**PRESS CREDENTIALS:** Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. When time permits, credentials will be mailed. If not, press will call is located at the will call/player pass table located on the third base concourse.

**PHOTO CREDENTIALS:** Will be issued on a per game basis only and must be worn in plain sight at all times. Access to the field is permitted via the right field stairway. Due to the limited foul territory behind home plate, all photographers must remain to the outfield side of the coaching boxes at first and third bases.

**PRESS BOX:** A temporary facility is located on the walkway behind the seats directly behind home plate. It seats five people comfortably, more so not comfortably. Additional seating is also available for the media in the rows in front of the press box.

**TELEPHONES:** The press box number is (714) 449-5327. Additional phones are available in the Sports Media Relations Office, located about 200 yards to the south of Titan Field. A public pay phone is located directly behind the electrical house behind the press box.

**RADIO LINES:** Up to three telephone lines can be made available to the designated radio station of the visiting team(s). The charge is \$35 per game or \$100 for a three-game series. Please make arrangements with Mel Franks well in advance.

**PARKING:** Parking is available by:

- a) Using lot G at Yorba Linda Blvd. and Associated Road and paying \$1.50 upon entry for a daily permit (Monday-Thursday only). Parking is free on Friday night and all day Saturday and Sunday.
- b) Obtaining a complimentary pass upon presentation of news credential to the Visitors Information Booth located on the south side of campus, northwest on the corner of Commonwealth and Nutwood Avenues.

The Cal State Fullerton baseball tradition had a most humble beginning, starting out as a club team and playing on a field literally scratched out of an orange grove. Only the wildest dreamer would have foreseen a program that now features two national championships, eight regional titles, 14 conference crowns and 21 alumni with major league playing experience.

It's been a memorable three decades since Beryl Kempton and Warren Beck brought the program into the world. Bill Fulton nursed it into adolescence and Augie Garrido guided it into maturity as Titan baseball developed into a national power. Larry Cochell kept the tradition alive with two College World Series appearances in his three-year tenure at Fullerton and Garrido has not missed a beat since he returned in 1991 after three seasons at Illinois.

Kempton was the university employee who graded the field out of the orange trees. Home plate sat near the old orchard residence, a brick structure now known as "Titan House." It's reportedly the second oldest existing structure in the city and is currently housing the Titans' soccer coaching staff.

The first-base line ran north and the thirdbase line went to the west, paralleling what is now called Gymnasium Drive. A split rail and wire mesh screen served as the outfield barrier.

Beck, a member of the faculty, was the inaugural coach. He fielded a "club" team which played local junior colleges and "pickup" teams from neighboring universities in its maiden season.

In 1965, the program became a full fledged intercollegiate sport with Fulton serving as the head coach. He led them into play in the California Collegiate Athletic Association and set the groundwork for the success of the 1970s as he battled Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, UC Riverside, Cal State Northridge and Cal Poly Pomona.

The catalyst to greatness was Garrido, who arrived from rival Cal Poly SLO and began developing a second field farther to the north. A new backstop, batter's eye and such "luxuries" as electricity for the pitching machines provided Garrido the most basic of tools.

After a rebuilding year in 1973, the Titans began establishing their successful tradition in 1974 by winning the CCAA championship.

The 1975 season saw a move up to Division I status and entry in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association. But the surging Titans did not miss a beat. They won the PCAA championship by one game over Pacific and then strolled onto Dedeaux Field on the campus of the University of Southern California and won the NCAA Western Regional, depriving the Trojans of a shot at a sixth consecutive NCAA championship.

Fullerton's first trip to Omaha for the College World Series was brief, to say the least. They lost their first two games, to Arizona State and Oklahoma, and were sent flying back to Los Angeles. But the experience would pay benefits.

Fullerton repeated as PCAA champions in 1976, this time by a comfortable four games over San Diego State. But then came realignment of

the league. The seven-team Southern California Baseball Association was formed by Fullerton, Cal State Los Angeles, San Diego State, Pepperdine, Loyola Marymount, UC Santa Barbara and Long Beach State. Pacific, Fresno State and San Jose State became part of the Northern California Baseball Association.

The new schedule failed to disrupt the Titans' championship rhythm, although they had to share the inaugural SCBA title in 1977 with Cal State Los Angeles. Fullerton lost a one-game playoff with the Diablos but gained an at-large NCAA bid where they lost in the regional title game to Washington State in Pullman.

There was another SCBA title in 1978 and regional elimination at USC before the Titans struck paydirt in 1979. They parlayed another SCBA crown into a national championship, but they did it the hard way.

Fullerton lost the regional opener at Fresno, but came back through the losers' bracket, finally beating UCLA twice to earn a return trip to Omaha. Again, the Titans lost the opener, this time to Mississippi State. But a confident Garrido still liked his team's chances and they proved him right. They won five games in a row including a 2-1 verdict over Arkansas for the NCAA championship, the first title for Fullerton in a men's sport in Division I play.

The fruits of victory did not include a home playing site worthy of a regional tournament, so Fullerton began a frustrating streak of post-season play in 1980. The Titans won the SCBA title again but had to go to Tucson, Arizona, where the host Arizona Wildcats won the regional on their way to the NCAA title. In 1981, the Titans won the SCBA but lost in the regional in Tempe, Arizona, to the hosts, the eventual national champion Arizona State Sun Devils.

Fullerton avenged the defeat, however, knocking off the highly regarded Sun Devils in their own backyard after another SCBA crown in 1982. However, the third trip to Omaha proved less than charming. Fullerton set a dubious record, becoming the first CWS team not to score as the Titans were shut out by Wichita State and Maine and hustled home.

In 1983, the Titans shared the SCBA crown but lost a one-game playoff to UC Santa Barbara for the automatic NCAA tournament bid. No matter, the Titans' 49-19-1 record earned them an at-large berth and another trip to Tempe, where the Sun Devils prevailed.

A slow start in 1984 after a couple of late summer professional signings stripped the pitching staff of its depth left Fullerton's reign in the SCBA teetering. But a realignment of the infielders seemed to work wonders and the team caught fire. A surge that would see the Titans win 37 of their last 42 games carried all the way to Omaha and a second NCAA championship.

Again, the road to Omaha was via Fresno, where the Titans survived a "Murderers' Row" field of USC, San Diego State and the host Bulldogs of Fresno State and won the regional in 100+degree heat.

