L.V. Emergency Services

Emergency Services is in the process of updating emergency services in Leisure Village.

On Oct. 30, 1986, Paul Kelwin, as a representative for L.V., was sent by the City of Camarillo to a daylong conference aboard the Queen Mary in Long Beach. The conference was sponsored by the State of Calif., Governor's Office of Emergency Services. Over 800 people attended, representing municipalities, large and small businesses, school districts, churches, etc.

The conference's purpose was to promote community awareness and self-help preparedness. The conference provided resources to help promote advance planning and participation for Earthquake Preparedness Week in April 1987. The underlying theme of the conference was "selfhelp". We approximately 4000 Villagers cannot wholly rely on the City of Camarillo in the event of a major catastrophe as the other 40,000 in Camarillo



Senior Concerns

Last year 102,000 tax-payers donated \$430,000 to the California Fund for Senior Citizens - considerably lower than the \$741,600 received by the Endangered and Rare Species Fund, and the \$770,639 by the Children's Trust Fund for Abused Children.

The Senior Citizens Fund is the sole source of income for the 120 elected non-paid and non-partisan volunteer California Senior Legislature. It funds the 5-day annual session held in the State Capitol early in October, and the Senior Legislature on-going activities in developing and advocating passage of legislation on senior issues by the State Legislature.

For the first time this year, voluntary donations to the check-off funds on the state tax return are tax deductible on both the federal and state returns.

You don't have to be a Republican, a Democratic, or any other party affiliation to vote in the election of California Senior Legislators.

You just have to be a senior ... age 60 and older ... and a registered voter ... to vote on March 17 for your Senior Senator and your Senior Assembly Member.

I.R.A. COVER-UP

When you see these initials, what do they mean to you? Irish Republican Army? Possibly, but not likely. Individual Retirement Account? Probably, but not necessarily.

INSURANCE RESERVE ACCOUNT? Certainly, if you have been reading *Inside Leisure Village* these many months and have been following the debate on the payment of the \$1,000 fire insurance deductible.

It is regrettable that not a single member of the Association Board of Directors has accepted the challenge to discuss the Insurance Reserve Account. The Board owes the residents an explanation, more especially since it was revealed during a recent meeting of the Finance Committee that the Board, in a closed meeting and therefore without public notification, has authorized payment of small property damage liability claims from the funds set aside for the payment of fire insurance claims.

Not only does the Association's liability insurance policy not contain a property damage deductible clause, but we are alarmed that financial reserves specifically set aside for one purpose (payment of the fire insurance deductible) are being drained off to pay claims presumably covered under liability insurance.

Thus, Account No. 449, carried under the name of "Deductible Insurance Reserves," declined from \$26,399 for the month ending January 1985 to \$24,741 in the month ending December 1986. In this two-year period only one legitimate damage claim was paid and then only because the Villager had threatened legal action. Though the claim was for almost \$1,200, the Association paid only \$616 from the Insurance Reserve Account.

Perhaps it may be asserted that the Board is justified in paying small property damage liability claims, instead of filing them with the insurance carrier, so as not to build up an aggregate loss experience that may lead to a policy cancellation. If this is the case, why doesn't the Board act in open session and spell out for all the Villagers to understand the rationale for this new approach?

For example, what is the maximum property damage claim that the Association will pay?

Why is not a special reserve fund set up for this particular purpose?

Why have \$1,042 in liability claims been paid from the Insurance Reserve Fund, which was set up to pay claims under the fire insurance deductible?

Finally, is it the Board's intention to destroy the viability of the Insurance Reserve Account? Is this the reason for the cover-up?

CONDO OR PUD?

Newcomers to Leisure Village — and some old-timers — don't know whether they bought a condo or a PUD townhouse, or what the difference is between them. They have every right to be confused for even the insurance industry sells condominium policies to cover PUD townhouses. Leisure Village is a planned development under California law, but is a Planned Unit Development (PUD) under the regulations of federal agencies which finance such developments in the secondary market.

What is the difference between a condo and a PUD townhouse development? Simply stated, in a condo the homeowners association holds title to all the land and the structures thereon, while the individual condo owners hold title to airspace surrounded by walls, ceilings, floors, doors and windows. In a PUD development, each owner has complete ownership of his lot and the residential structure erected thereon. The Homeowners Association holds title to the common area which includes recreational facilities, streets and landscaped areas — everything but the individual lots and the structures thereon.

