Within the past month, notable progress has been made in obtaining a change in the section of the flood plain map which includes Leisure Village. When this is accomplished, Leisure Village will no longer be obligated to carry flood insurance.

The Ventura County Flood Control District has completed repairs on the Conejo Creek levee bordering the Village; the City

Push Red Button.....

Safety in Leisure Village has always been a major concern for residents and the Board of Directors. One recent matter of concern is the pedestrian crossing at the main gate. Most foot traffic from the Village to the Santa Rosa Plaza and its shopping center walks along the edge of Village 13 to reach the new pedestrian gate; this causes little problem. It is the foot traffic which crosses Leisure Village Drive to reach the Plaza which is of concern.

This was identified as a safety hazard several years ago by the Board and the Security and Safety Committee, because pedestrian visibility to incoming motorists was impaired and the walking route unclear. The Board hired a safety consultant to design a safer crossing route. This design was installed at the main gate months ago.

However, pedestrians crossing the street are bypassing the safety precautions provided; many are not using the system. They cross in the striped walkway

provided, but ignore the red button.

It is unnerving for a motorist coming into the Village to have the gate arm raised for their entrance signifying "all clear"- then start to move their car only to find one or two pedestrians in the middle of the drive peering around the Gate House to check on traffic, trying to cross. They were standing right next to the red traffic button, but they DID NOT push it to alert the officer in the Gate House that there was foot traffic present. When the button is used, the gate officer does not permit vehicular traffic to enter until the pedestrians are safely across the street.

Their unexpected presence is a jolt to alert motorists who have been given an "all clear" sign. What about the effect on unwary drivers? This is the exact danger which the system was designed to prevent.

Perhaps some pedestrians are still unaware of the protection available for them. Here further education is

needed.

Pedestrians crossing Leisure Village Drive at the main entrance are urged to push the button when they want to cross on foot in either direction. This will halt vehicular traffic and give pedestrians the right of way to cross. Please use the system which was put in place for your safety.

OPEN LETTER

For the past year and a half there has been an ongoing argument concerning the by-laws and the question of the legality of the additions made to the Nominating Committee by a past Board. At the meeting of August 7 the Board was asked to meet with a small representative group to discuss the issue in an effort to come to some resolution to the question.

On Thursday, August 10 the undersigned Association members met with the Board at the invitation of the President, Ed Hawthorne. Present were Ed Hawthorne, who chaired the meeting, and Board members Bill Blauer, Hunter Cohen, and Donna Duke, and the Association Manager, Jean Verbeck. Nick Fiore was not present.

After a great deal of open discussion with arguments pro and con, it became clear that the continuing position of the Board was that the letter from Attorney Lingl was the authority that permitted the additions. The undersigned Association members request to see the letter was denied on the grounds that it was privileged information. However, it was evident from the discussion that there was agreement on both sides of the table that the additions to the Nominating Committee in February 1994 was not in keeping with the original intents and purposes of the CC&Rs and the by-laws as understood and voted on by the As-

sociation membership.

In the interest of harmony, we have accepted the position of the present Board, and put our trust in this, and future Boards, to conduct the affairs of Leisure Village in a manner that will avoid the type of confrontations that have occurred this past year and a half.



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
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
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CAMERA CLUB

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Profile: Celia Cantor

Handcrafted pottery filled with exotic plants against a background of delicately colored ceramic sculpture lines the walkway approach to Celia Cantor's home in V9. Bevond the threshold is a dazzling display of art, a world of sparkling color and beauty combining fantasy and reality. All the decor, both inside and out, was created by this incredibly talented lady and her husband, Louis.

Born in New York, Celia attended elementary school in Montreal before returning to New York. Her father died when she was thirteen, and she was forced to leave school; lied about her age, took a job as typist, attended evening high school and graduated in four years. There was little in home or school to foster interest in art, but her talent was recognized early on by an observant teacher.

She attended evening classes at Brooklyn College, but her studies were frequently interrupted by family responsibilities. She and Lou married in 1946. moved to California in 1957, and she resumed her education at Cal-State Northridge where she earned her B.A. degree in 1969 with a major in painting and ceramics, and a certificate from UCLA to teach adult education. She returned to school, and in 1990 when she was approaching her 80th birthday received her M.A. degree at Northridge with majors in clay and stained glass. She studied painting with Morton Dimondstein and Gordon Wagner.

Celia has worked in a variety of media including oil, wax, ceramics, glass and acrylic, taught her craft

rently offering instruction in ceramics in LV. She feels art can be therapeutic for all ages, that experimentation and perception determine the quality of the results, and she draws a distinct parallel between art and music.

Among the interesting pieces of art in her home are an abstract of an unusual plant, a ceramic of her perception of the dropping of the first atomic bomb, an oil allegorically depicting the passage of time and the evolution of motion, and countless stained glass pieces of extraordinary beauty and design. Her work has been exhibited in many public places, she has earned innumerable awards, and

private collections exist worldwide.



Because Thanksgiving and Christmas come so close to our meeting dates there will be no meetings for November and December.


FRIENDS OF LIBRARY SPONSORING GIANT BOOK SALE By Jack Whalen