At Omaha, venerable institutions Michigan,

Miami, Arizona State, Oklahoma State, and finally, the University of Texas, stood in the way of a second NCAA title. In a World Series dominated by the hitters and their aluminum bats, the Titans showed a national ESPN audience there was quality if not quantity on the pitching mound. Todd Simmons, Jack Reinholtz and record-setting reliever Scott Wright did yeoman's duty and left it for diminuitive lefty Ed Delzer to turn in the performance of his life and beat Texas, 3-1, in the title game.

There were other heroes, however. John Fishel set a CWS record for hits and won the Most Valuable Player trophy. Kirk Bates delivered a crucial bases-loaded single to help beat ASU. The Titans outslugged Oklahoma State behind a bases-loaded triple by Tom Thomas and a two-run double by Bob Caffrey to earn the winner-take-all rematch with the Longhorns, where John Bryant stole a base to set up the tying run and tripled for the key hit in a two-run fourth inning.

The 5-foot-7, 133-pound Delzer allowed a couple of infield hits in the first inning for a Texas run, but that was to be all. He pitched a nearperfect game until leg cramps forced him from the mound to open the eighth inning. Enter Wright, the NCAA's most prolific reliever ever. He slammed the door for his 22nd save.

Defending the title proved too much for the 1985 Titans to handle. Competing in the Southern Division of a reconstitued PCAA, the Titans finished in first place in their division but the pitching came up too thin in a playoff series at Fresno State that decided the league championship and the NCAA Tournament's automatic berth. And, with the nation's most difficult schedule taking its toll on an overall 36-32-1 record, the Titans did not get an at-large bid and were left out of the playoffs for the first time in 11 years.

By standard of most schools, the 1986 season was a successful one. The Titans posted a 36-21 record and won the Best of the West Tournament in Fresno as part of another challenging schedule. But, for the second year in a row, there was no league title nor NCAA playoffs as the season turned on one inning. Fullerton blew a 6-2 lead in the ninth inning at home against UNLV on April 5 and could never recover from the loss, finishing in third place behind UC Santa Barbara and UNLV.

When Fullerton opened up the 1987 season losing five of its first six games, PCAA rivals thought Fullerton's dominance had ended. But despite a schedule that saw them play all the contenders on the road, Fullerton roared through the league schedule, winning 12 of its 13 games on its way to a 18-3 PCAA mark and a five-game margin over surprise runners-up UC Irvine.

The Titans' regular season record of 42-15 earned them a national ranking as high as No. 3 and sent them to the NCAA playoffs with a berth in the South II Regional in New Orleans. The Titans were the top seed against five Louisiana schools and drew the No. 6 seed, Southern University from Baton Rouge. Representing a conference that never had won an NCAA playoff

game, the Jaguars nevertheless got a brilliant pitching performance from converted reliever Allan Ratliff, who beat CSF, 1-0, in a bizarre game that saw no infield chances for Southern. Ratliff handled a bunt and a comebacker and all the other outs were via fly balls or strikeouts.

Thrust into the losers' bracket, the Titans resorted to their deep ptiching staff to outlast all but Louisiana State. Mike Harkey shut out Tulane and Larry Casian did likewise to Louisiana Tech. But Longo Garcia, the hard-luck loser to Southern, could not handle the Tigers as the Titans had to settle for a 44-17 season.

The 1988 season brought a changing of the guard, but no deviation in the Titans' success story. Garrido resigned and headed for the University of Illinois where a lucrative financial offer and the challenge to build a winner in a cold weather location proved irresistible. Cochell left the cold of Evanston at Northwestern University and headed west.

After an inconsistent start, the new combination clicked and the Titans won 30 out of 35 games before losing a home series and the conference championship to Fresno State. But an at-large bid was tendered and Fullerton parlayed it into a return trip to Omaha by winning the South Regional in Starkville, Mississippi. Mike Ross hit a three-run homer with two outs in the bottom of the ninth for a 6-3 win over Texas A&M after the Titans had beaten the host Bulldogs twice in their own stadium.

Fullerton continued its winning ways in a revised CWS format in Omaha with well-pitched victories over Stanford and Miami. But Longo Garcia and Mark Beck could not repeat their feat and Stanford came back through the losers' bracket to drop the Titans to third place with a pair of Cardinal victories.

Despite the presence of All-Americans Brent Mayne and David Staton, the 1989 Titans endured Fullerton's worst season since 1973. The Titans finished in the second division of the Big West at 10-11 and the overall record was 30-27.

The end of a dynasty? Rival coaches thought so and picked the Titans to finish fifth in the Big West in 1990. Instead, the team romped to its first conference title since 1987 and rode that momentum to an impressive sweep of the Central Regional in Austin, Texas. Twice the Titans beat the host Longhorns on their own turf to earn a sixth trip to Omaha.

They crashed at the CWS, literally. Outfielder Rich Gonzales collided with the left field wall and concern for his health distracted the Titans in losses to Oklahoma State and The Citadel.

Cochell accepted a lucrative offer to coach at Oklahoma which created an opening for Garrido's return in 1991, a year the Titans would use Amerige Park in downtown Fullerton for games and practice with construction underway on a new stadium.

Fullerton started the year in its traditional slow fashion. The latter part of the season looked grim as the Titans entered conference play with a 15-12 record. But in keeping with Titan tradi-

tion, Fullerton ended the season on a high note winning 10 of its final 12 games and clinching a share of the conference championship, the second title in as many years.

By virtue of head-tohead competition, Fresno State gained the automatic berth to postseason play. The NCAA Selection Committee did not look upon Fullerton's strong finish as being good enough to earn an at-large bid to tournament play. The snub left the Titans at home, but provided motivation for the 1992 squad.



Eddie Delzer (left) and Bob Caffrey celebrate Fullerton's 1984 national championship.


The Titans had a dream season in 1992, one that seemed destined to result in a third national title. They opened the long awaited and revamped Titan Field in April, saw Fullerton alumnus Kevin Costner throw out the first pitch at the inaugural game and blew through an NCAA Regional tournament at defending national champion LSU only to come up one run short to longtime rival Pepperdine in the national title game televised by CBS.

The 1992 season also marked the end of one of the most remarkable athletic careers in Fullerton history. Phil Nevin, who was an outstanding kicker and punter for the football team for three years, was selected Baseball America's Player of the Year, the College World Series MVP (the first player from a non-championship team to win the award since Dave Winfield did so in 1973), Big West Conference Player of the Year, was the first player picked in the amateur draft by the Houston Astros, started at third base in the 1992 Olympics for Team USA and became the second Titan (Tim Wallach in 1979 was the first) to win amateur baseball's most prestigious prize, the Golden Spikes Award, from the United States Baseball Federation.

