In the event you have failed to cast a ballot, there is one last chance. In the Multi-Purpose Room, on Election Day, Thursday, June 22, you may obtain another type of ballot between 8 a.m. and 10 a.m., the absolute deadline.

Channel 25 will start broadcasting the Annual Meeting at 10 a.m. Historically, the results of the election are not known until early afternoon. If that's the case, the Board meeting will

stop at noon and restart at 1 p.m. Channel 25 will do the same, and once the nomination results are known, they will be announced and Channel 25 will close, repeating the election results every 10 to 15 minutes.

The Board will then go into working session to elect the President, Vice-President, and other officers for the year 2006-07. This information will be combined with the winners' names for showing often for about a week.

We have 2,136 homeowners and wish that all of you would vote.

Why voting on CC&Rs is important to you

If you are a Homeowner and think your vote is not needed for the current ballot, then this message is especially for you. As of this writing, we are over halfway to the needed two thirds "yes" votes for the CC&Rs and close to the simple majority to amend the Bylaws. We need your vote!

An important change is Patio Enclosure Construction and Divider Fences, 7.6. CC&Rs. Read the latest amendment in the Errata Sheet that came out with your ballot. It addresses the unsightly problem created when construction of a patio enclosure is too close to the divider fence, resulting in inadequate space for maintenance.

Unless the adjoining homeowner approves in writing the removal of the divider fence, the homeowner building the patio enclosure may not build closer than 42 inches from the property line. This allows for proper maintenance on both sides of the divider fence and decreases the chances of weeds and wildlife inhabiting the space. Your "yes" vote will help maintain the beauty of our Villages and value of our homes. This change is endorsed by the Architectural Committee.

Another change is Fees for Additional Residents, CC&Rs 4, 2 (b) (3), latest changes also in the Errata Sheet. When more than one

person resides in a dwelling unit, there will be a \$5 monthly fee for the second person and a \$10 monthly fee for each additional person over two residents. It also removes any power of the Board to change these

The rest of the changes are mainly updating to current law and including prior amendments.

If this ballot should not get the needed "yes" votes, our Association will be functioning with badly out-ofdate governing documents.

We are one of the largest senior communities in California and known for Homeowner pride in our community. We need to maintain good, up-to-date governing documents. Vote, and please vote yes! Your vote will make a difference.

to California law. The exact amount does vary.


If you are 70 or older and need to renew your drivers license, you will be required to pass a written test. The class will also be helpful to prepare for that.



Over the past years, General Manager Randy Watkins and I often wondered exactly how many Villagers were here.

He agreed with me that back in the late '70s and early '80s, there were close to 3,400, because the majority of our 2,136 home occupiers were married.

Over the years, as most of us observed, those who

came as couples lost a mate, but they continued to live here alone.

In mid-April of this year, Randy called to say that, as of that date, there were exactly 3,066 folks living here.

"That means," he said, "there are 1.4 people per home, less than the 1.5 for equal married vs. single."



Mort Marcovitz: His game is computers

How well many of us know that he has been, formany years, the driving force behind the Computer Club. The club, boasting 410 dues-paying members, is easily one of the largest in the Village.

Whom are we talking about? It's Village 42's Mort Marcovitz, already a bit of a legend among computer

Mort, Philadelphia-born and Philadelphia-educated, graduated from West Philadelphia High School in 1945 and entered the Drexel Institute of Technology, now Drexel University. His education was interrupted by a two-year stretch in the U.S. Navy.

He was awarded a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering from Drexel in 1951 and joined the Burroughs Corporation Research Center in Philadelphia. He also pursued graduate work, part time, at the University of Pennsylvania, where one of his professors was Village 42's Ed Hawthorne, a former President of our Leisure Village Board of Directors.

Although Ed had from

20 to 30 students in his class, he remembers Mort as a "good student." Mort remembers Ed as one who was well-versed and thoroughly skilled as a teacher.


Mort received his master's in electrical engineering from Penn in 1957.

Mort and his wife, Betty, were in the same high school class and married in

In 1961, with three children and a mother-inlaw, they spent six months in Pasadena, where Mort was on a special assignment at the Burroughs computer plant. Later that year, they moved permanently (ha ha) to Michigan, where he worked at corporate headquarters.

In 1966, Mort accepted a position with the Sweda International Division of Litton Industries. By this time, a fourth child had joined the family, and they moved to Morristown, N.J.

