Candidates Night set for May 19 in AR

Candidates Night, an open forum when six candidates for the Leisure Village Association Board of Directors will have an opportunity to address homeowners and answer questions, will be held at 7 p.m. Thursday, May 19, in the

This important session will be broadcast live on LVTV and replayed via recorded tape

during the next several weeks. Absentee ballots will be mailed to all homeowners on May 20 with the Annual Meeting date scheduled for Thursday, June 23, at 10 a.m., after which the results will be announced and officers for the coming year elected.

With the deadlines having passed for applications submitted through the

Nominating Committee, and/or receipt of appropriate petitions as provided for in the governing documents, the process associated with the annual election for candidates interested in serving on the five-member board of directors for the next two years is well underway. Public records show that four applications were received and subsequently

approved by the Nominating Committee, consisting of incumbents Jerry Rosen and Don Marquardt, in addition to homeowners Bob Ellis and Robert Riveles. Ted Lansing's seat is also open, but he is ineligible to run because he has reached the term limit of four years.

New decals available this month

Valid window stickers for easy entrance by residents into Leisure Village will expire on May 31 and therefore need to be renewed prior to that date. To facilitate the process, Safety and Security has established the following dates to have the old window stickers removed and replaced with a newer rendition that will then be valid for the next three years:

Wednesday and Thursday, May 18 and 19, from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. and then 2 p.m. through 5 p.m., and Saturday, May 21, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. No decaling will occur on Friday, May 20, due to a

The bills from Southern California Edison for the first two months in the new home averaged \$125, which seemed acceptable. Then began the bad news: November's electricity charge was \$200, December's \$443, January's \$364, and February's a whopping \$545!

"The fee was \$40, and it was worth it." explains Ross. "He discovered that the heating system had no heat pump. It was the original equipment installed over 30 years ago and didn't

include one."

'Power police' solve mystery

Ross is a retired telephone company manager who believes in thorough research. He applied that discipline to replacing the inefficient and ancient heating system and ducts.



The next month, the Edmonds' electric bill was \$106. And the savings have continued.

An eggs-citing spring breakfast

By now you should know that the "incredible edible" egg has been exonerated, and the medical community agrees that moderate consumption of eggs does not cause unhealthy rise in cholesterol levels. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, "Eggs are nutrient-rich, aid in weight management, muscle strength, eye health, and brain function."

Eggs are all natural and packed with nutrients at only 70 calories

This terrific recipe is so easy to make. On weekends I double this recipe-and when the kids come, I quadruple it. Everyone loves these eggs-cellent pancakes!

Ricotta Cheese Pancakes (Serves one) 1 large egg

1/4 cup lowfat Ricotta cheese 1/4 cup flour (I prefer unbleached) ½ tsp. sugar or sugar substitute to taste (optional) 1/4 cup fresh blueberries or 1/2 sliced banana (optional)

In medium bowl, use fork or whisk to mix the first four ingredients until well-blended. If desired fold fresh blueberries or sliced bananas into batter. Spray pan with butterflavored non-stick spray and preheat at medium high for 2-3 minutes. Using tablespoon, drop batter onto pan. This recipe makes about 4 pancakes. Use spatula to flip pancakes when the surface bubbles and the edges are dry. The second side cooks faster; be careful not to burn. (Once you flip, it only takes another minute or two.) Put on plate and top with low sugar syrup or jam — or use fresh fruit like strawberries and bananas as topping.

the election containing the required 43 signatures (2 percent of eligible voters) were also received from Lynne Holmes and Robert Kulick, bringing the total number of candidates for the three open seats to six.

Background information and accompanying photographs may be viewed at any time in the display case located at the atrium on the west side of the Recreation Center. This information will also be mailed to all homeowners by the Association in the near future.

The rules and regulations governing campaign procedures and the election process will also be made available to all homeowners.

As noted for previous years, and according to state law, nominations may also be made from the floor at the annual meeting, but because a vast majority of voting is completed via the use of absentee ballots, anyone nominated at the annual meeting has little if any chance of success in winning the election.


The governing documents require that a minimum of 1,069 votes be cast for the election to be valid, and although a process exists to override this potential problem, it is time consuming and costly, and ILV staff therefore requests that all homeowners become familiar with the candidates and "get out" the vote.

On April 11, the Leisure Village Pet Club hosted Dr. Kenra Decile, hereafter referred to as the cat doctor, at our meeting. Dr. Kendra is one of a group of veterinarians who work in the Camarillo and Thousand Oaks area. Dr. Decile has offered to give Leisure Village Pet Club cat owners the first visit free.

Cats are not small dogs! The main message from any vet: Cats hide diseases. It is their genetic disposition to hide their weaknesses. It can take weeks for a cat's illness to reach the point of showing itself. The main medical problems in cats are obesity and diabetes, heart disease, kidney disease, and asthma. Cats are living longer lives — 8 years is now considered middle age.

Fur ball problem? Use one tablespoon of pumpkin daily for hairball medication, and you can use flavored Vaseline or sweet potatoes. Another way to reduce furballs is to give your cat a lion cut.

Looking for a place to board your cat? There are several places — at Dr. Decile's two hospitals and at Kitty Land in Ventura and in Santa Barbara at the Cat House.

One of her food recommendations is Science Diet. Corn, fish (except salmon) and beef are allergens for cats. Dry food depletes the water that they need, creating kidney problems, and it packs on the pounds.




