### L.V. BOARD'S REASONS FOR INSURANCE CHANGES

At the Board Meeting on May 5, 1986, the Board announced a change in the responsibility for paying the \$1,000 deductible for claims filed against the Association's Master Policy of Fire and Extended Coverage for losses incurred in residential units. This was a major change for it shifted the burden of payment of the deductible from the Association to individual homeowners.

Although explained in detail at the May meeting and again at the June meeting, some confusion remains and some homeowners were unable to watch Channel 12 in its coverage of the meeting.

This is to review, stepby-step, the events which led the present and last year's Board to take this action. Let's start with a question:

Do you have Homeowners Insurance to insure your personal property for loss from fire and theft? Is your personal property insurance the standard condominium HO6 policy for communities such as Leisure Village?

And did you know that most Condominium Homeowners HO6 Policies contain a provision to pay the first \$1,000 loss covered by the Association's Master Policy? In other words, did you know that most of us paid

for the \$1,000 deductible

of the Association's fire

and extended coverage insurance when we bought our Homeowners Policy?

This fact was apparently unknown to previous Boards of Directors who carried out the policy established by Leisure Technology of paying the \$1,000 deductible out of Association's funds — your money.

In early 1985, insurance people advised the Board that while the wording in policies differs, nine out of ten homeowner policies sold to L.V. residents provide for paying the \$1,000 deductible. This posed a problem to the Board could they continue to pay the deductible out of Association funds when this loss was already covered? We must remember, Board members are legally bound to expend Association funds — your money — in a wise and prudent manner. To do otherwise would leave Board members subject to possible legal action.

The CC&Rs make no mention of the insurance deductible. And the CC&Rs are unclear, for one section requires the Association to carry fire and extended coverage insurance for the full replacement value of each dwelling unit, while another section requires the homeowner to repair and maintain the interior of his or her home.

Since the CC&Rs do not spell out this responsi-

### **INSURANCE RESERVE ACCOUNT**

Not until May 1986 did the LVA Board of Directors come out of the closet and public reveal that they have been pursuing a policy of refusing to pay the insurance deductible.

To recapitulate: Leisure Technology set up a fund to pay the fire insurance deductible and subsequently turned over this fund to Leisure Village Association. This Insurance Reserve is known as Account No. 944. Its existence is referred to in a number of Village documents.

For example, the Auditors' Notes to Financial Statements for March 31, 1984 read as follows:

"The Association receives amounts at the close of members' escrow to reimburse the Association for the increased insurance expenditures required to provide insurance on the new member's dwelling. Such amounts received have been designated by the Board of Directors as insurance reserves to provide for insurance claims in an amount less than the deductible limit specified in the Association's insurance policy."

And here is an excerpt from a memo dated June 14, 1984, from Ed Salzer, former Board Chairman, to the LV Board of Directors, which was also distributed to every Homeowner:

"The present insurance company agrees and pays full replacement cost on any fire damage, less the \$1,000 deductible, and the Association pays that to any owner that has fire damage."

Even the current LVA Budget for 4/1/86-3/31/87, refers to the "Reserve for Self Insurance - 449."

It is indisputible that the Insurance Reserve Account was started to pay the deductible on the Association fire policy and may not be used for any other purpose.

As of the end of the fiscal year on March 31, 1986, this fund amounted to \$25,870. It was as high as \$30,190 in 1980 and as low as \$16,441 in 1978.

In accordance with established practice, in 1983 LVA paid out from this account \$2,964 for insurance claims; in 1984, \$2,488; in 1985, NOTHING. It has come to light that in 1985 the previous Board, on which two present members served, adopted a policy, kept secret from the Association membership and continued to this date by the present Board, negating the long-established Village practice of paying claims under the \$1,000 deductible.

Except for those whose claims were rejected, the Village residents were deliberately kept ignorant of this state of affairs.

Please note that the Insurance Reserve Fund is nowhere near depletion. At the present rate of claims, it will take six to eight years before it is exhausted.

One of the justifications advanced by the present Board is the claim that Villagers who have a Condo-

### TWO-WAY COMMUNICATION

Each year at election time we hear a lot of talk about improving communication between the Board of Directors and the residents. But afterwards everyone seems to forget this matter until election time the following year.

On at least two occasions during recent months the Board placed itself in the embarrrassing position of being compelled to reverse itself, primarily because it made decisions without availing itself of resident input through the appropriate committee.

