Statement of Nondiscrimination and Disability Services Information

California State University Channel Islands prohibits discrimination or harassment based on sex, gender, race, color, religion, national origin or ancestry, age, disability, marital status, sexual orientation, cancer-related medical condition, or genetic predisposition. The University also prohibits discrimination against anyone due to a relationship or association with an individual with a known disability.

The University practices equal opportunity in admission to, access to, and operation of instruction, programs, services, and activities. Also, the University provides equally effective communication.

The University considers reasonable accommodation for these purposes: (a) completion of the admission and enrollment processes; (b) participation in instruction, programs, services and activities; and (c) equally effective communication, upon request by persons with legally protected disabilities.

Use of Social Security Number

Applicants are required to include their correct Social Security number (taxpayer identification number) in designated places on applications for admission pursuant to the authority contained in Section 41201, Title 5, California Code of Regulations, and Section 6109 of the Internal Revenue Code (26 U.S.C. 6109). The University uses the Social Security number to identify students and their records as well as to identify the student for purposes of financial aid eligibility, disbursement, and the repayment of financial aid and other debts payable to the institution. Also, the Internal Revenue Service requires the University to file information returns that include the student's Social Security number and other information such as the amount paid for qualified tuition, related expenses, and interest on educational loans. This information is used by the IRS to help determine whether a student, or a person claiming a student as a dependent, may take a credit or deduction to reduce federal income taxes.

Privacy Rights of Students in Education Records

The Federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (20 U.S.C. 1232g) and regulations adopted thereunder (34 C.F.R. 99) set out requirements designed to protect students' privacy in their records maintained by the campus. Specifically,

the statute and regulations govern access to student records maintained by the campus and the release of such records. In brief, the law provides that the campus must provide students access to records directly related to the student and an opportunity for a hearing to challenge such records on the grounds that they are inaccurate, misleading, or otherwise inappropriate. The right to a hearing under the law does not include any right to challenge the appropriateness of a grade as determined by the instructor. The law generally requires that written consent of the student be received before releasing personally identifiable data about the student from records to other than a specified list of exceptions. The institution has adopted a set of policies and procedures concerning implementation of the statutes and the regulations on the campus. Copies of these policies and procedures may be obtained at the Enrollment Center in the Professional Building. Among the types of information included in the campus statement of policies and procedures are: (1) the types of student records and the information contained therein; (2) the official responsible for the maintenance of each type of record; (3) the location of access lists that indicate persons requesting or receiving information from the record; (4) policies for reviewing and expunging records; (5) the access rights of students; (6) the procedures for challenging the content of student records; (7) the cost which will be charged for reproducing copies of records; and (8) the right of the student to file a complaint with the Department of Education. An office and review board have been established by the Department to investigate and adjudicate violations and complaints. The office designated for this purpose is: Family Policy Compliance Office, U.S. Department of Education, Washington, D.C. 20202-4605.

The campus is authorized under the Act to release "directory information" concerning students. "Directory information" may include the student's name, address, telephone listing, electronic mail address, photograph, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, and the most recent previous educational agency or institution attended by the student. The above designated information is subject to release by the campus at any time unless the campus has received prior written objection from the student specifying information which the student requests not to be released. Written objections should be sent to the Admissions and Records Office in the Professional Building.

The campus is authorized to provide access to student records to campus officials and employees who have legitimate educational interests in such access. These persons are those who have responsibilities in connection with the campus's academic, administrative, or service functions, and who have reason for using student records connected with their campus or other related academic responsibilities. Disclosure may also be made to other persons or organizations under certain conditions (e.g., as part of the accreditation or program evaluation, in response to a court order or subpoena, in connection with financial aid, in relation to other institutions to which the student is transferring).

Course load for undergraduate students

An undergraduate student may enroll in 18 units without advisor approval. Students enrolling in 19 or more units are required to have a program advisor's written approval.

Add Policy

1. Students may add courses during the first three weeks of classes with approval signatures from the instructor.
2. During the fourth week of instruction a student may add a class with the approval of the instructor and the approval of the Vice President for Academic Affairs (or designee) as indicated by their signatures on the appropriate forms.

Declaration of Majors

To help ensure timely completion of graduation requirements, students who have a total of 60 units completed and in progress must have declared a major before they may register for the next term. Upper-division transfer students are required to declare their intended major on their application for admission.

