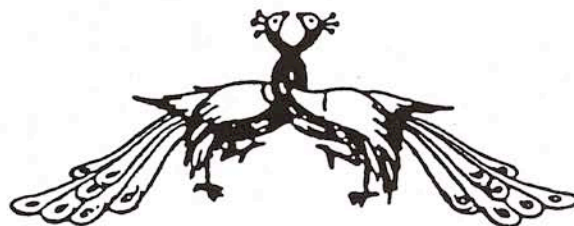

Informational Letter

1. Themes to be addressed:

Faculty of Oriental Studies and Special Faculty of Oriental Studies of the Saint-Petersburg University and Fund of Oriental Cultures upon the cooperation and participation of the New-Nakhichevan and Russian Eparchy of the Armenian Apostolic Church, General Consulate of Republic of Armenia in Saint-Petersburg, State Hermitage and the All Russian Social Alliance "The Union of Armenians in Russia" are planning to hold an International Academic Conference from the 27th to the 29th of June 2001. We shall investigate the Armenian and Christian East as we approach the 1700 year anniversary of the christening of Armenia.

We hope to cover a wide spectrum of research that is currently being carried out by specialists of Armenia within academic institutions of Russia and from countries near and afar. The papers are to be presented either in Russian or Western-European languages (mainly in English), and must not exceed 15 minutes so as to allow time for discussion.

Interest in Armenian studies is far from accidental. Armenian-Russian political, economic and cultural ties dictate a necessity to coordinate our efforts and to exchange experience and results of academic research.

This conference, without doubt, will serve to intensify and develop coordination among Oriental and Armenian Specialists from all over the world and these meetings shall become more regular.

2. During the conference we will discuss the following topics:

History, philosophy, culture, ethnography and linguistics of Armenia and its surrounding countries of the Christian Orient.

3. Format:

The program of the conference shall include plenary sessions academic papers, a press-conference, an exhibition and a cultural excursion.

4. Informational material:

Participants in the conference will be presented with a packet of informational material, including a program of the conference, a collection of the papers, a directory with information about the participants, a booklet of the university's Armenian studies program, as well Arsen K. Shahinyan's monograph, "The history of Armenian Studies in St. Petersburg University."

Preparation for the conference and its results will be put on the official web page of the Faculty of Oriental Studies of

the St. Petersburg State University and presented by the means of mass media.

5. Applications for participation and presentation of paper abstracts: We are accepting application forms not later than 15th of March, and paper abstracts 15th of May 2001.

The applications are to be completed in standard form by each participant (block letter). If you are in need of an invitation letter so as to obtain a visa, include a copy of your passport. Paper abstracts are to be presented in the following format:

The abstracts should be in text file without gaps, paragraph indentations and other means of formatting. Paragraphs are to be separated with a blank line.

Applications and abstracts should be sent by e-mail. We will not accept materials by regular mail or fax.

All participants will receive a series of informational material. Stipends for participants: transportation fee for citizens of the Republic of Armenia and hotel expenses for those who are not residents of St. Petersburg.

World Conference in Contemporary Armenian Literature

UCLA

April 7-8, 2001

The Narekatsi Chair of Armenian Studies at UCLA organized a conference devoted to contemporary Armenian literature held on campus at the Rolfe Hall auditorium on the weekend of April 7-8. The two-day conference examined different aspects of the literature composed over the last ten to fifteen years in the course of six panels.

The first of these, commenced on Saturday morning at 9:30, dealt with the broad topic of defining the period and highlighting the major trends, which have characterized it. Tumultuous events have shaped it such as the rise of the Karabagh Movement and the subsequent war to protect the region's independence, the earthquake in the north of Armenia, the dissolution of the Soviet Union and the declaration of Armenia as a sovereign republic, the hardships caused by the Azerbaijani and Turkish blockades, the struggles of the transition to a market economy, the impact of all these developments on the communities of the Diaspora, and the introduction of a new era in Armenia-Diaspora co-operation and interchange. This last decade of unprecedented pride, joy, challenge, and striving to respond to a new set of circumstances has inevitably evoked a range of reactions from Armenian writers, especially after the lifting of Soviet censorship in the republic.

