Four years and nine doctors later, I was diagnosed with primary pulmonary hypertension, a rare lung disorder. I began Flolan, a life-saving treatment that required a catheter be surgically placed into the right artery of my heart and attached to a battery-operated pump strapped around my waist, where it remained for three years.

I was listed for transplant University of at the California-San Diego on March 22, 1999.

By April 2000, I required oxygen 24/7. I was dragging with a cannula stuck up my

On Dec. 22, 2000, I relocated to a condo near UCSD to wait for transplant. I could barely walk. I waited for my single lung transplant for 804 days.

# Don't drive golf carts on public roads

It is becoming common for LV residents to travel outside the grounds in golf carts, especially out onto Santa Rosa Drive to get to the Vons Market or into Santa Rosa Plaza. This is dangerous and unlawful.

It is perfectly legal and safe to drive through the side gate into the Santa Rosa Plaza area, as long as you do not go out onto Santa Rosa Road. That way will stay on private property and no laws are involved. But driving a golf cart on high-speed roads such as Santa Rosa Road is dangerous and unlawful. The Camarillo police will be watching closely.

The laws of California specify that golf carts can be driven on streets whose speed limit exceeds 35 mph only if there is a specific law permitting such travel. Camarillo has no such law, and therefore it is not legal to take your golf carts outside the Village streets.