Academic leave

Students who take a one semester leave of absence from CSUCI are considered continuing students and do not need to take any action prior to registration. Any student in good academic standing may apply to take a leave of absence from the university for up to four consecutive semesters.

Semester Honors

CSUCI undergraduate students completing 12 or more units with a letter grade in a single semester or completing 12 or more units with a letter grade in one academic year assessed at the end of the Spring semester, shall be named to the Semester Honors list if they earn a 3.75 or higher grade point average. Academic Dishonesty

The catalog defines academic dishonesty to include "such things as cheating, inventing false information or citations, plagiarism and helping someone else commit an act of academic dishonesty. It usually involves an attempt by a student to show possession of a level of knowledge or skill that he/she does not possess". The catalog describes the process for evaluating cases of dishonesty and assignment of appropriate penalties.

Academic Probation and Disqualification

Academic Probation: An undergraduate student is subject to academic probation if at any time the cumulative grade point average (GPA) in all college work attempted or cumulative GPA at CSUCI falls below 2.0. Probationary students will be advised of their status by letter at the end of the semester. The letter will include conditions for removal from probation and

the circumstances that would lead to disqualification. An undergraduate student shall be removed from academic probation when the cumulative GPA in all college work attempted and the cumulative GPA average at CSUCI is 2.0 or higher.

Academic Disqualification: An undergraduate student on academic probation is subject to academic disqualification when: as a freshman the student falls below a GPA of 1.50 in all units attempted or in all units attempted at CSU Channel Islands; as a sophomore the student falls below a GPA of 1.70 in all units attempted or in all units attempted at CSU Channel Islands; as a junior the student falls below a GPA of 1.85 in all units attempted or in all units attempted at CSU Channel Islands; as a senior the student falls below a GPA of 1.95 in all units attempted or in all units attempted at CSU Channel Islands. Students' records will be evaluated for disqualification at the end of Spring semester.

Postbaccalaureate Students: A postbaccalaureate student will be subject to academic probation if, after attempting 12 or more graded units, his or her postbaccalaureate cumulative GPA for units attempted at CSU Channel Islands falls below a 2.50 average. The GPA will determine whether a student is subject to probation only when the student has attempted 12 semester units. A student enrolled in a graduate degree program in either conditionally classified or classified standing shall be subject to academic probation if he or she fails to maintain a cumulative GPA of at least 3.0 in all units attempted; no course in which the student receives lower than a C may be counted toward a Master's degree.

Students may also be placed on Administrative-Academic Probation or Administrative-Academic Disqualification subject to the conditions described in the Catalog.

Reinstatement

In order to be considered for reinstatement to the University, a disqualified student must demonstrate academic ability. This can be achieved by completing classes at other academic institutions. All classes taken must be applicable for degree credit. After reducing the grade-point deficiency, the student may petition the Academic Appeals Board for reinstatement.

Acceleration of University Studies

The University provides several means by which students may accelerate their studies; these are discussed below. Each of the following options may be subject to restrictions and regulations within individual academic programs. Therefore, students interested in any of these options should consult with the catalog and/or chair of the concerned program.

- Advanced Placement
- Unit Credit by Examination
- Substitution of Courses
- Waiver of Course Requirement
- Credit Toward Graduation for Courses Taken Outside CSU Channel Islands



Policy on withdrawal from courses

1. Students may drop courses during the first three weeks of classes without instructor permission.
2. After the third week of classes and before the end of the tenth week of classes, withdrawal from courses is permissible only for serious and compelling reasons. Approval signatures from the instructor and program chairs must be obtained to withdraw during this period. The withdrawal will be noted as a “W” on the student’s permanent record.
3. During the final six weeks of instruction, withdrawal is not permitted except in cases beyond the student’s control such as accident or serious illness where the assignment of an Incomplete is not practical. Approval signatures from the instructor, program chair and Vice President for Academic Affairs (or designee) must be obtained. Withdrawal in this category will typically involve total withdrawal from the University and will be noted as a “W” on the student’s permanent record.
4. Instructor Initiated Withdrawal: Instructors may drop students within the first three weeks of classes and as early as the first day of classes for any the following reasons:
 - a. Student failure to attend class without having made prior arrangements with the instructor.
 - b. Student failure to complete the prerequisites for a course before enrolling.
 - c. Student failure to secure properly the permission of the instructor before enrolling when such permission is required.

