#### Councilman Esty **Reports To Village**

By Romaine Lambert At the June Homeowners Assn. meeting, Villagers had the opportunity to receive a report from Councilman Bill Esty, fellow villager and former Mayor of Camarillo - information that may not have been covered in newspapers.

He stated that he had received many inquiries regarding the traffic signal at Adolfo and Mission Oaks. The City Council had little control over the timing because Santa Paula Savings funded the installation, but as you read this, the signal should be in operation.

Also of major concern to many Villagers is the intersection at Adolfo Road and Ponderosa where it is so difficult to turn onto Ponderosa. Esty pointed out that unfortunately, according to the California Code restrictions, this intersection does not warrant a traffic light (500 vehicles per hour for a 24hour period for Ponderosa and 250 for the same period for Adolfo.) There are ways to get around the restriction but the Council must first conduct a survey and this is in process.

Earlier residents may remember that at the time the "Adolfo connection" between eastern Camarillo and the central city was being considered, there was a third connection proposed. Now the "Upland/Las Posas connection" will be a reality. The Catholic Archdiocese

Members of the L.V. Board of Directors, impressed with the enthusiasm and efforts to date of the Organ Club, (\$3655 had been raised by June 6) decided to purchase the new instrument, with the assurance that efforts would continue by the club until the remaining \$6345 has been returned to the Association. Delighted by the Board's confidence, Organ Club President Piff De Simone promised the Members that the Club was committed to a series of fundraising events this year,

#### Security And **Safety Report**

By Romaine Lambert At the June Homeowners Association meeting, Mr. Tom O'Brien, Chairman of Security and Safety Committee, announced that Six-month Guest Passes will be distributed in July. He also disclosed the astonishing information that last year 5,400 guest passes were requested, but to date there remained about 800 to be picked up. He urged all villagers to be particularly selective in requesting passes and to remember that each villager requesting such a pass is responsible for the quest. The work involved in processing unnecessary passes is extensive and expensive.

Among the recommendations presented to the Board was a proposed concrete-stop barricade from the east parking lot to the paddle tennis courts to keep vehicles away from the curb at the walk entry to allow pedestrians to get past the bushes next to the walk. It was also recommended to mark the available parking space for 1 or 2 compact cars.

The Committee proposed that outside contractors be required to clean up the street area where they are working daily, inasmuch as debris left on the street hardens in the pavement and cannot be picked up by the street cleaner.

It has been observed that our own landscape crews have been scoop-

#### **OUR TV-CABLE-STATELLITE** STATE OF AFFAIRS

As we meet our press deadline we are advised that no final contract for our TV cable system has yet been signed. Nor has any final decision about TV satellite provisions been reached. However, our status review convinces us that the problems are being well considered by our Board and Management.

We have been blessed with the biggest bargain in cable-TV reception. We own perpetual rights to the placement of our TV antenna on the mountain top. We are subject to losing those rights only if we do not use the system for an entire year. In comparison, residents outside the Village pay about an average of \$160 a year. Five years ago they paid about \$20 monthly, or \$120 a year. That is an increase of 331/3%. We originally paid Western Cable \$1.00 per home per month. That cost for maintenance of our cable system was included in our monthly Association fee. For 2,000 homes that amounted to \$24,000 a year. When our Board received requests to make satellite reception available, a contract was made with Western Cable to give us many station combination options. This was set up with no expense to the Association. For the privilege of selling satellite reception and using our in-place system, Western Cable agreed to amend our contract. Our cost per home was reduced from \$1.00 per month to sixty cents, an annual saving of \$9,600 on 2,000 homes.

What is the current status? Western Cable has given notice of terminating its contract with us. Board members mentioned it at our June meeting. It should not have come as a complete surprise. Paid-for satellite TV reception did not produce the revenue Western Cable projected. Instead of the anticipated 40% Village subscriptions, we have been told that there are less than 200 which is

Villagers are concerned with economical, efficient, accountable and reliable maintenance of our antenna and built-in cable system. For a predominantly retired population, with many residents not very mobile, TV reception is a primary resource for entertainment, communication and enlightenment.

