# ILV goes into digital archives

CSUCI scans in 34 years of papers so they'll be available as historical record

**By Patty Ecker** 

More than 34 years of Leisure Village history, people stories, jokes, poems and club news will be easily available to us and our great-greatgrandchildren beginning this year. All past issues of Inside Leisure Village are being digitized, creating an online presence for this newspaper that has been published since 1979. The printed version will continue monthly as always; the digital issues will offer the same information to a wider audience.

This gift of technology comes from California State University, Channel Islands (CSUCI). Matthew Cook, head of CSUCI's Unique Collections, approved the project and will oversee the work of turning thousands of newspaper pages into an online archive. "This is timely and significant," Cook said. "Leisure Village is an important part of Camarillo, Ventura County and the Central Coast. This material will be used by our students, the public, historians and researchers." Not to mention Village residents eager to revisit people and moments from our past found in more than 375 issues.

It was former LV Board President Bob McQuivey who first worried out loud about



# Demand is up — and prices are rising — for LV homes

As the old saying goes: What goes up must come down. And, in the investment world, the reverse is often true. Eventually an equilibrium is reached and prices stabilize. That is true in the stock market as well as the real estate market. When the number of buyers equals the number of sellers, the equilibrium is reached. If buyers outnumber sellers, prices tend to rise and, generally, continue to rise until the market is out of balance once again.

The Southland real estate market in general, and Leisure Village in particular, has reached the equilibrium of a bottom and prices have begun to rise as the number of those interested in buying exceeds those interested in selling.

Consider that in the last half of 2012, 33 LV units closed escrow according to Realtor.com, the official website of the National Association of Realtors.

Multiple cash offers are not unheard of, with properties selling for well above asking prices.

In January of 2012, there were 29 active listings in Leisure Village. As of the day this article was written, six units were in escrow and only seven were actively listed for sale.

As you would expect, the time-tocontract has decreased dramatically.

As Realtor Dave Barlow noted, "When a home is priced close to the last sold comparisons, it is under contract in less than 30 days.

Normally homes were on the market 60 to 90 days this time of year."

And Realtor Sharron Parker added, "Multiple cash offers are not unheard of, with properties selling for well above asking prices."

The last time Leisure Village saw this level of real estate activity was 2005. While it is too soon to know what 2013 will bring, consider the following:

To a large extent, interest in Leisure Village homes is tied to activity in the general housing market. That is, most people need to sell their home before moving here.

The January 2013 monthly survey of real estate agents in the Los Angeles area conducted by Credit Suisse reported that the number of potential buyers far exceeded the available inventory. Further, the report concluded, "There are few signs of inventory increasing fast enough to match current demand levels, ... which will likely drive prices even higher this spring."

Couple that with the pent-

up demand caused by uncertain economic times, the growing number of baby boomers reaching retirement age and historically low mortgage rates, and it is easy to understand what is happening. That upward pressure on prices (and similarly on rents) is manifesting itself in multiple offers and over-asking bids.

The dual-edged sword of Leisure Village: It is a great place to live and many want to come here; it is a great place to live, and few want to leave.

A last note: ILV recently featured several homes that were solar-energy powered. One of those homes recently went into escrow. While Realtor Sharron Parker, representing the buyers, indicated that the home sold for a good price, the fact that it was solar-powered did not influence the bid. The price reflected the general market conditions as outlined in this story. As Dave Barlow put it, "This (solar) is not an item in high demand in our area."


Future workshops will cover how to take more powerful pictures, how to crop your pictures, composition and some easy Photoshop tricks that can enhance your picture.

# Sealing the end of the deal

Homes are selling very quickly, and it's helpful to know what to expect once the buyer and seller have an accepted offer.

The purchase agreement paperwork and the buyer's good faith deposit are delivered to the selected escrow company. Escrow assigns an escrow number, and then escrow papers, title report, natural hazard zone disclosure, homeowner association paperwork and other forms are sent to buyers and sellers by the escrow company.

The seller's agent will order a termite inspection, which will be sent to the buyer for acceptance. In our area, the seller typically pays for the pest control (termite) correction.

