



HEAD COACH





After two years as a Titan player and three stints as an assistant coach at Cal State Fullerton, Donny Daniels qualifies as an expert on the CSF basketball program. He is confident he can "get the job done" as the new head coach at his alma mater.

"It's a do-able situation. There have been some bumps in the road, but there hasn't been an earthquake," he said when finally hired on Apr. 20 for a job he has long sought.

"I was turned down nine years ago and again six years ago. If I was turned down a third time, I would have gone after it again. I just figured I would have to out-live them. There is nothing about this job that discourages me. I know the ins and outs of Fullerton and I know Southern California, and that's where I've recruited a lot for Utah."

Daniels signed a four-year contract and hit the campus and the recruiting trail with his feet flying, his wheels turning and his cell phone buzzing. After 11 seasons as an assistant to Rick Majerus at Utah, he had come home... but for only a few hours at a time. In a whirlwind three weeks he brought in seven new players despite lingering NCAA sanctions to begin the process of restoring the Titan program to its levels of previous decades.

Daniels, 46, played on Fullerton's first two Div. I teams in 1974-75 and



1975-76 under Coach Bobby Dye. In his senior year he was selected the top defender on a team that won the school's only conference basketball championship by earning a share of the 1976 Pacific Coast Athletic Association title.

He graduated in 1977 with a degree in criminal justice and returned as a volunteer assistant coach under Dye for the 1978-79 season. He was a paid assistant in Dye's final season (1979-80) before becoming an assistant at his high school alma mater, Verbum Dei, in Los Angeles. Daniels returned again as a part-time assistant coach under George McQuarn for the 1981-82 through 1983-84 seasons before becoming head coach at Los Angeles Harbor College in Wilmington (another alma mater) for two years (32-27 record). His third return to Fullerton came as a fulltime assistant to first McQuarn and then successor John Sneed for the 1986-87 through 1988-89 seasons.

During Daniels' tenure in Utah, the Utes reached the NCAA Tournament eight times in 11 seasons and were national runnersup in 1998. The parents of recent Utah star guard Andre Miller made a special trip to attend his Titan hiring press conference and he was the chief recruiter to Salt Lake City of current New Jersey Nets star Keith Van Horn.

"Donny has been an integral part of an established, successful program at the highest level of intercollegiate basketball," said Director of Athletics John Easterbrook. "The fact he is a former Titan player and coach is a bonus. He's an exciting match for the job."

McQuarn resigned before Ceballos donned a Titan uniform, but Daniels remained as an assistant and helped Cedric develop into a second-round NBA draft selection in 1990.

"I've walked the halls as a student and I've played in the gym, and I consider this a great opportunity," said Daniels. "The University showed that it was making a commitment to the program with the length of the contract."

The Titans have not had a winning season since they went 15-12 in Coach Brad Holland's initial season in 1992-93. They have not qualified for the NCAA tournament since gaining the Elite Eight in 1978, but made NIT appearances in 1983 and 1987 during Daniels' tenures. His full-time coaching tenures at Fullerton also coincide with the recruitment and/or development of former Titan greats Leon Wood and Cedric Ceballos.

Daniels increases to six the number of head coaches on the current Cal State Fullerton staff who are former Titan student-athletes. He joins wrestling Coach Ardeshir Asgari, cross country and track and field Coach John Elders, softball Coach Michelle Gromacki, baseball Coach George Horton and women's gymnastics Coach Julie Knight.

"It's an honor to be a part of this coaching staff," added Daniels. "As a Titan graduate and former player and assistant coach, there can be no one more motivated than I to see this athletics department enjoy success.

"One thing I really want is for our players to graduate at Fullerton. I'll do everything I can to help them take advantage of the resources that are available."

Daniels was born on Aug. 3, 1954, in New Orleans, Louisiana. He has three children – Eric (16), Kalynn (14) and Sarah (10).

ASSISTANT COACHES





Coach Jason Levy (1st year, Cal State Northridge, 1993)

Jason Levy brings a wealth of basketball experience to Donny Daniels' first Titan coaching staff. The 32-year-old native of New York City has worked on the West Coast, in the Midwest and on the East Coast in a variety of coaching positions.

Levy spent the past three seasons as an assistant at the University of Portland of the West Coast

Conference. He has three years of experience in the Big West Conference with two seasons (1994-95 and 1995-96) at Long Beach State under Seth Greenberg and one (1996-97) at UC

Irvine under Rod Baker. The 49ers went to the NCAA Tournament in 1994.

At Portland, Levy coordinated recruiting efforts for the Pilots while assisting in practice and game preparation. On the floor he worked primarily with post players and he also assisted with the strength and conditioning program.

Levy played high school ball for La Salle Academy in Manhattan before venturing west and playing two seasons at Cuesta College in San Luis Obispo. He transferred to Cal State Northridge, where he graduated in 1993. He served one season (1993-94) as an assistant to Rudy Washington at Drake in Des Moines, Iowa, before moving to Long Beach State. He began his coaching career at the Double Pump Camp at Cal State Dominguez Hills in 1992-93.

Coach Rob Orellana (1st year, Regents College, 1987)

Rob Orellana brings a varied basketball background with a dash of international flavor to Donny Daniels' first Titan coaching staff.

Orellana, 34, spent the past two seasons at Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, New Jersey, where he helped recruit seven foreign players to the squad from such varied outposts as Cameroon, Ivory Coast, France and Iceland.

He also has head coaching experience in Venezuela (Trotamundos Basketball Club in Valencia in 1995-96) and Spain (Gran Canaria Club in the Canary Islands in 1994-95).

Prior to his stint at Fairleigh Dickinson, Orellana worked

two seasons as an assistant at St. Francis College in Brooklyn. He also has three years of Big West Conference coaching experience, serving from 1991-92 thru 1993-94 at UC Irvine for Coach Rod Baker.

Orellana's coaching career began with two years as an assistant at Pius X High School in Downey, his alma mater. He moved to Westchester High School for two seasons before launching his collegiate career as a student assistant at UNLV for three years including the 1990 NCAA championship season. He returned to Pius X as head coach for the 1990-91 season and the Warriors won the Camino Real League championship and advanced to the CIF semifinals. The team's 17-8 record earned him Southern California Coach of the Year honors.

Orellana is a 1987 graduate of Regents College in Albany, New York.



Coach Mark Maki (1st year, Wyoming, 1997)

Mark Maki is a young but welltraveled and diversely trained young man who brings a lot of enthusiasm and dedication to the Titans' third assistant coaching position under new head man Donny Daniels.