The Federal Commerce Commission has established norms to evaluate performance and maintenance by cable system entrepreneurs. It should be reassuring to our Villagers to learn that the Board had an analysis made to determine the exact condition of the existing system. We needed an authoritative, unbiased examination of our antenna and underground cable hook-ups. It was felt that our cable maintenance firm was not completely free from a conflict of interest. Engineers have recently reviewed our cable facilities and gave our equipment a good rating as measured by "FCC Performance Standards"

The Board has to wrestle with the problem of satellite and pay-TV options. If we buy our own "Dish", is it right for all Villagers including non-

isers to pay for its maintenance? What is equitable and fair has to be evaluated. The editors of INSIDE LEISURE VILLAGE have confidence that there will be a proper resolution of these problems. We particularly encourage those responsible for these decisions which affect our economic, recreational and intellectual life, to use all Village resources to get as much input as possible. Communication in this area must be maximized so that it travels from the Villagers to Board members and from the Board to the Villagers and back again.

Like Halley's Comet, the 50th Anniversary of Social Security comes only once in a lifetime.

Such a celebration was proposed weeks ago to the LVA Board of Directors, who gave their approval and asked the Community Relations Committee to organize it. The Committee considered the proposition and voted, with Board member Bill Himstreet in agreement, to mark the occurrence during the July Fourth picnic.

But something funny happened on the way to the picnic:

The 50th anniversary celebration was cancelled at the instance of the chairman of the Community Relations Committee, who offered the excuse that the Current Issues Forum meeting on May 31 was noting the event.

Well, that's all the Forum did, that is, note the anniversary. There was nothing on the program smacking of a celebration. No cake. No coffee. No ice cream. Nothing except talk, which minimally touched on the current issues confronting Social Security.

There is still time to recover from this embarrassment. The exact anniversary date is August 14, almost two months away.

Surely, there are Villagers who will come forward to plan and organize an appropriate celebration of the 50th Anniversary of Social Security.

As a member of the pool committee, I have seen our present Board of Directors and their administrative staff, vacilate from one extreme to the other and back again, regarding the swimming pool. An item in the May 'VOICE' informed us that the subject of the eight-hour lifeguard schedule decision was tabled for further study.

> The ten-month hiatus with no lifeguard has made two things evident. One, it has denied those residents who need the comfort of a lifeguard's presence the use of the pool; and two, those who do swim, do so sensibly and cautiously in an unguarded pool. Having a lifeguard again would be welcome. However, having a daily double shift, from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m., the plan that is being considered, seems a wanton and unwarranted waste of our residents' money, AGAIN. We've been through all this before!

On a regular daily eighthour lifeguard schedule, residents who swim for therapeutic, mild exercise or other reasons would, as they've done in the past, use the pool at that time. Other residents who are confident swimmers



## Edison's "Warm-Room" Plan By So.Calif.

Edison Co.

With many cool nights and days yet to come this spring, Southern California Edison Company is offering low-income electric heating customers assistance in establishing a "one-warm-room" plan to help reduce home electric bills and conserve energy.

J. A. Melton, Edison area manager, said the utility is offering free electric heaters to eligible needy families interested in practicing the "one-warm-room" concept, which has its historical roots in the log cabin days.

"The idea is to heat only the main activity room, such as a den, living room or kitchen, where the family spends most of its time during the day and early evenings," explains Melton.

"At night, the single heater could be used to heat a bedroom, he adds. The overall purpose of the program is to assist families on fixed or low incomes to save energy and lower their electric heating bills. Eligible families must have electric heating systems such as ceiling cable, baseboard, wall or forced-air electric heaters.

To be eligible for the program, family income cannot exceed 150 percent of federal poverty guidelines. For example, maximum gross income for a family of two is \$10,080.

In addition, persons who are over 60 years of age, or are permanently disabled, may be eligible if they do not exceed 200% of federal poverty income guidelines. In such instances, maximum gross income for a family of two is \$13,440.

Families receiving income assistance such as AFDC or Supplemental Security Income also qualify.

The program is available to eligible renters and

homeowners. Customers who believe they may be eligible may call the utility's toll-free conservation action line at 1-800-952-5062 for information and applications. —SCE



service coverage.

We have had meetings in most areas of the County with qualified speakers presenting Health Plans. Our mails are saturated with all kinds of inducements to join or purchase Health Services. Doctors are organizing into groups and doing heavy advertising to attract patients. Clinics and other combinations of doctors are offering services to compete with the Hospitals. The Hospitals are expanding their functions from acute care to include preventative medicine as broad Community Hospitals.

Now, with all this competition (which is long overdue), the patient has

the opportunity to look critically at the doctors and the services involved; and should ask what do I get and how much do I pay for it?

It is also imperative to study the functions, the membership, and the financial structures of these health organizations, so that you are dealing with a solid, stable group, and that you know exactly for what you are paying. 

