This year, the annual Your Neighbors Care Group (Y.N.C.G.) Health Fair will be held on Sunday, March 9 from 9:00 a.m. to noon in the AR. After 19 years of having the Fair in the evenings, YNCG was able to coordinate this event to accommodate those L.V. residents who fast for the blood test and those who don't come out at night.

The following will be featured at the Fair:

1. 24 panel blood test (\$25.00). This will include total cholesterol, HDL, triglycerides and percentages. For an accurate triglyceride report, one must fast 12 hours.

The Staff is composed of volunteers. Staff reporters, club publicity people, letter writers, poets, cartoonists, and typists provide material which the editorial staff puts together to make up the paper.





Withholding Tax Advice For Employers

The following information is important to villagers who hire workers such as care-givers, maids or household helpers, and who fail to report employee earnings. This is not to be confused with hiring illegal entrants to the U. S., but it is about the avoidance of employer taxes and of failure to make proper deductions from employee salaries.

Plumbing Maintenance Committee Inspection

Plumbing Maintenance Committee has recently completed a survey of all 2,136 homes in L.V. to determine if the water pressure regulators are functioning properly. Failure of the pressure regulators has been instrumental (along with humans forgetting to turn off the water when leaving home) in many of the water leaks which have occurred in the Village recently.

About 21% of the regulators tested had pressure exceeding 75 lbs. psi. Of the shut-off valves tested, about 8% did not function normally.

Homeowners will be no-The newly established tified by mail if the regulators need to be adjusted or changed. Hereafter, or after notification of a faulty regulator, homeowners will be responsible for damage caused by water leaks in the home, rather than depending upon Village Master Policy insurance.


Barbara is a talented member of the Women's Golf Club and Billiard Club.

Last month's column dealt with the problems that Leisure World was facing as their property grew older and shoddier, and what they did to educate the owners to these problems and understand the need for property improvement. The question remaining from last month is: "How can they afford to keep their community in such fine condition?" To quote one resident, "If there is any problem that can be solved by money, our board solves

I can hear your next question: "Where do they get the money?"

To start with a dose of reality about our situation: I have investigated some, but not all, of our Southern California competition and I have not yet found a comparable community with homeowners' fees as low as ours.

The bad news is that we have been penny-wise and pound foolish. Our fees have been kept artificially low....not for the good of the Village and its value, but for purely political and very short- sighted reasons. It has made Board members, both past and present, "look good."

At Leisure World where they have one board for each type of housing plus an additional, but separate, board for the common areas. Board members do not wield as much personal power over decisions as they do here.

come down to? In Leisure World all the same type of housing pays the same dollar amount in homeowners'

The Co-ops (the smallest and oldest units) pay \$321 per month, while the Condo's pay \$327 per month.

While the following is not a complete breakdown (numbers have been rounded), approximately \$203 of the fee goes to the Golden Rain Foundation (the governing board of the common areas), \$14 is allocated for the T.V. system, \$53 is for landscaping, and \$17.22 goes for recreation fees. The remainder, (\$40) covers water, trash pick-up and maintenance which are also part of the monthly fee. Does anyone know the comparable figures for L.V. broken down in the same way? I don't.

Not included in the fees are additional charges. There are 8 pages of "Resident, Non-Resident and Guest Fees" which pertain to the common areas. There are also some service fees which pertain to some types of housing but not all.

Specifically, the Co-ops were built with only community washers-dryers. That costs \$4.80 more per month for those residents,. All three story buildings have elevators and these residents pay an additional service charge of \$22.60 a month.

I won't bore you with 8

So what does this all pages of fees, but let me show you those fees that are meaningful for our Village: Garden patches: by size, range from \$19-\$38 per year; Rototilling each plot by size, \$10-\$16. Golf Facilities: For owners: \$2 or \$3, Non-owners/guests: for 9 holes \$4, 18 holes \$6. Reservations for clubrooms \$3, for private parties \$10-\$50, but for food service you must hire an approved caterer who also pays an additional 60 cents per meal served. No host bars cost \$100-\$300 depending on the number of bartenders. Auditorium reservations for events with admissions \$250. Fund Raisers (lectures):\$8 per 100 (Dinners): \$15 per 100. Failure to cancel reservations: \$15-\$200. Locker rentals: Billiard room: \$5, Clubhouse: \$20, Hobby Lockers \$8.25. Kitchen/dining rooms cleanup charges \$50-\$400. R.V. rental space charges: resident:\$76 per year; staff: \$138 per year. I.D Cards (passes): \$15- \$25. Cost for each additional occupant of house. \$42 per month.(We charge \$4.00) House lockouts charges: \$6-8, Delinquency collection costs:\$100. Architectural permits for alterations to your home: depends on the price of the alteration and varies from \$10-\$300. No architectural permits

> So there you have it. This is the way Leisure World improves and maintains their property. None of

are free.

the bathrooms we visited smelled of stale urine as do some of ours, locker rooms appear fresh and up-to-date. All their six clubhouses look better than our one clubhouse and their exercise room makes our plans seem tiny in comparison, even allowing for the difference in populations. And non-owners and guests pay \$5 per diem for their use.

Yes, they have permanent space for the ping-pong tables and don't waste space by putting up \$90,000 buildings to contain miscellaneous things and empty space.

I am not advocating we adopt their fee schedule, in toto, instead I present these figures to show how one retirement community keeps their property value up. We may not want to use their methods, but I'm sure we all can agree that our goals are the same. And, sorry, Villagers, there is no Santa Claus, we will have to pay for it ourselves.