This basic difference in ownership affects the responsibilities of the Homeowners Association and the homeowners. Since in a condominium the association owns all of the land and structures, it is responsible for repairing and maintaining them, and taking out insurance to protect the association against loss. The cost of such repair, maintenance, and insurance is collected from homeowners through the annual assessment. In a PUD, in the absence of specific provisions in the CC&Rs making the association responsible for repair, maintenance and insurance of the individual dwelling units, responsibility for such repair, maintenance and insurance rests on the homeowners. However, in townhouse developments, it is customary to make the association responsible for exterior maintenance and repair of dwelling units, and it has become quite common to make the association, rather than the individual homeowners, responsible for insuring the dwelling units as well as facilities in the common area. As in the case of a condominium, the association collects its costs of exterior maintenance and insurance through the annual assessments.

What do the Leisure Village CC&Rs provide with respect to these matters? There are two provisions which are directly in point:

- 1. Sec. 3.4 reads in part as follows:
- 3.4 Duties of the Association. The Association shall have the obligation to perform each of the following duties:
- (b) To paint, maintain and repair the exterior surfaces of the Dwelling Units, subject to the provisions of Paragraph 3.6
- (e) To obtain and maintain in force the following policies of insurance:

One key is placed at each location. The patrol officer carries the clock to that location. The key is inserted into the clock to print out the time on the recording tape. This operation is repeated at 15 different locations with a different numbered key at each location.

The following day the Chief will remove the tapes from the clocks. The clocks, which are tamper proof, are intended to provide a positive patrol of all areas of the village.

Profile: The Multi-Talented Jack Fosdick

He's a man well-known for many good reasons. To some young and old he's L.V.'s "Santa Claus", to students he's an interesting school lecturer; still others are entertained by his Village Player acting roles, and to others he's known as a hard-working member of varied L.V. committees.

This month's spotlight is on Jack Fosdick, a V. 41 resident for some seven years.

When Jack was just 13 years old his family moved from Philadelphia to Santa Monica. After graduating from Hollywood High, he attended U.C.L.A. for several years before seeking employment.

Jack's mother, a Bull-ock's manager, helped him get a start with the company. From stock boy he rose to a sales position and at the young age of 23 was made a buyer.

"There was a very attractive lady by the name of Anne Carmichael also working at Bullock's', says Jack, "and believe it or not, it took two years of persuasion before she agreed to go out on a date with me."

Happily, she did and on February 19, 1938, the former Miss Monterey Park beauty queen became Mrs. Jack Fosdick.

World War II interrupted their happy lives and Jack was sent off to officers' training. Following graduation he was assigned to the Infantry and later was sent to England to prepare for the invasion.

Ashore on D-Day

On June 6, 1944, with supporting Allied aircraft overhead, Jack led his platoon of 72 men ashore at Utah Beach on the Normandy coast.

Thus the Association has become responsible for both exterior and interior repairs of Dwelling Units to the extent of the insurance coverage. If for any reason the insurance were not sufficient to complete interior repairs, the burden would fall on the homeowners to complete such repairs. And the problem of who should pay and how to collect all of the deductibles is still unresolved.

What about interior repairs of Dwelling Units due to wear and tear or





Development of the trellis area south of the pool is in the planning stage. Exercise classes and ping pong tables, displaced by the new meeting rooms, will eventually use the south area. A solid roof of skylight panels is being considered. Some roof supports must be replaced due to termite damage.

The MPR is having a major face lift. Walls, floors and ceilings all will be re-done, displacing group meetings for about a month. Cooperation of residents with the office staff who must re-schedule meetings during this trying time is urgently requested. Barbara Lay is the new clerk in the Rec. office who must do much of the re-scheduling.







very difficult landing with many of the boats either overturning or being hit by strafing enemy machine gun fire. There were ship of the Community heavy losses.'

Once ashore, they made their way inland, slowed not only by gunfire but by rivers of water as the enemy flooded the land during their slow but steady retreat.

As brave men of the 4th Division slugged their way on a direct line to Cherbourg, casualties ran high. Then, just 13 days after the D-Day landing, two enemy mortar shells exploded near Jack. The blast flung pieces of shrapnel into his body and broke both his legs.

Medics were quickly on the scene. Using two rifles on each of his legs, they made emergency splints and rushed him behind the lines. Later he was sent to England for further medical work, then on to the U.S. for treatment at a number of different hospitals.

Finally, some eighteen months after his close call with death, Jack was released from a hospital in Van Nuvs and started his chosen profession anew.

He joined the F.C. Nash Company, a clothing department store in Pasadena. In 1946, Anne and Jack were blessed with a son, Steve.

In 1950 the family of three moved to Encino as Jack joined the Joseph and Feiss Company, manufacturers of many of America's finest men's suits.

For the next 30 years Jack represented this prestigious firm, attaining Vice Presidency of the Western Region.

"It was Anne who decided that retirement time was here." Jack states. "She certainly was right in saying that Leisure Village would be a good choice.'

They quickly adjusted to the good life here. Anne, discovering that she had a natural talent for the stage, joined and and yet the hardest play became very active in the Village Players, Variety Guild and The Rhyth-