The 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. lifeguard schedule is a costly and unrealistic plan. What happens in the event a lifeguard fails to show up? We have been led to believe the pool facility gates would remain locked until another guard could be obtained! Projecting this sitation one step further, what might happen. Since just a few residents use the pool in the early a.m. or late afternoon hours the Board would probably then say that we are paying lifeguards to "baby-sit" a near empty pool. They would then probably limit the pool access to an eight-hour day. 






#### **Current Issues Form**

"Social Security - 50th Anniversary - Past and Future" was the topic discussed by the Forum on May 31 in the AR.

Joe Gaynes, Assemblyman for the California Senior Legislature, chaired the meeting and introduced the speakers: Tony Lamb, Senator for the California Senior Legislature; and Tony Lopez, Field Representative for the Social Security Administration of Ventura Coun-

Mr. Lopez presented a number of fact sheets and various pamphlets containing data and information helpful for those receiving Social Security. He stated that it is alleged that Social Security may not be around in 30 or so years. This is quite questionable. If true, though, it does not forebode well for those employed in the 30plus ages.

Joe Gaynes gave a glowing introduction for Tony Lamb who is a graduate Electrical Engineer and at age 81 does professional consulting work.

The 50th Anniversary of Social Security was celebrated throughout the nation and here on April 10 in Thousand Oaks. A group of Seniors led by Tony Lamb presented Bobbi Fiedler with a number of complaints about Social Security in general.

Tony Lamb meets monthly with representatives of Social Security, to review pertinent cases and if necessary forward any beefs to Washington. Lamb was staunchly against Social Security in its formative stages, during the great depression and the Administration of F.D.R. But now he confesses that he is more than happy that he lost that battle.

Lamb says that few people are aware that Social Security has a provision called "IMPAC" wherein a recipient in dire circumstances can receive a check FAST. He gave several examples of cases where Social Security inadvertently claimed that a recipient was deceased, thereby presenting time consumption and apprehension in final check reception. He also said that, generally speaking, it's OK to have Social Security checks sent to your bank but there is a long-shot chance that one may encounter problems, as for example, if the bank changes its name. Also, Social Security may impound your checking account under certain conditions, thereby presenting the possibility of over-drawn checks.

A question and answer period followed.

Residents have also expressed concern about the inadequacy of the Carmen interchange. The City has been negotiating with Cal Trans for two years on this matter. It has been expected that the State would finance the project since it involves 101, but instead, the City must assume the responsibility. This revision is #2 on the City priority list and will be starting in 1987-88.

#### She's On Patrol...And She Cares

Here in Leisure Village,
eight security people are
responsible for patrolling
our grounds, providing us
with emergency medical
and non-medical assistance plus enforcing the
Village codes and providing traffic control.

Only one patrol person is a lady — Sgt. Mary Burrus — whose 5 p.m. to 1 a.m. duties are termed "outstanding" by Security Chief Max Moses.

Mary, a lifelong Camarillo resident, is a veteran of several years' U.S.

Army service and more recently, was a nurse's aide, performing services both here in L.V. as well as in the general Camarillo area.

She joined our Security Staff just thirteen months ago and on her second day of patrol, was summoned to a home where the male resident was in a comatose state: no vital signs or breathing. She immediately began C.P.R., was able to revive the patient and had him transferred to Pleasant Valley Hospital in stable condition. In a letter to Se-

curity soon after, Rachel Hutchison reported, "I never felt so joyous to see anyone as I did the day little Mary Burrus came flying out of her patrol car to my door. She quickly revived my husband ... all of you have my heartfelt gratitude."

Commenting on Sgt. Burrus, Chief Moses said. "In addition to her professional performance in emergencies, Mary has established a format on the follow-up of the people she has assisted. This has been done by phone calls to the home or hospital, by visits to the home and by offers of assistance. Her high degree of skill and caring earned for her Sergeant's stripes in a relatively short period of time.'

Can she comment on the frequency and/or types of calls she responds to? "Well," she replies, "winter time is generally the quiet time although we do have more breathing problems during those months. I have far more emergency calls during the summer.

Mary enjoys working the evening shift so that she can devote time to her two children, a boy three and a girl two, during daytime hours. She almost lost her infant daughter to APNEA, commonly called Sudden Infant Death Syndrome, Mary now reports that her daughter is a healthy, normal child.

This prompted her to become proficient at Cardiac Pulmonary Resuscitation. Chief Moses believes that at least two lives have been saved thanks to Mary's C.P.R. techniques. When asked how our patrol vehicles are able to respond so quickly, the Chief said that the Village is divided into two sections and that generally, an officer will be at your home within two minutes.






