lose bone density and often only find out when we break a bone. Therefore it is most important to find out what the condition of our bones is and if necessary prevent further loss.

The test takes about seven minutes; is painless, safe and accurate.

Vote On Propositions

Have you voted on the two Village propositions? The ballots were mailed to each homeowner in June and are due back by mid-September. Passing both measures will update documents by which we are governed

in the Village.

The initiative proposition is to eliminate cumulative voting. Most homeowners associations were saddled with the voting method by their developers, who drafted the documents to control election of the Board of Directors. Normally when the developer turns the project over to the homeowners, the cumulative voting practice is eliminated.

Rather than the "one person, one vote" systems used by all city, county, state and national ballots, cumulative voting permits "stacking" of votes, manipulation and control. It is a dinosaur left over from earlier days.

The widely used "one person, one vote" system is the more democratic and fair way to vote. ILV suggests we eliminate this dinosaur by voting "yes" to delete cumulative voting from the LV Bylaws.

The second proposition is designed to reduce the number of homeowners votes required to change the CC&Rs from a 75% positive vote to a 67% positive vote. Getting a 75% positive vote can be difficult, if not mindful of the right of the impossible, to make changes in the CC&Rs. Voter apathy frequently results in the lack of a quorum being attained and no business can be transacted at all.

The Board of Directors drafted this change and so-

licits your support.

Replacement ballots are available at the Administration office, West gate, in case you have misplaced yours. Ballots may be deposited in the boxes in either the Administration office or the Recreation lobby.

These measures need your support and ILV suggests a "yes" vote on both propositions. Vote "yes" to delete cumulative voting. Vote "yes" to reduce the vote required to change the CC&Rs to 67%. Please vote today.

Volunteers Needed

Much of the work of the Village is done by volunteer residents who serve on committees. These committees are reorganizing over the summer and their rosters will be announced about September 1.

The adage "You get out of it what you put into it" certainly holds true in Leisure Village. Homeowners who pledge several hours a month to promote Village activities through Committee participation help us all.

The list of the dozen committees who act as consultants to the LVA Board is printed in the Village Voice and are listed on the Channel 12 calendar. Please pick a committee which interests you and attend the August meeting. Then ask for a volunteer form and sign up to help. All committees need new blood.

Homeowners who lend their expertise to the Village as a volunteer for a few hours a month help control costs and lower our monthly assessment fee. After all, "You get out of it what you put into it."

A Secret Ballot?

Do you count amongst your cherished memories the first time you voted when you reached the ripe old age of 21? There are a number of reasons why I remember it which I won't go Into now, except for one. At that time I was taking a course in Constitutional Law. Our professor put great emphasis on the fact that the framers of our Constitution were very citizens to be guaranteed certain freedoms. One of these precious freedoms was the right to privacy of each and every individual, which included the privilege, when voting, of using the Secret Ballot.

This brings me to the present issue of our two ballots regarding 1)The changing of the percentages required to change the CC&Rs, & 2) The issue of Cumulative Voting. Question: What happened to our right to cast a secret

we're voting for a candidate or deciding an issue, that freedom is being ignored and violated by requiring the villagers to include their names and home addresses. For over 50 years, I've cherished guarantee privacy..."legal" is not the issue. We're talking constitutional tradition. My main concern is that if this practice continues, there will be more and homeowners abstaining from voting at LVA elections, because of our inherent belief in the principle of privacy at the ballot box at ALL elections.




address(es). I then had to reconstruct the earnings record. Employer(s) were devastated to learn they had to pay Internal Revenue taxes for several years back, PLUS interest, PLUS penalty.

The employer(s) had paid cash to the employee and had not reported those earnings to the Soc. Sec. Adm. or even on Form 1099 to the Int. Rev. Service for income taxes that should have been withheld or reported by the employee. That was trouble for every one concerned.

Many workers will say they are self-employed AND may be. But, it would be wise for anyone in LV who has any doubts or questions to clarify the employment status of anyone working in your home. The ESC constantly works to establish a relationship among residents which we call the Buddy System. It is highly desirable that Leisure Village residents plan for a time when help will be needed. Considering our age group with its incidence of falls and other home accidents, strokes, heart attacks and similar misfortunes it is certain that most of us will need a hand sooner or later. Should an evacuabe necessary, non-drivers would be at risk.

Many arrangements exist now. They may help in developing a model for each of us. Agreements may be quite involved or as simple as letting each other know when one will be away for a day or so.

Following is a list of arrangements:

· Transportation for nondrivers, temporarily indisposed persons, travelers and just car-pooling.
• Visits, shared sports, din-

ner out, theater trips.

 Telephone contact with other party's children, friends, medical, etc.

 Daily phone call or other OK signal.

 Copy of itinerary to neighbor(s) when travel-

 Exchange of house keys, vital phone lists and medication regimes.

 Visual signals, such as window shade placement

Other, more sophisticated systems are being considered. Among these are electronically or mechanically activated items which must be physically returned to "off" status. This group may include a low-cost substitute now being used by some LV residents in lieu of the "Lifeline" system .