Maki, 26, coached last year in Teaneck, New Jersey, at Fairleigh Dickinson University along with Rob Orellana, who was hired a few

months earlier as one of Daniels' lead assistants. The team went 17-11 overall and was 13-5 to gain second place in the Northeast Conference. Maki also has coached at Notre Dame Prep School in Fitchburg, Massachusetts, and Penn State New Kensington after serving as a student assistant for four years at his alma

mater, the University of Wyoming. He has been involved with basketball internationally and in every state of the union with the exception of Alaska.

At FDU, Maki conducted the off-season physical training program and assisted in the overall planning, organization and coaching of the team. He recruited, scouted, handled video coordination and aided in academic monitoring.

At Notre Dame Prep, he was an integral part of the staff of one the elite prep programs in the country, one that placed 13 players at Division I schools during his one-year (1998-99) tenure. There he learned the other side of the academic picture by coordinating players' NCAA eligibility status including monitoring SAT and ACT scores and core course work. He was at Penn State New Kensington for the 1997-98 season and performed all general coaching responsibilities.

Maki graduated from Wyoming in 1997.



Rodney Anderson's freshman season was cut short by a random street shooting that has left him paralyzed from the chest down... He was shot three times in the back and neck in the early evening on Mar. 2, 2000, near his Los Angeles home where he had gone



for dinner... A suspect, a known gang member, was charged with the crime in early October... Rodney was hospitalized for a couple of months and is taking continuous physical therapy... At press time, he was hopeful of returning to classes at Cal State Fullerton for the Spring semester in February... A fund to defray his medical expenses has been established by the University's Advancement Department and gate receipts from the Nov. 8 game with Simon Fraser will go to that fund... Contributions to the Rodney Anderson Assistance Fund may be sent to University Advancement, 2600 E. Nutwood Ave., Suite 850, Fullerton, CA 92831... Rodney played in 24 games and started one (at Saint Mary's on Nov. 30)... He averaged 3.4 points and 1.4 rebounds... He scored a

high of 9 points vs. Patten on Dec. 21 and had a high of 3 rebounds on three occasions.

WASHINGTON HIGH SCHOOL: Two-year varsity letterman at George Washington Prep in Los Angeles for Coach Andy Davis... Played point guard, off guard and small forward during his prep career... Averaged 13 points, 5 rebounds and 4 assists as a senior... Also played two seasons of varsity baseball as a centerfielder.





PERSONAL: Born on Sept. 9, 1981 in Los Angeles... Parents are Joseph and Martha Anderson... Has one older brother (Joseph) and three older sisters (Glenda, Thressa and Demetrius)... Human services major... Credits Coach Davis for making him believe he could go somewhere with his basketball career... Most memorable sports thrill was making game-winning shot for a youth league championship.



Ike Harmon made a phenomenal effort in the classroom during calendar year 2000 to extend his collegiate playing career into the 2000-01 season... Taking advantage of Spring, 2000, NCAA legislation, he passed 42 units between January and Aug. 18 --3 in January intersession, 18 in Spring and 21 in Summer Sessions -- to earn a bachelor's degree in criminal justice, thus earning

back the year of eligibility he lost in 1996-97 as a non-qualifying incoming freshman... One of only a handful of players in the nation to accomplish the feat... He is now enrolled in a program towards a second bachelor's degree in kinesiology and health promotion... Will probably have slow start due to concentration on academics in summer and stress fracture in his left foot (fifth metatarsal) which sidelined him on Oct. 18... He has won All-Big West Conference honors in each of his three previous seasons (honorable mention, first team and second team, in order)... A crowd-pleasing leaper and dunker who also brings smiles to the Titan coaches with his

contributions to team effort... Forced to play inside much of his career, he is expected to see more time on the perimeter under new Coach Donny Daniels... Harmon ranks No. 7 on the Titans' all-time scoring list with 1,311 points and trails record holder Leon Wood (1,876) by 565 points... He has 542 career rebounds to also rank No. 7 but has only half as many as CSF leader and Big West record holder Tony Neal (1,115)... Ranks No. 4 with 76 blocked shots behind leader Neal with 115.

CSF IN 1999-2000: Led the Titans for the second season in a row in scoring and rebounding at 18.7 points and 7.5 rebounds per game... Selected to the All-Big West Conference second team... Played in all 27 games, starting 26 of them... Scored in double figures in all but two games with a high of 32 at North

Texas... Twice had 29 points (vs. LMU and at Long Beach State) and scored 28 in each of the final two games... Had a career-high 14 rebounds at UC Irvine on Jan. 26... SEASON PREVIEW

New. You can't talk about Cal State Fullerton basketball in 2000-01 without using the word, over and over. New coaches. New players. New conference alignment. New non-conference opponents. And a new start.

"That's the biggest plus," says new Head Coach Donny Daniels. "We are all new so it'll be a new start for everyone. No one can be held accountable for the last three or four years. These guys and our staff can make this season as good as we want it to be. That doesn't necessarily mean in wins and losses, but in putting forth the effort on a consistent basis. We need to play the game one possession at a time."

Did we mention new enthusiasm? The hiring of Daniels, a popular former Titan player and assistant coach who spent the last 11 seasons working for Rick Majerus at Utah, is seen as a harbinger of a return to the Titans' early Div. I successes. Fullerton stunned collegiate basketball by advancing within a basket of the Final Four in 1978 in only its fourth season at that level. Fullerton produced All-American point guard and Olympian Leon Wood and Fullerton still is represented in the National Basketball Association by Cedric Ceballos and Bruce Bowen. Daniels had a hand in much of that under Coaches Bobby Dye and George McQuarn.

The downside of new is unfamiliarity and uncertainty.

"Our biggest obstacle is getting everyone on the same page as early in the season as possible," said Daniels. "We've got to get our system across and make the players feel comfortable with it."

Daniels inherited a slim returning roster when hired on Apr. 20 as well as remaining NCAA recruiting sanctions that date to 1993 infractions. The quick fix of recruiting junior college players was prohibited. Still, he managed to attract two walk-on JC players and signed five incoming freshmen and one foreign player who form the nucleus of the future of his new program.

"I'm very pleased with the guys we signed," said Daniels. "Not so much for the immediate future, but down the road. The next two recruiting classes will be very important, but we have to establish a foundation now and I think we were able to address the backcourt situation and add three players for depth on the front line."

