Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb. President

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb was appointed the third president of Cal State Fullerton on July 8, 1981. Her selection was the culmination of a nationwide search begun in November, 1980.

Dr. Cobb had served as dean of Douglass College at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, since 1976. There she also held the rank of professor of biological sciences. Prior to her Douglass appointment she was dean of Connecticut College and professor of

zoology for seven years. Previously, she was professor of biology at Sarah Lawrence College in New York.

Born in January, 1924, Dr. Cobb is known for her work in cell physiology, her promotion of the advancement of women in scientific fields and her activities on behalf of minorities. She is the first black woman to head a major public university on the west coast.

Cobb earned her bachelor's degree from Talladega College in Alabama and her M.S. and Ph.D. in cell physiology from New York University. She also holds 14 honorary doctorates. She is the mother of a son, Jonathan, who is a graduate of the Cornell University Medical School.



Ed Carroll, **Athletic Director**

The rapid climb of Ed Carroll through the ranks of the Cal State Fullerton athletic department culminated in his appointment as Director of Athletics on July 1, 1985, and he immediately ushered in an era of positive thinking.

"one of my priorities has been to enhance the image of our athletic program by stressing positives," says Carroll, 37. "We must use the power of positive

thinking to overcome our limitations and build our program to greater heights

Carroll has upgraded the football schedule with opponents such as LSU Florida, West Virginia and Army, the latter set for a home and home series ir 2001 and 2003. Long dormant plans for an on-campus Youth Sports Complex with a football, soccer and baseball facility have been revived with a pivotal Marriott Hotel now under construction in a former parking lot.

Carroll was a wrestler at Fullerton and was team captain and the Most Outstanding Wrestler in the California Collegiate Athletic Association championship meet in 1972. He later served as an assistant to former head coach Don Matson.

Carroll earned bachelor's degrees in history and physical education from Fullerton as well as a secondary teaching credential. He earned a master's degree in recreation administration at Long Beach State.

Ed and his wife Connie and young children Brandon and Kimberly reside in Fullerton.

MEDIA INFORMATION

PRESS CREDENTIALS: Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. When time permits, credentials will be mailed. If not, press will call is located in the main ticket booth behind third base.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only and must be worn in plain sight at all times. Access to the field is permitted with positioning regulated by the game umpires.

PRESS ROW: Is located in the top row of the central grandstands located directly behind home plate. It is an "open air" facility — cooled, heated and ventilated by Mother Nature. Seating at the working counter is limited to approximately seven persons.

TELEPHONES: The press row number is (714) 773-2400. A second line or use of telephones in the sports information office is available after games.

RADIO: Arrangements for broadcasts should be made at least one week in advance. One telephone line (modular jack) is available upon request at a fee of \$20 per game to visiting stations.

ELECTRICAL POWER: Is limited in press row. Special needs should be requested well in advance.

PARKING: Is FREE on Friday nights (after 6 p.m.) and all day on Saturday and Sunday in Lot A northwest of the field, accessible from either State College or Yorba Linda Boulevard. For other games, a fee of 75 cents (three quarters) for a daily permit is required and is enforced.

Head Coach LARRY COCHELL

A proven winner assumes the task of maintaining Cal State Fullerton's base-ball prowess as 21-year college veteran Larry Cochell replaces Augie Garrido in the Titans' dugout in 1988.

4/TITANS

Cochell, 48, brings a career record of 687-390-2 (.638) to Fullerton following a one-year term (23-20-1) at Northwestern that ended a 10-year tenure (428-172-1) at Oral Roberts University

in Tulsa, Oklahoma. He ranks No. 17 in Division I coaching victories and is a nine-time veteran of NCAA post-season play. His 1978 ORU Titans finished fifth in the College World Series.

A prominent figure on the national scene as a member of the Baseball Rules Committee and chairman of the American Baseball Coaches Association All-American selection committee, Cochell also boasts three years (1983-86) of experience as athletic director at Oral Roberts.

The Lebanon, Oregon native is a product of the Bobby Winkles era at Arizona State University (1964), but he is no stranger to the PCAA or southern California. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Utah State (master's degree in 1965) and was the head coach at Cal State L.A. from 1972 through 1976. Between those stops he was head man for three years (70-45 in 1967-69) at Emporia State in Kansas and two seasons (49-28 in 1970-71) at Creighton in Nebraska.