For 1993, the Titans had beaten USC twice during the regular season for the first time since 1987, but the Trojans would get their revenge by beating Cal State Fullerton both times in the Central II Regional in Austin, Texas. Disappointment for the team turned to excitement last year when Fullerton once again made a run for the national title.

The Titans fought their way through the Midwest I Regional at Oklahoma State and beat the host Cowboys in extra innings to make their eighth appearance at the College World Series.

A highlight of the 1994 CWS came against LSU when Fullerton tied a tournament record, scoring 11 runs in the first inning to go on to a 20-6 victory over the Tigers. Georgia Tech, which was shut out for the first time in several seasons in a February game in the Anaheim Hilton & Towers Classic by the Titans in Fullerton, returned the favor in the opening game of the CWS. The Titans fought back through the loser's bracket, routing LSU and overpowering Florida State behind Mark Kotsay's 7-RBI performance and the gutty relief pitching of Dan Ricabal, who shut out the Seminoles over the final 8.1 innings. That earned Fullerton another shot at Georgia Tech and another pitching duel between the Yellowjackets' Brad Rigby and Fullerton's Mike Parisi developed. The game was decided in the 12th inning when Nomar Garciaparra homered for Georgia Tech in the top of the inning and the Titans stranded Dante Powell at third base with no outs in the bottom of the frame, ending the Titans' season.



Head Coach Augie Garrido hasn't missed a beat since returning to the helm of the Cal State Fullerton baseball program four seasons ago. After three years at the University of Illinois interrupted what is now a 20-year tenure with the Titans, Garrido has logged two more conference championships and a pair of trips to the College World Series. The Titans placed second in Omaha in 1992 and third in 1994.

Garrido's return to Fullerton coincided with the beginning of construction of a long-awaited on-campus stadium. The

"Field of Dreams" facility was used for the first time on Apr. 18, 1992, in a doubleheader victory over Loyola Marymount and was formally dedicated on May 4, 1992, as CSUF alumnus Kevin Costner threw out the first pitch before a crowd of 2,054 that overflowed the 1,520 theater-style chairs.

The fifth winningest active coach in Division I NCAA baseball, Garrido spent 1988 through 1990 as head coach at Illinois, where he built the Illini into a national power and led them to their first Big Ten Championship in 26 years. He compiled a record of 111-57 and twice took the Illini into the NCAA playoffs.

At Fullerton, Garrido has captured a pair of national championships, six regional titles and 14 conference crowns including 11 in a row from 1974 through 1984. These accomplishments only scratch the surface of the success story he has written at Cal State Fullerton.

Garrido, 56, has served with equal professionalism his studentathletes, his institution and his sport while developing a nationally prominent program at a university which has existed for just over 30 years. Fullerton has sent scores of players into the professional ranks (21 to the major leagues through 1994) while bringing CSF its first men's Division I national title. Garrido has been an articulate and respected voice in the promotion of collegiate and amateur baseball.

Garrido ranks fifth among active Division I coaches and tenth all-time with 1,050 victories through 26 seasons. He celebrated his 1,000th career win on May 7, 1993, with a 12-1 victory over San Jose State. His lifetime mark is 1,050-499-7 (.677) and his Fullerton record is 829-366-6 (.693). Three times (1975, 1979 and 1984) he has been selected National Coach of the Year. His average of more than 40 victories per season is the fourth highest in NCAA history, and in a survey of major league directors of player development, Coach Garrido was rated one of the nation's top three teachers.

The Titans have strung together 21 consecutive winning seasons while typically playing as difficult a schedule as anyone in the country. For 11 years in a row (1974-84), Fullerton won or shared its league championship and went on to post-season play. In 1985, Fullerton won the southern division championship of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association but lost a playoff series at Fresno State. The Garrido-coached Titans have missed the NCAA tournament on only two other occasions -- in 1986 when they placed third and in 1991 when they were the Big West co-champs but did not earn the automatic tourney berth.

A native of the San Francisco Bay town of Vallejo, Garrido attended Fresno State University (1959-61) and was an all-conference performer for Coach Pete Beiden. He played in the 1959 College World Series and was inducted into the Fresno State Hall of Fame in the fall of 1993. He signed a contract with the Cleveland

Indians and played six years in their minor league system before retiring in 1966 to accept a coaching position at Sierra High School in Tollhouse, California.

Garrido moved up to the collegiate ranks in 1969 as head coach at San Francisco State (25-14) and then spent three seasons at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo (85-62-1), where he earned a master's degree in 1968.

Despite being situated in the heart of baseball-rich southern California, Fullerton had enjoyed only limited success in the infant years of its intercollegiate baseball program. But that began to change in 1973 when Garrido arrived. After one losing (19-33-1) season, he began producing nothing but winners. And in 1975, the Titans asserted their new prowess by winning the NCAA regional tournament at USC and advancing to the College World Series in Omaha in their first year of Division I play.

It took until 1979 for a repeat Fullerton performance in the CWS, but the Titans didn't waste the second opportunity. The Titans came though the consolation bracket to beat Arkansas, 2-1, for the NCAA championship. They repeated as national champions in 1984, beating Texas, 3-1, in the title game.


Garrido's baseball interests carry beyond the college schedule. His 1979 team took a goodwill mission to Taiwan, he managed in Alaska summer leagues, he operates a successful instructional camp for youth and is in great demand as a speaker. Garrido also spent the summer of 1990 as an assistant coach with Team USA.


Garrido also serves as an assistant athletic director with an emphasis on fund raising. He is single, resides in Newport Beach and has a daughter, Lisa, 29.

#### Top Ten Baseball Accomplishments of Augie Garrido

- 1. Is one of 11 men (six active) with more than 1,000 Division I college baseball coaching victories (1,050 to date)
- 2. At Cal State Fullerton and Illinois, he has won or shared 16 conference championships including 11 in a row in Fullerton from 1974 through 1984.
- 3. He has won two national titles -- in 1979 and 1984 -- and has placed second (1992) and third (1994).
- 4. He has won six regional championships in 16 tries -- ALL away from home.
- 5. He has developed a program which has produced 21 major leaguers (as of June 22, 1994).
- 6. On three occasions (1975, 1979 and 1984) he has been selected national coach of the year.
- His teams have personally dethroned four defending NCAA champions: 1981 Arizona State in 1982 regional game at Tempe 1983 Texas in 1984 title game in Omaha 1991 LSU in 1992 regional game at Baton Rouge 1993 LSU in 1994 College World Series game
- B. He has sent four assistants on to Division I head coaching jobs -Bill Kernen currently at Cal State Northridge

- 9. He led Illinois in 1989 to its first Big 10 baseball championship in 26 years

Associate Head Coach George Horton has played a major role in the Titans' success for the past four seasons. He has input on almost every aspect of the Fullerton baseball program with his primary concern being the development of the pitching staff.

