



Cal State Fullerton Campus

California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing.

Classes were offered for the first time in 1959 and the first commencement — for five students — took place in 1960.

The university's 23,500 students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and other nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes; many come to classes only in the evening.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 750-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The university enjoys full accreditation for its overall program. In addition, national recognition has been accorded to programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, education, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing, and theater. All told there are 85 degree programs — 41 of them at the graduate level plus several credential programs and five certificate programs.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is an internship and cooperative education program that allows students

to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their regular studies

Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours without the formalities of regular admission to the university.

Still another strong point is the university's cultural events program. It includes a series that brings nationally-known professional artists to the campus for residencies as well as public performances and the Cabaret Repertory Theater Company, which performs regularly in Brea.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members is another highlight, as is the network of community support groups. Another is Continuing Learning Experience, which has spearheaded the fund-raising campaign to build a gerontology center on campus.

Further examples of community outreach are joint ventures with the City of Fullerton. One resulted in the Fullerton Arboretum, which opened on campus in 1979. Another produced lighting for the baseball field and adjoining soccer fields, while a third yielded two lighted softball fields.

To reinforce the university's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State has embarked on a comprehensive fund-raising campaign. Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to make a very good university a great university.

ADMINISTRATION



Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb, President

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb was appointed the third president of Cal State Fullerton on July 8, 1981. Her selection was the culmination of a nationwide search begun in November, 1980 to replace Dr. L. Donald Shields, who had resigned after a ten-year term to accept the presidency of Southern Methodist University.

Dr. Cobb had served as Dean of Douglass College at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, since 1976. There she also held the rank of Professor of Biological Sciences. Prior to her Douglass appointment, she was Dean of Connecticut College and Professor of Zoology for seven years. Previously, she was Professor of Biology at Sarah Lawrence College in New York. in New York

in New York.

Born in January, 1924, Dr. Cobb is known for her work in cell physiology, her promotion of the advancement of women in scientific fields and her activities on behalf of minorities. She is the first black woman to head a major public university on the west coast.

Cobb earned her bachelor's degree in 1944 from Talladega College in Alabama and her M.S. and Ph.D. in cell physiology from New York University in 1947 and 1950, respectively. She is the mother of a son, Jonathan, who is a graduate of the Cornell University Medical School.

HEAD COACH JUDI GARMAN



Beginning her seventh season at Cal State Fullerton, Judi Garman has led the Titans to no less than a ninth place national finish in her six-year tenure while picking up 300 career victories along the way, a remarkable feet for the only coach in the program's history.

Garman established the program in 1980 and finished third in the conference, second in the region and ninth place nationally. Since then, Garman's teams have won every conference and five out of six regional championships while finishing second at the College World Series in 1981 and 1983 and third in 1982 and 1985.

Garman's instant success at Fullerton is only the latest in a remarkable string of accomplishments which stretch across the continent from Canada to the University of California, Santa Barbara to Golden West College in Huntington Beach to Cal State Fullerton.

At Golden West College in 1971, she inherited a team which was winless the previous year and took it to a 9-8 showing. Over the next four years she captured her first conference crown and the first of her four national championships.

Starting with nothing at Fullerton, she has took the Titans to the College World Series in her first four years. Just missing the national twice while settling for second place.

Garman earned her bachelor's degree from the University of Saskatchewan in 1966 and immediately moved to California where she began working on her master's degree at UC Santa Barbara. While at Santa Barbara, she started club softball and soon had a varsity team. Upon completion of her studies she took the women's athletic directorship at Westmont College in Santa Barbara and coached the volleyball, basketball and tennis in addition to softball.

Garman then moved to Golden West College where, along with softball, she coached basketball (1973-76) and cross-country (1977-79). Twenty-one of her softball players received scholarships to four-year institutions, against who she manufactured a 34-11-2 record over the years.

In great demand as a speaker and instructor at clinics, Garman has conducted her own sessions at Golden West College and Fullerton, attracting hundreds of coaches and young softball players. She has also taken a Titan team to Sweden for a series of clinics and exhibitions.

Fishing and snow skiing occupy Garman time away from softball field. She has also been published in many physical education journals and was a pioneer in the equality in sports movement when she played Little League baseball.

ASSISTANT COACH KATHY VAN WYK

Kathy Van Wyk begins her fourth year as the Titans' assistant coach after a highly successful playing career at Cal State Fullerton and Texas Women's University.

Van Wyk, 25 had a sensational one year pitching career at Fullerton after transferring from Texas Women's University when its softball program was dropped. At Fullerton she compiled a 35-1 record with an earned run average of 0.18 and 270 strikeouts in 278 innings pitched. She was named both NCAA and AIAW All-American while receiving the Broderick Award for the nation's top softball player. Van Wyk also received an NCAA post-graduate scholarship.

At TWU she was a member of the 1979 AIAW National Championship team and was named Texas AIAW Player of the Year. In 1980 she was nominated for the Broderick Award after compiling a 40-6 record with three perfect games. In 1981 her record was 11-9 with a 0.63 ERA in 133 innings. She was also an ASA All-American when she played for the Orlando Rebels in 1979.