Cochell has sent more than 60 players into professional baseball including 24 in his five-year tenure at Cal State L.A. He has coached six first-round draft picks.

Cochell and his wife, Fran, have two sons, Craig (16) and Chad (12) and live in Placentia.

DENNIS ROGERS

Dennis Rogers brings a versatile and highly successful background in both professional and collegiate baseball to the Titan coaching staff in 1988.


Rogers, 36, worked the past two years for the Pittsburgh Pirates as minor league field coordinator. From 1982 through 1984 he was with the Oakland A's and for two seasons as a manager had the best record in professional baseball. His Medford, Oregon teams posted back-to-back seasons of 54-17 and 55-17. In 1983, he was selected Minor League Manager of the Year and was promoted to a coaching position at the Triple A level at Tacoma in 1984.

A graduate of Cal Poly Pomona (1976), Rogers served four seasons at

his alma mater under the venerable John Scolinos. He played an intergral role in the 1980 and 1983 national championship (Div. II) seasons.

Rogers was an infielder-outfielder for one and a half seasons in the San Francisco organization before an injury ended his playing career. His coaching career included stops at San Gorgonio High School (1977 CIF 4A championship) and San Bernardino Valley College (1978-79). He also has worked in player representation.

Currently a Lake Arrowhead resident, Rogers will be relocating his wife Connie, son John, 7, and infant daughter Brittany closer to the Titan campus.



DICK LARNER

Dick Larner brings a vast baseball and business background to a full-time coaching position with the Cal State Fullerton program again in 1988. He had served in an advisory role in 1986.

Larner, 63, "retired" in 1985 after 33 years with Standard Oil of California. He served in a variety of management roles, most recently as marketing division manager of the southwest division.

Larner played baseball and basketball with great distinction at the University of California after serving in the South Pacific for the United States Marine Corps during World War II. He was a member of Cal's 1947 national championship baseball team and also on the Bears' basketball team, which reached the Final Four in 1946, where they lost to eventual national champion Oklahoma State.

Larner is the answer to a significant trivia question. He was the winning pitcher in the first College World Series game ever played, winning the 1947 opener at Kalamazoo, Michigan. The series was moved permanently to Omaha, Nebraska in 1949. Among the hitters he retired was Yale first baseman George Bush, who went on to become Vice President of the United States.

After progressing as high as the Triple-A Pacific Coast League with the San Francisco Seals in a four-year professional career, Larner returned to coaching, a career he had begun at St. Mary's High School in Berkeley while he still was attending Cal.

Larner and his wife Kay live in Yorba Linda. They have two children.



RICK VANDERHOOK

Rick Vanderhook assumes full-time coaching duties as he begins his fourth year as an assistant for the Titans. After serving as a bullpen coach and working with the pitchers and catchers in 1985 and 1986, he stepped into the third-base coaching box in 1987 and worked with the hitters and defense.

Vanderhook, 26, has coached for Fairbanks in Alaska and the Goldpanners finished third in the nation in 1986.

Vanderhook came to Fullerton in 1983 after completing his playing career at Cerritos College. He was team captain for the Falcons in 1982 when he batted .350.

Vanderhook prepped at Lakewood High School under coach John Herbold, now the head coach at Cal State Los Angeles. He was team captain as a senior when he batted .320 with two home runs and 19 runs batted in. He struck out only once in 80 plate appearances while playing first base and catching.

Vanderhook is single and lives in Lakewood.

1988 SEASON PREVIEW_

Larry Cochell will author a new era of Cal State Fullerton baseball in 1988 and the veteran collegiate coach expects the success of the Titans' program to continue without interruption.

"We have a good nucleus of returning players and have a chance to be very good in 1988," says the successor to Augie Garrido, who has moved to the University of Illinois after a 15-year career at Fullerton.

"We have some people who will have to step forward. We lost 21 wins in Mike Harkey and Larry Casian, so the pitchers in particular will have to emerge. We should have a good offensive club with pretty good power. And with what I think is as good a double-play combination as there is in college baseball, we should be solid defensively."

The Titans' strengths begin in the middle of the diamond with a pair of internationally tested pitchers and two All-Pacific Coast Athletic Association middle infielders.