In 1972, he rejoined Burroughs at its Plymouth, Mich., plant, and the family moved to Farmington Hills. Eventually, Mort was transferred to its Radnor, Pa., facility, where he retired in 1987.

By this time, the children had spread their wings, with one in Michigan, one in California and two in Massachusetts.

Over the years, Mort criss-crossed the United States many times and he knew that someday they would retire in Southern California. He never recovered from his time at Treasure Island while in the

Mort and Betty came to Southern California in 1995 and spent about a year in Playa del Rey. Their youngest daughter, Ruth Adler, and her family settled in Agoura Hills, and, visiting often, Betty and Mort discovered Leisure Village. You might say the rest is history.

Daughter Nancy Helt resides in Moraga in the East San Francisco Bay area, and daughter Marcie lives in Chicago.

Their son, Michael, continues to reside in Ann Arbor, Mich.

Betty and Mort have five grandchildren now - one in college and four in high school. As you are reading this, another should be here. The new arrival's 15-year-old sister is taking it quite well. She has asked permission to go to a boarding school!

Their residence in Leisure Village is about the longest stay ever in one place, and they plan to remain for the rest of their days.

Careful planning can blunt impact of disasters

By Joe Foraker

A damaging earthquake during a Santa Ana wind condition would be a deadly combination.

Southern California's 47 percent probability of a severe earthquake within the next four years is holding. The probability continues, regardless of other disasters that have temporarily distracted many residents.

The terrible infernos that accompanied Santa Ana winds this past year spread swiftly as a horrified nation watched. Nearly everyone in Ventura County witnessed the huge black clouds and the glow of stubborn fires that burned into the night. When the winds finally subsided, a murky stillness dumped souvenir ashes from Bakersfield to Tijuana.

The hundreds of homes consumed by recent fires represent a staggering loss. But the number of people who could be affected by a strong earthquake could be hundreds of times greater. Now add the unthinkable - a major earthquake during a Santa Ana wind condition. What will happen to those who have ignored the earthquake threat and are unprepared for an earthquake emergency or any other natural disaster?

Fire departments that are fighting widely scattered fires over dozens of areas during Santa Ana wind conditions will not be quick responders to problems created by earthquakes. Com-

munities are more vulnerable some days than others. But vulnerability peaks when hot, dry desert winds rush across the state.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency is reeling from disasters that have plagued the nation over the past few years.

The United States experienced its first billion-dollar disaster in 1972, when Hurricane Agnes devastated Texas and Louisiana. Multibillion losses since then include, among others, the 1989 Loma Prieta earthquake, the 1992 hurricanes in Florida and the 1993 floods in the Midwest. The 1994 Northridge earthquake inflicted nearly \$40 billion in damage. Hurricane Katrina killed nearly 700 people and caused more than \$72 billion in property damage.

Emergency-planning seminars are held periodically in municipalities and cities throughout the county. A broad spectrum of booklets and videos is located in the Leisure Village Library for your perusal. The Internet is a huge source of information that can be used to customize a plan that fits your individual

Today I have chosen the Farmers Market, Pig and Whistle, and the Tick Tock Tea Room. I had planned to tell you about Olvera Street and early movie houses, but there is too much information to shorten it.

The Farmers Market was started in 1934 when a group of enterprising farmers started an informal market at the corner of Fairfax

and Third selling produce from their trucks. Customers quickly arrived, parking their cars in a hastily built dirt parking lot in spaces designated with chalk. They strolled among the trucks purchasing fruit, vegetables and flowers. The trucks gave way to stalls, and the farmers were charged 50 cents per day.

More than 60 years later, it still thrives and has become one of the most popular tourist spots in Los Angeles. It has grown, yes, but it still stays true to its

Magee's, one of the originals, grinds 100,000 pounds of peanut butter a

year. Bob's Donuts begins baking at 4:30 each morning to provide the 1,000 donuts they sell daily. It became the central meeting place for Angelenos, and "Meet me at 3rd and Fairfax" is still a commonplace phrase in the

Manning's Coffee was ground fresh daily and coffee was served at tables outside. Dupar's Bakery was also one of the first restau-

Here are some quick facts. The Pig and Whistle was on Broadway between 2nd and 3rd around 1909 and later had branches at South Broadway, Hill at Hollywood Boulevard, and at

Spring Street. The original was later a pizza parlor, but it eventually was restored as a Pig and Whistle and is still there.