Only four lettermen return from last year's 8-19 team that lost its final 11 games. Forward Ike Harmon (6-foot-7), the team's leading scorer and rebounder the past two seasons, took advantage of NCAA legislation passed in Spring to regain his lost freshman year by taking 21 summer units and graduating in August. Junior forward Brandon Campbell (6-4) is a two-year starter and senior Matt Caldwell (6-8) and junior Josh Fischer (6-9) have been regulars on the front line, but both have been foul and injury prone. Other holdovers are redshirt Daniel Kohn (6-8) from UMass-Lowell, center Mitch Deve' (7-0) and guard Josh Pierson (6-0).

"Some coaches in my situation might say they'll be fine when they get their own players," said Daniels. "I don't believe in that. These returning players ARE my players.

"Off the films, my favorite player from last year was Caldwell, because of the effort he gave on every possession. He has to play smarter on defense and keep his enthusiasm and emotions under control. If he does that, he will be able to stay in games longer and be one of the better frontline players in the conference."

Caldwell averaged 12.7 points and 4.3 rebounds in 7 games before undergoing shoulder surgery. The previous year he averaged 9.8 points and 5.0 rebounds. Harmon has averaged 16.6 points and 6.9 rebounds for his career while Fischer posted numbers of 8.3 points and 5.0 rebounds last season before missing the final week with a broken hand. But all the guards are gone with

Kenroy Jarrett and Mark Murphy exhausting their eligibility and Rodney Anderson remains paralyzed after a random street shooting last March.

The all new backcourt will consist of true freshmen Chris Smith (5-9) from Pacific High in San Bernardino and Ryan Dillon (6-2) from Victor Valley HS and, at the end of the Fall semester, Orange Coast College transfer David Castleton (6-2). Rancho Cucamonga guard Derick Andrew (6-2) also signed with the Titans but will not be eligible until the 2001-02 season.

"Castleton is a great outside shooter who had great success at Orange Coast (led Orange Empire Conference in scoring at 22.6 ppg)," said Daniels. "He also played football, and that hurt his basketball development. When he focuses on just basketball, he will be a better player.

"Dillon is a 3-point shooter and a very good passer and ball handler. He should adapt to our motion offense quite easily. Smith is very quick and strong and should be a very good transition player. He had a great deal of success in high school and I think his determination and how hard he plays are a big part of his success."

A new wing player is Treasure Valley JC transfer Kevin Richardson (6-5) -- "he's a good shooter and good athlete who will be one of our better players if he gives supreme effort on a consistent basis" -- and the prized 6-foot-7 building blocks inside are products of highly successful Southern California high school programs - Keith Brooks from Dominguez in Compton and Joe Travis from Long Beach Poly.

"They are kind of bookends," says Danels of the latter pair. "Both have wide bodies and will give us a physical presence at both the '4' and '5' positions. Keith was out there late and we were in the right place at the right time. Joe has the ability to play 17 feet from the basket or with his back to the basket. He lost weight this summer and, with dedication, he will have a very favorable freshman season."

A "wild card" addition is 6-foot-11 center Babacar Camara from Senegal in West Africa. He attended Cheickantadiop University in native Dakar but it did not have a basketball team. He is a sophomore with three years of eligibility or four if he graduates in 2003.

Daniels plans to bring a physical brand of basketball back to Titan Gym. Transitional defense will be a priority, as will improving the team's minus-six rebounding margin and .457 field goal defense percentage.

Fullerton has had only one winning season -- 15-12 in 1992-93 -- since Assistant Coach Daniels left for Utah. It's unrealistic to expect an immediate turnaround.

"The schedule is very difficult," said Daniels. "Pepperdine, Northern Arizona and Valparaiso were NCAA Tournament teams and Wyoming is a very difficult team to play. I saw them beat Utah by 28 points last year. Oregon State has the best California JC player in Phil Ricci from Delta. Coach Dave Bliss will have one of the better teams in the country at Baylor."

Defending champion Utah State likely will be the favorite in the re-aligned Big West Conference, which will play a new full home-and-home 16-game schedule with the departure of New Mexico State, Nevada and North Texas. Fullerton's goal will be to qualify for the revamped Big West post-season tournament. It's back in a familiar venue, the Anaheim Convention Center, where it was held from 1977 through 1982.

(OK, so not everything is new).

PRESS/PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only. Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. "Visiting" media may make their requests through their respective "home" SIDs. Photo credentials must be worn in plain sight at all times. Photographers may shoot only from the designated areas behind both baselines.

PARKING: Parking is available by:

BIG WEST CONFERENCE In Its 32nd Season – 1969–2001

This season will be the thirty-second year in which the Big West Conference sponsors the sport of men's basketball. Also this season, the Big West will celebrate the 26th anniversary of its postseason tournament. During the past thirty-one years, six of the nine current members have claimed or shared a regular season title. Four current members have won the tournament title led by Long Beach State and Utah State's three titles apiece.

The Big West has been home to one NCAA National Championship (UNLV in 1990) and one NIT crown (Fresno State in 1983). The conference has also had a team

represented in the NCAA Tournament every year of its 31-year existence. Nine times the conference has had multiple representatives. Last year, three Big West teams reached postseason play (Utah State to the NCAA and Long Beach State and former member New Mexico State to the NIT).

While Big West programs have had team success on a national level, some marquee players have played in the conference. In 1998, the number one pick in the NBA Draft came out of the Big West in Michael Olowokandi from Pacific. Other current NBA stars that hailed from the Big West are Larry Johnson, Cedric Ceballos, Bryon Russell, Stacey Augmon and J.R. Rider.



Ike Harmon has won All-Big West honors three times -- honorable mention in 1997-98, first-team in 1998-99 and second team in 1999-2000.

BIG WEST EXPERIENCES POSTSEASON SUCCESS ONCE AGAIN IN 1999–2000 Two Final Four Appearances In Women's Volleyball Accentuates Season



The 1999-2000 season was the thirty-first for the Big West Conference and marked the end of the league's 12-team configuration. Success began in the fall as the conference continued its domination on the volleyball court, sending two teams, Long Beach State and Pacific, to the NCAA Final Four for the first time in league history. In football, Boise State beat Louisville, 34-31, in the Crucial.com Humanitarian Bowl and Nevada's Trevor Insley became the NCAA's career reception and yardage leader, the first wideout to amass over 5,000 receiving yards.

The winter sports season saw Limin Liu defend her 200 Fly title at the NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships while lowering her record time. Liu also won the 100 Fly crown. Utah State made headlines in men's basketball, winning 19 consecutive games on its way to the Big West title and a berth in the NCAA Tournament. In women's basketball, UCSB won the title for the fourth straight year and ran their conference winning streak to 51 games. Long Beach State also had a successful season by reaching the championship game of the Big West tourney and the quarterfinals of the Women's NIT.