Senior righthander Longo Garcia is the top winner among returning Titan pitchers. He was 10-5 in 1987 with a 3.88 earned run average. He completed eight of 19 starts and logged a save in each of two relief appearances. During the summer he was a member of the United States' silver-medal winning team in the Pan American Games.

Sophomore righthander Mark Beck is a Collegiate Baseball pre-season All-American after a 6-3 freshman campaign and a berth on the USA roster for the Intercontinental Cup Tournament in October. Beck was 2-2 and led the staff with 21 strikeouts in 22.1 innings as the U.S. placed second to host Cuba. In 1987 for the Titans he had the best strikeout ratio (81 SO in 78 IP) on a staff that included the PCAA Player of the Year in Casian (11-1, 118 SO in 120.2 IP) and Harkey (10-2, 101 SO in 125.2 IP), the fourth player selected in the June professional draft.

Senior second baseman Mike Ross was a first-team All-PCAA choice in 1987 despite a slow start due to a January knee injury. An outstanding glove man, Ross led the club with 12 home runs and had 43 runs batted in while hitting .260 overall, .298 in PCAA play.

Junior shortstop Mark Razook was a second-team All-PCAA pick after batting .282 with seven home runs and 38 RBI. The two-year letterman made only 14 errors (.942).

The balance of the pitching staff features a mixture of lightly used lettermen, junior college transfers and a trio of promising freshmen.

Junior righthander Paul Johnson is a two-year letterman with only 39 innings of experience. He was 4-2 last year with a 3.77 ERA, working all 28.2 innings in relief. Sophomore lefthander Rick Faulks was 0-1 in four appearances with a 4.60 ERA in 15.2 innings. Junior righthander Duane Madje was on the roster in 1987 but did not see action.

Erik Silvey from Cypress College, Jim Foley from Orange Coast and Danny DeVille from Mt. San Antonio are the JC transfers. Completing the staff are a trio of freshmen in Huck Flener from Armijo High in Fairfield; Chris Robinson from Troy High in Fullerton; and redshirt Matt Watson from Covina High. Robinson is the younger brother of Pittsburgh Pirates pitcher Jeff Robinson, a four-year Fullerton letterman.

"Garcia and Beck are proven winners," said Cochell, who coached last year at Northwestern after a 10-year tenure at Oral Roberts. "We were encouraged by Johnson's work in the fall. Silvey was a short reliever at Cypress and could start or relieve or both for us. Robinson has a chance to pitch for us as a freshman."

A new Titan catcher must emerge in 1988 with the graduation of second-team All-PCAA pick Mike Ham and the conversion of backup Jason Rolish to centerfield. The new duo is Orange Coast JC transfer Brent Mayne and Shane Flores, who sat out last year after transferring from the University of Oklahoma.

"Mayne has a chance to be an outstanding college catcher," said Cochell. "He's a left-handed hitter (.330 last year) and is very intelligent with his father (Mike) being the coach at Orange Coast. He has an above average arm. Flores is an accomplished receiver with experience at Golden West JC and Oklahoma. He will also get a shot at third base."

Flores will be competing at third with Ralph Ramirez from Orange Coast and Mike Friedland from San Mateo JC. They must replace All-PCAA first-teamer Tony Trevino. Ramirez was the regular third baseman for OCC's state finalist squad while Friedland can play all infield positions and will serve as a utilityman along with letterman Kemer Brett. Squad member Mark Shimamoto and newcomer Ramiro Garcia will provide infield depth.

Power-hitting Keith Kaub is the incumbent at first base, but he faces a challenge from OCC transfer Rex Peters, who hit .384 and also can play the outfield. Kaub hit .290 last year and had eight home runs; six of them in PCAA play before a late-season elbow injury cost him eight games.

Offensive sparkplug Greg Mannion is the only returning starter from the outfield. The lefthanded-hitting senior left fielder batted .306 and led the team with 48 RBI while being runnerup with 10 home runs and 20 stolen bases. He will likely be joined by centerfielder Rolish and either Jim Osborn or Bobby Jones in right field. Rolish hit .208 in only 53 at bats last year as a catcher. Osborn hit .235 in 51 at bats while Jones was 2 for 6 and saw most of his action as a pinch-runner. Another outfield candidate but more likely to see duty as a designated hitter or at first base is powerful Scott Talanoa, who hit .472 with 17 home runs last year for El Segundo High. Gone from the scene are leadoff hitter and centerfielder Mark Baca (.368 with 36 SB) and right fielder Ken Garcia (.310).