Graduation

To qualify for graduation, students must complete all requirements for the bachelor’s degree by the official graduation date listed in the Schedule of Classes. Graduation is not automatic upon the completion of requirements. Students who intend to graduate must take the initiative and should follow the key steps listed in the Catalog. While students are ultimately responsible for completing all degree requirements, assistance is available through faculty advisement, the Advising Center, and Graduation Evaluations. It is important that students meet regularly with an advisor to avoid graduation problems and delays.

The application for bachelor’s degree, and diploma, and filing fee entitle students to an official graduation evaluation of progress toward meeting baccalaureate degree requirements. Students qualifying for graduation by the designated graduation date may participate in the annual commencement ceremony. The application for degree is available at the Advising Center in the Bell Tower and at the Enrollment Center in the Professional Building.

At CSU Channel Islands, the role of advising is shared by faculty advisors and professional advisors. Academic advising is a continuous process that supports students throughout their academic journey at the University. Students are ultimately responsible for their educational planning and meeting all graduation requirements. Students need to be familiar with the University Catalog policies, as well as major and degree policies. In order to ensure academic success and remain on course, students are encouraged to maintain regular contact with academic advisors.

Students may stop by the Advising Center check-in counter to schedule an appointment with one of our professional academic advisors. Major faculty advisors are available on a walk-in basis or by appointment. Each semester, office locations, hours, and phone numbers are posted in the display case outside the Advising Center. Advisors are busiest during registration periods and the first few weeks of the semester. Therefore, students are encouraged to schedule advising sessions during non-peak times.

Systemwide Placement Test Requirements

The California State University requires each entering undergraduate, except those who qualify for an exemption, to take the CSU Entry Level Mathematics (ELM) examination and the CSU English Placement Test (EPT) prior to enrollment. These placement tests are not a condition for admission to the CSU, but they are a condition of enrollment. They are designed to identify entering students who may need additional support in acquiring the basic English and mathematics skills necessary to succeed in CSU baccalaureate-level courses.

Undergraduate students who do not demonstrate college-level skills in mathematics will be placed in appropriate remedial programs and activities during the first term of their enrollment. Students placed in such programs in mathematics must complete all remediation in their first year of enrollment. Failure to complete remediation by the end of the first year may result in denial of enrollment for future terms. Students

register for the EPT and/or ELM at their local CSU campus. Questions about test dates and registration materials may be addressed to the C.H.A.P.s office located in the Bell Tower Building, Room 1415, (805) 437-8510.

Directed Self Placement (DSP)

Directed self placement will be the only method used on the CSU Channel Islands campus to place students into freshman composition courses. EPT scores will not be used. Students will be given guidance in directed self placement during orientation and will select either English 105, Composition and Rhetoric, or the English 102/103 Stretch Composition sequence. Completion of either English 105 or English 102/103 satisfies the freshman writing requirement.

Learning Communities

Consider enrolling in a learning community this Fall semester. Learning communities are linked courses that are designed to make connections across disciplines. Because the same group of students enroll in the linked courses, they develop a strong support network with each other, as well as strong connections with the faculty and the University. At CSU Channel Islands, we believe participation in a learning community will positively impact your college experience.

For Fall 2004, for example, most first-year composition courses are part of a learning community, linked to courses in other disciplines. The advantage to linking an English course to another course of interest is that a student can improve his/her writing while also strengthening learning in the linked course. Each Learning Community is linked with specific sections of composition, English 102 and English 105. From information and guidance provided during new student advising and Island View Orientation, the student will determine which English course, 102, or 105, is right for him/her. Students may pick any one of the learning communities in the different disciplines. Students will then enroll in that course and also in one of the linked English courses, either Stretch Composition (English 102) or Composition and Rhetoric I (English 105).

The Math Tutoring Lab and The University Writing Center

Contact Roberta Brodie at 805-437-8409 or check the display in front of the Advising Center for the current schedules and location of each center.

At the Math Tutoring Lab and the University Writing Center the process is collaborative. Tutors work with students to encourage effective, independent learning, and to further knowledge and understanding during their education at CSU Channel Islands. Tutors are available to accommodate students' needs, whether one desires help completing homework, studying for a test, or just understanding a concept. They are able to consult in virtually every math course offered on this campus, and their specialties are posted in front of the lab.

In the Writing Center, trained student consultants are available to assist students with composing a first draft, editing, and polishing their completed work. Students who would like to review the fundamentals of grammar, syntax, and word usage are invited to work with consultants on an individual basis, or in small group sessions with the center's director. The center is also available to assist students with organizing their studies, taking notes, and using research materials.