The spring season for the Big West has a history of crowning champions and this past year

was no different. Idaho's Joachim Olsen took home the crown in the men's shot put at the NCAA Track

Matt Caldwell missed most of last season due to January shoulder surgery.

and Field Championships with the nation's second-best throw of the year. Cal Poly's Kaaron Conwright also had success at the national meet with a third place finish in the men's 100 Meters. Two weeks earlier, Conwright defended his Big West crown in the event and set a new conference record. In golf, Idaho was the surprise of the year, coming from behind to claim the men's title in a playoff.

In all, 50 teams and 27 individuals advanced to postseason play this past season and 20 athletes earned All-America honors.

IMPORTANT DATES IN BIG WEST HISTORY

July 1, 1969 - The desire to form a Division I football conference sparks the formation of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association (PCAA) with seven charter members: Fresno State, Long Beach State, San Jose State, UC Santa Barbara, Pacific, Cal State Los Angeles and San Diego State. The conference sponsors 11 men's sports: baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, gymnastics, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field, water polo and wrestling. J. Kenneth Fagans is named commissioner on a part-time basis.

November 25, 1979 - UC Santa Barbara claims the NCAA Water Polo Championship with an 11-3 win over UCLA. It is the first NCAA title won by a PCAA men's member in a PCAA sport.

December 22, 1985 - Pacific wins the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship - the first national title for a PCAA women's member. The Tigers defeat Stanford in three out of four games to capture the title.

July 1, 1988 - The conference changes its name from "PCAA" to "Big West Conference."

April 2, 1990 - UNLV wins the NCAA Men's Basketball Championship, defeating Duke by the record-breaking score of 103-73. It is the first men's basketball title for the Big West.

December 19, 1998 - Long Beach State captures the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship with a 3-2 victory over Penn State. The 49ers become the first undefeated team (36-0) in NCAA volleyball history. It is also the sixth women's volleyball title won by a conference member.

June 14, 1999 - Long Beach State's Misty May is awarded the Honda Broderick Cup, given to the top collegiate woman athlete of the year. May is the first Big West athlete to be honored.

February 9, 2000 - Cal St. Northridge and UC Riverside are formally invited to join the Big West beginning with the 2001-2002 season. The Big West also announces that the men's and women's basketball tournament will be moved to the Anaheim Convention Center for three years beginning in 2001.



1999-2000 SEASON REVIEW

Locating the turning point of Cal State Fullerton's 1999-2000 basketball season would probably require the use of at least one "life line" if queried on ABC's popular "Who Wants to Be a Millionaire?"

A. - Apr. 29, 1999, the day the program was placed on NCAA probation.

B. - Sept. 7, 1999, the day heralded Switzerland product Patrick Ceresa was denied admittance to the university.

C. - Jan. 4, 2000, the day surgery was performed on Matt Caldwell's shoulder.

D.-Jan. 29, 2000, the day Kyle Crawford's buzzer-beating 3-pointer started the Titans on a season-ending 11-game losing streak.

Actually, a case could be made for "any of the above."

The studio audience would likely vote in the majority for "D". The Titans had the momentum from a home sweep of Boise State and Idaho and a road win at UC Irvine. They hit their first 10 shots of the game in Denton and held a 51-37 halftime advantage. North Texas rallied and took a late lead, but Mark Murphy drilled a 3-pointer for the Titans with 10 seconds remaining for an 82-81 lead. Crawford then answered with a trey for the Eagles with three tenths of a second remaining for an 84-82 win and that's as close as Fullerton would again come to a victory.

A friend who had his pulse on the recruiting wars would probably opt for answer "B". Ceresa was a talented, 6-foot-8 international star whom UCLA had tried to enroll the year before. But because he had attended the equivalent of a "trade" school instead of a college preparatory institution in Switzerland, Ceresa couldn't meet entrance requirements and the Titans were left with a large void in their front line.


A coin flip is the best way to choose between answers "A" and "C."

The NCAA placed the CSF program on probation for violations dating to the 1993-94 season. Among the penalties was a ban on preseason exhibitions, which left the Titans vulnerable to a confidence-rattling upset loss in the season opener in Burnaby, British Columbia,

Canada. Simon Fraser University, which already had five games under its belt, took advantage of the kinks in Fullerton's coming-out party to rally from a 11-point deficit for an 80-77 win.

In December, Caldwell's suspect right shoulder gave out and it was determined that surgery would be required, ending his season after only seven games. The Titans lost their most physical inside presence and almost everyone remaining had to play out of position the rest of the way.

Whatever the cause, it became a forgettable season. On Feb. 23, Head Coach Bob Hawking announced that he would resign at the end of the season, his sixth on the job. And on March 2, the entire situation was put into a different perspective when freshman guard Rodney Anderson was critically wounded in a random shooting outside his Los Angeles home. He was hit by three bullets and one struck his spinal cord, leaving him paralyzed. He plans to return to classes in Spring in a wheelchair.

For Rodney's sake as much as anyone, there were some highlights to recall. Despite an 0-4 start that included a narrow home loss to San Diego and a pair of lopsided losses at Montana State and Saint Mary's, the Titans regrouped in December. They beat Loyola Marymount to get into the victory column with Ike Harmon scoring 20 points in the first half and Kenroy Jarrett tallying 9 points in the final 2:01 to keep the Lions at bay.

They won their next three home games with relative ease -- holding San Jose State to 17 first-half points in a 68-44 win; restricting Patten College to 17 per cent shooting in the first half of a 99-56 rout and using a 7-point possession to spark a 15-0 run in a 98-83 win over Eastern Kentucky. They got to .500 at 5-5 with a road victory at San Diego State on Jan. 5 behind Brandon Campbell's career-high 20-point effort.

The absence of Caldwell began to show up in successive road defeats at University of San Diego and the Big West-opening trip to Utah State and Nevada. But then the Titans came back to Orange County, found some good fortune and won three games in a row.

A see-saw affair with Boise State came down to the wire. Jarrett's high-arching jumper with one-tenth of a second remaining avenged a loss at the buzzer to the Broncos the year before. A technical foul on Idaho Coach David Farrar keyed a 6-point Titan possession with about 5 minutes to play that put the Titans in control for their inaugural win over the Vandals in four tries, 82-74. Good things continued to happen in the Bren Center, where Fullerton won for the eighth time in nine seasons. Anteater guard Sean Jackson missed all eight of his shots from the floor and UCI, which entered the game ranked No. 3 in the nation with a .769 team free-throw percentage, hit only 9 of 20 foul shots.