"Mannion is an outstanding hitter and could be a great lead-off man," said Cochell. "Both Osborn and Jones had good falls. Rolish is a fine defensive player and has shown offensive improvement."

Fullerton's schedule is typically competitive. The Titans have early 3-game series at Arizona and Stanford and also have home-and-home matchups with UCLA and USC. The Titans will team with the Bruins and Trojans against LSU, Tulane and New Orleans in Busch Challenge II in the Superdome March 25-27.

The PCAA schedule offers traditional threats in Fresno State, UNLV and UC Santa Barbara, all at Titan Field, along with 1987 runnerup UC Irvine. The Titans play only nine league road games — three each at Pacific, Long Beach State and San Jose State.





HISTORY OF TITAN BASEBALL

From the early club days when a playing field literally was scratched out of an orange grove to a national championship captured before the entire country's eyes on live television, Titan baseball has provided Cal State Fullerton fans with a wide range of thrills and excitement over the past two decades.

Beryl Kempton and Warren Beck brought the program into the world, Bill Fulton nursed it into adolescence and then Augie Garrido guided it into maturity as Titan baseball has developed into a national power, now under the hand of proven veteran Larry Cochell.

Kempton was the University employee who graded the field out of the orange trees. Home plate sat near the old orchard residence, a brick structure now known as "Football House." It's reportedly the second oldest existing residence in the city and now houses the Titans' football coaching staff.

The first-base line ran north and the thirdbase line paralleled what is now called Gymnasium Drive, heading west. A split rail and wire mesh screen served as the outfield barrier.

Beck, a member of the faculty, was the inaugural coach. He fielded a "club" team which played local junior colleges and "pick-up" teams from neighboring universities in its maiden season.

In 1965, the program became a full-fledged intercollegiate sport with Bill Fulton serving as the head coach. He led them into play in the California Collegiate Athletic Association and set the groundwork for the success of the 1970s as he battled Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, UC Riverside, Cal State Northridge and Cal Poly Pomona.

The catalyst to greatness was Garrido, who arrived from rival Cal Poly SLO and began developing the new field now situated farther to the north. A new backstop, batter's eye and such luxuries as electricity for the pitching machines provided Garrido the most basic of tools.

After a rebuilding year in 1973, the Titans began establishing their great tradition in 1974 by winning the CCAA championship.

The 1975 season saw a move up to Division I status and entry in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association. But the surging Titans didn't miss a beat. They won the PCAA championship by one game over Pacific and then strolled onto Dedeaux Field on the campus of the University of Southern California and won the NCAA Western Regional to deprive the Trojans of a shot at their sixth consecutive NCAA championship.

Fullerton's first trip to Omaha for the College World Series was brief to say the least. The Titans lost their first two games, to Arizona State and Oklahoma, and were sent packing and flying back to Los Angeles. But the experience would pay benefits down the

Fullerton repeated as PCAA champion in

1976, this time by a comfortable four games ahead of San Diego State. But then came realignment of the league as the Southern California Baseball Association was formed by Fullerton, Cal State Los Angeles, San Diego State, Pepperdine, Loyola Marymount, UC Santa Barbara and Long Beach State. Pacific, Fresno State and San Jose State became part of the Northern California Baseball Association.

The new schedule failed to disrupt the Titans' championship rhythm, although they had to share the inaugural SCBA title with Cal State L.A. Fullerton lost a one-game playoff with the Diablos but gained an atlarge NCAA bid where they lost in the regional title game to Washington State in Pullman.

There was another SCBA title in 1978 and regional elimination at USC before the Titans struck paydirt in 1979. They parlayed another SCBA crown into a national championship but they did it the hard way.

Fullerton lost the regional opener at Fresno but came back through the losers' bracket, finally beating UCLA twice to earn a return trip to Omaha. Again, the Titans lost the opener, this time to Mississippi State. But a confident Garrido still liked his team's chances and they proved him right. They won five games in a row including a 2-1 verdict over Arkansas for the NCAA championship, the first title for Fullerton in a men's sport in Division I play.

