Villager now ranks as pioneer No. 1

Forty-three years ago – that's February, 1973 – Charlotte and Joe Romero moved into their new house in Village 9. They had no neighbors nor any nearby houses that were completed in this under-construction community called Leisure Village. "Santa Rosa Road was one lane each way," Charlotte remembers. "We were pioneers." Now, in 2016, as the resident who has lived here the longest, she is Pioneer No. 1.

The Romeros moved from Oxnard after Joe retired as a civilian administrator on the base at Port Hueneme. Charlotte continued to work in an Oxnard school.

"Slowly, couples began to move in around us," she says. "We were like a family. On weekends, the men would dig a hole and roast a pig for a barbeque. Then we'd have a dance. Joe brought the record player. Over the months, the group grew to about fifty people. We had fun."

Charlotte worked full-time for the first five years she and Joe lived in the Village. She didn't join any clubs during that time. "I decided that when I got old, I'd join things that would be new to me, and that's what happened" she says.

After she retired, she saw a notice for a belly dancing class in Thousand Oaks.

I guess you can tell by the serious look on my face that this is a serious subject. Well, it really is from a number of view points, but let me focus on Inside Leisure Village.

Our community paper is published (make-up, printing and distribution) by the Ventura County Star. It is made available to all readers subscription free (read that as no cost). It is completely independent editorially and not subsidized in any way by the LV HOA. The Star recoups its entire publishing cost, plus hopefully a little profit, through the sale of the display ads that you see in the paper. The creative side writing, editing and photography- is done by volunteer residents of LV.

As in the outside world newspaper business, the size of the paper is determined by the amount of ad space sold. You have probably noticed that your Monday paper (whether the Times or the Star) is much smaller than the Sunday edition. Lots more ads run on Sunday. The news stories compete for the remaining available space.

The same thing is true for Inside Leisure Village. Each month, the staff generates copy and photos without really knowing how much space will be available. Consequently, we prioritize the stories so that when the avail-

able space is known, (generally on the Tuesday after our deadline) the production editor (a Star employee) can complete the layout for our review. This process has been in place for more years than anyone can say at this point. And it has worked primarily because the ad-count was relatively stable and we knew with reasonable certainly how much space would be available.

Unfortunately, things are changing in our little world (and the newspaper world in general). Where we used to have 32-page editions, with an occasional bump to 40 pages, we have declined in the past year to 24 pages as the norm and the last issue was only 20 pages!

There are many opinions as to why this is happening: the economy, the internet, lack of response to the ads. Take your pick. There is not much we can do about it other than buckle up and ride it through as best we can. If the situation continues to worsen, we will be forced to take painful actions that we would prefer not to do. Time will tell.

But we do want you to know what is happening and why. And I, along with the rest of the staff, appreciate your understanding and support.

Shop Ahoy helps homebound

Shop Ahoy is a shopping and delivery service for homebound seniors and disabled adults. They also serve those people who no longer drive, have difficulty maneuvering through the grocery store or are unable to carry heavy items.

Shop Ahoy is a volunteer-based nonprofit organization servicing Ventura County. A volunteer will call the customer on Sunday or Monday of each week to take their grocery order. Another volunteer shops on Tuesdays at a local store, and the order is delivered and paid for, along with a small contribution to help the system stay in operation.

Shop Ahoy is always in need of volunteers. To help the growing need for this service as a volunteer non-profit organization, they welcome your support. There are three ways to participate: calling, shopping and delivering.



Racowsky honored As Hero of the Week

KNX Newsradio sponsored a luncheon in Los Angeles on Jan. 22 honoring Leisure Village resident Ben Racowsky and others as the 2015 KNX Heroes of the Week. Ben, who became age 100 on Sept. 17, 2015 was recognized by Diane Thompson, the Afternoon News Anchor/Producer of the KNX Hero of the Week, as a World War Two veteran who spent 30 years in the Navy teaching new recruits how to swim, making a difference to many between drowning and surviving.

In his spare time, he loves to be in his workshop where he makes wooden toys for children... His philosophy in life is "be nice"....something he learned from his mother."



New street lights being installed

At its best, street lighting is only there when we need it, from sunset to sunrisea magic made possible by the photovoltaic cell. The cells are those light-sensitive black caps worn by all the Southern California Edison lights along our two main streets and all 37 Villages (despite numbers from 1 to 44, seven Villages do not exist).

As part of its capital improvements, the utility company periodically (every ten years or so) replaces the light units and the cells, but not on a single Village-wide schedule. In all, there are an estimated 350 such units throughout the Village.