One such incident was the Board's action to change the closing time of the East and West gates without first discussing the proposal with the Security and Safety Committee.

A second instance was the levying of charges for use of the kitchen facilities by the clubs without benefit of prior discussion by the Education and Recreation Committee.

Both decisions by the Board were met with such resounding disapproval by the residents that the Board rescinded its unpopular measures.

And now, to compound the error of its ways, the Board has decided that its members who have been assigned to work as liason with the several Village committees need not attend committee meetings.

How will Board members assess the concerns of the residents who attend committee meetings, if they are not present to hear complaints and/or suggestions? Certainly not by just reading committee minutes.

In short, to achieve an effective decision-making process, the Board should invite, rather than cut off, oral two-way communication.

minium Form of the Homeowners' Policy will be paid the \$1,000 deductible under that policy (less the H.O. policy deductible).

This payment is not automatic. For example, Safeco Insurance refers to "property which is your insurance responsibility under the condominium association agreement." Other companies have similar requirements. One company, Farmers Insurance, does not pay the deductible.

It has been asserted that 80% or 90% of the residents have the Condominium Unit Owners Form (HO 6), but this is merely a guess. The Board has not done a survey to find out the extent of Homeowner Insurance coverage.

More important, our CC&R's at present contain no such requiremnt. It remained for the Board to use tortured reasoning to attempt to read this requirement into the CC&R's. As a result, much of Board time is consumed processing insurance claims — a job best left to professional insurance adjusters.

Tom O'Brien, former Association President, the only Villager to have served two complete terms on the Board and who has also been Chairman of the Finance Committee, has suggested a way out of the swamp entrapping the present Board.

"If the Board will not take the initiative to revert to the original method of paying the fire insurance deductible up to \$1,000, then let the villagers take a referendum vote on this matter. That is the democratic way. That is the fair way."

bility, the Board sought legal opinion. Our Association attorney advised that the overall context of the CC&Rs is that the owner is responsible for the deductible. The Board then asked another attorney for his opinion, and he concurred. Fortunately, a court case came up and the superior court of Ventura County, Judge Bruce A. Thompson ruled that homeowners were responsible for the deductible.

With this legal foundation, the Board at its May meeting announced a change in policy in that the Association would not pay the deductible, but would look to residents to call upon their homeowners' policies for payment.

While the above was being developed, two things happened. The first was the Board adopted an interim practice of handling claims on a case by case basis - generally denying losses under \$1,000 but accepting losses over \$1,000 for filing against the Association Policy. The second was referral to the Insurance Committee. They concurred in principle in the Board's action but recommended an amendment to the CC&R's to spell out this responsibility and remove all doubts. The Board agrees. This is the amendment you will shortly be asked to approve.

Some owners disagree with the Board's action. John Lauten, with a legal background, and a member of the Insurance Committee feels the Board should continue the former practice until such time as the homeowners approve the amendment ot the CC&Rs. He has a valid point. Harry Becker takes the position that the amount in the past, \$3,000 to \$5,000 a year is small, and that the Association should pay since





### YNCG REPORT: HUNGER

By Sandy Okum

Food Share Inc., one of the largest volunteer organizations in the county, counts about 70 Leisure Villagers among its 550 volunteers.

Food Share is a food bank. That is, a non-profit organization which takes donated food and re-distributes it to those who need it. In 1985, Food Share distributed over 51/2 million pounds of food.

Where does all that food come from? Almost half (44%) comes from the government Commodities Program. Food Share distributes 250,000 pounds of milk, butter, cheese, rice, flour, corn meal and honey each month through this program.

Another 35% comes from gleaning. This means going into fields which have been harvested and pulling out a second harvest. George Langston

has been in charge of the gleaning operation for several years. There's hardly a field in this area you can drive past which George and his crews haven't gleaned.

(There are also more modern forms of gleaning. Each Friday Food Share sends a crew down to the docks to pick up bananas from Del Monte - bananas which are still edible but which, for one reason or another, are no longer saleable.)

The remaining 21% of Food Share's food comes from donations by individuals, retail stores (such as bakeries) and food packers and processors.

Where does all that food go? It is not distributed directly to the hungry. After it has been sorted and culled in Food Share's Oxnard warehouse, it is distributed through 128 agencies throughout the county. These include Catholic Social Services, Salvation Army, Head Start and Foster Grandparents in

Neighbors Care Group in Leisure Village.

