Me, Too

With apologies to "The Godfather" we offer you a "PREPOSITION YOU CANNOT REFUSE TO RECOGNIZE:"

How many times have you heard the expression, "to Jim (or Mary) and I"? Or, "to he and I"? If you watch much television, chances are that such misuse of language is noticed often; likewise in Hollywood movies and even in plays produced by the BBC.

H. W. Fowler, in his DICTIONARY OF MODERN ENGLISH USAGE, states: "Between you and I' is a piece of false grammar which, though often heard, is not sanctioned, like its opposites 'It's me' and 'That's him', even in colloquial usage."

Yet, he quotes Shakespeare: "All debts are cleared between you and I."

Fowler continues: "To Dickens it seems to have been natural that Nell's grandfather should say 'Leave Nell and I to toil and work,' and more than a hundred years later it seems to have been no less natural for a broadcaster giving a serious talk to say 'These things are for the betterment of you and I.' Perhaps this use of 'I' is partly due to a vague recollection of hearing 'me' corrected when wrongly used in a subjective partnership, as . . . 'Mrs. Forster and me are such friends."

Why focus on a fairly common grammatical error at this time? The school year begins in the month of September, and our thoughts naturally turn to the quality of education offered in our public schools, a "mediocrity" reflected in our adult population.

"Education is the primary activity of 60.2 million Americans. More than one of four persons will be a direct participant in the educational process as a student or teacher," reports Secretary of Education Terrel Bell.

To list just some of the problems facing our public schools is to illustrate the complexity of modern society:

Severely restricted budgets stemming from inadequate state funding--a direct outgrowth of the depressed economy and the "tax revolt" of recent years.

Declining enrollment in many districts due to demographic changes and transfers to private schools.

Declining caliber of new teachers.

Low pay and poor working conditions.

Student boredom and the drug culture.

Leisure Villagers will be delighted to learn that they will have an opportunity to discuss the future of the public school system with a panel of education experts invited by the Current Issues Forum for an appearance in the AR on Friday, September 30, at 7:30PM (See the Forum Calendar for details.)

And remember: Elementary school was once called grammar school.

At the Board meeting of Sept. 6, 1983, a resolution was unanimously passed, without discussion, regarding all recognized clubs in the Village. Most of us belong to one club or another, some to two or three. The new rules as read at the Board meeting contain among other things:

- 1. Clubs must carry no cash on hand.
- 2. All bills must be paid by
- 3. All books must be audited by a delegate of the Board.
- 4. Future activities, fund raising, etc., must be scheduled for the coming year.
 - 5. And some others.

Noncompliance voids use of facilities.

This ruling had not been presented to the Villagers at any previous monthly meeting so far as I know. As it was obvious that this change in rules was going to pass, before the vote was taken, I asked the chairman if it would be possible to address the chair. I was refused. I did speak at the end of the meeting, after the vote was taken.

In most changes of this kind, the Board has a "Reading," letting the Association members know that the Board intends to vote on the matter at the next Association meeting. Not this time, however. After some eight years of club activities, boom, the rules are changed before the Association, (you and I, club members), can have any input as to the changes.

I think this is "shooting from the hip," ill-advised and, in this case, stepping in where it is largely none of the Board's business! The rule should be discussed and then reversed.


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SWING DISCO JAZZ


mixed doubles, Kay Bell and Lee Gardens were the successful players.







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Profile: Hardworking And Happy, Fred And Gertie Dorward

Fred and Gertie Dorward, V.1, are friends and neighbors of everyone they meet. They are two of the hardest-working people in the Village because they have chosen one of the hardest volunteer jobs available. There's no glamour involved.

Gertie, supported 100% by Fred, has served for 4 years as organizer of the Women's Club Trading Post. This involves endless telephone calls, gasoline, pickups of contributions, and the physical moving of large quantities of sales merchandise out of and back to

storage for every club meeting. Gertie also has a hard-working committee composed of Betty Keeler, Helen Thomsen, Kay LaPrell, and Doris LaPrell (and their husbands get pulled in, too) who are right with her. They can sell anything.