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Profile -**DOROTHY WEISS Pianist** Par Excellence

Leisure Village has, over the years, been blessed with a number of talented residents. One of its brightest stars is "worldclass" pianist, Dorothy Weiss. This remarkable lady is "low key" only in her diminutive size and demeanor, but a virtual power house as a musician.

Dorothy was born in Chicago where she lived with her parents, a sister and a brother, attended Bryant Elementary School and Harrison High School, received her Bachelor's degree from De Paul University with a major in music and a minor in

psychology. She and Sidney Weiss met in their teens, married in 1934, moved to California in 1952 where they lived in Hollywood, Los Angeles and Tarzana. Sid became seriously ill and knowing that death was imminent and wishing to make certain that Dorothy would continue to live comfortably and securely, he decided in 1986 that they move to Leisure Village where his brother, Irv Weiss and wife Ruth, and Dorothy's sister-in-law, Vivian Bloom, were residents. Sid died soon after their arrival in LV.

Dorothy's career as a musician took four distinct but related directions: first as a protégé-performer then as an accomplished accompanist, later as a teacher, and finally, although not a singer, became a much sought after and respected vocal coach.

It all started when her mother who was studying piano heard Dorothy playing by ear a piece mother had been practicing. This gifted child began lessons at age 5, and gave her first recital at age 7. Among her memorabilia are newspaper clippings her father

had saved reflecting her very early recital appearances. Between ages 7 and 14 she received enthusiastic reviews as "one of the most unusual talents heard of late. She has remarkable hands, temperament and everything which will go to make her a real genius."

At 14 she entered a competition and won a scholarship with the eminent teacher, Rudolph Ganz, and at age 16 she appeared as soloist with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. In Ganz's master classes, the young pia-nist was privileged to study with and to be in the presence of such illustrious art-Horowitz, ists as Rachmaninoff, Rubinstein, and many famous opera stars and distinguished conductors.

Her career as accompanist began when she was a student at De Paul where she became the official accompanist of her class. With this training and experience, she be-

came a concert accompanist to many world-famous instrumentalists and opera stars, touring several seasons as accompanist for the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo.

It was after obtaining her university degree that she realized she enjoyed teaching and coaching, and that she was "irrevocably addicted to music emotionally and intellectually." Testimonials over the years from her students reflect the consensus that she was "a small miracle

who brought understanding of the expressiveness of the piano, who taught them to touch people with their playing," and that they are forever grateful to their Master teacher. Her teaching method has been characterized as "one that brings life, zest, and meaning to the performer while communicating these feelings and emotions to the listener," and she has imbued her students with the notion that music has to be practiced for intellectual response as well as for

emotional reaction.

Dorothy's LV admirers describe her as "knowledgeable, analytical and patient - an outstanding musicologist." Members of the LV Chorale have lauded her and expressed their deep appreciation for her assistance not only as accompanist and coach during rehearsals, but for helping to make their performances so outstanding, commenting that "with Dorothy at the piano, who needs an orchestra?" She has appeared on numerous occasions on LV Women's Club programs, and most recently stepped in at a moment's notice as accompanist to a guest saxophone-clarinetist.

A conversation with Dorothy reveals that her intellect is as sharp and well-defined as her craft. that she is an intuitive, warm, caring and concerned individual, eager and willing to acknowledge the achievements of others and to encourage their efforts. She is con-See Weiss Profile.....pg. 9

Her home in V. 20 is breathtakingly beautiful reflecting her artistry, her temperament and impeccable good taste. There is no mistaking the fact that it is not only the home of a musician, but that it was also the home of her late husband. Sid, a musician who had played with Harry James Orchestra, who had been an attorney and a businessman and who had devoted his retirement years to artistic expression. Much of his sculpture, statuary and paintings are prominently displayed in Dorothy's home.







Because water provides natural resistance to body movements, you can strengthen complementary muscle groups more readily in the pool than on land. For example, when you do arm curls in a weight room. strengthen your biceps as you lift the weight against the force of gravity, but when you lower the weight, you hardly work your muscles at all because gravity gives you an assist. In contrast, when you do an arm curl in water, you

have resistance in both directions so you strengthen the biceps muscles on the way up and the triceps muscles on the way down.

You don't need special equipment to intensify your workout. Cup your hands to pull the water with more force, or slice your fingers through the water for less resistance.

Besides being great exercise for almost every body type, there is also evidence that aquatic exercise can ward off the deterioration of bone mass that leads to osteoporosis.

Non-swimmers can take aquatic exercise classes in shallow water (waist deep). In these classes you keep your head above the water at all times.

The common belief that swimming burns less fat and fewer calories than other exercises confuses water aerobic activities with traditional swimming.

"Swimming is performed horizontally and is meant to be done in a streamlined manner. The idea isn't to work specific muscle groups but to get through the water smoothly." One hour of aquatic aerobics burns 400 to 700 calories-about the same amount that is expended in land-based aerobics.

Even if you are exercising in shallow water and keeping your feet on the pool's floor, you should observe several safety precautions: Don't go into a pool alone; if you exercise after dark, make sure the pool is well lit; even if you are in great shape, begin your aquatic exercise program slowly and master the correct techniques.