After the opening by Prof. S. Peter Cowe of UCLA, these general trends were explored in detail by Prof. Azat Eghiazaryan, director of the Institute of Literature affiliated with the Armenian Academy of Sciences. He was then followed by Dr. Seyran Grigoryan, Dr. Grigor Hakobyan, and Dr. Aleksandr Topchyan, who reviewed in turn the current state of the three main literary genres of poetry, prose writing (novel and short story), and drama. Setting the pattern for the other panels, these initial presentations were succeeded first by a series of select readings from contemporary literary works illustrating the topic of the panel and then by a round table discussion featuring a number of notable writers and critics. In all about fifteen representatives came from the Armenian Republic and around the same number from various centers in the Diaspora - Middle East, Europe and North America.

After lunch the conference reconvened for a further two panels. The first of these, introduced by Prof. Khachig Tölölyan of Wesleyan University, Connecticut, discussed the crucial issue of the Armenian writer's place in society and how that role is to be currently defined. The second then broached the controversial theme of taboos in Armenian literature, a vital question in view of the lifting of censorship. Discussion was initiated by a paper from Prof. Mark Nichanian of Columbia University, New York, and then pur-

sued by the round table of writers before being opened to a question and answer session from the floor.

Particularly during the long stretches of history without a state infrastructure, Armenian culture has played a crucial role in maintaining a sense of continuing ethnic tradition. This question becomes the focus of attention in the fourth panel which commenced at 1 p.m. on Sunday afternoon. The theme of literature and Armenian identity was broached by Dr. Rubina Perroomian, the first doctoral candidate to receive her degree from the UCLA program in Armenian language and culture under the supervision of Prof. Avedis K. Sanjian.

After a brief coffee break focus turned to an increasingly important phenomenon of the current time, that of literature composed by writers of Armenian descent in languages other than Armenian, of which the best-known twentieth century example is probably that of William Saroyan. The topic was broached in a paper by Prof. Lorne Shirinian of the Royal Military Academy of Canada, who, in addition to his works of literary criticism, is also a widely published author of poetry and fiction in English.

After another coffee break, the final panel then took up the question of the literary impact of translating foreign literature into Armenian. This process has been a means of enriching the Armenian literary tradition ever since the animated activity of Mashtots and his pupils, which made a significant contribution to the Golden Age of the fifth century. Similarly, the opportunity to translate into Armenian authors once banned for their political views has been widely exploited in the republic and has sparked a number of new directions in Armenian literature. The subject was explored first in the presentations by Prof. Artem Harutyunyan of Erevan State University for Eastern Armenian and Mr. Boghos Snabian, editor of the literary review 'Pakin', for Western Armenian. Discussion then passed to a round table of writers and translators and concluded with a period of question and answer from the floor.

A Symposium on the 1915 Genocide of the Armenians in Ottoman Turkey

On Tuesday, April 24, 2001, the four-month-old Harvard Armenian Society presented a free symposium on the Armenian Genocide. The program consisted of talks from Professor Kevork Bardakjian, Marie Manoogian Professor of Armenian Literature at the University of Michigan, Professor Vahagn Dadrian, Director of Genocide Research at the Zoryan Institute, and Professor Peter Balakian, Author and Donald M. and Constance H. Rebar, Chair in Humanities at Colgate University. The program began at 7 pm at the Harvard Science Center, Hall D, and the speakers were interrupted by a thirty minute dessert reception from 8-8:30. Moderating part of the event will be Professor James R. Russell, Mashtots Chair of Armenian Studies at Harvard University. The themes of the Symposium will be "Justice Under One Empire: Turkish Court-Martials of Ottoman Genocide Perpetrators" and "The Armenian Genocide: Ottoman and German Documentation and American Cultural Response."

The program is sponsored by the Armenian General Benevolent Union, with the extended patronage of the Sheraton Commander Hotel in Cambridge. Harvard University is providing security in anticipation of a hotly controversial event. The program is the first undergraduate-run Genocide commemoration in over two decades.

The Harvard Armenian Society was resurrected in January, 2001, and currently consists of over one hundred Armenians affiliated with the University. Members of the Society include residents of Massachusetts, New Jersey, Illinois, Florida, California, New York, Canada, Armenia, and Lebanon.