For the benefit of the few who might not know, Trading Post is a large indoor garage sale held before each Women's Club meeting. All items are contributed and may vary widely from a dozen hand-crocheted antimacassars, to a bird-cage, or a ravioli-maker. Right now their stock contains a knitting machine and a rollaway bed. Prices are low with most from \$.15 to \$1.00 with larger items a few dollars more.


People who browse at the Trading Post often laugh at the display of goods but the monthly sale is the second-highest revenue producing resource of Women's Club (next to the Bazaar itself), and last year brought in \$2,800. There are no expenses.

Gertie says that it is re-

warding to watch the expressions on the faces of the buyers when they realize what a terrific bargain they are getting. She also says that sometimes a sold article returns as a donation in a few months.

Gertie has a hand in all the club's charity work because of her interest and energy. Just recently she organized the redecoration of the Intake Room of the Children's Ward of Camarillo State Hospital. This is the room where newcomers must wait (often several hours), children, parents, and guardians together and it was a gloomy run-down room until Women's Club took hold. President Dorothy Barrus asked Village artists Helen Gold and Edith Ward to paint bright murals on the walls and in the nearby corridor and Gertie was given a budget of \$300 (contributed anonymously), to buy paint, a couch, chairs, a table, lamp, and bookcase. She did this by careful shopping for used items. The bookcase was new and unpainted but Max Smith,

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
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V.7, finished it to match. Gertie also provided toys, magazines, and books. Florence Caulkins furnished some charming macrame wall-hangings and a very attractive room resulted. Total cost was \$207.76. The remainder has been given to Woodlands Boy Scout Troop 126 who volunteered to paint shabby areas of C.S.H. and clean up grounds and gardens as an Eagle Scout project.

In addition Gertie organized a used clothing drive for the Hospital patients and a food drive for needy Camarillo citizens during the holidays. Fred was in to everything every step of the way. Last year when Women's Club was trying to buy solar heating for the whirlpool at the Rec. Center, Fred took several trips out of town to examine and compare existing systems.

Who are these hard-working and happy people? Gertie is from Pennsylvania and Fred is from Nebraska. They met in California. Gertie was working in a Savings and Loan with Betty Walker, V.25, and it was through the Walkers that the Dorwards met: Fred was just out of the Merchant Marine which had afforded him two trips around the world and a lifelong wish to travel.


The Dorwards have been married 35 years. Fred had a career in selling pneumatic tools and appliances. 

At the September Homeowners meeting, Herb Schwartz, Chairman of the Educ. & Rec. Comm., reported on the status of the Oxnard Community College classes within the village. On Aug. 11th at the Committee's regular meeting, Susan Norris, Director of Educ. & Rec., informed the Committee that all classes in the village had been cancelled. Joe Gaynes, one of the newlyelected Representatives to the Senior Assembly Legislature, was at the meeting. The following day, Friday the 12th, Joe met with "the Brass" at the College which resulted in a meeting of the community-atlarge held in L.V. the following Tuesday. Those in attendance included, among others, the President of Oxnard College, a member of the Board of Trustees of the Ventura County Community Colleges, a representative from Assemblyman

McClintock's office, Dallas Sidlo, present Assemblywoman to the Senior Legislature; Tony Lamb, Dr. Strohbehn, Susan Norris, Herb Schwartz, and Bill Himstreet, Community Relations Comm., represented Leisure Village.

Political, financial and educational problems faced by the District were discussed, particularly the drastic cuts which have been made in the budget. Gaynes, long an advocate of the community college system, has consistently stressed the importance of college classes to older citizens so that they might continue to be intellectually stimulated, and who might find it a hardship to attend classes on campus. But, as a former teacher, Gaynes also is deeply concerned about the effect on young students when over 300 off-campus classes are cut, particularly when many young people are working part-time and trying to continue their education.

Two days later a minimum number of classes at L.V. had been reinstated. Additional fees, however, were imposed in addition to the former \$7.50 health fee charged in the past. But school is again in session in the Village.

for LV newcomers was evident as warmth of cooperation became surfaced in shows, singalongs, rallies, etc.





At home, Sam Atkinson of Pt. Mugu will be guest caller on Sept. 27 and Dick Hodnefield of Chatsworth will host on Oct.



On October 19, same time and place, Al Elson will direct members and guests in taking portraits with models and lights, following the methods he explained and showed by example at our last meeting.




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