Horton returned to Cal State Fullerton after coaching at Cerritos College where he guided the Falcons to three junior college state championships in six years.

Horton, 41, compiled a 226-53 record at Cerritos and won the California state

championship in 1985, 1987 and 1989. Each of those years he was selected National Junior College Coach of the Year. His best season was 1987 when the Falcons went 46-5. He had a South Coast Conference record of 102-28 (.785) and was a four-time So. Coast Conference Coach of the Year (1985, 1987, 1989 and 1990).


He had many players graduate to the major leagues including Brian Hunter, who played for the Atlanta Braves in the 1991 World Series. Other names include Mike Benjamin with the San Francisco Giants, Craig Worthington with the Baltimore Orioles, Ever Magallanes, Al Osuna, Bret Barberie, Louis Medina and Jeff Hearron.

Horton was a member of the Cerritos College team in 1972 and '73. He was a member of the 1973 State Championship team. He won the most inspirational award in '72. In 1973 he was the Falcon team captain and won the Dallas Moon Award. Horton played two seasons for Garrido at Cal State Fullerton in 1975 and 1976 and won All-PCAA honors as both a junior and a senior. He was on the first Fullerton team to go to the College World Series in 1975. He batted .308 as a junior and .290 as a senior while playing first base. He graduated in 1978 and went on to earn a master's degree in 1980 at Cal Lutheran.

Horton's coaching career began at Cerritos in 1976-77 and he went to Los Angeles Valley College where he coached with current Long Beach State coach Dave Snow the following three seasons. In 1980, he moved back to Cerritos as an assistant to Gordie Douglas before taking the head job in 1985. In addition, he coached during the summer for the Fairbanks Goldpanners (1981 and 1983) in Alaska and the Hutchinson Broncs (1982) in Kansas. A few famous names played for him on those summer teams such as Shane Mack, Odibbe McDowell, Joe Magrane, Dan Plesac, Phil Stevenson and Roger Clemens.

Horton and his wife Francie have three daughters -- Michele (15), Heather (11) and Rebecca (4). Horton and his family reside in Yorba Linda.

Rick Vanderhook is in his eighth season with the Titans as a coach. "Hook" will coach the outfielders and set the defense again in 1995. He is also Fullerton's recruiting coordinator. He and the rest of the staff did an outstanding job in recruiting coveted players like C.J. Ankrum, Jack Jones, Mark Kotsay, Ted Silva and Jon Ward.

Vanderhook, 33, first coached the Titans from 1985 to 1988. After serving as a bullpen coach and working with the pitchers and catchers in 1985 and 1986, he stepped into the third base coaching box in 1987 and worked with the hitters and defense in 1988. He spent 1989 and 1990 with Coach Bill Kernen at Cal State Northridge and returned to Fullerton for the 1992 season.

Vanderhook has coached for Fairbanks in Alaska and the Goldpanners finished third in the nation in 1986.

He originally came to Fullerton in 1983 and redshirted his first season with the Titans. He was also a member of the Titans' 1984 national championship team. He also played at Cerritos College for Coach Horton.

Vanderhook prepped at Lakewood HS under Coach John Herbold, now the head coach at Cal State Los Angeles.




Rick Stassi Strength & Conditioning Advisor

Mike Kirby **Volunteer Assistant Coach** 



Maintaining a baseball field properly requires an enormous amount of time and effort, but former Titan players Tony Fusco and Jason Gill are examples of the quality and dedication seen with the baseball program.

Fusco, who mainly goes by the nickname of "Chief", played for Cal State Fullerton during the 1993 season. He transferred from Long Beach City College where he played for one season. He played at Mt. San Antonio College for one season previous to his stint at Long Beach City College.

Fusco grew up in Seal Beach and graduated from Los Alamitos High School.

Gill played one season with the Titans last year, starting in 43 games at third base. He hit .345 for the Titans as they made their way to the College World Series.

Gill, a transfer from Cal State Dominguez Hills, also played at Cuesta College. He grew up in Santa Ana and graduated from Mater Dei High School.

Only 12 players return from a Titan baseball team that finished 47-16, tied for first place in the Big West and was only two wins away from reaching its second national championship game in three years. That means a large challenge for Head Coach Augie Garrido and his staff as Cal State Fullerton prepares for its 21st season of play at the Division I level.

The Titans will take it one game at a time. But with a little luck and chemistry, don't be surprised if a post-season berth is in the cards for the 1995 Titans despite the huge turnover; this team from Fullerton may have a couple of aces up its collective sleeves.

"The voids that have been created by the departure of players from last season's team will be filled by the leadership of our returning players," said Garrido. "If the returning players can step up their level of play, our newcomers will be more comfortable and will contribute."

Fullerton is balanced offensively with good power and hitting ability from both sides of the plate.

Sophomore outfielder/pitcher **Mark Kotsay** (.372, 4 HR, 35 RBI), senior first baseman **D.C. Olsen** (.277, 5 HR, 26 RBI) and sophomore shortstop **Jack Jones** (.180, 3 HR, 25 RBI) provide the Titans with the only returning starting position players. Kotsay, who led the team in hitting, already has been picked as a pre-season All-American.

Junior pitchers **Ted Silva** (4-4, 2.29 ERA, 13 saves) and **Jon Ward** (0-2, 3.67, 1 save) will lead an almost brand-new pitching staff for the Titans.

Among the large group of newcomers are C.J. Ankrum (Saratoga-Saratoga HS), Mark Chavez (Wilmington-L.A. Harbor College), Tom Dillon (Fairfax-College of Marin), Joe Fraser (Huntington Beach-Rancho Santiago College), Ruben Hernandez (Needles-Cal Baptist), Tony Martinez (Fullerton-Porterville College) and John Mitchell (Camarillo-UCLA)

Beginning in 1988, Cal State Fullerton has gone to the College World Series every even-numbered year. Does that mean that the Titans are statistically prevented from going to Omaha in 1995?

"This is basically a two-year team. The leadership of this year's team will provide the leadership for next year's team, so every game and every inning will be valuable as they gain experience," said Garrido. "The experiences this year hopefully will help us to win the national championship.

"If we fall short of the goal, which is what happens to every team that starts except for one, we will take a more mature and experienced team into next year at the key positions."

