It will be held in the AR on Wednesday, Oct. 1, from 9 a.m. to noon. If your last name starts with A through G, come at 8:45 a.m.; H through N, come at 9:45 a.m.; and O through Z, come at 10:45 a.m. Please follow this alphabetical order to limit confusion.

There will be no charge to you if you bring a valid Medicare card. If you belong to an HMO and want your shot given here, it will cost you \$20. All others not possessing a Medicare card also will be charged \$20.

Please do not forget your Medicare card. Cash or check will be accepted.

Your YNCG membership fee of \$1 was due July 1. Please sign up at the clinic.

In addition, Kaiser will be in Leisure Village on the morning of Oct. 16 to give flu shots.

Village as a menace and dangerous. I was told the man who dashed into our Village was the man in charge for the evening. I said I then would report it to his boss on Monday. He said he would have the man stop by to talk to me. I said it didn't matter as I would still report him.

As I was finishing my dinner, two officers rang my doorbell. I guess the second one was what you would call a backup.

The officer in charge asked me to step outside to talk, and I asked him why. He replied that he wasn't comfortable talking through a screen door.

I then realized they either wished to seem more menacing to this 82-year-old man on the same level or record our conversation.

The backup man, in an effort to show us his experience, told me he was a police officer and tried to show me his badge several times. We're old, and we hurt crossing at designated crosswalks when we are only going across street. It is impractical and further than we can sometimes walk. We may even turn around when alarmed and walk into you. Wouldn't it be better to give up the pursuit than to risk injury to a resident you were paid to protect?

piece of Velcro attached, entitled "Emergency Flag Procedure," explaining that the flag is to remain with the house and not to be removed (See sample printed on this page), along with the Flag itself with each house number printed on it.

In order for the changeover to the Red Flags to be successful, the ESO (Emergency Service Committee) hopes that every one of the residents will participate in this endeavor, and by the next Safety Drill in October, a majority of the Village, if not all, will display the Red Flag.

The purpose of changing the flags to Red Ribbons, and the choice of location to hang them, is for the volunteers to be able to readily see the flags against the light colored garage doors. Also, with a number of residents changing to the rollup type of garage doors, it left no place to hang the flags, and this system will eliminate the use of Tshirts, handkerchiefs, etc., on bushes and other inappropriate locations. - Charles Donnel, V. 32

Per the current Insurance Committee, there were no claims last year due to the CC&R amendment. A more accurate statement would be that there were no reported claims last year because most claims are under \$25,000, and that problem is now the Homeowner's problem.

What concerns me is the high insurance premium the Homeowners are forced to pay for an insurance policy that hasn't paid out one penny for a claim last year. The only reason the assessment was held at 2.861 percent is because the Board took monies from reserve funds to offset the insurance premium. I should mention that trust monies bequeathed to Leisure Village were also used toward the insurance premium, plus a special assess-

ment we all had to cough up. Using the reserve monies and special bequests were one-time money sources. So where will the money come from to pay the insurance premium this year and to replace the roof reserve?

It is my understanding that the current Insurance Committee is proposing to the Board that it hire an exclusive national broker of record to represent LVA's insurance needs. Do we need to pay a national broker of record or any broker of record to find the best policy for the best premium? Why don't we open up the bidding process instead and forego an expensive exclusive broker of record? With no claims last year, independent brokers should be clamoring for our business. We need to cut our losses instead of incurring more bills.

The question of homeowners' "rights" to attend committee meetings has come up on several occasions, including at the Candidates' Night last June. In fact, some candidates seemed to proclaim such a "right," apparently as a ploy to get elected. I submit that no such "right" exists.

The Davis Sterling Act clearly states that certain meetings must be open to homeowners (except for specifically identified subjects, such as legal, contractual and personnel matters) This rule applies to deci-

sion-making bodies, including our Board of Directors. It is presumptuous and foolish to extend such a rule to all homeowner meetings, e.g., club meetings.

Committees are not decision-making bodies. They serve at the pleasure of the Board. The are not even required, except for two committees specified in our governing documents: Architectural and Finance. They furnish advice and provide requested informa-

How committees obtain that information is up to them. How and where they conduct their meetings is up to them. In fact, some meetings may be conducted in the privacy of individual



homes. Committees may wish to consult other homeowners, but they do not have to.

Sometimes homeowner confidentiality is at stake. It would be impossible to protect the rights of a homeowner who wishes to provide confidential or personal information, if committees were required "by law" to have their meetings "open"!

The above does not mean that it is not, in fact, advisable to have committee meetings open to homeowners in most cases. It's certainly a good idea to do so; this has been our wise practice all along. With few justified exceptions, most of our Standing Committees always have and still do have open meetings, where homeowner attendance is in fact solicited!