Institute for Armenian Studies and Research Launched by NAASR

Responding to the need for increased research and analysis on issues related to all aspects of Armenian history, culture, and civilization, the National Association for Armenian Studies and Research (NAASR) announced the launching of its Institute for Armenian Studies and Research at its 46th Annual Assembly, held last November. NAASR also announced the appointment of Robert O. Krikorian of Harvard University as Institute Director. The activation of the Institute was made possible by funds raised in its current \$5 million campaign.

The purpose of the Institute is to undertake and foster research and publication on the historical, political, economic, social, and cultural development of Armenia and its people. The Institute is designed to approach the study of Armenian history and culture using integrative and multi-disciplinary methodologies in response to a rapidly changing geo-strategic environment where the historical past is often used as a political tool in the present. The Institute will endeavor to examine Armenia within its regional and historical context, emphasizing the interactions and inter-relationships between Armenians and their neighbors.

Aspects of Armenian History

The primary areas of emphasis for the Institute will be Armenian foreign relations in modern times (17th century to the present) and the five-hundred-year period of Armenian history from the Fall of the Kingdom of Cilician Arme-

nia (1375) to the Modern Armenian Renaissance (1875). The Institute is also concerned with study of the Republic of Armenia, the Armenian Diaspora, and the Armenian Genocide, in all of their political, historical, economic, cultural, and sociological aspects.

Institute Director Appointed

Institute Director Robert O. Krikorian is the co-author with Joseph R. Masih of Armenia at the Crossroads, one of the few histories of Armenia since independence. He has had extensive experience working with development and relief organizations in Armenia since 1988, including work as a regional scholar exchange program coordinator for the Kennan Institute for Advanced Russian Studies.

Krikorian is at present coordinator of the Russian and East European History Workshop at Harvard University. He has been for the past two years the recipient of a Dolores Zohrab Liebmann Fellowship. He has written extensively on Armenian history and politics and the Caspian region and is currently completing his doctoral work at Harvard University in the Department of Near Eastern Languages and Civilization. He has been a NAASR member since 1984.

Activities of Institute

To accomplish its goals, the Institute for Armenian Studies and Research is planning a number of activities and events. Within the framework of NAASR it will sponsor a wide range of research activities, including in-house and off-site research. Of central importance to the Institute's research efforts will be NAASR's Edward and Helen Mardigian Armenian Reference and Research Library, a twenty-thousand volume collection of books, periodicals, maps, photographs, clippings files, personal papers, microfilm, and microfiche. In addition to a large collection of English-language materials, the library also contains thousands of items in Armenian, as well as titles in Russian, Turkish, French, and German. This rich repository is a heretofore untapped resource of enormous value to those interested in Armenian Studies.

The Institute is also planning to provide access and research space to research fellows, associates, and visiting scholars. A particular focus of the Institute will be to provide policy-relevant analyses on historical and current developments through a series of seminars, symposia, lectures, position papers, and other publications, in association with NAASR's Armenian Heritage Press and other NAASR entities.

The Institute will also participate in the publication of NAASR's *Journal of Armenian Studies*. The Journal is intended to provide an outlet for scholars and researchers interested in all aspects of Armenian Studies, broadly defined. The Journal is interested in soliciting contributions from the newer generation of scholars as well as those engaged in researching previously neglected areas of Armenian Studies. Under the new editorship of Marc A. Mamigonian, it is intended that the Journal will be issued semi-annually, and all articles submitted for publication will be reviewed by

qualified specialists.

Relations with Chairs

Given NAASR's long-standing interest in fostering Armenian studies, research, and publication, its pioneering role in establishing Chairs and supporting Armenian Studies in American universities, as well as the increase in international interest in Armenia and the Caucasus, the Institute intends to establish cooperative relations with the Chairs of Armenian Studies, University Research Centers, and other institutions in the Americas, Europe, the Middle East, and Armenia.

