# The Wide, Wide **World Of Volunteers**

During August the Leisure Village Board of Directors appoint members and chairmen to standing Village committees, a group which numbers well over 100. But LV residents provide man and woman power for a great many other projects and groups in the Village and beyond into the wider community.

The Women's Club fall Bazaar would not be the same without the year long efforts of their workshop group of women meeting each Tuesday morning to make boutique items. The Bazaar also benefits from the efforts of a crew of woodshop men to create toys, windmills. etc. Did you know the latter group often does repairs on Village bulletin boards and cases? And the Women's Club Trading Post runs only with many volunteer hours.

Beyond the Village, residents get involved as hospital volunteers — at Pleasant Valley, St. John's, Los Robles and the State Hospital. Others act as tutors for youngsters at local schools or learn to teach teens and adults to read in the literacy program. They also volunteer at Ventura School for troubled teens.

Villagers unstintingly serve in city and county planning and advisory committees. We can boast of one resident who went on to serve several terms as a city councilman, with at least one term as mayor. Others work in AARP projects or the Senior Legislature, reaching out to the state and national levels. They work for Food Share, Meals on Wheels and Boys and Girls Club, or serve as docents at several museums.

The list seems endless. Seniors with free time and much talent and abilities to lend find groups eager for their volunteer help. It is known that retirees who are involved live happier and healthier lives in general.

The world certainly does not end at the Village walls. Many able retirees reach out to the wider community (Some even nation-wide) and demonstrate that Leisure Village is not an isolated island, but chooses to enrich the areas around us.

This influence of the Village is felt around us, and not just on voting day. So when one says the word "volunteer," there is a broad application which Villagers are expanding and stretching each day.

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

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### **Blue Ballots**

Have you turned in your blue ballots yet? The number of ballots turned in must reach a quorum by Friday, September 2, or the Board of Directors will have to extend the voting period.

Two issues are on the ballots as detailed below. The CC&Rs revisions, item 1 below, need approval by 75% of homeowners or 1602 votes for implementation. The bylaws revision, item 2, reguires a majority vote in eliminate cumulative votorder to pass.

The ballots may be returned either via U.S. mail or by depositing in the ballot boxes located in the Rec Center or the Association office. If you do not have ballots, they can be picked up at the Association office.

#### **BALLOT ISSUES**

1. ASSIGNMENT OF RENTS: This addition to the CC&Rs will allow the

Association to seek payment of any amounts which are past due to the Association directly from tenants residing in the rented property. In such an instance, the Association would request payment directly from the tenant and the tenant would pay the amount due to the Association and remit the balance of the rent if any to the property owner. If you are in favor of the change, vote YES. If you are not in favor, vote NO.

2. CUMULATIVE VOT-ING: This deletion will ing; that is, the owner will not be able to cumulate (combine) his/her votes for one candidate. The elimination of cumulative voting will allow for one vote for each vacant seat on the Board of Directors. If you are in favor of this change, vote YES. If you are not in favor vote NO.

Valid ballots must have the unit address and homeowners signatures on the envelope. Please submit YOUR votes today.



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

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### Profile:

# Marcel Lerner

Marcel Lerner, a man of European background trained in the profession of acting, lived through the worst of times, experienced personal tragedy, escaped to the United States by good fortune and strength of his talent, and built a new life as an American citizen.

Lerner, born in Vienna, Austria, feels he inherited an acting talent from his father who was a prominent public speaker, and his mother, Fritzi, an opera singer and voice teacher. After graduation from the Max Reinhardt Seminary where one of his instructors was the late Otto Preminger, Marcel performed on stages in Czechoslovakia and in the German sections of Poland and Austria. While performing in Vienna, he was "discovered" and received a contract to perform major roles in Switzerland.

Due to the war in Europe, the Swiss government permitted him to remain in that country for two years. At that point, Austria had been occupied by Hitler's army, and Marcel had no passport.

With the aid of some Quaker friends, Marcel managed to get to Paris to join his brother Arthur. In Paris, he met Maurice Schwartz of the Yiddish Art Theater in New York who was in Paris to put on several shows. He gave Marcel a job as an extra, and hired a teacher to give him lessons in Yiddish. Through fortunate and timely circumstances, Marcel was taken to London and obtained a passport and an affidavit (through his brother) to enter the U.S. In August 1939. Marcel arrived in New York and immediately applied for his first citizenship papers.

The war in Europe was now in full swing, but

Marcel felt secure in the U.S. In 1943, while playing in the Pasadena Playhouse, he received his draft notice. He joined the U.S. Army and went to Fort Knox, Kentucky, for basic training. He continued to entertain troops and received an award from the ARTC Special Service office for entertaining troops and civilian personnel.

On June 6, 1944, the day of the Normandy landing, he was transferred to Camp Gordon, Georgia. Private Lerner became an instructor of French and German for soldiers of the 10th Armored Division. In September he ironically was sent back to Europe. Marcel, who had never driven a car, was now a member of tank unit and became a combat interpreter and interrogator. By late 1944 his Division was

in the Battle of the Bulge in Bastogne, Belgium, where he received a Purple Heart and the Medal of Valor.

After the war. Marcel became an investigator for political and historical intelligence for the U.S. Government in the City of Munich. While stationed in Germany, he learned that his father, a survivor of the Theresienstadt concentration camp, was a patient in the Rothschild Hospital in Vienna. His mother did not survive. Marcel spent an unforgettable week with his father whom he had not seen for eight years.

After his discharge in 1946, Marcel came to Los Angeles where he met Esther who became his wife. (They just celebrated their 48th wedding anniversary.) He became a traveling salesman for Stratton and Sons of London, and after 37 years, he

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### Clip and Save Guidelines For Contributors To ILV
