





LV resident reflects on a year's journey

Where do I begin? A year ago I was diagnosed with cancer, fourth stage. While writing and sharing information with others is important to me, this was one journey I chose not to share. I did however post an article for ILV with what I thought was useful suggestions about how they might handle a similar situation. I hope some residents found it of value and have kept the Emergency phone number accessible. I chose to remain anonymous.

It is a year later and I am doing pretty well. If you've seen someone walking with a cane and a baseball hat (or wig) ... it might have been me. My intent today is to express my gratitude to everyone that has supported me through this experience. I was told to wait two months before driving again. My chemo treatment center was in Ventura. How to get there? Not a day went by that some (more than one some times) neighbor or friend didn't call and ask what day they could drive me to my appointment. Besides the drive, it meant they would sit in a waiting room reading People magazine waiting for my treatment to end. We celebrated with lunch.

And cards! People sent me cards. The thought of someone taking the time to go up and down the card aisle looking for the perfect card for me, buying it, posting a stamp and mailing it to me, moves my very soul.

Would you know what to do?

The following article appeared in the June 2014 issue of ILV, when Marian wished to not be identified.

I've often thought when hearing the unsettling noise of the fire engines coming through Leisure Village that somehow it is a really jarring sound we hear way too often.

And when we hear it, we silently hope and pray that blaring sound will not wind up at someone's home near and dear to us. On Tuesday, April 22 at about 4:15 p.m., that sound, that fire engine noise stopped at my house. What happened to me after I had taken a shower and was casually watching afternoon TV, was a numbness/tingling on my left side beginning at my face and leading down to my foot, all on one side.

I live alone and without someone to call. I quickly decided this was something serious. I managed to get to my phone and speed dial and because I had previously preset it, the LV emergency staff promptly answered. I identified myself and described my situation. While talking to them, the numbness and tingling stopped. I thought I was fine and maybe it wasn't necessary for them to follow up with me; they decided differently and said they would be there immediately. They were.

Talking to me and realizing I may or may not have had a stroke they suggested calling 911. Admittedly, I was scared and agreed to that call. Paramedics arrived quickly and after putting a blood pressure cuff on my arm, determined my blood pressure was a whooping 190. They recommended I be taken to Pleasant Valley Hospital.

Hopping on the gurney, because I could, I was whisked off to the hospital. A doctor reviewed what had occurred to me and planned a series of tests. With my first free moment, I got out my cell phone to call my kids. Guess what...battery was dead. Where was my charger? One was at home; one was in my car (logical places I thought). I didn't even know my kids' phone numbers, used to just speeddialing. What was I to do? Explaining my dilemma to the first person I saw, I was offered their universal charger. 66 Hopping on the gurney, because I could. I was whisked off to the hospital."

Whew! Within a short time, my Smart Phone was charging and I was able to email my kids.

The Paramedics shut and locked my front door as we left. They weren't aware that my house keys were on a hook in my kitchen. Fortunately, I had a key hidden outside so I was able to get in when I returned home.

The following is very important and the purpose of this is to remind all residents this is something that could happen to you. I am using my experience to share some hints to help in the event you suffer a similar emergency. Are you prepared?

1. Do you have the emergency number for LV in your speed dial? It is 388-

2. Do you have a list of your medications (and dosage) readily available (in your wallet)?

3. Do you have the phone numbers of your immediate family and close friends written down?

4. Do you have the phone number of the CAT should you be in a situation where you might need a ride home?

5. Do you have a house key with a neighbor or hidden somewhere out-

6. If it is possible, you may choose to get the names of the emergency personnel who assist you, perhaps to later send a thank you note?

7. Be proactive! I was so eager to leave the hospital that I didn't pay much attention to the exit papers I signed. I did not notice the hospital personnel had failed to complete the doctor's name nor the phone number I was supposed to call for a follow-up appointment.

8. And specifically for women, don't forget to have your eyeliner in your

purse!

I am back home, following doctor's orders, taking my meds and hoping I never have to repeat my recent episode, but I am prepared now, are you?





As Chair of the Exercise Science Department at Cal Lutheran University, Dr. Steven Hawkins has studied senior fitness extensively and advises that regular exercise is crucial for good health, no matter how old

we are.

A fitness center for everyone

As Dr. Steven Hawkins walks into the gym at Cal Lutheran University, he repeats his mantra. "No matter how old we are, exercise is always beneficial. The goal is to improve our health, not run a 5K," he said, and the new Leisure Village Fitness Center can help all residents meet that goal. He emphasizes "all residents."

Dr. Hawkins is the Chair of the Exercise Science Department at CLU, a position he's held since 2007. He earned his PhD at USC and has published scholarly papers reporting his studies on the effects of a variety of exercises on older people.

Academically and personally, he believes most Villagers should become more physically active. He advises "Five days a week, thirty minutes a day - which don't have to be continuous. Walking to the fridge doesn't count. Household chores might. But a brisk five-minute walk is better," he said with a smile, "because it will raise your heart rate, and that's what we want."

Getting that heart rate up is an important first step to better health for seniors. The best exercise for that? "The one that you'll do," Dr. Hawkins said. "If I suggest running, and you hate running, that's a no go." The LV Fitness Center offers several exercise options for residents, from those who

use wheelchairs to those who play tennis

The new weight machines and sets of free weights in the center are a good place to begin. "Start with the lowest weight and follow the posted instructions," he says. These exercises improve muscle tone and strength relatively quickly. Free weights are good because they help improve balance, too. Here, Dr. Hawkins adds a warning: Avoid lifting free weights over your head at first. He estimates 'reconditioning' begins to emerge in about two weeks; you'll feel it and begin to see improvement in the ability to lift things at home or to easily get out of a chair.