A major concern for Cal State Fullerton this season will be the pitching staff. Only three pitchers return from last season's talented staff that featured five pitchers currently in the minor leagues.

"Losing the wins (42 last season) is significant, there will be four or five new guys that will get an opportunity," said Associate Head Coach George Horton. "The biggest challenge is finding out who can assume those kind of roles and provide the quality.

"This staff has a chance to be very competitive. We are going to try to win right out of the gate and will not sacrifice winning for development. How they react will be important and we are coaching them to keep in character and make them believe that they are capable of pitching well against quality opponents."

As has been the case in the past, Cal State Fullerton will face a daunting schedule before Big West Conference play. The Titans will face a Stanford team that some feel is the best team in the nation. The jewel of this year's home schedule is the Anaheim Hilton and Towers Classic which features Texas, Notre Dame and Pepperdine. Texas will be a familiar foe as the Titans travel to Austin, Texas, to face the Longhorns in a three-game set. During non-conference play, the Titans will also travel to Fresno State, Arizona and Wichita State.

Fullerton will get the advantage in Big West Conference play by hosting cross-town rival Long Beach State in early April.

"Over the years, we have developed a schedule that we believe is conducive to maturing the players before conference play. We play the best possible opponents in different environments, both home and away. That will help us eventually to be successful not only in conference play but also postseason play as well. I think that has been a key element to our success in the past couple of years," said Garrido.

#### POSITION OUTLOOK

**CATCHER:** Brian Loyd (Fullerton-El Dorado HS) returns for Fullerton and will round out the leadership. Loyd played in 18 games last season, which should help the Titans' new pitching staff.

**FIRST BASE:** Ankrum and Olsen will garner most of the playing time at this position. If Ankrum plays, look for Olsen to be the designated hitter and vice versa. Ankrum can also play in the outfield, while Hernandez can also be plugged into the first base-designated hitter equation.

**SECOND BASE:** Fraser is a good all-around player who will help the Titans both offensively and defensively. His steadiness, teamed with the dazzling glove of shortstop Jones, creates a solid middle. **Nakia Hill** (San Diego-Crawford HS) has talent and will use 1995 to gain experience at the collegiate level.

**SHORTSTOP:** Last year, the glove of Jones was why he started all season, not his bat. But Jones had a hot fall offensively and may develop into one of the top all-around shortstops. **Sergio Brown** (Cal Poly Pomona) will back up Jones at this position.

**THIRD BASE:** Redshirt freshman **Mike Lamb** (Valinda), originally charted as a catcher will move to third base. Lamb had the best batting average during the Titans' fall season. Martinez will backup Lamb at the hot corner.


**LEFT FIELD:** Tony Miranda (.254, 2 HR, 7 RBI) only started 12 games last season, but will see a lot more action in '95. A player with good range, Miranda has some pop in his bat and will be part of a strong outfield.

**CENTER FIELD:** Kotsay can provide the leadership for Fullerton as the starting center fielder. He has the flexibility to pitch, as well, but his arm will be a plus in center.

**RIGHT FIELD:** Giambi, who had a tremendous post-season last year, will be the one in right field. His good offensive production is balanced with a good glove and should help the Titans. Backing up Giambi and the rest of the outfield will be Ankrum, Chatham and Matos.

STARTING PITCHER: Silva moves out of the bullpen and into the starting rotation. His experience in clutch situations and his competent ability will help to guide a relatively new staff. The key to the success of the staff, however, won't be Silva, but Ward. Ward has made good progress since last fall. Pitching to his anticipated performance level and maintaining consistency would be a plus for the starting rotation. Mitchell should be a quality pickup for the Titans and has the type of stuff that makes him a good starting pitcher. Senior transfer **Tim Dixon** (San Jose-University of Arkansas at Little Rock) will also be a strong candidate to make the starting rotation.

**RELIEF PITCHER:** The promotion of Silva to the starting rotation leaves right-handed relief chores to Chavez. Chavez should have the ability to fill the role and the Titans will look to continue their strong tradition of a good lefty-righty combination from one of two lefties with either Kotsay or Dillon.

California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies, such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing.

Classes were offered for the first time in 1959, and the first commencement (for five students) was in 1960.

The University's 22,000 students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and nations. Most students commute daily to and from classes, although nearly 400 now live on campus in residence halls opened in 1988.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 700-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The University is fully accredited and enjoys national recognition for both its array of traditional academic programs and a wide list of independently accredited professional programs, including art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, education, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing and theater. All told, there are 94 degree programs - 44 of them at the graduate level - plus a wide variety of credential and certificate programs.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is an internship and cooperative education program that allows students to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their regular studies.

Another amenity is the extended education program, which provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours without the formalities of regular admission to the university.

Still another strong point is the University's cultural events program. Besides student productions, it includes a series that brings nationally known professional artists to Cal State Fullerton for residencies as well as public performances.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members, is another highlight, as is a growing network of support groups including the Alumni Association, which represents the university's 100,000 graduates, and the Titan Athletic Foundation.

Further examples of community outreach are the Ruby Geron-

tology Center, which serves as an educational and research facility for the study of aging and a meeting place for the Continuing Learning Experience support group. The center is the first building at Cal State Fullerton to be funded solely by private funds.

Other organizations serving as support groups include the President's Associates, Art Alliance, the Emeriti, Friends of the Fullerton Arboretum, Music Associates, Patrons of the Library, Patrons of the Museum of Anthropology, Reading Educators Guild and Tucker Wildlife Society.

To reinforce the University's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State Fullerton has embarked on a comprehensive fund-raising campaign. Its purpose is to raise the

necessary non-state funding to make a very good university a great institution.

#### Building for the 21st Century: The Future is Now!

Cal State Fullerton is making great strides toward becoming one of the top universities in the nation. The University has been able to secure a large amount of capital-outlay funding to support the needs of the student body and the faculty.

The main campus now consists of 19 permanent buildings or building clusters. The tallest building on campus is nine stories, and the greatest walking distance from one building to another is only 10 minutes. The newest buildings are the two-story Science Laboratory Center and five-story University Hall, both of which were completed in 1993 and opened for classes in January, 1994.

In early 1992, the campus witnessed the expansion of the University Center. The \$10.1 million project was funded by a student fee increase in 1987 and added 48,000 square feet to the facility, including the 1,200-seat Titan Pavilion.

Cal State Fullerton also witnessed the addition of the five-story Computer Science Building in January, 1990.