After the ill-fated trip to Denton, a 6-game Titan Gym winning streak fell by the wayside in a 59-54 loss to Pacific, which got a career night (19 points, 11 rebounds) from reserve center Ross Mills. Long Beach State snapped a 3-year losing streak in Titan Gym by shooting 64 per cent from the floor in a 98-82 decision and the slide had begun.

Fullerton fell behind early, 13-1, and was never in a 28-point loss at UC Santa Barbara. They lost big at Cal Poly and then came home and lost two closer games to the same Gauchos and Mustangs. The Titans tied the game at 73 on Harmon's 3-pointer but The Clan got a dunk from Richard Anderson and two free throws by Jeff Antwi and they survived a desperation 3-pointer at the buzzer by Murphy.

Fullerton returned to familiar ground for its home opener against the University of San Diego, coached by former Titan head coach Brad Holland. It was the first of two meetings with the Toreros, who would host the Titans on Jan. 8 in a novel home-and-home series between non-conference foes.

The Titans got off to a good start at 7-2 but USD caught them at 11. The teams sparred back and forth with ties at 21-21 and 29-29 before USD used a 9-4 run over the final 4:15 to forge a narrow 40-39 halftime lead.

The nip and tuck affair continued after intermission until USD suddenly turned a 46-44 deficit at 15:54 into a 57-47 lead at 12:43 sparked by 8 points by Tom Lippold, who didn't even play in the first half. Fullerton got a lategame surge from Mark Murphy, who scored all 10 of his points in the final 6:09, and twice got within one point of the lead.

But Tyler Field scored a bucket with 36 seconds to go and then Cameron Rigby hit two free throws with 23 seconds left to twice build the lead back to 3 points. Murphy missed a 3-pointer and the Titans fumbled the rebound away with 5 seconds left and had to foul Andre Laws, who clinched the USD win by making a free throw with 4 seconds left.

It was hard to determine what was the most devastating thing to happen to the Titans on their first trip to Bozeman in more than 30 years.

Center Matt Caldwell suffered a sprained right ankle midway through the second half and was lost for a full week. Guard Kenroy Jarrett played despite a case of the flu that left him with a temperature of 102 degrees at game time. And Ike Harmon fouled out with 12:32 to play and the Titans trailing, 50-40 when he picked up his fourth foul.

Yes, fourth foul. A mistake by the official scorekeeper earlier in the half, couldn't or wouldn't be overturned by the game officials, who instead tagged Coach Bob Hawking with a technical foul for not making a substitution in the allotted 30 seconds.

The Titans never led after falling behind 4-0 and 21-9. With Harmon and Mark Murphy each hitting a pair of 3-point field goals, the Titans caught up at 30-30 at 4:16. But Harmon then picked up his third foul, joining Jarrett in that predicament, and the Bobcats scored the final 9 points of the half and the first 5 of the second half for a 44-30 lead that the Titans never seriously challenged.

The Titans got their first look at Brad Millard, the 7-foot-3, 345-pound Gaels' center. He was bigger and better than advertised and they had to face him without Matt Caldwell (injured) or a healthy Josh Fischer (flu).

Predictably, the Gaels overpowered the Titans inside but what they couldn't have hoped for was a sub-par offensive production from the veteran Titan trio of Ike Harmon, Mark Murphy and Kenroy Jarrett. A courageous effort by Matt Caldwell, a sensational first half by Ike Harmon and a clutch final two minutes by Kenroy Jarrett proved the key ingredients in the Titans' first win.

Despite no practice time, Caldwell made his first game appearance since spraining his right ankle one week earlier at Montana State and played 23 effective minutes.

Harmon had one of the best halves of his career. With the Lions trying to defend him with straight man-to-man alignments, he hit 8 of 12 shots from the floor and all four free throws for a 20-point half, as Fullerton opened up a 12-point lead.

But with LMU concentrating on Harmon in the second half, it was left for first Mark Murphy and then Jarrett to provide the points that prevented an LMU rally. Murphy hit a trey to open the half for a 15-point lead, the biggest of the game. And it was a Murphy layup that answered a Lions' charge that brought the margin down to 62-59 with 6:21 to play.

The combination of a deliberate San Jose offense and tenacious Cal State Fullerton defense enabled the Titans to hold an opponent to the lowest point total in more than a decade (New Mexico State 41 with a 41-37 win over Fullerton on Jan. 4, 1988.)

Under new coach Steve Barnes, the Spartans were averaging only 51 points during a 3-3 start. And with a scoreless stretch of more than 7 minutes in the first half, they managed only 17 points in the first 20 minutes to find themselves down by 16 points at intermission when Matt Caldwell made two free throws after the buzzer.

And they never got closer. With Kenroy Jarrett distributing the ball and the other four starters all in doubles figures, the Titans just gradually pulled away to lead by as many as 30 points at 63-33 with 3:30 to play.

Ben Sanders, a transfer from Fullerton JC who scored 20 against the Titans in a Spartan rout a year ago in San Jose, didn't get a basket until the final minute when San Jose State finally broke the 40-point barrier.

The series between the two schools is now tied at 24-24 with each team scoring their most lopsided victory in the past two seasons.

After a 10-day break for final exams, the Titans took the floor for the first time against Patten College, an NAIA school located in Oakland. With the visitors putting on a miserable shooting performance, the Titans were able to coast to a win and give the entire roster some experience.

After Fred Casby's 3-point play matched Brandon Campbell's game-opening 3-point field goal, the Lions went stone cold, missing 12 of their next 15 shots on their way to a 6-for-36 effort in the first half. As a result, they fell behind 18-6 after a 10-0 Fullerton run and 41-13 after an 11-0 Titan spurt that included a couple of spectacular alley oop plays to a highflying and dunking Ike Harmon.

For the game, the Lions shot only 25.3 per cent from the floor, the lowest by a Titan opponent since at least 1980-81, which is as far back as complete box score records exist. The 43-point margin of victory -- the Titans led by as many as 52 points -- was the largest since a 106-60 win over Brown on Dec. 30, 1987.

The Titans' final trip to Denton, at least in Big West Conference competition, provided a memorable contest but one that they would like to forget.

The game had almost everything -- phenomenal early shooting by the Titans, a sustained comeback by the Eagles, a last-minute rally by the Titans and then a last-second game-winning 3-point shot by Kyle Crawford.

