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THE LEGISLATIVE RECORD

The 1963 California legislative session, which proved to be the longest in history, opened on a high note of anticipation in January when Governor Edmund G. Brown presented his laudable program and ended with a mixed and perhaps disappointing note. Its record of accomplishment, although falling short of the desired goal and suffering by comparison with the 1959 Democratic legislature, was still far superior to the remembered periods of inaction and frustration which marked the Republican dominated sessions of the past. By sifting through its achievements and failures a number of positive areas of progress can be cited.

Topping this list, of course, is the Rumford Fair Housing Act which passed the Assembly comfortably when it was eventually brought to the floor, but produced perhaps the bitterest relationships the Senate has ever experienced when it was enacted there at the eleventh hour through the personal leadership of Senator Ed Regan. Health and welfare also received favorable treatment with the passage of AB59, the so-called "social welfare package" carried so successfully by Assemblyman Philip Burton. Also passed was an increase in state contributions to local mental health programs under the Short-Doyle Act. Educational legislation provided a pilot youth conservation project for drop-outs, a special program for culturally disadvantaged youths, and Senator Rodda's bill providing counsel to local districts to assist in combatting de facto school segregation. The labor platform saw an important measure enacted, directing the newly created Commission on Automation and Technological Developments to "foster and promote full employment and increased productivity" and to study procedures for retraining the worker displaced by technological change. In the area of natural resources, positive measures taken included the creation of a master plan for scenic highways and provision for placing a \$150 million bond issue for the purchase of beach and park land on the 1964

primary ballot.

It must be said, moreover, that very few backward steps were taken (the most notable was AB2922). The return of cross-filing was voted down in the Senate, although only by one vote. No new loyalty oaths or other anti-civil libertarian bills were passed.

On the negative side lies a great body of proposed legislation killed on the floor or stifled by inaction in committee. The county-wide equalization formula for educational funds was defeated and although some additional monies were appropriated for education, the amount was inadequate. Payroll-withholding on State income taxes, vigorously sought by the Governor, failed. Billboard control measures were defeated, as were efforts to reduce from 66-2/3% to 60% the number of affirmative votes needed for passage of locally-sponsored bond issues. The Z'berg Housing and Community Development Act was voted down, a victim of savings and loan and real estate lobbies. The "truth in leading" bills, requiring simple and easily understood statements of interest charges, were interred in committee. Measures proposing a moratorium on capital punishment and a change of definition of legal insanity went down in defeat. On election reform, not only were the purity of elections proposals voted down, but the infamous AB2922 (a bill requiring labelling on campaign literature by volunteer political organizations) was passed, carried through as a personal power play against CDC by Speaker Jesse Unruh. Preoccupation with this bill bogged down other legislation for ten days and undoubtedly affected overall productivity of the session. Culmination of the contest came with the use of Governor Brown's signature on the bill as a ransom for the salvaging of a major segment of his program which at the time had not yet come up for consideration.

In the following charts, the bills and floor votes were selected for tabulation with an aim to differentiate the viewpoints of the various legislators on issues that concern CDC. For this reason, some important

bills are not represented where the vote approached unanimity, divided strictly along party lines, or were killed in committee and votes were therefore not officially recorded.

It should be borne in mind that a floor vote is but one facet of the total legislative process. A legislative session is a complex operation and a vote may be affected by broader consideration than appears on the surface. While every attempt was made to present a true picture, caution is urged against too rigid interpretation of the tabulation. Using it as the sole or ultimate measure of a legislator's worth could lead to serious misjudgment.