The most important project related to athletics opened in the spring of 1992. Backed by the city of Fullerton, the Titan Sports Complex is one of the premier sports complexes in Orange County. Funds for the project have been partially generated by the lease agreement with the on-campus Marriott Hotel. The hotel, a joint effort of the university, the city of Fullerton and the Marriott Corporation, opened in 1989.

The sports complex includes a 10,000-seat stadium for football, soccer and other activities; a 1,500-seat baseball stadium; an eightlane all-weather track around an auxiliary practice soccer field and 12 tennis courts. Two lighted softball fields were already part of the complex before the additions.

#### Dr. Milton A. Gordon, President

Dr. Milton A. Gordon was selected the fourth president of Cal State Fullerton by The California State University Board of Trustees and assumed his duties on August 6, 1990.

His university leadership includes serving as vice president for academic affairs at Sonoma State University for four years, as dean of the College of the Arts and Sciences for Chicago State University for more than eight years and as director of the Afro-American Studies Program at Loyola University of Chicago for six years.

President Gordon also taught at the Illinois Institute of Technology and in the Chicago public schools and served as mathematician at the University of Chicago's Laboratories of Applied Sciences.

He is the Big West Conference representative to the NCAA Presidents Commission and the California state representative to the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and he serves on the governing boards of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, California Coalition for Mathematics, Orange County Chamber of Commerce, Orange County Community Foundation, United Way of Orange County, YMCA of Orange County and Fullerton Chamber of Commerce. In addition, he is on the advisory boards of St. Jude Medical Center and The California State University's Institute for Teaching and Learning.

The President has a Ph.D. in mathematics from the Illinois Institute of Technology, an M.A. in mathematics from the University of Detroit and a B.A. in mathematics and secondary education from Xavier University of Louisiana.

#### John Easterbrook, Athletic Director

John Easterbrook was appointed director of athletics at Cal State Fullerton on September 1, 1994, by President Milton Gordon as part of a message to the campus and the community.

"This isn't just a hiring," said Dr. Gordon, "it's a message to the athletic department that the athletic program is an integral part of our overall university program."

Easterbrook was chosen from a field of 41 candidates on the strength of his experience at a successful Division I program and his familiarity with the California State University system as an associate athletic director for the past nine years at Fresno State. Easterbrook, 55, was involved primarily in compliance, facilities and event management at Fresno State, which drew more than 500,000 fans to athletic events last year.

Easterbrook was hired at Fresno State by Dr. Gary Cunningham. The pair had crossed paths at the University of Wyoming in Laramie where Easterbrook was the president and chief executive officer of American National Bank and Cunningham was the UW athletic director.

Easterbrook previously coached college football for 13 seasons at Idaho, Oregon State, Illinois and Wyoming. He was a three-year starter at quarterback and also played two seasons of basketball at Illinois. He was the Most Valuable Player of the Copper Bowl. He earned a bachelor's degree in commerce and law and attended law school for two years before entering coaching.

#### Titan Nickname and Elephant Mascot Evolved from Vote and Memorable Race

"What exactly is a Titan?"

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that pop into the minds of media and fans when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit. While the relatively young institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, here are the recognized legends.

"It was the student's decision in a vote," explains Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname 'Titans.' "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body at the outset, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College. They voted to organize as a student body and to assess themselves a fee of \$10 per semester.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories where named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done about a mascot because no one knew quite what to do. Until, of course, the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke turned into probably the biggest "happening" on the campus to this day. The "gag" attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became know that spring afternoon in 1962.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the

campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions in the caricature have been made in recent years to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek. The costume that brings the elephant mascot to life also has changed. Tuffy even attracted a Tiffy in 1992.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white when they chose Titans, but the athletic

equipment manager at the time thought orange was

an appropiate color on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987. A change to a navy blue in uniforms and printing instead of the "reflex" blue of recent years was inititated in 1992 with a de-emphasis of the orange, furthered by former

athletic director Lynn Eilefson in the mid 1980s.

Finally, there is the matter of the school's name. The name originally for CSUF was Orange County State College. It's also been Orange State College and later California State College at Fullerton or California State College, Fullerton. The change to university status necessitated a further change to California State University, Fullerton, but the school's address could not be changed from 800 N. State *College* Boulevard.

To out-of-staters, the school's name causes confusion because most don't realize there are two distinct systems of higher education in the state - the University of California and the State University system. So, the school has been called everything from Cal-Fullerton to UC Fullerton to California State Fullerton State to simply Fullerton State. The preferred moniker is Cal State Fullerton, with no hyphens or commas, which is what most of the more than 100,000 graduates recognize. But since there are only two other major institutions known as Titans (University of Detroit and Oral Roberts University), just call Fullerton teams the "Titans!"

Obstacles and adversity. Grass-roots support and coaches with "sandwich board" signs. Stunning upsets and courageous performances. All have been a part of Cal State Fullerton athletics as "Titan Pride" has taken limited resources to athletic successes disproportionate to such a young institution.

How many universities can claim national championships in seven different sports, a perennial All-Star major league third baseman, baseball and men and women basketball players in the Olympics, two rookies in the Super Bowl, the subject matter of a Walt Disney feature film and the first player selected in the major league draft?

The tenor was set by the first intercollegiate team - men's basketball. In only their second season, coach Alex Omalev advanced the Titans five rounds into the NAIA national playoffs in 1961-62.

Sixteen seasons later, the entire nation watched another "cinderella" Titan Five advance within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association post-season tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the Western Regional.

The basketball tradition, which included a women's national title in 1970 and coach Billie Moore and star Nancy Dunkle on the women's 1976 Olympic team, was continued in 1984 as Leon Wood helped the men to a gold medal before he became a first-round NBA draft choice. Coach George McQuarn's teams were usually factors in the PCAA race and had national Top 20 rankings and a victory over the nation's No. 1-ranked and undefeated team to their credit. Fullerton, which seemingly specialized in last-second wins in 1988-89 behind 1995 NBA All-Star forward Cedric Ceballos of the Los Angeles Lakers, also has competed twice in the post-season NIT Tournament while the women have recently been in both the WNIT and NCAA fields. In 1991, Genia Miller was selected a Kodak All-America after ranking No. 2 in the nation in scoring and blocked shots and No. 7 in rebounding.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton more fame. Former men's Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and had recent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation led by former Chinese Olympian Li Xiao Ping. Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished sixth or better in the nation 12 times and won the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while more recently Tami Elliott won 10 All-American awards.