Fullerton hits its first 10 shots from the floor in bolting to a 24-7 lead. When the Titans finally missed, the Eagles began a methodical rally. They cut the gap to 9 points at 37-28 before the Titans pulled away again and took a 51-37 lead at halftime as Ike Harmon hit a 3-pointer to beat the buzzer and leave CSF 20-for-31 from the floor.

Fullerton returned to Titan Gym, where it had won its last six games and hoped to break a second-place tie with Pacific. But in a game where the overall statistics were almost identical, the Tigers led almost wire-to-wire and survived a desperate Titan rally in the final two minutes.

The longest-standing rivalry in Titan basketball brought the biggest crowd of the season into Titan Gym and the intensity level was reflected in the efficient play of both teams. The visiting 49ers ran their winning streak to 14 in a row but not before a strong fight by the Titans.

When Ike Harmon staged a personal 9-0 run to cut the Long Beach State lead to 63-61 with 10:37 remaining, Coach Wayne Morgan called a timeout. A resulting 3-point play by James Williams and four free throws by Ron Johnson and Mate Milisa while Harmon and Josh Fischer were picking up fourth fouls opened a 70-61 gap and the Titans would never get closer than 7 points.

After consecutive road games at UC Irvine and North Texas where the Titans exploded to early leads of 11-0 and 24-7, CSF went the opposite direction at Santa Barbara. The Titans ran into a proverbial buzz saw in Mott Gymnasium, as Cal Poly exploded inside and outside to snap a 6-game losing streak and extend the Titans' loss skein to five in a row.

Fullerton got off to a much better start than at UCSB, holding a 12-9 lead after a Kenroy Jarrett 3-point play with 16:24 to go in the first half. But the Mustangs went on a 33-7 run over the next 9 minutes to take a 42-19 lead and the rest of the game was academic.

Chris Bjorklund and Jeremiah Mayes scored inside during the opening minutes and that opened up a shooting range from the 3-point line. Fullerton hoped to exact some quick revenge on UC Santa Barbara and Cal Poly when the Titans got their two recent conquerors back in Titan Gym. But the results proved not much different despite the home uniforms and the losing streak would climb to six and then seven in a row.

Fullerton again brought out the best in the Mustangs of Cal Poly. The visitors completed a season sweep of the Titans for the third year in a row with another display of marksmanship from all over the floor.

Although the Titans "held" Cal Poly to "only" 9-of-18 shooting from behind the 3-point line this time, the Mustangs held on to a 4-point victory by making their final 18 free throws. Cal Poly made its last field goal of the game with 4:17 remaining on David Henry's 3-pointer for a 71-61 lead.

But Mark Murphy sparked a Titan rally. His trey after a steal made it a 75-71 game with 1:58 to play. A Kenroy Jarrett 3-pointer made it 77-74 with 1:13 to go.

The season came to an end on a sad, eerie final night in Titan Gym.

The random shooting in Los Angeles two nights earlier of guard Rodney Anderson cast a pall over the Senior Night recognition for Mark Murphy and Kenroy Jarrett (Ike Harmon declined, hopeful of regaining a year of eligibility by graduating in August). During pre-game introductions, Harmon held Anderson's jersey No. 4 aloft and each of the starters gave it a tap as he was introduced. The jersey was then placed over an empty chair on the bench.

Inspired but emotionally spent after several hospital visits, the Titans gave it an effort -- "40 minutes for No. was their motto. But there was little they could do to contend with a New Mexico State team that quickly found a hot hand from the perimeter. Billy Keys hit a 3-pointer on the game's first possession and the Aggies would hit 6-of-8 treys in the first half including 4-for-4 by Keys. The Aggies jumped to a 19-9 lead and they would have a double digit advantage for the rest of the ball game.

Harmon turned in another strong performance, possibly his last in a Ti-

TANS IN THE N.B.A.

Cal State Fullerton has been well represented at the professional level despite the relative youth of the intercollegiate basketball program. Seven Titans have been drafted in the past



After two seasons with the Celtics Bruce Bowen was traded to Philadelphia and now is with Miami.

18 years and several more players have signed as free agents with the National Basketball Association.

The most prominent Titan of late has been forward Cedric Ceballos. He became one of the league's top scorers for the Los Angeles Lakers and made the NBA All-Starteam for 1994-95, but was unable to play due to an injury. He twice has been with Phoenix and the Dallas Mavericks and begins the 2000-01 season with the Detroit Pistons.

During four years with the Suns, he was known primarily for two things: winning the NBA

slam-dunk contest in 1992 with his blind-folded "hocus pocus" act and scoring a phenomenal number of points when Charles

Barkley was injured. Ceballos' absence due to another injury may have swung the tide toward the Chicago Bulls in the 1994 playoffs.

A Fullerton teammate of Ceballos' forward Bruce Bowen -- was a pleasant free agent surprise during the 1997-98 season for Coach Rick Pitino and the Boston Celtics, starting nine times in 61 appearances and averaging 5.6 points and 2.9 rebounds while playing several positions. He had played briefly in 1996-97 with the Miami Heat for Coach Pat Riley after two productive and profitable seasons in France. In Evreux, France, he averaged more than 29 points per game. Last Fall he signed with the Philadelphia 76ers, appearing in 42

games, before he was traded to Chicago only to end up back with Riley in Miami for 27 games plus 10 playoff contests.

The Titans hit it big in 1984 when two players made NBA rosters -- guard Leon Wood with Philadelphia and center Ozell Jones with San Antonio. Wood completed a 6-year NBA career with Sacramento on Christmas Eve, 1990. He played last in the CBA and in France and toured with Magic Johnson's All-Stars. He has spent the last four seasons as an NBA referee, only the second former NBA player to make that transition. Wood began his post-Titan career as the point guard on the United States' gold-medal 1984 Olympic team under Coach Bob Knight.

Other former Titans in and out of the NBA and CBA during the past few years were 1988 graduates Richard Morton and Henry Turner. Morton started the 1988-89 season with Indiana and later played with Golden State. Turner, who was a teammate of Morton's in the CBA, spent much of the 1989-90 season with Sacramento. Morton was one of the top scorers in the CBA in recent seasons and has made the loop's all-star team.

Guard Aaron Sunderland, a 1993 product, has done well in the CBA and 1994-95 products Winston Peterson and David Frigout are play-

ing in Europe. J. D. Green (1990-92) has become a star in Australia and former center Dirk Rassloff was summoned last summer to join a team in Milan, Italy.