Edison technician John Birky is the man responsible for keeping those lights shining and changing out those that have aged or have been made obsolete. He's the guy we see, from time to time, here and throughout much of Ventura County, moving his cherry-picker into position near the top of the light poles to upgrade the lighting fixtures and to replace the photovoltaic cells that have been ravaged by the elements.

While the Village does not usually have the problems Birky encounters elsewhere, mostly would-be sharpshooters of all ages

using street lights for target practice, the new sodium-based fixtures and the on-going replacement of worn-out cells make Birky and his one-man elevator a familiar presence in the community.

And, yes, his work here does have a positive effect on Birky, a Santa Barbara resident, who says, when he is old enough, he'd like to live here-where the lights shine when and where they're needed.


convenient cause his part of the movie was shot in Fillmore, "For three days of filming, we hung out in a coffee shop. It takes all day to shoot five minutes of film."

He remembered his dialogue "pretty well," to use his words. And during one take, his line drew laughter - not a good thing even though the movie is a comedy. "You have to keep remembering that doing comedy on a film set without an audience requires a different mind-set. You can't laugh or react," John explains with a chuckle.

"Pee-Wee's Big Holiday" is a Netflix original film, a family movie for kids and adults, which will be released on March 18. John might sign autographs, but there will be no red carpet or opening night party in his Village.


convenient cause his part of the movie was shot in Fillmore, "For three days of filming, we hung out in a coffee shop. It takes all day to shoot five minutes of film."

The Amateur Radio Club

This past month, an account for our club station, KJ6LV, was set up in Log-



book of the World. LOTW is a way to electronically submit radio contacts for confirmation. If our submitted information matches the information submitted by the person we made contact with on the radio, then the computerized system will confirm the contact. This system is faster and cheaper than sending cards back and forth in the mail.

For those people who don't use this electronic system on the Internet, the club also voted on a design for a QSL card. A QSL card is a written confirmation of a two-way radio communication between two amateur radio stations. This type of confirmation originated during the early days of radio broadcasting. The ability for a radio set to receive distant signals was a source of pride for many consumers and hobbyists. Listeners would mail "reception reports" to radio broadcasting stations in hopes of getting a written letter to officially verify they had heard a distant station. As the volume of reception reports increased, stations took to sending post cards containing a brief form that acknowledged reception. Collecting these cards became popular with radio listeners in the 1920s and 1930s, and reception reports were often used by early broadcasters to gauge the effectiveness of their transmissions.

Today, many ham radio operators collect these QSL cards and either display them at home or use them to qualify for different awards. The most common







The Ceramics Club added a touch of beauty to the new Women's Shower Room with this original vase made by Carol Moody and Norm Chapman.



Loneliness and isolation can affect senior health

Part 1 of 2

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, 11 million, or 28 percent of people who are aged 65 and older, now live alone. Consider these facts from the Administration on Aging:

- People over 65 have an average life expectancy of almost 20 more years, which is a long time to live alone.
- While 72 percent of men over 65 are married and living with someone, only 45 percent of women are married, and 37 percent are widows.
- Almost half of women over 75 live alone.

Lack of contact with others is a serious issue among seniors. Sometimes, a senior has no local network of family and friends, and feels disconnected from his or her community. Other times, a senior may withdraw into isolation as a result of health conditions, depression, or mental illness. Fear of falling can keep a senior isolated in his or her home, as can fatigue, chronic pain, or shame over memory problems. In addition, many seniors become nervous about driving. As a result of these factors, older adults may be alone for days or even weeks without someone to watch over them.

Loneliness affects the Brain: Loneliness

may speed up the onset of dementia. In a recent Dutch study published in the Journal of Neurology, Neurosurgery, and Psychiatry, researchers followed more than 2,000 healthy, dementia-free seniors for three years and found that 13 percent who reported feeling lonely developed dementia by the end of that time, as compared with 6 percent with strong social support.

Loneliness Harms the Heart:In 2012, the Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA) compiled the results of numerous studies and concluded that there's a proven link between loneliness and heart disease. In one study, researchers at Harvard followed 44,000 people

with heart disease and found that 8 percent of patients living alone passed away after four years, compared with 5.7 of those living with a spouse or others.

In research on the outcomes of coronary disease, Swedish researchers discovered that coronary bypass patients who checked the box "I feel lonely" had a mortality rate 2.5 times higher than other patients 30 days post-surgery, and that even five years later they were twice as likely to have passed.

VOLUNTEERS WANTED

Volunteerism has long been considered the catalyst that makes Leisure Village what it is—a vibrant, active adult development. But that may not be true. That fact alone should convince you that now is the time to volunteer. Finally, volunteering makes you happy. Researchers at the London School of Economics found that more people volunteered, the happier they were. Clearly, volunteering is a win-win situation. And here are some wonderful volunteer opportunities just waiting for you!