With the arrival of coach Augie Garrido, baseball exploded on the national scene. He broke the USC monopoly in the western regionals in 1975 and won the national title in 1979 behind the play of Tim Wallach, now of the Los Angeles Dodgers. He won the College World Series again in 1984 with players such as pitcher Greg Mathews and CWS Most Valuable Player John Fishel. After a three-year stint at Illinois, Garrido returned with a share of the 1991 Big West title and a second-place finish in the 1992 College World Series despite losing his old diamond to construction for the new complex. A member of the 1992 team, standout Phil Nevin, was selected as the No. 1 pick in the amateur draft by the Houston Astros. Garrido struck gold again last year with a third-place finish at the CWS.

Women have sparkled on the Fullerton diamonds, too. Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and the Titans have been a powerhouse, making seven trips to the College World Series and 15 consecutive regional appearances. The Titans brought home their first NCAA Championship in 1986 and often have been ranked No. 1 in the country.

There have been national titles in men's cross country and women's fencing and individual standouts like golfer Martha Wilkerson, runner Mark Covert and wrestler Laszlo Molnar, who finished second in the nation in 1994 at 167 pounds.

The now-defunct football program made great strides in Division I-A after its humble Division II beginnings. Gene Murphy guided the Titans to two conference championships and four runnerup finishes between 1983 and 1989.

Despite the loss of the football program, Head Coach Al Mistri's soccer program has tried to fill the void in Titan Stadium. A new women's program was launched in 1993 and it coincided with a memorable men's season that saw the Titans move as high as No. 3 in the national rankings behind All-American forward Eddie Soto and compete at the NCAA Final Four in Davidson, North Carolina. The 1994 team advanced to the NCAA quarterfinals.



"We just won the wrong tournament!"

In only six words, Coach Augie Garrido succinctly summarized the 1994 Cal State Fullerton baseball season. The Titans fell short of their goal of winning a third national championship by virtue of misreading the calendar. They outperformed both Oklahoma and Georgia Tech to win the inaugural Anaheim Hilton & Towers Classic in Fullerton in February and then had to watch television on June 11 as the Sooners beat the Yellowjackets in Omaha in the title game of the College World Series. Three days earlier Georgia Tech had eliminated the Titans from the Rosenblatt Stadium tournament, leaving the Titans tied for third place.

"The team was focused all season on its goal and it was disappointing to come up just short," said Garrido. "However, every team but one fails in that quest. We have to find comfort in the fact that we gave a champion-ship effort."

The Titans were a model of consistency all year. They blended excellent pitching with solid defense and an offense that produced runs without consistently hitting the ball out of the yard. They never lost more than two games in a row and those "slumps" occurred but three times and to quality opponents. They were ranked as high as No. 1 in the nation yet could gain only a one-third piece of the championship of an underrated Big West Conference.

Stars were plentiful. Six different players made All-American teams. Second baseman Jeff Ferguson was the conference Co-Player of the Year and Matt Wagner, who barely made the travel squad in January, was the Big West Pitcher of the Year. Eventual first-round draft choice Dante Powell endured overwhelming scrutiny by hordes of professional scouts. Pitcher Dan Ricabal was ignored by the scouts and wasn't even drafted despite ironman performances down the stretch.

Fullerton opened the season as impressively as ever. The Titans won the rubber game of a season-opening 3-game series at Stanford and that triggered an 11-game winning streak. A series sweep at Arizona was encouraging and one at Texas was historic — it was only the second time Coach Cliff Gustafson's Longhorns had been swept in three games at home. The streak ended ignominiously at Div. II UC Riverside, when the Highlanders took advantage of a two-out, third-strike passed ball to launch a 2-run ninth-inning rally.

That sat the stage for the Anaheim Hilton & Towers Classic. More than 4,500 college baseball fans flocked to Titan Field to see what would turn out to be the three best teams in America and the University of San Diego, which could hold its head high. The Toreros went 0-3 but lost to both Georgia Tech and Oklahoma in extra innings and to Fullerton, 6-4.

The San Diego game was a key for Fullerton. Ricabal started and couldn't throw strikes. He shaved his head the next day and launched a turnaround that would see him go 10-1 the rest of the season with a 1.71 ERA and log a 4-0 record in the NCAA tournament. Wagner relieved Ricabal and pitched 1-hit ball for 8.2 innings for the victory and a spot in the starting rotation. He also would go 10-1 over the balance of the season (12-1 total) and go from walk-on to All-American.

The second day of the tournament featured a matchup of Garrido and Oklahoma coach Larry Cochell, who guided the Titans to the College World Series twice while Garrido was coaching at the University of Illinois from 1988 to 1990. Chad Rolish pitched the only complete game of his career for a 4-1 win over the eventual national champions, who featured several Southern California high school products.

The championship was decided in the final game by Fullerton and Georgia Tech, which had lost its opener to Oklahoma, 8-6. In the first of what would become three outstanding pitchers' duels between the Titans and Yellowjackets, Mike Parisi and Ted Silva combined on a 6-hit shutout to beat Al Gogolin, who also allowed six hits in a complete game effort .

In an inevitable letdown, Fullerton lost back-to-back games at Fresno State and Pepperdine to fall to 15-4. The Titans won 11 of their next 13 including a pair of 1-run victories over Wichita State and five wins in six

Big West games to set up a showdown series at Long Beach State. The 49ers bounced back from a 9-1 drubbing in the series opener at Blair Field to beat the Titans twice, 10-2 and 4-2.

Fullerton took out its frustration on its next four opponents, winning all seven games. The Titans pummeled UNLV by scores of 16-1, 20-1 and 3-0 and won a rain-abbreviated series at Pacific, 4-0 and 4-1. But upstart Nevada flexed its newfound baseball muscle. The Wolf Pack strolled into Titan Field and beat the Titans twice -- 5-2 and 7-2 -- before Ricabal spun a 3-hit shutout for an 8-0 win. The Big West championship would eventually be declared a three-way tie with Nevada and Long Beach at 16-5 and Fullerton at 15-5 with a rainout at Stockton. The automatic NCAA berth would go to Nevada and the Titans would have to worry about a repeat of their 1991 NCAA snubbing.

The Titans concluded Big West play with an offensive explosion at New Mexico State. They won by scores of 15-11, 23-10 and 15-5 with Ferguson ablaze. He went 11-for-15 in the series with 5 home runs, 2 double snad 12 RBI. In the middle game he went 7-for-7 with 7 RBI and 17 total bases. The hits were a Big West single-game record and he earned honors as the Mizuno-Collegiate Baseball National Player of the Week.

