Many Leisure Villagers were among those honored recently by the Ventura County Health Care Agency Public Health Services at its Eighth Annual Awards ceremony, for their participation in the countywide High Blood Pressure Education Pro-

Featured speaker at the Center was Daniel S. The main skill being Clark, M.D., a cardiologist, who spoke on the great strides that have been made in the medical field since 1959 when heart disease, heart failure and stroke, was the number-one killer. It is estimated that 60 million people in the United States suffer from hypertension; 37 million elevatblood pressure (160/95); and 23 million borderline, (140/90). (The numerical guidelines vary

slightly in the over-50 age group.) Fortunately, 50% of these are now adequately controlled, but 30to 50% do not even know that they have the disease, since there are usually no symptoms hence the designation, "the Silent Killer." Clark praised the county program, stating that most doctors appreciate the screening because their patients often exhibit exaggerated pressures in the office because of nervousness. The patient's condition can be better evaluated when readings are taken under more normal circumstances.

COMMUNICATION IS A TWO-WAY STREET

After Leisure village began to grow rapidly, it became increasingly difficult for villagers to know what was going on. Rumors often ran rampant and homeowners were at a loss to know what was true or

ILV was early in the crusade for more open communication. Each successive Board of Directors has attempted, in increasing degrees, to inform the Village as to what was happening, or about to happen, and why. Yet, we hear complaints from many sides such as "why don't they do this?" or "why aren't they doing something" about such and such,etc.

In many cases, something has been done, and the reason has been explained. Why haven't we heard? Perhaps we haven't listened.

Do we really read the official announcements in the "Village Voice"? Do we read ILV beyond the accounts of our own pet clubs? Do we ever watch Channel 12? How often do we sit in on Committee meetings?

At the February meeting of the Homeowners Association, the A.R. was less than half-full. Were you there? If you had been, you would have heard excellent reports from Committee Chairmen. At the meeting, you also would have had the privilege of hearing former Mayor and present City Councilman and homeowner, Bill Esty, make a highly informative report on matters that affect not only our City, but also

Among many things, Esty told us that the traffic light at Woodcreek and Santa Rosa Road will probably be installed by March 1; that the freeway interchange at Santa Rosa will probably not be completed until 1987; that while the condition of the Conejo Creek has been improved, there are still monumental problems to be solved; and the future status of Camarillo Airport operation may hinge on who will next be in office.

Doesn't it behoove us to pay attention to all sources of information at hand? Should we not remember that although we are concerned about our own Village, we are also part of the City of Camarillo? One way we can accomplish this is to read the Daily News. Do you subscribe? No, it's not the New York Times. We wouldn't want it to be. It is the CAMARILLO DAILY NEWS, and we feel that villagers should have a special loyalty to it. Why?

The Camarillo Daily News is responsible for IN-SIDE LEISURE VILLAGE at no cost to the Association, or to any villager. The News Staff procures the commercial ads which determine our space; it prints and distributes the paper once a month to every home in the Village. (In a recent brief experiment in having the News print the Village Voice, the cost to homeowners was over \$300 a month.)

The Daily News grants a special rate to villagers, just \$10.20 for a three-month subscription. As if this were not enough, ILV receives a one-time payment

SECURITY FIRST

By Romaine Lambert We are indebted to our Security and Safetee Committee, under the chairmanship of Tom O'Brien, for some telling statistics for 1984. There were, for instance: 286 medical emergencies, and 193 non-medical emergencies. (Assistance Life Line and Assistance to Residents - often getting someone into bed are categorized as nonmedical emergencies).

At this point, a RE-MINDER may be in order: DO NOT CALL THE EMERGENCY NUMBER, EXCEPT FOR LIFE-THREATENING SITUA-TIONS. You will still get an immediate response from Security by calling the main gate. Another CAUTION! The largest number of calls on medical emergencies were for slipping and falling. We all know that as we get older, we have to be doubly careful, even in our own homes.

Lock-outs, water problems and complaints accounted for more than 200 (calls) each. Although fewer in number, the AUTO seems to have been the culprit in several instances - eight of them hit mailboxes; two hit the east gate; and one, the west gate; one hit a bike; four hit houses; and ten made the competition a little fairer — by attacking their own kind.

As for citations — there were 126 warnings, and 287 written tickets. Speeding and overnight parking accounted for most of these.

Just in case Security did not have enough to do, they again started vacation checks which numbered 17,388 since June.

In analyzing these statistics, O'Brien found in part, medical emergencies averaged more than 24 per month, and non-medical, sixteen. Other re- they were just great!"

THE SENIOR LEGISLATURE

By Joe Gaynes Assemblyman, California Senior Legislature

We are in the midst of our Income Tax chores. There are very few opportunities to designate where your tax money may be spent. On our State Income Tax form under item 89, the taxpayer may contribute any amount of dollars to fund the California Senior Legislature, and to provide direct service projects such as housing, transportation, nutrition, long-term care. etc.

Monies so collected are allocated to the Senior Legislature: the first \$75,000 for conducting its annual session; the next \$250,000 for its ongoing activities. Amounts over \$325,000 are allocated for direct services throughout California for Seniors.