Van Wyk was born in Holland Michigan on July 21, 1960 and attended Holland Christian High School. She was

named to the all-conference team and she played on the 1979 state championship team. She also played two years of volleyball and three seasons of basketball. In basketball she was once all-city and twice all-conference.

After coming to Fullerton she ran her pitching record to 33-0 before losing her first game in the College World Series and was named County Athlete of the Year by the Orange County Sportwriters Association for sports other than football, basketball or baseball.

Last March, Kathy took her pitching talents to Australia to compete for the US National team at the World Friendship Tournament.

TITANS LOOK TO CONTEND AGAIN IN 1986

Loaded with two returning first-team All-Americans, the winningest pitcher in the program's history, one of the nation's top recruiting classes and 300 career wins, Cal State Fullerton Softball Head Coach **JUDI GARMAN (300-82-2)** has got to be excited about the Titans chances in 1986.

"Certainly we have some outstanding talent returning this season," notes the six-year coach. "But there are still some questions that are

going to be answered before the season starts."

Lost off last year's third-place (NCAA Championships) team are first-team All-America pitcher Debbie Mygind (28-4, 0.27 ERA), starting rightfielder Lisa Baker (.262, 18 doubles), centerfielder Leslie King (.268), shortstop Lisa Noriega (.227) plus former all-conference catcher Maridee Richards (.185).

"When you lose two-thirds of your outfield, plus a starting pitcher of Debbie's caliber, you would certainly have areas of concern," notes Garman. "But with our new recruits, plus the off-season progress of

some of our returners, I think the team should come together."

Headlining the returning class are senior All-Americans JOANN FERRIERI and TERRI OBERG. Ferrieri proved to be the nation's finest third baseman after hitting .328 for the season and closing out the year by being picked to the All-College World Series team. Leftfielder Oberg posted a marvelous offensive campaign last year with 7 HR's, 8 triples, 6 doubles and 35 RBI's. Oberg will move from the outfield to a possible starting spot at shortstop while also offering relief at catcher and third base thus leaving three outfield spots to be filled. Speed will be the name of the game for the Titan outfield as fleet JC transfer CHENITA ROGERS (.703), returning senior DIANE DODD (.172) and redshirt sophomore RINA FOSTER presently hold the advantage. Yet some outstanding talent wait in the wings including newcomer ALANI SILVA, one of the nation's top JC hitters, powerhitting JC transfer YVONNE SOLIS or versatile returner CORINA SMITH. Silva and Solis seem the logical choices as the designated hitters.

"I am very pleased with the way our outfield presently stands," adds Garman. "We were able to acquire some additional power plus

improving our overall team speed, a real priority."

With Ferrieri set at third, shortstop should be either Oberg, UCLA transfer CHERYL DAZALLA or freshman CHARIS MONROE. Sophomore VALERIE VAN KIRK (.160) showed exceptional defensive talent and poise for a freshman and should be a lock at second base. Gold glove first baseman ROBIN GOODIN posted her finest all-around season after hitting .250, including a CWS home-run off UCLA's Debbie Doom. Freshman ANDREA GRAY will understudy Ferrieri at third base.

The departure of Richards leaves junior MICHELLE GROMACKI (.180) as the heir apparent to the catching job but competition could come from freshman KRISTEN GOODALL and Oberg, who has been recently working out at the position.

SUSAN LEFEBVRE, an All-American as a freshman, returns for her collegiate finale after posting a very fine 23-6 record with an ERA of 0.52 in 1985. She will be joined by the nation's top JC pitcher last year in CONNIE CLARK of Central Arizona CC. Look for junior APRIL JONES to see some action as will Ferrieri, who pitched for the Titans in her first two years.

The 1986 Titans will be shooting for a fifth appearance at the College World Series after only six years of existence. Last season, Fullerton spent a good portion of the year atop the national rankings only to fall to eventual NCAA Champ UCLA in the CWS semi-finals. The most glaring question of note remains how well the recruiting class can adapt to Division I softball plus the off-season development of the returners. Should all come together as expected, Fullerton should find a way to Omaha once again in 1986.

1985 COLLEGE WORLD SERIES

Heading into their fifth CWS in six seasons, the Titans felt confidently that they could break the jinx and take the national championship. Fullerton was the tournaments' number one seed and had handily defeated all competition throughout the regular season. In that a vast majority of CWS teams had fallen to Fullerton during the year gave the Titans all the more confidence and security. But this was the national championship where a hot team can run the gamut into the title.

Fullerton was coming off a relatively easy regional championship series with Central Michigan with back to back 5-0 victories. The Titans had relied all season on strong bats (Ferrieri .328, Oberg 7 HR, 8 3B and 35 RBl's) plus outstanding pitching (Mygind 26-3, LeFebvre 22-5) and the Chippewas learned that early in both games before bowing out.

