

This exhibition introduces the artwork of Quechua children from the Peruvian Andes. El Taller Movil de Arte, a non-profit mobile arts education school in Peru, teaches children how to use art as a tool for self-expression. With ancient Peruvian textiles as an artistic reference point, the paintings reflect an innocence unaffected by modern city life.

The photography of Monique Y. Pineda and the Chulucanas pottery of Froilan Cordova are also presented in this exhibition.


La Patria Portátil July 1 - August 31, 1999

"La Patria Portátil: 100 Years of Mexican Chromo Art Calendars" is a retrospective exhibition of 20th century Mexico, as seen through its popular art calendars. These vintage calendars feature historic and romantic images, which have become part of the Mexican identity. Subjects include the Mexican Revolution and scenes from the Golden Age of Mexican cinema. This often overlooked graphic art tradition documents the year-by-year changes in Mexican ideals, dreams and desires.

Veredas Argentinas – Argentine Pathways September 13 – October 24, 1999