BRAVO to EPC Volunteers!!!!

It just might be a record. Seventeen – yes, seventeen – volunteers were approved as members of the Emergency Preparedness Committee at the February Board meeting. EPC Co-Chair Sharon Pfeiffer says getting volunteers for this important committee is very much like responding to an emergency, "It's important to rely on ourselves," she explains. "So we asked each active member to recruit at least one other Villager. And it worked." Sharon is quick to add they aren't finished. "Ideally. we need at least one EPC member for each village. We're close, but not there yet."

Volunteers make Leisure Village what it is – an active, vibrant community. Studies show that volunteering leads to better health, lower mortality rates, and strong friendships among the participants. Right now, finding volunteers for many committees and clubs is difficult in the Village. Sharon Pfeiffer and the EPC discovered a secret. "Current members are the best sales people," she says, sharing a tip for other groups looking to share the contribution and camaraderie with new volunteers. It may be as easy – and successful – as asking.



"We had 17 in our group. The youngest was 18. Guess who was the oldest. I danced with them in shows and competitions until I was 80."

She's not dancing anymore, but she has a schedule that keeps her hopping. She swims every morning at 6 a.m., attends Bone Builders classes twice a week, works with a trainer two other days, and participates in two book clubs and a study group. She has two daughters, four grand-children, and two great grandchildren. She and Joe were married 62 years. He died in 2006.

She celebrated her 95th birthday recently and made a command decision to give up her car. 

BIRDS OF LEISURE VILLAGE

By Jean Kohut

Leisure Village, with it thousands of mature trees, is a haven for birds of all types and sizes. We have year-round residents and we have stop-over migrating birds. Some of these birds have flown thousands of miles to get to Ventura County on their journey even farther south to their breed-

ing grounds.

For the 10 years I have lived here, I have kept bubbling bird baths of all types and attracted many visitors. Birds love water that moves. This winter I have had an interesting collection of birds that I have never seen before. I removed the screen from my laundry room window, which faces the birdbaths in my patio, and began photographing them. I hang a camouflage curtain and point my telephotos lens out the window. Most of them get used to me and the clicking of the shutter. Others take off and I end up with just a birdbath and no bird.

Starting with this month's column, I will be highlighting one of the many unusual visitors that we have here in the Village, along with a photograph of them, of course. Let me assure you, they are most interesting, and beautiful creatures. Look for them here and in your neighborhood.

Meet the Ruby Crowned Kinglet. Fast as lightning, I had to chase him around for quite a few days before I could get a clear photograph. He finally stood still for a nanosecond on the bubble. Lucky timing for me; I spotted him flitting around in the patio and waited for him.

According to Cornell Lab of Ornithology, the Ruby Crowned Kinglet is "a tiny bird seemingly overflowing with energy." I can attest to that. The male's brilliant ruby crown patch usually stays hidden. The best

chance to see it is to find an excited male singing in spring or summer. Since it is winter here, I had to settle for what little bit I could see of his Ruby Crown.

Ruby Crowned Kinglets are migrators to our area. These are short-distance migrants. They breed across far northern North America as well as the western mountains. Most migrate to the southern and southwestern United States and Mexico for the winter. For a bird flying from as far as Canada, this is a short distant migration. There are some species that cover tens of thousands of miles in their yearly migration, even crossing the Himalayan Mountains to get to their breeding

My Ruby Crowned Kinglet is the only one of his kind I have seen at my birdbaths. I have not seen the female. Hope he has a mate waiting for him somewhere in the spring so he can show off that brilliant tuft of feathers on the top of his head.

In the next column, I will highlight another unusual visitor I have had this winter-a Lincoln's Sparrow, also just one of his kind at my birdbaths.

A homeowner can also run for the Board by submitting a petition of 43 authenticated signatures, only one signature per lot, 60 days prior to the Annual Meeting.

The Nominating Committee oversees the process that begins with recruiting potential candidates, then interviewing them one-by-one, making certain each meets basic qualifications for BOD service. The committee has begun its work which is not open to the public - by discussing the kinds of questions members want to ask to vet the candidates. No personal questions are permitted.

"We do not endorse candidates," explains Lansing. "We make sure that they meet basic legal qualifications. Are they bondable? Do they have any felony convictions against them? Are they presently engaged in any legal action against or by the Association? Have they served on a Village committee for at least six months or been an officer in a club?"

"Don't think of our work as a winnowing process," says Lansing. "We are doing our best to preclude resident apathy, attract good candidates, and give voters solid choices." The ballots go out May 20, the day after Candidates Night. The votes will be counted during LV's Annual Meeting on June 23.