The buyer will hire an inspection company at the buyer's expense to perform a physical inspection on the property. Based on the report, the buyer's agent will assist the buyer in creating a Request for Repair. These items are considered negotiable, and the seller will then determine which items will be corrected or if a credit in lieu of correction will be offered. This, along with a buyer's loan contingency, will need to be completed in order to move the process forward.

The Leisure Village Association will also inspect the exterior of the house and will send a request for correction, missing permits, etc., to the seller's agent. This must be completed with a re-inspection before the new buyer can have occupancy of the home.

Your Realtor will be guiding you through this to make it as effortless as possible with the intention of a smooth escrow closing.





generously welcomed the suggestion.

The university is donating its expertise and services to this project.

The actual digitizing takes about five hours per issue, according to Cook. The first step is to photograph each page separately to create a digital image of the page. Computer software then applies Optical Character Recognition (OCR to 21st century techies) to the image to identify the letters, numbers and symbols that make up the newspaper's content. This means that all of the text - including names, clubs and events - will be searchable so that online readers can find mention of the 1979 Pumpkin Festival or 2012 golfer John Wirtz with a quick Google search.

"CSUCI is a new school. We don't have vast archives yet. That's

why we're eager to partner in this relevant project," explains Cook. "More and more people are moving into retirement communities as baby boomers retire. Our students will apply the lens of sociologist, historian, urban planner or public health official as they study the Leisure Village phenomenon. The ILV archives will be useful and easy for anyone to access."

From now on, the Ventura County Star, which prints ILV, will send pages directly to CSUCI so the archives will continue to grow.

One copy of each month's Inside Leisure Village has also been saved in a plastic bag and stowed away in the Annex by Marilyn Holthouse, the Village historian. That collection will be moved from its less-thanideal locker to safer, temperaturecontrolled storage at CSUCI.

Matt Cook assures us that any LV resident can visit the issues at the Broome Library on campus.

# Village needs new volunteers

estimates between 600 to 700 residents volunteer (volunteers need not be homeowners) to serve on various committees and as members of some 60 clubs. That's in excess of 20 percent of our population, and might be as high as 25 percent depending on how many are members of multiple organizations.

While we have that enviable participation, there seems to be some early warning signs that newcomers may not have the same enthusiasm for joining some clubs or volunteering for leadership in clubs and committees. Unlike their predecessors, younger arrivals may want to enjoy the amenities but pass on taking on some of the responsibilities of running the organizations.

This can lead to problems because it seems to be happening as more and more old-timers are just burning out. Some clubs, for example, are coming up short of newcomers who appreciate the need for leaders, especially those who can bring new ideas and different objectives to old organizations.

Commenting on this, former Board President Bob McQuivey said it reminds him of an old saying from the days when he was a Fish & Wildlife ranger in Nevada: "Ten percent of the fishermen catch 90 percent of the fish — in this case, 10 percent of the members do 90 percent of the work.'

Some cases in point:

• The Boosters Club needs some new members who have new ideas and the energy to help improve the Village's appearance.

• Showtyme, while enjoying great success in appealing to big audiences - drawing hundreds to its productions — has difficulty forming a cadre of leaders who will continue the work needed to carry the group into the future.

• The Players Guild, too, has a great track record, attracting big audiences, but it needs more Indians, men and women who want to be up on the stage and behind the curtains - which, by the way, is a great place for those newcomers who say they don't know how to meet others.

The head of Showtyme, Phil Kamen, who is responsible for producing nine shows a year, is 90 years old and is tired. He plans to step down from leadership this year. And David Harris, who arranged the three major entertainment presentations each year, has moved out of the Village. Fortunately, a newcomer (a resident for less than two years), Diann Carroll, with the help of Lois O'Conner, has taken over from Harris, but more, younger volunteers are needed.

Much of the same is true for our committees. Operating as an extension of the Board of Directors, the various committees always need new members, especially those who will volunteer for leadership roles. as chairs, secretaries and subcommittee officers.

As somebody who more or less lived according to that bad advice I got so many years ago in the Army. I am thankful that sooner, rather than later, I discovered the barracks lawyers were wrong — when others step back, step up, volunteer.