Registration Experience

Schedule of Classes

It is the responsibility of every CSU Channel Island student to read and understand the Schedule of Classes. Students are expected to adhere to academic policy and published deadlines, and to follow correct enrollment procedures. The Schedule of Classes provides students with the information needed to successfully enroll in classes by:

- **Furnishing a list of classes offered for the Fall 2004 semester.** When planning a schedule, please note any specific prerequisites.
- **Advising students of pertinent deadlines and current fees.** This schedule instructs students on where to seek advice on how to plan a class schedule, how to change a program, and on other academic procedures.
- **Outlining those courses that may be taken to fulfill general education requirements.** Obtain an updated list of general education requirements from the Advising Center.

SUBJECT TO CHANGE

This Schedule of Classes publication is only a guide. While every effort has been made to ensure its accuracy, this information is subject to change without notice. Consult the current University Catalog for current course descriptions, prerequisites and policies. Class additions, changes and cancellations will be posted on the University web site and will be reflected in my.CSUCI.edu.

Schedule of Classes on the Web

This Schedule of Classes publication will also be available online on the University web site. Additionally, changes, added sections and class cancellations will be posted to the web site prior to the start of the semester. The most current listing of classes is available by using the [View Schedule of Classes](#) link in my.CSUCI.edu to search current offerings.

Registration

Registration takes place on the web at my.CSUCI.edu. This is the University's student information system. Students register for classes at appointment times, which are set based on class level and descending number of units earned (seniors, then juniors, etc). New students will also register this way, during Orientation and new student advising workshops. Access to the system is secured by a unique user ID and password.

The my.CSUCI.edu system also allows students to maintain their address and phone number, view their grades at the end of the term, and review their transcripts of classes taken at CSUCI. As new features are implemented, they will become available on the my.CSUCI.edu site.

Course Load

An undergraduate student may enroll in 18 units without advisor approval. Students enrolling in 19 or more units are required to have a program advisor's written approval. Advisors may sign the Change of Program form or a Course Overload form. Forms are available from, and must be processed at the Enrollment Center.

Change of Program

Students are responsible for managing their programs of study; obtaining any authorizations required to add, drop or swap classes or to change the basis of grading for a class. Such changes can be made on the web in my.CSUCI.edu prior to the start of classes without any authorization. Once classes begin through the end of the third week of the semester, the authorization of the instructor is required to add. Beginning with the fourth week of instruction, all enrollment changes must be requested by obtaining required signatures on the Change of Program form and having the form processed at the Enrollment Center.

Students are responsible for any additional fees incurred as a result of adding classes. Please refer to the inside back cover of this Schedule of Classes for information on Change of Program deadlines and required authorizations.

Adding Classes

Once classes begin, students must obtain authorization from the instructor to add a class prior to the published deadline. Students may add classes in one of the following ways:

- By obtaining the signature of the instructor on the Change of Program form, available in the Enrollment Center in the Professional Building, and having the form processed at the Enrollment Center.
- By obtaining a Permission Number from the instructor and entering the class number and permission number in my.CSUCI.edu.

Please refer to the inside back cover of this Schedule of Classes for information on Change of Program deadlines and required authorizations.

Dropping Classes

Prior to the start of classes and through the end of the third week of the semester, students may drop class(es) on the web in my.CSUCI.edu without any authorization of the instructor. Alternatively, once classes begin, students may complete the Change of Program form and have it processed in the Enrollment Center until the deadline. Although a record is kept of the drop, the course will not appear on the student's permanent record.

Beginning with the fourth week of instruction and prior to the tenth week of instruction, withdrawal is permissible only for serious and compelling reasons. The approval signatures of the instructor and the Program Chair are required to withdraw from a class during this period. Documentation of the serious and compelling reasons may be required. A "W" grade will be recorded on the student's permanent record.

Withdrawal during the final six weeks of instruction is not permitted except in cases where the circumstances causing the withdrawal are clearly beyond the student's control, and the assignment of an "I" (Incomplete) grade is not practical. Ordinarily, withdrawal in this category will involve complete withdrawal from the University. The approval signatures of the instructor and Program Chair are required to withdraw from classes during this period. Documentation of the circumstances causing the student to request withdrawal may be required. A "W" grade will be recorded on the student's permanent record for each course.

Failure to properly withdraw from class(es) may result in the student receiving failing grades ("WU" grade).

Please refer to the inside back cover of this Schedule of Classes for information on Change of Program deadlines and required authorizations.