Fullerton got its NCAA berth as a No. 2-seed at Stillwater, Oklahoma, where the host Cowboys had won six of seven previous regionals and were seeded No. 1 in 1994. The Titans easily handled Northwestern State of Louisiana and TCU and caught a break when Memphis outslugged Oklahoma State. Fullerton was on the verge of eliminating the host Cowboys and gain the "catbird seat" with an 11-8 lead going into the ninth. But Jake Benz hit a 3-run homer to cap a 5-run rally and give the Cowboys a 13-11 win in a game that lasted 4:01.

A sleepless Fullerton team was faced with the prospect of beating Memphis in the afternoon humidity and then coming back and doing the same to a better-rested home team playing in front of a vocal group of 3,800 supporters in even more humidity. The Titans did it. Tony Fetchel, who had pitched 9 innings all year, started against Memphis and got the Titans into the fifth inning with a 6-2 lead. Ricabal, who had beaten Northwestern State, came in to shut down the Tigers while Powell was going 6-for-6 to spark an assault on the Memphis bullpen and a 12-5 win.

The title game was a classic battle of will and determination between two storied college baseball programs. Each team went deep into its pitching staff as the game was contested out by out. OSU broke a 4-4 tie with a run in the seventh and took the 5-4 lead into the bottom of the ninth. An error opened the door and the Titans eventually loaded the bases with two outs. Brian King, who had replaced an injured Powell in the eighth, singled to center. The tying run scored but pinch-runner Fetchel was thrown out at the plate on a close play and the game went into extra innings. With a makeshift lineup featuring Steve Rath at third base, Chris Remala at shortstop and Jim Betzsold at first, Silva got out of the tenth with a runner at third when Rath caught a wicked line drive for his first putout of the year. Ferguson walked with one out in the bottom half and he went to third on a steal and a throwing error. With the bases loaded, Cowboy relief ace Rob Gaiko hit pinch-hitter Robert Matos in the wrist to force in the winning run and send the Titans to Omaha.

After two sleepless nights in Stillwater and a quick trip home to Fullerton to do laundry, the fatigued Titans opened the CWS against Georgia Tech. Brad Rigby outdueled Mike Parisi and Tech returned a favor, handing Fullerton its first shutout loss in 195 games, 2-0. The drought ended in a cloudburst as Fullerton tied a CWS record with 11 runs in the first inning on the way to a 20-6 elimination of defending national champion LSU. Fullerton remained alive with a 10-3 romp over Florida State as Mark Kotsay drove in a CWS record seven runs. Fullerton needed two wins over Georgia Tech to get into the national title game. Nomar Garciaparra's 12th-inning solo home run was the difference in a 3-2 Tech win that wasn't decided until King's fly out to center with the bases loaded in the bottom of the 12th.

Twenty-one products of the Cal State Fullerton baseball program have worked their way into major league box scores with several more stars of recent Titan teams waiting in the wings for their opportunity.

The first Titan to play in the major leagues was left-handed pitcher **Dan Boone**, who broke in with the Angels and Padres after helping Fullerton into the 1975 College World Series and then made a dramatic comeback with Baltimore in 1990. He was followed by **Dan Whitmer** at Toronto (1976) and California.

The biggest name came next as **Tim Wallach**, the 1979 College Player of the Year, broke in with the Montreal Expos. He has played in several All-Star Games for the National League including the 1989 Classic in Anaheim. He now plays for the Los Angeles Dodgers.


Arriving at the 'Show' in the mid-80s were right-handed pitcher **Jeff Robinson** with the San Francisco Giants, Pittsburgh Pirates, New York Yankees, California Angels and Chicago Cubs; outfielder **Andre David**, who hit a home run in his first at bat for the Minnesota Twins; and outfielder **John Christensen** with the New York Mets, Boston Red Sox, Seattle Mariners and the Twins.


Left-handed pitcher **Greg Mathews** burst upon the scene in St. Louis in 1986 to become a valued member of the Cardinals' starting rotation. He started in the Championship Series for the Cardinals. Recurring arm problems have plagued his career and he

is now playing in triple A.


Getting his debut in 1987 was **Bill Moore** with Montreal before the Titan Alumni Club exploded in 1988 with five additions. The most heralded was pitcher **Mike Harkey**, who was starting at Wrigley Field for the Chicago Cubs 16 months after his last Titan appearance. He was selected *USA Today's* Minor League Player of the Year in 1988 but suffered a knee injury during spring training and missed the Cubs' 1989 divisional title team. In 1990, he was the Cubs' No. 2 winner and placed fifth in Rookie of the Year balloting. He spent the 1991 season rehabilitating a shoulder injury and returned to the Chicago rotation in 1992. The Cubs released him before the 1994 season and he was signed by the Colorado Rockies.


Earlier in the 1988 season, former Titan reliever Mike Schooler surfaced with the Mariners and was their top stopper and one of the best in baseball before being released and signing on with the Texas Rangers. In Philadelphia, Shane Turner was one of the players who tried to fill the shoes of Hall of Famer Mike Schmidt at third base and he is currently trying to make the Cleveland Indians' roster. In Houston, John Fishel, the MVP of the 1984 College World Series, was part of the Astros' futile run at the NL West before being traded to the Yankees. Kevin Reimer started in more than 100 games in right field for the Texas Rangers in 1991, DH in 1992 and signed with the Milwaukee Brewers in 1993.






1995 Cal State Fullerton Baseball













**Phil Nevin,** the 1992 College Player of the Year and No. 1 pick in the '92 amateur baseball draft has a good opportunity to play for the Houston Astros with the trade of third baseman Ken Caminiti to the San Diego Padres.

# **New Titan Field**

The current Titan Field became the home of Cal State Fullerton baseball on Apr. 18, 1992, when the Titans swept a double-header from Loyola Marymount, 8-2 and 11-3. It is the third oncampus diamond to serve Cal State Fullerton, which also has played "home" games at city parks such as Amerige in Fullerton and Boysen in Anaheim as well as borrowing junior college fields at Fullerton, Rancho Santiago and Orange Coast Colleges during the installation of lights in 1983.

The first Titan diamond was laid out to the west of Titan House, located to the southeast of the current stadium. Home

plate was in the southeast corner of the field plowed out of citrus groves. A new field was built around 1970 today's site, but with home plate located where the current left field foul pole rises. The largest crowd to see a game at that field, with small portable bleachers and plenty of standing room, was estimated at 5,000 in 1979 when Fullerton hosted the University of Hawai'i and heralded pitcher Derek Tatsuno.

The current stadium boasts 1,540 permanent chairback seats with another 200 spots available on the concrete steps above each dugout. There is ample standing room around the concourse.