The Tick Tock started out with one clock and ended up with 48. They were famous for their sticky buns. The original on Cahuenga opened in 1934.

C.C. Brown's opened in 1906. Their hot fudge is still available on the Internet.

Olvera Street, Gilmore Speedway and Stadium, Clifton's Cafeteria, La Brea Tar Pits and old movie houses are too much for this column. See you next time, and let me hear from you!



Recipe of the month: Garden Zucchini Bread

This recipe was submitted with information for the Farmers Club, which notes that zucchini are becoming prevalent in the LV garden patches.

Ingredients:

- 3 eggs
- 1 cup vegetable oil
- 2 cups shredded, unpeeled zucchini
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon baking powder
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 2 cups flour
- 1 cup chopped nuts.

Put shredded zucchini in strainer or colander. Press or squeeze with your hands to remove excess liquid.

Beat eggs, sugar and vegetable oil together. Add flour, baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon, vanilla and chopped nuts. Mix together by hand.

Add zucchini (minus water) and thoroughly mix ingredients with a large spoon.

Pour into two loaf pans. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour.



- Never carry your Social Security card in your wallet or purse. Remove your Social Security Number (SSN) from personal checks and your driver's license. When asked to verify your SSN, provide only the last four digits.
- Keep your wallet contents to a minimum. Store copies of contents in a safe place so you know the credit

cards you were carrying and have the telephone number to call in case of loss.

- Invest in a locking mailbox. Don't leave outgoing mail in your mailbox.
- Never sign the back of your credit cards. Instead, write "ask for ID." At checkout, hand over your card face down to prevent it being photographed by a camera phone.
- Pay close attention to credit card billing cycles and statement charges. Keep receipts and reconcile your statement. Verify transaction, balances and payment due date via online access to your statements.





Matteo's in Camarillo Springs is a winner

This series of articles will, with luck, give you a little insight into the restaurants available to us in the area — who runs them, who owns them, what the food is like, and all that good stuff. All the opinions expressed are mine alone, and I am fully cognizant that your experience in any particular restaurant may have differed from mine quite widely.

It is not our purpose to criticize any restaurant. What restaurants Sarah and I have found to be wanting, we merely will not mention. We will probably revisit them sometime in the future, because even restaurants can have a bad day from time to time.

We never tell the restaurant owners that we write articles about dining places. We always pay for our meals. That way we can have an unbiased view of the neighborhood dining spots. We don't want their largesse to influence our writing in any way.

We will continue to discuss the restaurants closest to Leisure Village, and work our way outward to the area

around Ventura and also toward Thousand Oaks and Westlake Village, bearing in mind that maybe half an hour of driving time would be the most anyone would wish to go for a good meal here. But we'll concentrate on Camarillo itself, first.

Also, we won't discuss any of the chain-type fast food places. I have always suspected that all the McDonald's, Burger Kings, Wendy's and places of that kind are all served by one single big kitchen in Kansas, and when you order something, it is shot to Los Angeles in pneumatic tubes so it won't get cold. But the food is virtually indistinguishable from one fast-food place to the next, and certainly between places with the same signs on the front.

If you remember from last week, we discussed the restaurant at Mission Oaks Plaza now known as Mo's Café. It began life as Giovanni's, owned by Giovanni Tromba, an Italian gourmet. Giovanni moved out and the place was taken over by Denis Rion, who opened Nou-Nou's.

Meanwhile, plans were afoot to enlarge the area

around the Camarillo Railroad Station on Lewis and Ventura Roads. Unfortunately, there was an Italian restaurant in the way of that expansion, Petrucci's, and Mr. Petrucci was forced to move. He moved to the place formerly occupied by Nou-Nou's, and actually spent a few short years there before he passed away. The people who bought the restaurant from him were unable to keep up the quality as Mr. Petrucci did, and the restaurant shortly was vacant once again. Now that space is occupied by Mo's Café, of which we wrote in last month's column.

Denis Rion of Nou-Nou's moved to Camarillo Springs, where he has opened a small gourmet restaurant called Matteo's. Matteo's is open every weekday for lunch. and on only Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights for dinner. Reservations are recommended because the place fills up very quickly, and for good reason. Denis is his own chef. He and the excellent staff will keep your palate more than satisfied. Their wine list is exemplary as well.

The food is mostly West-