Change of Grading Basis

A student may opt to change the grading basis for a class, only if an alternate grading basis is available to that course as indicated in the Catalog. Some classes are not available to be taken on a Credit / No Credit grading basis, conversely, some classes are only offered on a Credit / No Credit basis and may not be taken for a letter grade. Consult the Catalog for the options available to each course. Additionally, the student should be aware that courses taken for the major may not be allowed to be taken on a Credit / No Credit grading basis.

Changes of Grading Basis must be requested by completing a Change of Program form and having the form process at the Enrollment Center.

Please refer to the inside back cover of this Schedule of Classes for information on Change of Program deadlines and required authorizations.

Late Registration

Students who have not registered prior to the start of classes must follow the late registration procedures in order to enroll. Students must obtain authorization from the instructor to add a class prior to the published deadline. Students may add classes in one of the following ways:

- By obtaining the signature of the instructor on the Change of Program form, available in the Enrollment Center in the Professional Building, and having the form processed at the Enrollment Center.
- By obtaining a Permission Number from the instructor and entering the class number and permission number in my.CSUCI.edu.

Late registration must be completed by the end of the third week of instruction. A \$25.00 Late Registration fee is charged in addition to all regular registration fees. Refer to the University Fees section of this publication for more information. Late registration is available only to students admitted to the University. Please refer to the inside back cover of this Schedule of Classes for information on Change of Program deadlines and required authorizations.

Complete Withdrawal from the University

Students who find it necessary to withdraw from CSU Channel Islands after enrolling are required to follow the official withdrawal procedures. Students must provide proof of a serious and compelling reason for withdrawal. Complete Withdrawal from the University is requested by completing a Change of Program form. Beginning with the fourth week of instruction, the signature of the Instructor and Program Chair is required. Please refer to the inside back cover of this Schedule of Classes for information on Change of Program deadlines and required authorizations. Failure to properly withdraw may result in the assignment of failing grades in all courses.

Students receiving financial aid are advised to consult with the Financial Aid Office, prior to withdrawing from the University, regarding any required return or repayments of grant or loan assistance received for that academic term. If a recipient of financial assistance under federal Title IV financial aid programs withdraws from the institution during a payment period, the amount of grant or loan assistance received is subject to return and repayment provisions governed by federal law.

Consult the University Fees section of this publication for information on refunds as a result of Complete Withdrawal from the University.

Instructor Initiated Drop

Non-Attendance

An instructor may drop a student who does not attend class and who has not made prior arrangements with the instructor. This may occur as early as the first class meeting or any time during the first three weeks of the semester.

Note: It is the student's responsibility to manage his / her class schedule and any change of program. Failure to properly drop a class may result in the student receiving a failing ("WU") grade for the course.

Prerequisites

An instructor may drop a student who has enrolled in a class requiring permission of the instructor or completion of prerequisites if the student has not properly secured this permission or satisfactorily completed the prerequisites before enrolling.

Wait List

Students may opt to be placed on a wait list for a class that is full at the time of registration. The student will be informed at the time of registration in my.CSUCI.edu of his / her position on the wait list for a class. Students opting for the wait list are not guaranteed entry to the class. However, prior to the start of classes, if sufficient space becomes available, and the student has not enrolled in another section of the same class or in another class that would cause a time conflict, the student will be enrolled into the class from the wait list. Students who opt to be wait listed for a class are encouraged to check their schedules often to determine if their position on the wait list has changed or if they have been enrolled in the class from the wait list. Students will not otherwise be notified of their enrollment in a class from the wait list.

If a wait list exists for a class at the start of the semester, a wait list roster will be provided to the instructor which lists students in the order that they wait listed for the class. The instructor may, at his / her discretion, use the wait list to determine who may be allowed to add the class.

The wait list is not available for class sections that have been cancelled nor is it available for non-enrollment components of classes.

Class Time Conflicts

It is the policy of CSU Channel Islands that no student shall be permitted to enroll simultaneously in any two or more classes meeting during the same time period.

Grade Policy

1. The "ABCD" is the default grading system.
2. Although it is not required, individual faculty members may add a "+" or "-" to any grade except "F." By adding a "+" to a grade, the grade points earned increase by 0.3 (except an A+ shall still be 4.0 grade points). By adding a "-" to a grade, the grade points earned shall decrease by 0.3. Course syllabi are required to state clearly whether "+/-" grading is used.
3. A student may take a course "CR/NC" if the course is designated as allowing "CR/NC" grading in the course approval process.
4. No more than 12 units of General Education courses may be taken "CR/NC."

IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS

Entering CSU students are required to present proof of the following immunizations to the CSU campus they will be attending before the beginning of their first term of enrollment.

Measles and Rubella: All new and readmitted students born after January 1, 1957 must provide proof of full immunization against measles and rubella prior to enrollment. Submit medical documentation to the Student Health Center to verify both vaccinations were received since age 1 or obtain the vaccination at no charge through the Student Health Center.

Hepatitis B: All new students who will be 18 years of age or younger at the start of their first term at a CSU campus must provide proof of full immunization against Hepatitis B before enrolling. Full immunization against Hepatitis B consists of three timed doses of vaccine over a minimum 4 to 6 months period. If you need further details or have special circumstances, please consult the Student Health Center at (805) 437-8828 in the Health Center Building located on San Luis Avenue.

5. The decision as to how many units of courses may be taken "CR/NC" and which courses can be taken "CR/NC" is left up to each individual program.
6. Course syllabi shall include a discussion of the instructor's grading policy.

Policy on Course Grade Appeals

1. Each student has the right to appeal the final course grade, but Each student has the right to appeal the final course grade, but only the final course grade. A student may not appeal individual assignments and examinations.
2. Appeals are limited to situations in which the student believes the grade was "prejudicially," "capriciously," or "arbitrarily" assigned.
3. The appeal must be initiated within the first regular semester after assignment of the grade. It must first be directed to the instructor of the course, orally or in writing. If further action is necessary, the student should appeal in writing to the program coordinator. If further action is necessary, the issue may be appealed to the University Grade Appeals Committee.
4. The University Grade Appeals Committee shall consist of faculty and at least one student.
5. Individuals may not participate as a member of the University Grade Appeals Committee in the review of an appeal if they are a participant in an appeal.
6. The decision of the University Grade Appeals Committee is final.

Policy on Forgiveness of Previously Earned Grade (Repeat and Delete)

A student may repeat a maximum of 10 different courses at CSUCI for the purposes of improving his or her undergraduate GPA. Each different course may be taken a maximum of 3 times. After consultation with his or her faculty advisor a student may petition the academic appeals board to repeat additional times if he or she has special circumstances. Only the most recent grade for the course will be used in calculation of the GPA.

Other Grading assigned for various categories of enrollment:

I (Incomplete Authorized). The "I" symbol indicates that a portion of course required course work cannot be met within the prescribed time period due to unforeseen circumstances, and that there is still a possibility of earning credit. It is the responsibility of the student to bring pertinent information to the attention of the instructor and to determine from the instructor the remaining course requirements which must be satisfied to remove the Incomplete. An "I" must normally be made up within one calendar year immediately following the end of the term during which it was assigned. A final grade is assigned when the work agreed upon has been completed and evaluated. Failure to complete the assigned work will result in an "I" being converted to an "IC" symbol, unless the faculty member assigns a specific letter grade at the time the Incomplete is assigned.

IC (Incomplete Charged). The "IC" symbol may be used when a student who received an authorized incomplete ("I") has not completed the required course work within the allowed time limit. The "IC" replaces the "I" and is counted as a failing grade for grade point average calculation.

RP (Report in Progress). The "RP" symbol is used in connection with courses that extend beyond one academic term. It indicates that work is in progress, but that the assignment of a final grade must await completion of additional work. Work is to be completed within one year except for graduate degree theses.

W (Withdrawal). The "W" symbol indicates that the student was permitted to withdraw from the course after the third week of the semester with the approval of the instructor and appropriate campus officials. It carries no connotation of quality of student performance and is not used in calculating grade point average. See withdrawal procedures in the Catalog.

WU (Withdrawal Unauthorized). The "WU" symbol indicates that an enrolled student did not formally withdraw from the course according to University policy and also failed to complete course requirements. It is used when, in the opinion of the instructor, completed assignments or course activities or both were insufficient to make normal evaluation of academic performance possible. For purposes of grade point average, this symbol is equivalent to an "F."



Extension Courses

Students may take extension courses without matriculating at CSUCI provided that they meet course prerequisites. Extension courses may be applied to degree and credential requirements with the approval of the degree program coordinator. Extension courses do not satisfy the University's residence requirement for graduation. Up to 24 units earned through Open University (see Procedure for enrollment in Regular Classes Through Open University) and Extension may be applied to a bachelor's degree, and up to 9 units may be applied to a master's degree.