A second step to improved health and physical function is aerobic exercise. "Don't jump on the treadmill right away," advises Dr. Hawkins. Start with an outside walk, a stationary bike, or, follow his mother's example by dancing to a lively beat. "Moving!" he adds, "The benefits of moderate exercise generally outweigh the risks." The Village's new Center also has space for floor exercises and stretching on mats. Dr. Hawkins calls those "fabulous" for improving our mobility.

"Just keep moving" is his message. Villagers headed for the Fitness Center are moving in the right direction.

Personifying a Confederate officer,

Civil War history is coming to Leisure Village

presentation describing the end of the Civil War, will be held in Leisure Village on June 22.

The dramatic conclusion of that historic conflict will be described in word and visuals by Don Marquardt, the Village's own raconteur and student of the War between the States. Marking the 150th anniversary of the end of the hostilities, Don's presentation begins in the AR at 6:30 p.m. on Monday, June 22. This will be his third presentation about the Civil War for Village residents.

"My fascination with the War began about seven years ago when I went to Gettysburg for the first time," Don explains. "I taught history at UCLA for 30 years, so obviously I was familiar with the events. But when I stood on that battlefield - the pinnacle of the Civil War, I was stunned."

Since that experience, he has visited at least

"The Surrender At Appomattox," a special 25 battlefields in Virginia. He attended surrender ceremonies at Appomattox in Virginia on April 9, 2015, exactly 150 years after the actual event.

> Don traditionally brings the Civil War alive in costume and beard with the distinctive accent of his Kentucky character.

> His first Leisure Village Civil War presentation was in 2013 and focused on the Battle of Gettysburg.

> The 2014 spotlight was on the Battle of Cold Harbor. Don admits to some melancholy because this will be his last Civil War presenta-

"I really enjoy doing these for Leisure Village," Marquardt said. "Some Californians don't know a lot about the War history. Last year, the audience asked questions for nearly an hour after the presentation," he recalls. "It was a great evening!"

meant that I had to work out of my home; I got into sewing and knitting," Bonnie recalls.

In 1967, the family was living in Oregon when she was asked to compete in the Mrs. Oregon contest.

It was a good fit. The contestants didn't compete in swimsuits or playing a piano concerto.

They faced off in cooking contests, ironing shirts, putting on a kid's party. "This was really a Mrs. Contest," Bonnie explains. "I made the clothes I wore, including the formal gown." And she won!

Mrs. Oregon went on to the Mrs. America contest.

"It was wonderful because it was held in San Diego where my parents lived," Bonnie says, "So they got to see the competition." And their daughter did well; she made it to the finals. Mrs. Kansas won, and Mrs. Oregon was first runner-up."

It was not a defeat for Bonnie. "I did some public speaking during that year, and I loved it," she says. And that opened many doors. The knitterpattern maker-seamtress started her own business. It began as a complete

needlework store in Colorado and, as her family moved, morphed into several stores called Yarn Country in the Bay Area.

Her life took another turn when a customer got testy as she was told she couldn't return a skein of yarn she'd had for several years. Bonnie saw an opportunity.

She suggested that customers could knit caps for needy children with yarn scraps and donate them.

Caps for Kids was born; soon they were giving away thousands through a network of non-profits.

"Caps for Kids distributed a million caps in four years, and we stopped counting," Bonnie said with a smile. Awards and honors to Bonnie followed, as did a whole new career in business consulting, producing seminars titled "Cash, Check, or Charge," as a columnist for a needlework magazine, MCing, and auctioneering.

Bonnie as MC of the Musicians Club's Cabaret Night was her first onstage work in Leisure Village. (Remember the \$20 cupcakes?) "I had fun with that," she laughs. She plans to volunteer more this year, in between visits with her kids, 18 grand-children, and 5 great grandchildren.



The evening was planned for about 64 people. Over 165 actually attended, and, as a result, club membership increased by 38 that evening. Thanks to the LV employees who worked fast


to add tables and chairs for the unexpected crowd.

echnology means getting a fair sweep

lince the Village bought its own eet sweeper, that lumbering visitor become a familiar sight and sound it makes its rounds. Its initial rollout brought some resident complaints from people who didn't get the message (or forgot) that they can't park on their streets on sweeper days. But

now this relatively new clean-up system has brought 21st century technology to the job, and that has quieted protests.

The street sweeper now is equipped with a camera mounted on the dash, a continuously recording eye on the route and the parked vehicles that block its way. The camera picks up the car or truck parked on its route, videos the license plate, the location, and the time. This 'eye' on the sweeper has brought a fairness to the process and is saving money for LV's security sys-

"Before we got the camera, we assigned several security officers to follow the sweeper," explains Security Chief Manny Segovia. The officers would follow the machine, "playing leapfrog," to use the Chief's description. When a car obstructed the curbside route of the sweeper, an officer would stop, take down information about the car, and write a citation. Meanwhile, another officer continued

on behind the moving street sweeper until the next violation.

"It was not a good system. Our officers also must respond to medical and emergency calls; we get more than 800 a year," explains Chief Segovia. "And those are more important. So often they'd have to leave the route." The sweeper was on its own, and violators were missed.

The Village got complaints; one neighbor got a ticket, while someone on the other side of the street did not. The Security Team agreed that it was not equitable. The dash camera has brought the solution.

The driver of the sweeper has nothing to do with the camera. It is calibrated each morning and records continuously. At the end of a day, a supervisor reviews the recording, notes the violations, and notifies the residents by mail. "Now we're getting compliments saying it's fair for everyone," adds the Chief. And it's saving money: on gas, on manpower, and on paperwork.