The fruits of victory did not include a home playing site worthy of a regional tournament, so Fullerton began in 1980 a frustrating streak of post-season play. The Titans won the SCBA title again but had to go to Tucson, where the host Arizona Wildcats won the regional on their way to the NCAA title. In 1981, the Titans won the SCBA but lost in the regionals at Tempe to the hosts, the eventual national champion Arizona State Sun Devils.

Fullerton avenged the defeat, however, knocking off the highly regarded Sun Devils in their own backyard after another SCBA crown in 1982. However, the third trip to Omaha proved less than charming. Fullerton set a dubious record, becoming the first CWS team not to score a run as the Titans were shut out by Wichita State and Maine and hustled home.

In 1983, the Titans shared the SCBA crown but lost a one-game playoff to UC Santa Barbara for the NCAA automatic tournament bid. No matter, the Titans' 49-19-1 record earned them an at-large berth. It also earned them another trip to Tempe, where the Sun Devils prevailed.

A slow start in 1984 after a couple of late summer professional signings stripped the pitching staff of its depth left Fullerton's reign in the SCBA teetering. A realignment of the infield seemed to work wonders and the team caught fire. A surge that would see them win 37 of their last 42 games carried all the way to Omaha and a second NCAA championship.

Again, the road to Omaha was via Fresno, where the Titans survived a murderers' row field of USC, San Diego State and the host Bulldogs of Fresno State. An extra-inning title game played in 100+ degree heat finally went the Titans' way and presented a schedule of some of the nation's most famous institutions in the College World Series

Michigan, Miami, Arizona State, Oklahoma State and, finally, the University of Texas, stood in the way. In a series dominated by the hitters and their aluminum bats, the Titans showed a national ESPN audience that there was quality if not quantity on the pitching mound. Todd Simmons, Jack Reinholtz and record-setting reliever. Scott Wright did yeoman's duty and left it for diminuitive lefty Ed Delzer to turn in the performance of his life in winning a 3-1 decision over the Longhorns in the title game.

There were other heroes, however. John Fishel, who would set a CWS record for hits and win the Most Valuable Player Trophy, slid around the Michigan catcher to ignite a five-run eighth inning and give the Titans an opening 8-4 win over the Wolverines.

After a 6-4 loss to Texas sent them to the losers' bracket, the Titans fought back. They routed Miami, 13-5, with bunts and stolen bases rattling the Hurricanes into four costly errors. They eliminated Arizona State as Reinholtz cooled the hot Devil bats and Kirk Bates delivered a crucial bases-loaded single. They outslugged Oklahoma State behind a Fishel home run, a bases-loaded triple by Tom Thomas and a two-run double by Bob Caffrey to earn the winner-take-all rematch with the Longhorns.

The five-foot-seven, 133-pound Delzer got a rare starting call against the defending champions. A couple of infield hits in the first inning produced a run but that was to be all. Delzer pitched a near-perfect game until leg cramps forced him from the mound to open the eighth inning. Enter Wright, the NCAA's most prolific reliever ever. He slammed the door on Texas for his 22nd save.

The offensive hero was John Bryant, who stole a base to set up the tying run and then tripled for the key hit in a two-run fourth inning that proved the difference.

Defending the title proved too much for the 1985 Titans to handle. Competing in the Southern Division of a reconstituted PCAA, the Titans finished in first place in their division but the pitching came up too thin in a playoff series at Fresno State that decided the league championship and the NCAA Tournament's automatic berth. And, with the nation's most difficult schedule taking its toll on an overall 36-32-1 record, the

Titans did not get an at-large bid and were left out of the playoffs for the first time in 11 years

By most school's standards, the 1986 season was a successful one. The Titans posted a solid 36-21 record and won the Best of the West Tournament in Fresno as part of another challenging schedule. But, for the second year in a row, there was no league title nor NCAA playoff berth as the season turned on one inning. Fullerton blew a 6-2 lead in the ninth inning at home vs. UNLV on Apr. 5 and could never recover from the loss, finishing in third place behind UC Santa Barbara and UNLV.

When Fullerton opened up the 1987 season losing five of its first six games, PCAA rivals thought Fullerton's dominance had ended. But despite a schedule that saw them play all the contenders on the road.