Procedure for Enrollment in Regular Classes Through Open University

Open University permits non-matriculated students to register in regular classes on a "space available" basis. Up to 24 units earned through Open University and Extension may be applied to a bachelor's degree, and up to 9 units may be applied to a master's degree.

Individuals who have not been formally admitted to the University may register through Extended Education as an Open University student for regular classes by securing the approval of the instructor and paying extension fees. Students are expected to meet any course prerequisites and are subject to Open University Extension regulations regarding change of program, fees, refunds, and grades.

Students should attend desired classes for the first week. If space is available after the first week of classes, and with the appropriate approval, students may register at the Enrollment Center. Full payment of fees is due at the time of registration.

Participation in the Open University Program does not constitute admission to the University nor does it entitle individuals to services available to regular students, with the exception of library privileges.

Special Enrollment Programs

Intrasystem Concurrent Enrollment

This program permits students to enroll for classes at CSU Channel Islands and another CSU campus simultaneously. There is no limitation to the number of times a student may enter this program, as long as an application is filed each semester within the application deadlines outlined by the host campus. Please consult your program advisor and financial aid representative at your home campus. Contact the Enrollment Center for the Intrasystem Concurrent Enrollment application.

Intrasystem Visitor Enrollment

This program permits students to enroll solely at a CSU campus different from their home campus. Registration fees are paid to the host campus (the campus which the student is visiting). Financial aid recipients should check with a financial aid representative at their home campus. Applications must be filed within the application deadline outlined by the host campus. Contact the Enrollment Center for the Intrasystem Visitor Enrollment Application.

EXTENDED EDUCATION Open University

Open University provides an opportunity for those who are not currently admitted to CSUCI to enroll in courses offered by the regular university.

Student Financial Services

The Cashier's Office is located on the first floor of the Professional Building in the Enrollment Center and is open during the following times:

Closed Saturday and Sunday

There will be extended hours of operation the first two weeks of the semester (August 30 – September 10, 2004).

FEES ARE SUBJECT TO CHANGE BY THE TRUSTEES OF THE CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY: students will be billed for any fee increase approved by the Board of Trustees.

It is the student's responsibility to pay all registration fees by August 27, 2004. Invoices will not be mailed to students. Outstanding balances on August 30, 2004 are subject to a \$25 late fee.

NOTE: Graduates must pay the higher of the two fee categories. A graduate is defined as any student having already earned a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution.

Cancellation of Registration Prior to the Beginning of the Term

A student will be eligible for a full refund if fees are paid but no enrollment occurred or if all classes have been dropped prior to the first day of instruction for the term. Procedures for withdrawal are available in the Enrollment Center or in this Schedule of Classes.

Students will also receive a full refund of mandatory fees and nonresident tuition under the following circumstances:

- The tuition and mandatory fees were collected in error.
- The course for which the tuition and mandatory fees were assessed or collected was cancelled by the University.
- The University makes a delayed decision that the student was not eligible to enroll in the term for which the mandatory fees were assessed and collected, and the delayed decision was not due to incomplete or inaccurate information provided by the student.
- The student was activated for compulsory military service.

All refunds for mandatory fees are now automatic. Refund checks will be mailed to the address on file with Admissions and Records. Please make sure that your address is correct. Payments made by Visa or Master Card will be credited back to the original card.

Prorated Refunds for Complete Withdrawals

Beginning with the first day of instruction for the term, refunds for complete withdrawals will be prorated based on the date of withdrawal and the length of the academic period up to the 60 percent point of the term. Refunds are processed automatically. A student who officially withdraws after the 60 percent point in the academic period will not be entitled to a refund.

Nonresident Fees

Nonresident students must pay the resident registration fees plus \$282.00 per unit. With prior approval, students have the option to pay registration fees in three installments. Check with Student Financial Services for complete details.

Registration Fee Installment Plan

All students may apply to participate in the registration installment payment plan (IPP) to pay registration fees in a predetermined payment schedule. An approved IPP contract may be obtained from Student Financial Services. A student's prior financial activity must demonstrate credit worthiness in order to be approved to participate in the IPP. The IPP includes an initial payment and two additional payments during the current semester.



Installment Payment Plan applications and additional information are available at Student Financial Services. A non-refundable administrative fee of \$33.00 per semester is required for participation in the installment plan. The initial payment includes 1/3 of the state university fee and/or 1/3 of the applicable tuition charges, all campus based fees, and administrative fees. Two additional equal installments of the remaining state university fee and/or tuition charges will be due on the published due dates. Failure to complete your obligation under the terms of the IPP may result in the termination of University services and enrollment eligibility (disenrollment.)

