November 8. 1876

Dear Boy -

I know I ought to have written to you - but I am so busy - and if I attempt to write when I go up to bed Corey wakes right up - and write in the darks I cannot -

I have your last letter telling me about your visits and dining at the Parlett's - Is Mr. Hughes a nice man? and when the rains set in, will you see that the trunks in the play house don't get damp from leaks? -

Emma is well and all right again from her diphtheria - Fanny has been home all the week with an ulcerated sore throat and a bilious head - but he is about well now - It was not diphtheria -

but for a day or two looked like it.
Arny is well - I had all his hair cut
off - short to his head and he looks
very funny. Indu is tolerably well -
I think Barnum was too much
for them - the Salimons are very kind
and give them an overwhelming lot
of things. Emma is very homesick
at times - its very sad to hear her
ask me if I don't want to go home?
they all send their love - The weather
is lovely - I rec a letter from Sallies
that I will try to answer -

Mother is better one day and not so
well the next but all together I
think she is gaining or not losing
the nurse is still here.

The children send their love to the

Arletti and Taylor - the Stewart
outrage is the excitement here - Do n't
it the worst you ever heard of -

I trust you are well - We all send
you our love - Father is well and
very kind - he always wants to know
how you are - What is the number of
your boarding house - and the
name - do you continue to like it -

If I can I'll write more Sunday - I
know I neglect you - but you can
survive it - and the changes will be
of great benefit to you - I found your
visit to the Lamps very interesting.

Louisa is still here -

I sleep with Dad and Emma is here
with me and Arny in his crib.

Dear Boy.

I should have written sooner but I actually have no time. I run all day and evening and the strains are awful hard on me.

Mother is no better and sits up in a wrapper just a few minutes and lays on the lounge awhile and goes back to bed. she does not cough much. but has night sweats and is very weak and low spirited for her. The last night I wrote to you she had a terrible turn.

Emma is very sick and I fear it will be diphtheria. she has no cough a very high fever has night sweats looks badly and is real sick. there are two spots in her throat very sore and Dr. Johnson says

a case just like it on the next block
turned into diphtheria in one night
covered the throat a finger broad -
which is encouraging - I hope for the
best. Johnson was here twice yesterday,
and I give all the children Whiskey,
and sleep (?) with Emma myself -
I do all I can - the others are well -
I went to see Miss Dobbin yesterday
she was very pleasant and kind -
It's a very nice school for Pam, I
intended sending him today - but it
rains so hard - I don't think it safe
before now - I don't know how much it
will be - will write you when the bill
comes in - The Salesmen arrived home
last week they brought me a lovely
breast pin - Andrew a beautiful Roman dash
Array a Belt - and Emma a pair and
a real Scotch Kilt dressed doll Pam

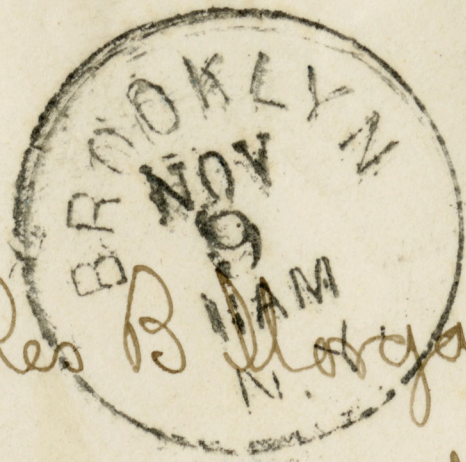
a pin cushion - were they not kind? -
They brought India the same - and Mother
as pair of candle sticks - India has given
Painal a pair of stockings worth dollars
and ten cents in many - one a dress
and socks and an end of things.
Hope you can read this - I'm scribbling
for life - Orey is fat and crosser
than ever.

29th

Emma's the doctor thinks is better - that
is her throat is spreading - it looks
very bad. I had to buy Painal a Hat
and a pair of shoes.

I hope you are well and high
spirited - I was pleased to get the
"Bulletin", and I observed the Dick
quotations. I'll write again soon