Fullerton roared through the league schedule, winning 12 of its first 13 games, on its way to an 18-3 PCAA mark and a fivegame margin over surprise runnerup UC Irvine

The Titans' regular season record of 42-15 earned them a national ranking as high as No. 3 and sent them packing for their return to the NCAA playoffs with a berth in the South II Regional in New Orleans. The Titans were the top seed against five Louisiana schools and drew the No. 6 seed, Southern University from Baton Rouge. Representing a conference that never had won an NCAA playoff game, the Jaguars nevertheless got a brilliant pitching performance from converted reliever Allan Ratliff, who beat CSF, 1-0, in a bizarre game that saw no infield chances for Southern. Ratliff handled a bunt and a comebacker and all of

the other outs were via fly balls or strike-

Thrust into the losers' bracket, the Titans resorted to their deep pitching staff to outlast all but Louisiana State. Mike Harkey shut out Tulane and Larry Casian did likewise to Louisiana Tech. But Longo Garcia, the hard-luck loser to Southern, couldn't handle the Tigers. The pivotal play occurred when his glove came off while fielding a comebacker and the Titans could not rally, settling for a 44-17 season.

The lure of financial security and the challenge of building a winning college baseball program in the Midwest lured Garrido to Illinois during the summer and brought to Fullerton the veteran Cochell, who has taken several teams to post-season play during his 21-year college coaching career.

The 1988 season marks the fourth year of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association's reformed baseball format.

The league was re-aligned for the 1985 season with teams from the Southern and Northern California Baseball Associations. A north-south format was used in 1985, but since 1986 all eight teams have vied for the PCAA pennant and automatic NCAA playoff berth in a single division. The 21-game league schedule consists of seven 3-game weekend series with the sites alternating on an annual basis.

Fullerton joined the PCAA in 1975 when the Titans moved up to Division I status. After two seasons, teams from the south half of the PCAA and the West Coast Athletic Conference were combined into the SCBA and the northern teams formed the NCBA. The desire of the WCAC to field its own baseball league caused the return to the regular PCAA alignment after eight seasons, which saw Fullerton win or share eight SCBA championships.

The end result is one of the most competitive baseball leagues in the nation. In 1983 and 1984, six teams from the current alignment gained the NCAA playoffs with Fresno State representing the NCBA both years and the SCBA being represented twice by Fullerton and once each by UC Santa Barbara (1983) and Nevada Las Vegas (1984). Since realignment, the PCAA has been marked by parity with three different schools-Fresno State in 1985, UC Santa Barbara in 1986 and Fullerton in 1987-emerging as conference champions.

New Stadium Part of Sports Complex

A joint venture among the City of Fullerton, the Marriott Hotel chain and the State University system will soon produce a long-awaited stadium for Titan baseball.

An \$18 million Marriott Hotel will be built on the southeast corner of the campus at Nutwood Avenue and the Orange (57) Freeway: Road construction has begun and ground-breaking is

scheduled for April.

The hotel's operation will provide funds to maintain a \$6.7 million city-built sports complex which will include a soccer/football facility and fan facilities around the existing baseball field. The design, cost and seating capacity of the baseball stadium currently are under review by a committee that includes coach Larry Cochell.

TITANS IN THE MAJOR LEAGUES

Eight products of the Cal State Fullerton baseball program have worked their way into the major leagues with many of the stars of the recent teams waiting in the wings for their opportunity.

The first Titan to play in the major leagues was lefthanded pitcher Dan Boone, who broke in with the Angels and Padres after helping the Titans into the 1975 College World Series. He was soon followed by catcher Dan Whitmer at Toronto and California.

The biggest name came next as Tim Wallach, the 1979 College Player of the Year, broke in with the Montreal Expos on his way to All-Star status as a third baseman for the National League the past few seasons.

More recent arrivals have been righthanded pitcher Jeff Robinson with the San Francisco Giants and Pittsburgh Pirates; outfielder Andre David, who hit a home run in his first at bat for the Minnesota Twins; and outfielder John Christensen with the New York Mets, Boston Red Sox and Seattle Mariners.

The most impressive performance recently came from lefthander Greg Matthews, who burst upon the scene in St. Louis in 1986 to become a valued member of the Cardinals' starting rotation. He was on the NCAA championship team of 1984 but did not play in the College World Series after getting hit in the face by a line drive in batting practice. Also getting his debut was Bill Moore with Montreal after an all-star season in the American Association for pennant-winning Indianapolis.


