
### **Beautiful Home!**

I remember when I was a kid and money wasn't too plentiful. My mother would take me for shoes. She always picked shoes a size larger than I needed and when I complained that they were too big she would say "they're not too big. I'll stuff some cotton in the toes and you'll grow into them. They're good shoes. By the time they fit you your sister can wear them." I never had anything that fit me. Either it was too long so it would fit next year or it was too wide so it would fit my sister. All my clothes came in two sizes, "too big" and "too small". With five girls in the family if it didn't fit one it was bound to fit another.

I watch my grandchildren growing up now and marvel at the difference. Kids never had it so good! A child now is like a "sun" about which all the world orbits. There's no such thing as a child not having everything every other kid has. They "have" to have it. They're "entitled". I didn't "have to have" anything. I wasn't "entitled" to an opinion! Not that I didn't have them. I had them but I couldn't voice them. I was talking to my grandson the other day: "Grandma", he said, "when I save up enough money from my allowance I'm going to buy" . . . he mentioned some outer-space sounding toy. I shook my head in wonder. I couldn't believe, after almost breaking my neck on one of the hundreds of toys on his bedroom floor, that there could possibly be anything left he didn't already have at least two of! On the way home I sat in the car steeped in retrospection. Reflecting on my own childhood and making comparisons, I thought about his "allowance". When I was a kid the only allowance I ever heard of was the six inch hem on my dress or the inch wide seams. I don't remember ever saving a dime . . . in fact. I don't remember ever having a dime to save! There were only pennies. For one penny we could buy six green "spearmint leaves", a "Tootsie Roll", or a "Penny Waffle". It's very sad to think that my grandchildren will grow up never having eaten a "Penny Waffle", that heavenly creation so crisp on the outside and creamy within, and covered all over with confectioners sugar that powdered your nose and stuck to your lashes with every bit. Looking back in memory I can almost hear again the "tooting" of his horse-drawn cart as it whistled while he worked . . . It's very sad that my grandchildren will never experience the character-building incidents that shaped our lives and molded our personalities so permanently that even now, when I can well afford to buy my clothes at Robinsons, I find myself, arms laden with "rejects", waiting patiently in line for a dressing room at "The Outlet" . . .

When I became a teenager things were slightly better for me. By that time one of my older sisters had a good job and was earning what was then considered "a man's salary". She dressed beautifully and I began to inherit some very nice "hand-me-downs". There was just one drawback . . . again, nothing fit me. She was taller and heavier than I was so that everything had to be made over, with the result that, although they came from "Saks Fifth Avenue", still felt like "homemades", and did very little for my depressed ego. I remember once when I was invited to a junior prom and flew into a real temper tantrum, screaming and yelling that this time I was going to have my own dress! My ego wasn't the only thing that was depressed . . . it was 1932 and money was very scarce. I carried on so dramatically (threatening suicide), that my mother, sensing the importance of the occasion and the depth of my emotion, finally capitulated and handed me five much needed dollars. Issuing a "declaration of independence" I went by myself and purchased a brightly flowered chiffon dress, very sophisticated and utterly unsuited to my childishly undeveloped figure. Looking back I realize how ridiculous I must have looked but at the time I thought it was the most beautiful dress I had ever seen, and, most of all, it was my own . . . my first "very own" dress. I remember it as one of the most traumatic experiences of my life, for as I danced in the arms of my adolescent admirer, feeling as enchanted as Cinderella at the prince's ball, there hanging from under my arm was a price tag reading "as is — no returns — \$5.00"! In one fleet second my "carriage" had turned into a "pumpkin" . . . I wanted to kill myself!

Getting back to shopping. Let's face it, I'm what is known as a "born shopper". It comes naturally to me. My "nose for a bargain" unerringly leads me directly to the one item of value in a pile of junk. I get a bigger thrill out of a reduced garment with a little hole that I can cover with a flower or a jeweled pin than buying a Christian Dior or a Gloria Vanderbilt. I would rather shop than eat. I love it! You can wake me up in the middle of the night and ask me to go to "The Oaks" and I could be dressed and ready in five minutes flat. I could be down with the flu and a raging fever but let the phone ring and I'm up in a flash, sneezing and coughing, and fortified with aspirins and a box of Kleenex, am on my way. Not that I buy so much. Usually I come home with nothing, which simply infuriates Jerry. He says, "I never saw anyone shop so much and buy so little! How come you didn't get anything?" How can I tell him I couldn't find anything that was ripped, soiled, or had only one sleeve? So . . . I developed two pat answers: "I'm too small for the things I should wear at my age and too old for the things that fit me" and "I'll be darned if I'll pay sixty dollars for something that isn't worth six". I don't know . . . I guess you can't change an old "bag" with a new "rag" . . . it must be a carry-over from childhood . . . conditioning is a very powerful thing . . .

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### ALEXANDER M. HAIG, JR. **JOINS** LEISURE TECHNOLOGY BOARD

LOS ANGELES, CA — General Alexander M. Haig, Jr., former U.S. Secretary of State, has joined the Board of Directors of Leisure Technology it was announced today by Michael L. Tenzer, Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer. General Haig will also serve as a consultant to the Company.

Prior to serving as President Reagan's first Secretary of State, General Haig was President and Chief Operating Officer of United Technologies Corporation, and until 1979 served as Supreme Allied Commander, Europe, a position to which he was appointed by President Gerald R. Ford after he served as White House Chief of Staff.

In announcing General Haig's association with Leisure Technology, Mr. Tenzer stated: "We are most pleased that Alexander Haig has agreed to join our Board of Directors. Throughout his distinguished career both in and out of uniform, including service at the highest levels of our government and the corporate community, he has been recognized as a leader not only in our country, but throughout the world."

General Haig said, "Now that I am in my fifth retirement, I have a special interest in housing and health care services for a growing adult and retirement population. Longer life expectancy and increased opportunities for the young, adult and the senior citizen in the U.S. make Leisure Technology's housing concepts particularly dynamic and important. I am pleased to be associated with the Company, a leading national developer of adult and retirement communities. I look forward to my increased involvement with the concerns and issues confronting this fastest-growing segment of the U.S. population."

General Haig is also a Director of MGM/UA Entertainment Company, and MGM/UA Home Entertainment Group. In addition to other corporate and public interest associations, he is Chairman of United Technologies Corporation's European Advisory Council, and a Senior Fellow at the Hudson Institute (a Policy Research Institute in the Public Interest). Since his resignation as Secretary of State, General Haig has been a Visiting Statesman and Executive at the Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs, Princeton University; a Chubb Fellow at Yale University; and has lectured on domestic and international issues through the U.S. and in over 20 countries.