AMATEUR **RADIO** CLUB

Should a disaster occur in L.V. and phone service is knocked out, the Amateur Radio Club will attempt to set up radio communications both locally and with other states. The primary purpose of the radio messages would be to signal for help and to let authorities know any damage assessment.

As in all disasters, the Radio Club would subsequently set up communications to provide health and welfare information for villagers, both out-bound and in-bound.

Residents can help themselves by preparing relatives or other contacts throughout the country with information. Find a local "Ham" and keep in contact with him/her, with news and special events.

The best way to find a "Ham" is to inquire around the neighborhood or look in the yellow pages under Amateur Radio Club. Amateur Radio Operators (Hams) are generally friendly and congenial and

are very willing to help in a disaster. When your out-of-town relatives have found a local Ham, let L.V.A.R.C. know his call sign and preferred frequency and the club will try to make contact.

The local Amateur Radio Club (KE6SWL) is always alert to opportunities to contact relatives of L.V. residents around the country. Let them know that they are here for your communications needs, not only in an emergency, but every

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
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Profile: Howard Estabrook Villagers Active With

The American Heart Association has named a new grant: "Camarillo Leisure Village Research Grant." This honor is the result of the dedication of Howard Estabrook of V.4. as well as the contributions of villagers. Howard has been actively raising funds for the A.H.A. for 14 years. This year he has raised \$2,559 which is \$59 over his goal.

Knowing the constant support that the A.H.A. has given the Village has given Howard the strength to continue his volunteering. even through difficult personal times. He is a delightful, modest man, who preferred to talk about the accomplishments of his beloved wife, Mabel who passed away in 1985.

He arrived in Long Beach. California at the age of 2, when his family moved there from Washington State. There he attended Long Beach Poly High and Long Beach State University for 2 years, where he studied accountancy.

The Estabrooks raised a family of 5 children: 1 daughter and 4 sons. The children are scattered throughout the U.S., the closest living in Santa Barbara.

During his life Howard worked for the U.S. Treasury Department, at times was self-employed. In 1952 he obtained employment as account special-

Always interested in health, the Estabrooks were active on the committee that worked to establish Pleasant Valley Hospital. In addition both were active volunteers at the A.H.A. A prized possession is a beautiful, large silver tray, given to Howard at the time of his retirement in 1976, after 24 years of service at the Camarillo State Hospital.

E. S. O. RADIO BULLETIN By Ken Wilson

Your Emergency Services Organization needs your help in closing a dangerous communications gap. Of course we hope that there will never be a life-threatening emergency in Leisure Village, but we are continually reminded that we live in earthquake country.

Should a major quake strike our area we would quite certainly be faced with incidents requiring swift action to save lives and property. We must operate on the premise that any delay in informing our special teams may cost someone their life or property. Reliable radio communication is the only method within our knowledge that can provide the necessary speed.

Our Disaster Preparedness Exercises (the DPXwhite flag routine) have strongly indicated the need for a relatively new type of 2-way radio to replace the C-B Radio system on which we had been depending. The new type is designated **GMSR** for General Mobile Service Radio.

It is needed because too often we cannot transmit on C-B because atmospheric conditions and illegally powerful transmitters interfere. It requires no repeater station. Operators need not be

tion is needed in its operation. It will be used for very short distance calls only to a relay station in each of four sectors into which Leisure Village is divided by our planning. The GMSR system is successfully operating in at least one small community similar to Leisure Village.

Each GMRS radio will cost about 200 dollars, relatively inexpensive in comparison to the 500 dollar units used by our gardeners. However the aggregate of 50 units which are needed for our task represents nearly ten thousand dollars...a strain on anyone's budget. It is our wish to achieve our goal through donations from individuals and organizations within Leisure Village rather than from the LV budget.

Your ESC Committee feels that this is not unattainable, since it means only a little over 200 dollars per village or an average of less than four dollars per residence. This article is an invitation to all residents to help as much as they choose by making a small contribution to this project.

Please contact a member of the ESC or a Village Coordinator or assistant and give them a pledge of a few dollars. We will collect no money until it is determined that funds are

available for the entire initial purchase, to avoid problems of returning money in case the project runs into unforeseen problems.

It is planned that all of the sets become property of Leisure Village. Each Village Coordinator is to be issued a radio unit. Leisure Village staff (probably within the LV Patrol Unit) will maintain records of individuals having such assignments. In the event of any such individual preparing to leave the Village the staff person in charge would follow an established procedure and pick up the unit for re-assignment. Refinements to this plan will develop as we progress.

Since use of the units will probably not exceed one hour every three months in a DPX plus another half hour per month in "just radio" practices, it is expected that maintenance will consist only of battery re-charging and, in due course, new batteries. Thus, Leisure village will incur very little cost for maintenance during a radio lifetime which should exceed five years.

At this time, several individuals and more than one organization have promised their support. We appeal to each resident to do likewise, keeping in mind that it is your life and your property that may be at risk. **ILV Services 'n Stuff**

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


