





## Master of Light The Life and Watercolors of Rollin Pickford

Filmed in California's San Joaquin Valley and Monterey Peninsula, *Master of Light* documents the remarkable six-decade career of artist Rollin Pickford. His watercolors use innovative techniques to capture an agrarian landscape that is being rapidly bulldozed to make way for strip malls and low-density subdivisions.

Master of Light is much more than a film about art. It also tells the story of Pickford's courage in the face of many losses, including the near-destruction of his native land by careless development and political corruption. Contrasting with stunningly beautiful scenes of the Valley, are stark images of the sprawl, pollution and urban blight that have become increasingly commonplace there. Los Angeles Times staff writer, Mark Arax expertly narrates the tale of greed and poor planning that have turned Pickford's hometown in to a paradigm of peripheral growth and inner city decay.

Master of Light also explores the mysteries and magic of the creative process. Pickford's self-effacing manner and gentle wit enliven the film as it reveals the secrets of his Zen-like watercolor technique. Dividing his time between the San Joaquin Valley and the Central Coast, the prolific 87-year-old artist continues to work every day, creating hundreds of new paintings each year.
