Recycled Water Plan Studied for L.V. Golf Course, Landscaping

Camrosa Water District Facility Tour By Herman Waltzer

In order to conserve water, the L.V. Board of Directors is studying the possibility of using non-potable water to irrigate the golf course and other landscape areas. Responding to an invitation by Camrosa Water District, several Village residents (including this writer) and LV Staff members were taken on a tour by Richard Hajas, General Manager.


We were first shown the laboratory where routine samples from wells supplying the District are analyzed chemically and bacterially. All test results are compared with standards mandated by regulatory agencies. This laboratory is certified by the State Health Dept. In order to qualify for certification, a water analysis laboratory must meet stringent State imposed criteria regarding personnel and equipment.

We were next taken to a representative well and were shown the safeguards and computerized controls.

The last phase of the tour involved the water reclamation facility which was completed in April 1997, and located south of the Highway 101 bridge over Conejo Creek, not far from the Camarillo Springs Golf Course. In this plant waste water, including sewage, is treated by an activated sludge process. This process has been used for many years in large municipalities. The plant is highly automated, computerized

Problems & Solutions In Leisure Village

Lately, we have been noticing an increase in complaints and even anger about problems in Leisure Village. At the same time, there is a decrease in attendance and attention to Board meetings. These are connected, i.e. the concern about problems may be causing loss of attendance, but the poor turn-out may also be causing loss of solutions.

Certainly there are problems in Leisure Village as it grows older. Landscaping, services, security, maintenance all need change, repair or even replacement. But as we ourselves know as we also grow older, improvements can be slow, difficult, expensive, and not always

entirely possible.

Complaining without really being informed about the situation, won't change anything -- except maybe our blood pressure! The first step is to understand the problem: then become informed about what can be done. what is actually being done, what is intended to be done, what results can be expected, what the cost will be, and, finally, what each one of us can do about it. The way to do that is by watching, attending, participating in Board Meetings,

If we do not understand what is really happening, or not happening, in our Leisure Village community, then we really cannot make constructive suggestions, criticisms or even complaints; and we certainly cannot know what we can do. It would be like expecting to be cured of a disease without knowing the diagnosis or without

taking the prescribed medication!

Leisure Village represents our community, our homes. our retirement lives; let us be informed so we can become involved; let us become part of the solution, not just complain about the problem.

Auto injury to another person can happen here in the Village. The chances of trouble increase as the area driven widens to include market, doctor's appointments, shopping. Often drivers do not realize how risky or impaired their driving has become until an accident occurs. A car can do a great amount of damage when it hits a human body.

Each senior should realistically assess his own individual skill. Ask relatives or friends for their observations about your driving skills. Really think about this.

The community realizes the limitations of seniors and provides regular bus service and Dial A Ride to the door. Sell that car and get a 3-wheel scooter or golf cart. These vehicles can take you all around the Village, and even up to Santa Rosa Plaza for shopping.

Assess your limitations and take action to change your mode of transportation before a serious accident hap-

pens.



The projection TV system offers several distinct advantages according to subcommittee member Jerry Banchik. "The cost, approximately \$7,000 for both projector and screen, is little compared to other possibilities. Moreover," he added, "the system would be fully compatible with existing Village video equipment.

A spokesman for Channel 12 favored this approach, indicating that Channel 12, would be willing to furnish video cameras and operators to any clubs wishing to employ the large screen system. "I can," says Banchik, "envision this system being used to very good advantage."

Committee recommendations will be submitted to the Board of Directors.

WATER.....from pg 1 and is continuously monitored. It is supervised by the plant superintendent who holds a Class 4 Treatment Plant Operator's license (Class 5 is the highest license grade). The main plant control system along with a small laboratory is housed in the on-site operations building.

The proposed wastewater plant (which could serve L.V.) will be much less complicated as the incoming water will be from Conejo Creek in which no industrial or domestic waste discharge is allowed. The proposed treatment plant will also be completely automated. According to the General Manager, no additional employees will be

needed. This water will be used exclusively for landscaping and agriculture. L.V. has the option of tying into the system before the reclaimed water is bought by other entities. A saving of many dollars is foreseen in the plan.

In the opinion of this writer, based on observations and explanations by district personnel, the overall facility appears well managed and maintained.