Members of the Legislature are active participants in their local communities. Some serve on the California Commission on Aging, others are members of advisory councils to the Area Agencies on Aging, County and City Commissions on Aging, national and State senior organizations. All have one thing in common — their involvement and concerns about senior issues in their local communities.

Therefore, indicate your support to your lawyer, accountant, or tax consultant by making a contribution under item 89 for the Senior Programs.





THE TREASURE **OF CAMARILLO**

By Jeanne Carlson Editor's Note: This is the second article in a series describing Ventura County sites of interest to residents and their visitors.

The jewel of Camarillo is the Edward Lawrence **Doheny Memorial Library** located on the grounds of St. John's Seminary. The land itself was donated for the seminary by our town's First Father, Adolfo Camarillo. The library was given to the seminary by Mrs. Estelle Doheny in honor of her husband in 1939.

To reach this beautiful place from the Village, take Adolfo to Lewis and turn right. Drive to the Las Posas intersection and turn right again, cross the tracks, proceed up the hill and through the gates. The lower slopes are covered by a working ranch which belongs to St. John's. Along the way there are numerous viewgrounds to be enjoyed. At the top are the buildings of the seminary and the library, a beautiful 2-stoside.

What will you see inside? There is something there for everyone and for all ages. The second floor houses Mrs. Dohenv's collection in three rooms central area which is where you enter is devotof glass, crystal, foil, and an extensive collection of paper-weights. This display will fascinate everyone since the colors positively glow and the intricacies of design are remarkable.

The large room on the west is decorated in the style of Louis XV and features paintings by the masters of the Barbizon School. A portrait of Archbishop Cantwell by Arthur

First editions of colored glasses made into English and American literature and other books remarkable for their artistic qualities, (such as the ones with fore-edge painting), are also kept here. A fireproof vault just off the room contains the most valuable and rare item in the whole library. This is an original Gutenberg Old Testament, one of fortyseven still in existence. Mrs. Doheny had waited twenty years to acquire this as her crowning achievement in collecting.

> The third room, the Western Room, is the setting for Mr. Dohenv's chief interest, Americana, especially that of the West. Here are hung favorite paintings by Charles Russell and Frederic Remington. A collection of two hundred Currier and Ives prints plus many books on the history of California are here. A fireplace built of petrified wood by Stanford White for the Paris Exposition of 1900 dominates the room.

The library is open to the public for conducted tours on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays from 9 to 1. You must call ahead, 482-4115, but sometimes you can be accommodated the same day.

Camarillo is indeed fortunate to possess such a treasure as the Doheny. Visit it often, whether you have guests or not. You'll notice more interesting things each time.

CURRENT ISSUES FORUM

Dr. Kathleen Cooper, 1st Vice-Pres. and Senior Economist for the Security Pacific National Bank, expects 1985 to be another good year for the U.S. economy, she told a Current Issues Forum audience on January 25.

Dr. Cooper predicted economic growth for 1985 of around three-andone-half percent (slower than 1984), and an inflation rate of about five percent, and unemployment at the six-and-one-half percent range; which she considers near full employment. BIRDS OF LEISURE VILLAGE:



THE CEDAR WAXWING

Birds are such creatures of habit that they are considered to be very predictable. Their life patterns, however, may be changed by modification of terrain or severe changes in climate such as we are experiencing this winter. Therefore, even the casual bird watcher may observe "accidentals" in Leisure Village and its vicinity. These are usually birds that appear singly, (occasionally in small groups), beyond the traditional limits of their kind. For instance, last spring I sighted a varied thrush bathing in a mud puddle with robins, his near cousins, many miles south of Monterey; which is listed as his southern limit in Roger Tory Peterson's, A Field Guide to the Western Birds." Watch for unusual birds here because of the severe weather conditions north and east of us.

Migratory birds are usually as regular in their habits as the year-round dwellers. They may travel very long distances every fall toward the south, and back again in the spring to their northern nesting grounds. These transients may stop for only one night or day, or they may stay in one place for a week or more. For the last two winters, a large flock of cedar waxwings has spent almost two weeks in Leisure Village during the middle of January. Waxwings breed from northern California to as far north as Canada, and may winter as far south as Mexico. Leisure Village is sort of an "R-and-R"

stopover for them. We set a good table, for they are especially fond of our pyracantha berries in the hedges along the wall behind Village 15, and the fence by the west gate.

This bird is not an "accidental". We are on his regular flyway. Flocks of more than a hundred came this year. They are a beautiful sight to behold. Between the size of a sparrow and a robin, but slimmer than either, a tall crest is their most distinguishing feature. Both males and female's backs are brown, their bellies a creamy yellow, with a bright yellow band at the tip of the tail. When perhaps thirty or more swoop down from above, the yellow becomes spectacularly colorful. Another group and yet another, follows to feed quickly on the brilliant berries. Then, as if by signal, they are gone to a higher and safer territory.

Birds generally have a very high metabolic rate so that they must each day, eat a prodigious amount of food; but one small bird's craw will hold only a few pyracantha berries at one time. In an hour or so, the flock is back for more and it repeats the performance many times during the


day.

But migrating birds are restless. They seem to know that there is a long way to go and that they must not be late. However, you and I know that it will be "the same time next year." We'll be watching, won't we?