Other Titans to play in the NBA include guard Kevin Henderson, who played with Golden State and Cleveland; forward Mike Niles with Phoenix; and forward Greg Bunch with the New York Knicks. Foreign leagues have featured center Herman (Demone) Webster, forward Kerry Boagni and sharpshooter Kevin Heenan to name a few. Other players drafted in the 1980s were Ricky Mixon (Lakers), Tony Neal

(Lakers) and Boagni (Utah Jazz).

Sean Williams has gained fame first as an actor ("Blue Chips") and recently as a member of the Harlem Globetrotters. for whom he gained the Guinness Book World of Records by dunking on a basket 11 feet. 8 inches off the floor.





Dr. Milton Gordon University President

Dr. Milton A. Gordon was selected the fourth president of Cal State Fullerton by The California State University Board of Trustees and assumed his duties on Aug. 6, 1990.

His university leadership includes serving as vice president for academic affairs at Sonoma State University for four years, as dean of the College of the Arts and Sciences for Chicago State University for more than eight years and as director of the Afro-American Studies Program at Loyola University of Chicago for six years.

President Gordon also taught at the Illinois Institute of Technology and in the Chicago public schools and served as mathematician at the University of Chicago's Laboratories of Applied Sciences

He is the vice chairman of the NCAA Presidents Commission and the California state representative to the American Association of State Colleges and Universities. John Easterbrook **Athletics Director**

John Easterbrook is in his seventh year in charge of the Cal State Fullerton athletics department, which has seen continued and easily measured success during his first six years of leadership. The Titans have annually come out in the black budgetarily and on-campus facilities have been dramatically improved. Four teams have reached NCAA quarterfinals during his tenure topped by the 1995 national championship baseball team.

Easterbrook was appointed on Sept. 1, 1994, by President Milton Gordon. He

was chosen from a field of 41 candidates on the strength of his experience at a successful Division I program and his familiarity with the California State University system as an associate athletic director for nine years at Fresno State. Easterbrook, 61, was involved primarily in compliance, facilities and event management at Fresno State, which annually draws more than 500,000 fans.

Easterbrook was hired at Fresno State by Dr. Gary Cunningham. The pair had crossed paths at the University of Wyoming in Laramie where Easterbrook was the president and CEO of American National Bank and Cunningham was the UW athletic director.

Easterbrook previously coached college football for 13 seasons at Idaho, Oregon State, Illinois and Wyoming. He was a threeyear starter at quarterback and also played two seasons of basketball at Illinois. He was the Most Valuable Player of the Copper Bowl. He earned a bachelor's degree (1962) in commerce and law and attended the University of Illinois Law School.

The Champaign, Illinois, native and his wife, Cynthia, have three adult children, four granddaughters and one grandson.

Dr. Jeremiah is primarily responsible for overseeing athletic department academics, assisting with departmental planning and financial forecasting and supervising volleyball, gymnastics, wrestling, women's basketball and softball.

She is a member of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee and will chair the committee for the next two

years. Additionally, she is a member of the Big West Conference Athletics Council and serves on Cal State Fullerton's Academic Senate executive committee and university planning committee .

In her seven years as the Titan's women's basketball coach, Jeremiah compiled a 112-93 record and in 1990-91, she guided the team to a 25-9 season (most wins in school history) and the second-round of the NCAA Tournament. Following the season, Jeremiah was recognized with both District 8 and Big West coachof-the-year honors.

She also was the recipient of the Carol Eckman Award, given by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association to the coach who best represents sportsmanship and ethics in the coaching profession. Jeremiah finished her 23-year coaching career with a 375-



TITAN ATHLETICS...A PROUD HISTORY

From modest beginnings and never with abundant resources, the Cal State Fullerton Titans have achieved successes that are the envy of many older and larger institutions across the country.

"Titan Pride" has been the rallying cry for 11 national team championships in seven different sports, hundreds of individual All-Americans, dozens of eventual professional athletes, numerous national coach of the year award winners, Olympic basketball players, a Miss America candidate and the subject matter of a Walt Disney film.

The tenor was set by the first intercollegiate team - men's basketball. In only his second season, Coach Alex Omalev advanced the Titans five rounds into the NAIA playoffs in 1961-62. Sixteen seasons later, the nation watched another "Cinderella" Titan Five advance to within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association postseason tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the NCAA Western Regional.

The basketball tradition began even stronger on the women's side. Recent Naismith and Women's Basketball Hall of Fame inductee Billie Moore coached the Titans to the national championship in 1970 and star forward Nancy Dunkle was one of her players on the women's 1976 silver-medal winning Olympic team. The most recent Titan All-American was center Genia Miller in 1991.

The Titans earned gold in 1984 when point guard Leon Wood directed the men's Olympic team to victory in Los Angeles. The first-round draft pick of the Philadelphia 76ers went on to a 6-year National Basketball Association career and he currently is in his third season as a referee, only the second former NBA player to make that career switch.

Future NBA performers Richard Morton, Henry Turner, Cedric Ceballos and Bruce Bowen were some of the stars of the 1980s and 1990s, when the Titans made NIT appearances on both the men's and women's sides. Ceballos gained notoriety for winning the NBA Slam-Dunk contest one year while the women can point with pride to Autumn Hollyfield, the nation's top 3-point field goal shooter in 1993-94, and Koko Lahanas, the nation's scoring leader in 1994-95. Miller still holds NCAA records and came back from a career in Japan to earn a spot with the Los Angeles Sparks of the WNBA as Eugenia Rycraw.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton considerable fame. Former men's Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division NCAA titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and had subsequent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation. Coach Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished sixth or better in the nation 12 times and won the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while Tami Elliott (1984-86) won 10 All-American awards before becoming Miss Virginia and competing in the Miss America pageant.

Baseball exploded onto the national scene behind former Coach Augie Garrido by breaking the USC monopoly in the NCAA western regionals in 1975. The Titans won the national title in 1979 behind Tim Wallach, who would play 17 major league seasons. They won the College World Series again in 1984 and John Fishel was the MVP of the CWS. They were national runners-up in 1992 with another MVP in third baseman Phil Nevin, who also was the first pick in the amateur draft by the Houston Astros.

The Titans placed third in the CWS in 1994 and came back with their best season ever in 1995, going 57-9 en route to their third national championship. Leading the way was Player of the Year Mark Kotsay, now with the Florida Marlins, and one of 31 former Titans to have played in the majors. Fullerton made its tenth trip to Omaha in 1999 under third-year Coach George Horton.

Five players have become Olympians with Kotsay and Brian Loyd helping the U.S. win a bronze medal in 1996 in Atlanta. Nevin, Jason Moler and Bob Caffrey are the other Fullerton baseball Olympians.