With a new generation taking its place in the upper levels of Armenian Studies in the United States, the field is currently in transition and in need of greater definition and increased communication. The Institute for Armenian Studies and Research, in conjunction with NAASR's other entities, will explore ways to help shape an agenda for Armenian Studies and initiate a dialogue among interested parties.

NAASR has established a Fund for the Future of Armenian Studies, which has among its goals raising funds to implement the programs and activities of the Institute, aimed at promoting the field of Armenian Studies, and in general to help insure through NAASR's ongoing efforts that Armenian Studies remains a vital academic discipline in the coming decades. The Fund will be soliciting contributions and grants from foundations, corporations, and individuals.

Application Deadline: May 1, 2001

The National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) announces the competition for Fellowships for 2002-2003. These Fellowships provide opportunities for individuals to pursue advanced research in the humanities.

Applicants may be faculty or staff members of colleges or universities or of primary or secondary schools. Scholars and writers working independently, in institutions such as museums, libraries, and historical associations, or in institutions with no connection to the humanities, also are eligible to apply.

NEH Fellowships support a variety of activities. Projects may contribute to scholarly knowledge, to the advancement of teaching, or to the general public understanding of the humanities. Award recipients might eventually produce scholarly articles, a book-length treatment of a broad topic, an archaeological site report, a translation, an edition, a database, or some other scholarly tool.

Citizenship: Applicants should be U.S. citizens, native

residents of U.S. jurisdictions, or foreign nationals who have been legal residents in the U.S. or its jurisdictions for at least three years immediately preceding the application deadline.

Eligibility: Applicants whose professional training includes a degree program must have received the degree or completed all requirements for it by the application deadline. Persons seeking support for work leading to a degree are not eligible to apply, nor are active candidates for degrees.

Tenure and Stipend: Tenure must cover an uninterrupted period of from six to twelve months. The earliest beginning date is January 1, 2002, and the latest is the start of the spring term of the 2002-2003 academic term, or April 1, 2003 for those who are not on an academic year schedule.

Tenure periods for teachers must include at least one complete term of the academic year. A stipend of \$40,000 will be awarded to those holding fellowships for a grant period of nine months to twelve months. A stipend of \$24,000 will be awarded to those holding fellowships for a grant period of six months to eight months.

Submission of Applications: The Fellowships Program begins accepting applications on March 1, 2001. All applications must be postmarked on or before May 1, 2001. New Books

The Armenian Texts of Epiphanius of Salamis de Mensuris et Ponderibus

By Michael E. Stone and Roberta R. Ervine. Leuven, Peeters, 2000, ISBN 90-429-0886-6

This book is published in the Subsidia of the series Corpus Scriptorum Christianorum Orientalium.

Ephiphanius of Salamis in his work "On Weights and Measures" discusses two chief subjects, the story of the translation of the Bible into Greek, and the weights and measures used in the Bible and in the ancient world. Composed in Greek, the treatise survives in a poor Greek version. The Armenian version published here is not complete, but has been assembled from a variety of manuscripts and texts. There was an ancient Armenian version in full, but it has only survived as presented here. The book is provided with an extensive introduction, an appendix listing works attributed to Epiphanius in Armenian, and an index. The texts are published in Armenian and English.

Writing Memory: The Search for Home in Armenian: Diaspora Literature as Cultural Practice

Writing Memory is Lorne Shirinian's fourth book on Armenian literature in English in North America. His other three academic works deal with political history. For example, *Quest for Closure: The Armenian Genocide* and the *Search for Justice in Canada* (2000) is the first book to look at the history of the Armenian community in Canada and the way the various governments have reacted to calls from Armenians here to officially acknowledge the Armenian Genocide.

In *Writing Memory*, Dr. Shirinian begins with an important introduction in which he presents a penetrating overview of the Armenian diaspora in North America and the effects of it being a transnational community and their sig-

nificance for cultural production. At the end of his introduction, Shirinian writes, "Finally, this study accepts as its underlying principle that the cultural practice of Armenian diaspora artists, writers, and filmmakers, when their works relate to their heritage, creates texts that focus on the search for home. In their creations, they write memory."

In the six essays that follow, Shirinian develops his argument. In the first chapter, he has written an analysis of the critical writing on this literature since the 1930s. Below is the table of contents.