We should encourage this generally beneficial practice of open committee meetings whenever practicable. However, we shouldn't condemn committees that find it advisable or necessary to limit homeowner attendance in justifiable circumstances. This right to obtain information for the Board without undue constraints is especially mandatory for Ad Hoc Committees appointed for specific purposes.

Again, I am not saying that all Ad Hoc Committees shall be closed. For example, the Ad Hoc Committee on Outside Management, which I chaired some time ago, was open to all homeowners (except for the last session when we prepared our final recommendations). But we should not claim that open attendance is mandatory for all LV committees!


Next safe driving course set for Oct. 16, 17 in MPR

DRILL: Don't forget to use your flags Oct. 16, 17

Interspersed throughout the remainder of Thursday and Friday will be training sessions conducted in each of the six communication sectors.

Villagers are asked to leave their flags in plain view for both days of the emergency exercises. Villagers will have the chance to visit Villages 1, 3, 5, 8, or 32 to see the new red-ribbon Donnel flags during this 48-hour event and to visit the night drill emergency generator and illumination equipment at the Radio Shack and the Pool Pavilion during the early evening.

First Aid and Search & Rescue will assist the Village Coordinators in each sector in the proper use of triage tags and available equipment for assisting victims of an earthquake. The coordinators will be working with both the First Aid Nurses and members of the Search

& Rescue team members. The locations of these special training drills will be announced on a surprise basis, giving each deputy coordinator the opportunity to work with all of the sector members on a specific (simulated) life-saving event.

At the 10 a.m. event on Thursday, Oct. 16, the two-day safety drill will begin with a regular local flag count in each Village, followed by a briefing session in the Pavilion. The flags are to remain up for the next 48 hours in order to conduct the ongoing training events. Forty-two Village Coordinators and Assistants, plus more than 100 Phone-Tree Helpers, will be striving for the very best flag count and 100 percent Villager support in each of the local villages.

"In a real disaster, everyone wants to help and be helped," said ham radio operator Marge May, "but some of our residents still fail to grasp the significance of being prepared. Some others, well, either they don't think Leisure Village will have another nighttime earthquake or that retirement excuses them from helping us to be prepared."

The ESO will have its power generator on for radio communications and for illumination of the Command Post, Triage First Aid Center, and other special needs in the early evening of Oct. 16.

Everyone is invited to drop by

Most important, everyone is to leave their A-OK Flag up for the entire 48 hours. The singular purpose of the ESO is to be prepared to save lives. When you use the flag (as explained in the Leisure Village Phone Book, Page 13) you save our Village Coordinators valuable time as they rush through each Village searching for those who really need immediate help.

For those who worry that

a real earthquake might happen during the 48 hours that their flag is outside, be assured that our Phone-Tree Helpers and Coordinators will take appropriate action to check on everyone.



inches. He lives in an isolette in the NICU (Neonatal Infant Care Unit) that monitors his breathing and well being and provides a safe environment for him. These dedicated women, through their generosity of time and resources, provide this infant with hats, booties and blankets.

Stitches from the Heart was formed by Kathy Silverton in 1998 when her daughter informed her that preemies were going home from the hospitals without clothing small enough to fit them. Her efforts at knitting for these children were publicized by the Los Angeles Times and she heard from 100 women who called to help her. The number of volunteers has grown, and currently there are 3,400 members, and so far in 2003, more than 115,900 items have been sent out to

380 hospitals.

Kathy said, "Knitters are the most giving people in society." The blankets are often used to cover the isolettes in the NICU, and when the infant is taken home, the blanket is used to keep the baby warm. Kathy pointed out that frequently people who have preemies are not prepared to take

home such a tiny infant. Often the women who donated the crocheted or knitted item receive a thank you from the mothers. They say that the knitted blankets are like a touch of home for the infants as well as for the parents.

Kathy stated that the items donated are in so much demand that sometimes the nurses fight over

the contents of the box because they have infants who will benefit from the items.

Stitches from the Heart is a non-profit organization. People may send donations or contribute wool or yarn to Winifred Singleton, the Leisure Village representative. Kathy stated, "In the sweaters I make for others I gently pass on my positive desires for their lives; this garment gives warmth while embracing the wearers in a hundred thousand little prayers."

missing these citations, the City Council has approved an \$18 administrative fee to cover the costs of personnel, mailing and supplies. It is hoped that the \$18 fee will be a deterrent.

If you have a handicap license plate, you will be OK, but if you have a placard, you should take care to make sure it is placed properly either on your rearview mirror or on your dashboard on the driver's side. Otherwise, you will be required to pay an \$18 fee when you make the request for the citation to be dismissed.

Of course, if you don't have handicap status as authorized by the State of California, you should never park in a parking spot designated for handicap only.