Women also have sparkled on Fullerton diamonds. Hall of Fame Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and won more games (913) than any previous coach. The Titans have made eight trips to the College World Series and 19 regional appearances. They brought home an NCAA Championship in 1986 and boast three national players of the year in pitchers Kathy Van Wyk, Susan LeFebvre and Connie

The now-defunct football program made great strides in Division I-A after its humble

Div. II beginnings in 1970. Coach Gene Murphy guided the Titans to two conference championships and four runner-up finishes between 1983 and 1989. Titan products included Super Bowl rookies Bobby Kemp (Cincinnati in 1982) and Mark Collins (New York Giants in 1987). Titans have starred in the Canadian Football League led by receiver Allen Pitts of Calgary, 1995 MVP Mike Pringle of Baltimore and perennial quarterback star Damon Allen.

With the loss of football, Head Coach Al Mistri's soccer program filled the void in Titan Stadium. A women's squad was launched in 1993 and it coincided with a memorable men's season that saw the Titans climb as high as No. 3 in the national rankings. They were led by All-American forward Eddie Soto and competed at the NCAA Final Four, placing third. There have been three subsequent trips to the playoffs and a No. 2 national ranking in 1996. On the international level, former Titan Brian Dunseth captained the U.S. Olympic team in Sydney last September.

There have been national titles in men's cross country (1971) and women's fencing (1974) and individual standouts such as golfer Martha Wilkerson, runner Mark Covert and wrestler Laszlo Molnar, who finished second in the nation in 1994 at 167 pounds. Heather Killeen became the Titans' first Div. I cross country All-American in 1994, won three events at the 1995 Big West Conference track championships and was one of 10 finalists for 1995 NCAA Woman of the Year Award. The Titans have a rising star in junior Brandon Campbell. He became the first Titan to compete in the Pan-Am Junior Games and won a silver medal in 1999 while establishing a school record in the high jump at 7-1. He holds several other records and also plays on the basketball team.



"What exactly is a Titan?"

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that arise when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit to an area. While the relatively young institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, there are some recognized legends.

"It was the students' decision in a vote," explained Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname "Titans." "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories were named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done but then along came the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became known that spring afternoon in 1962.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions of the caricature have been made to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek. The costume that brings the mascot to life also has changed. Tuffy even attracted a female Tiffy in 1992.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was appropriate on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987. A change to a navy blue was initiated in 1992 with a de-emphasis of the orange.





California State University, Fullerton plays a major role in the intellectual, cultural and economic lives of Orange County. Given the charge of teaching as a member of the state's three-tiered system of higher education, Cal State Fullerton does an exceptional job of educating the residents - and future - of Orange County. It prepares highly skilled and well-prepared university graduates.

Now in its 42nd year, the university points proudly to its product, approximately 120,000 graduates. With 85 percent of them remaining within a 50-mile radius of campus, they occupy key spots in business, industry, government, the political arena and education.

The university - with its main campus in Fullerton and satellites in Mission Viejo, Garden Grove and Santa Ana - is one of the county's largest employers and purchasers. Its presence is a key factor in the prosperity and progress of this area. With nearly 28,000 students currently enrolled and about 4,000 faculty and staff members, Cal State Fullerton's economic impact is \$490 million annually.

With a mission of making learning preeminent, the university's 700 full-time faculty members combine the best qualities of teaching and research universities to work in close collaboration with students and staff to expand knowledge. The instructional program is offered by seven colleges: The Arts; Business and Economics; Communications; Engineering and Computer Science; Human Development and Community Service; Humanities and Social Sciences; and Natural Sciences and Mathematics.

With full accreditation for its overall program, Cal State Fullerton has national recognition for its programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, communicative disorders, computer science, dance, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, teacher education and theater. In all there are 98 degree programs with 44 of them at the graduate level - plus a wide variety of credential and certificate programs.

theory and research and integrate professional studies with preparation in the arts and sciences. Through experiences in and out of the classroom, students develop the habit of intellectual inquiry, prepare for challenging professions, strengthen relationships to their communities and contribute productively to society.

Cal State Fullerton is the most affordable and ethnically diverse university in the area. It ranks 10th nationally in the overall number of bachelor's degrees awarded to minority students.

An extended education program, with open enrollment, offers individual courses, seminars and workshops, as well as more than 50 certificate programs ranging from entrepreneurship and sales management to creative writing.

Community members also may visit campus for theater, music and dance performances and art exhibits of off-campus artists, plus those of university students and faculty members. While here, both the Fullerton Arboretum and Heritage House are worth touring. And, an extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students, also is open to the public.

Volunteer opportunities are open through Cal State Fullerton's many support groups, such as the Art Alliance, Music Associates, Patrons of the Library and President's Associates. One such group, Continuing Learning Experience, holds many of its programs in the Ruby Gerontology Center, which serves as an educational and research facility for the study of successful aging.

In four decades, Cal State Fullerton has taken its place as a primary force in the growth and prosperity of Southern California.

Cal State Fullerton student-athletes have year-round access to the services offered by the Strength and Conditioning Program, under the direction of Mike Nagler. Aimed at developing speed, power, strength and endurance in Cal State Fullerton's student-athletes, the program plays a key role in the success of Titan teams.

Individual workouts are designed, implemented and regularly adjusted by Nagler to help each student-athlete develop the stamina needed to maintain the rigorous year-round workouts associated with Division I sports.

Now located inside Titan Stadium is a 6,000 squarefoot weight room facility featuring eight platforms, eight squat racks, plyometric devices and nearly 8,000 pounds in free weights. The facility will service more than 300 student-athletes over the course of the year.

Individual workouts are developed, implemented and regularly adjusted for each of Cal State Fullerton's student-athletes by strength and conditioning Coach Mike Nagler.

The weight room located above Titan Gym is one of several on-campus facilities utilized by Cal State Fullerton's student-athletes.

Mike Nagler was named Cal State Fullerton's first fulltime strength and conditioning coach on Jan. 4, 2000. Nagler had spent the previous 17 months as assistant strength coach at the University of Iowa. At Iowa, Nagler was in charge of developing and implementing weight lifting programs for women's basketball, volleyball, women's soccer, men's and women's track, gymnastics, softball, and men's and women's golf. He also assisted with the men's basketball program.

He also previously worked as an assistant at Baylor University, the University of Washington, UNLV and Washington State and served as an intern with the NFL's Seattle Seahawks.

Nagler, 29, earned his bachelor's degree in exercise science from Washington State in 1993 and picked up a master's degree in kinesiology from UNLV in 1996.