The Titans were ready for the College World Series.

GAME #1: If the Titans came into their first game of the tournament overconfident, that wore off quickly as the pitchers' duel between Mygind and Adelphi's Julie Bolduc carried into the eighth inning tied at 0-0. After entering the eighth inning, the game went to the international tiebreaker whereby a runner, the last batter to get out, starts at second base. For Fullerton in the top of the eighth, Leslie King opened up the inning at second. Right fielder Lisa Baker sacrifices King to third but is thrown out at first. JoAnn Ferrieri next steps up to the plate and proves why she is an All-America by lining a single to left-center. She is thrown out trying to stretch it to a double but the run still scored giving Fullerton a 1-0 lead. Oberg closed out the inning flying out. FINAL SCORE: Fullerton 1, Adelphi 0

GAME #2: The Titan's second appearance in the College World Series would mark another chapter in one of softball's most celebrated rivalries. UCLA had fallen to Fullerton twice in the regular season but the Bruins were the defending national champs and looked to continue. Mygind took the mound for Fullerton in game 2 while UCLA's All-America Debbie Doom countered for the Bruins. The game was scoreless into the third when the Titans struck on a Bruin defensive miscue. With two outs in the bottom of the third, Oberg singles up the middle. The next batter Ferrieri grounds to shortstop. UCLA's Leslie Rover goes to make the easy play for the force at second but Bruin second baseman Chris Olivie isn't at the bag and the ball rolls to right. Oberg goes to third and Ferrieri stays at first. Lisa Baker pokes a single to center scoring Oberg while Ferrieri stops at second. Robin Goodin closes out the inning with a ground out but the damage is already done and the Titans lead 1-0. Fullerton got one more on Goodin's first collegiate home run while Mygind went the distance to allow two hits along with seven strikeouts. FINAL SCORE: Fullerton 2, UCLA 0

GAME #3: The CWS's two undefeated teams met for the first time since the PONY Tournament with different results this time. Earlier in the year, the Titans handled Lori Sippel and the Huskers with a 2-0 victory. This time the Titans caught Nebraska when they were hot. Susan LeFebvre went for Fullerton and quickly fell behind 3-0 in the third. That would be all the Huskers would need but the Titans did benefit from a solo home run from Terri Oberg in the sixth. Nebraska went on the get two more to close out the scoring. FINAL SCORE: Nebraska 5. Fullerton 1

GAME #4: The first semi-final contest featured two arch-rivals, both with one loss on the brink of elimination. Cal Poly Pomona and the Titans have played some of softball's most exciting contests this season and today's would be no exception. Fullerton opened with Mygind while the Broncos countered with All-America Rhonda Wheatley in a battle of softball's top pitchers of 1985. Fullerton grabbed an early lead when first inning leadoff batter Leslie King is hit by a pitch. After Oberg strikes out, Ferrieri doubles to rightcenter scoring King. Baker and Goodin pop up stranding pinch runner Corina Smith at second. Titans take a 1-0 lead. The lead holds true until the bottom of the fourth when the Broncos score when Lyn Callahan singles home Alison Stowell, who had also singled. With the score tied, Pomona threatened in their half of the sixth by putting runners on second and third with one out. Mygind is replaced by Susan LeFebvre who proceeds to force Bronco catcher Donna McElrea to pop out and Stowell to strike out. With the score tied in the eighth inning, the tiebreaker rule goes into effect. Titan Valerie Van Kirk starts out the inning on second and is sacrificed to third by DH Diane Dodd. A King grounder to short sends Van Kirk home but she is thrown out at the plate with King safe at first. With two outs, Terri Oberg singles King to second. JoAnn Ferrieri then steps up and singles to right scoring King and giving Fullerton a 2-1 lead. The Broncos test LeFebvre once again while starting Kathy Powell at second. The sacrifice attempt finds Powell advancing to third while batter Jenny Moore is safe at first. Moore steals while Shar Bilyeu is up putting runners at second and third with no outs. Bilyeu pops up to Goodin for the first out. Kandi Burke grounds to short with the runners holding for the second out. McElrea is intentionally walked to load the bases to bring up Stowell. Stowell strikes out to end the tournaments most exciting game. FINAL SCORE: Fullerton 2, Pomona 1

GAME #5: A rematch of game two with the winner to face Nebraska for the national title. The game opened with Susan LeFebvre for Fullerton and Tracy Compton for UCLA. LeFebvre went 3 1/3 before giving way to Debbie Mygind after allowing three hits without a strikeout. The game remained scoreless till the bottom of the seventh when Leslie Rover of UCLA singled past shortstop, Jennifer Simm sacrificed her to second before Gina Holmstrom singles to put runners on first and third with one out. Right fielder Chris Olivie steps up to the plate and singles to left, driving in Rover and sending UCLA to the championship finals once again. The Bruins had to beat Nebraska twice, which they did, to capture their second consecutive NCAA title. FINAL SCORE: UCLA 1, Fullerton 0