The very large number of caring volunteers allows Food Share to operate very efficiently, distributing \$40 worth of food for every \$1 of administrative costs.

But, you may ask, are there really that many hungry people in Ventura County, or in America? Is it true that, as it was reported in the New York Times last December, hunger has reached epidemic proportions?

We are used to hearing about hungry people in impoverished countries, and even then the facts assault our sensibilities. But when we hear the facts about our own country, the paradox of hunger in the land of plenty is almost impossible to grasp.

The network of food banks has grown significantly to meet this crisis. The Second Harvest food bank network, for instance, has grown from a

Camarillo, and Your single soup kitchen in 1966 to a national network of 78 food banks and 150 affiliates in 1985. (Food Share is an affiliate of Second Harvest).

> In less than 25 years food banks have entered the mainstream of the national economy. Two years ago, for instance, less than one quarter of our supermarkets made donations to food banks. As of 1985, that has increased to almost half (47.4%).

This is a growing partnership which not only helps the hungry, but helps streamline our economy by eliminating waste. In the past, much processed food went to waste simply because the packaging was mis-labeled or damaged.

Raisin bran with too many raisins, onions too large for hamburger buns, frozen fruit drink that turns the wrong color the food industry is full of absurd stories about food that was once simply

thrown away.

But now that food banks have gained the trust of processors and wholesalers (who want to be sure the food will not find its way back into the market), that food can be re-distributed rather than wasted.

If a person is concerned about hunger, what can he do?

You can educate yourself on the subject. (Food Share has a reading list. Send for it.)

You can join an organization that is doing something about it. In addition to Food Share, there is the Ventura County Hunger coalition (652-1326) and many agencies that distribute directly to the hungry. Bread For The World is a Christian advocacy group that works in the area of public policy. (802 Rhode Island Ave N.E., Washington, D.C. 20018)

If you choose to join many of your neighbors in volunteering at Food Share, there is much to be done. You can volunteer to work in the warehouse or in the office; you can join a gleaning crew gleaners are entitled to 25% of what they pick; you can help with an ongoing research project.

You can grow a vegetable garden and contribute what you grow to Food Share. (And if you do, you are entitled to a nice deduction on your state income tax for the value of the produce.)

You can work for legislation to protect family farmers against the encroachment of corporate farming.

You can examine your own attitudes towards hunger. If you still believe that there's too many people, or not enough food, or that there will always be hunger, maybe it's time to think things through again.

# THE INEPT GARDENER: STAKED OUT

Ten years ago, our new home in L.V. had a planter area too desirable just for ivy and shrubs, which were scraggly and puny. After considering the options, I applied for permission to plant some flowers. All too quickly, we were yellow-staked!

I dug out the ivy myself and began spreading additives and humus, hoping to encourage my protegees.

The first couple of years met with only moderate success, because of my ignorance of congenial plants, and the native soil. However, some of the experiments worked, and the area began to show colors and diversity.

My original plan called for carefully delineated beds of annuals, bulbs, or perennials accented by borders of sweet alyssum. Haunted by my weakness that "more is better", the original plan failed. The place looks like HASH. Every time I skim through a seed catalog, nursery brochure, or wander through the nursery for more snail pellets, I come away with another idea.

I tried Protea, native of south Africa, whose fantastic blossoms and seed cases are incorporated into expensive dried flower arrangements. Our climate is ideal, promised the dealer, but after a valiant effort in which the plants struggled to survive, I had to admit failure. Perhaps they couldn't adjust to reversed seasons, December being summer in their native haunts.

Equal failure came with the Hawaiian Air Plant, a fly-eating carnivore, and a tree fern. It's just as well. Our rabbits should not become used to such exotic hors d'oeuvres.

we all share this expense and the cost to each is minimal. However, both overlook the legal responsibility of the Directors — can the Directors spend Association funds — your money — for something already paid for?

The Board urges all owners to study this proposed amendment. A Townhall Meeting is planned for a full discussion prior to voting.

I would be remiss if I failed to point out that one major insurance company, Farmers, does not offer this specific coverage in its condominium policy, and also, some homeowners choose to underwrite their own exposure and do not carry homeowners insurance. If you are in this group, we urge you to reconsider your insurance coverage.

The bottom line is simply this — why should we continue to pay out the deductible from Association funds when nine out of ten of us have already paid for this coverage in our Homeowners Policy? The other one-tenth can easily change their policies and then there will be 100% coverage.
