
Leadership, for a change.



# Why does our district need a change?

Because incumbent Teague provides no leadership. Because he straddles issues. Because he avoids clear, firm stands on the really tough problems—Vietnam, law and order, tax reform, equal justice, our cities, etc. Because he typifies what is wrong with Congress: too many older, submissive politicians losing their constitutional power to an unchecked executive; losing their feel for the mood of the people; losing their ability to solve our country's ugly problems. After fourteen years in Congress, incum-

bent Teague sits on only two committees. He introduces no vital legislation. He ignores high unemployment rates and the need for jobs. He ignores the need for light industry to lighten the homeowner's property tax burden. He ignores the need for greater educational facilities. He ignores air pollution in Ventura and water pollution in Santa Barbara. He ignores the plight of the farm workers, but not big agriculture. There is an urgent need for men of action in Congress. Men who will lead, who will work hard, who will speak out clearly on the vital issues of 1968. Men like Stan Sheinbaum.



## On Vietnam

The cost is staggering: 205,000 American casualties; one hundred *billion* dollars. And let there be no mistake, the war escalated because a weak Congress, including incumbent Teague,

gave away its traditional voice in foreign policy. Teague's token newsletters make vague statements, but on the floor of Congress, where it counts, he makes absolutely no statements at all.

Stan Sheinbaum, for four years a governmental consultant in Vietnam, has said since 1961 that the American people must be told the truth: military power cannot solve the political dilemma in Vietnam. Only a coalition government which includes all political forces can achieve peace in this ravaged land. The disastrous alternative is eventual war with Red China.

### On Law and Order

A man with an education, a job, a home, and a voice in his community doesn't protest or riot. Promises not kept, problems not solved create disorder. Problems like rats running rampant in parts of our cities. Incumbent Teague voted against the ratcontrol bill. Against open housing. Against the Housing and Urban Development appropriation. In other words, against the very bills needed to eliminate the causes of discontent, lawlessness and disorder.

Stan Sheinbaum, experienced in police administration, urges better



trained, better paid police to deal with crime and lawlessness. But he also believes there must be stronger leadership in Congress to attack the root causes of disorder.



#### On Taxes

Do you think taxes are too high? Ask a millionaire who doesn't pay any. Ask the Internal Revenue Service which can't touch one half the country's income—a loss of forty billion dollars every year. Somebody has to make up that loss, and that somebody is you (unless you happen to be one of the rich ones). In 14 years, incumbent Teague

has chosen to ignore this problem. Example: Teague admits the oil depletion allowance is wrong—but once again, does nothing about it.

Tax reform is desperately needed. If tax loopholes and privileges were eliminated, your taxes could be reduced by as much as one third.