Financial Aid

Students who have accepted a financial aid award will be able to postpone payment of registration fees until August 27, 2004. Financial aid awards will first be used to satisfy any obligations owed to the University. If the total aid available is not sufficient to pay fees or if the student loses financial aid eligibility, the student is responsible for payment of fees.

To qualify for a financial aid disbursement, students must be enrolled in at least 12 units. This is considered the minimum full-time load and will result in full financial aid eligibility. Students enrolling less than full time may have their aid reduced. Most financial aid programs have minimum unit requirements that must be met or aid from those programs may be cancelled completely. If you completely withdraw from school, you may be required to repay some or all of your financial aid.

Federal Military Selective Service Act

The Federal Military Selective Service Act (the "Act") requires most males residing in the United States to present themselves for registration with the Selective Service System within thirty (30) days of their eighteenth birthday. Most males between the ages of 18 and 25 must be registered. Males born after December 31, 1959 may be required to submit a statement of compliance with the Act and regulations in order to receive any grant, loan, or work assistance under specified provisions of existing federal law. In California, students subject to the Act who fail to register are also ineligible to receive any need-based student grants funded by the state or public postsecondary institution.

Selective Service registration forms are available at any U.S. Post Office, and many high schools have a staff member or teacher appointed as a Selective Service Registrar. Applicants for financial aid can also request that information provided on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) be used to register them with the Selective Service. Information in the Selective Service System is available and the registration process may be initiated online at www.sss.gov.

Special Course Fees (Lab Fees)

Several courses require the payment of special course fees (lab fees) as a condition of enrollment. These fees may be indicated in the Schedule of Classes next to the course listing. Lab fees must be paid with registration fees. Lab courses dropped by the add/drop deadline will automatically be credited on the

student's account. Lab courses dropped after the deadline will not be refunded.

Refunds for Partial Withdrawals

A student who drops some, (but not all) units resulting in a lower mandatory fee obligation by September 10, 2004 will be entitled to a refund of the applicable difference in fees. Refunds are processed automatically. A student who fails to drop classes that would result in a lower fee category by the deadline will not be entitled to a refund.

NOTE: It is the sole responsibility of the student to withdraw from classes. Refunds can only be issued to students who withdraw from classes by the published deadlines. Students are responsible for verifying their withdrawal from classes.

All permit and parking regulations are enforced seven days a week, 24 hours a day. Vehicles parked on campus are required to have a parking permit. There is no grace period, and cars without permits will be cited.

Off-Campus Shuttle Service

A shuttle service is available Monday through Friday, 7:00 a.m. to 10:30 p.m., and Saturday, 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. The cost of a transit card is **\$50 per semester**.* The shuttle operates from the following sites:

To utilize this service and purchase a photo transit card, students should stop by TPS to complete an application and have a photo taken. Please allow 10 minutes to process the card.

The transit card is a countywide bus pass that can be used with other area transits that transfer to the CSUCI shuttles. Students can also park at one of the sites and ride the shuttle to campus. Parking at the sites is free.

On-Campus Escort/Shuttle Service

On-campus escort/shuttle service is available Monday-Thursday, from 6:00 to 10:00 p.m.

Parking Permits

Semester and daily permits are valid in all “A” lots.

Semester Permits

All parking permits are available for sale through TPS. The purchase of a parking permit does not guarantee availability of space in a particular lot. Parking permits are available on a semester basis. The cost of the permit is \$110.00*. Permits purchased after the start of the semester are prorated accordingly: 1) 31-60 days, 75 percent; 2) within 61-90 days, 50 percent; and 3) 91+ days, 25 percent

Semester Refunds

Refunds after the start of the semester are prorated accordingly: 1) within 30 days, 75 percent; 2) within 60 days, 50 percent; 3) within 90 days, 25 percent; and none thereafter. Refunds will be made within 30 days of receipt of request. There are no parking refunds for any amount less than \$10.00.

Daily Permits

Daily parking permits may be purchased from permit dispensers located in Lots A1, A2, A4, or the lobby of the PSD and are valid only on the date of purchase. The cost of the daily permit is \$4.00*. The dispensers will accept coins; and \$1, \$5, \$10, and \$20 bills; and give change in one dollar coins.

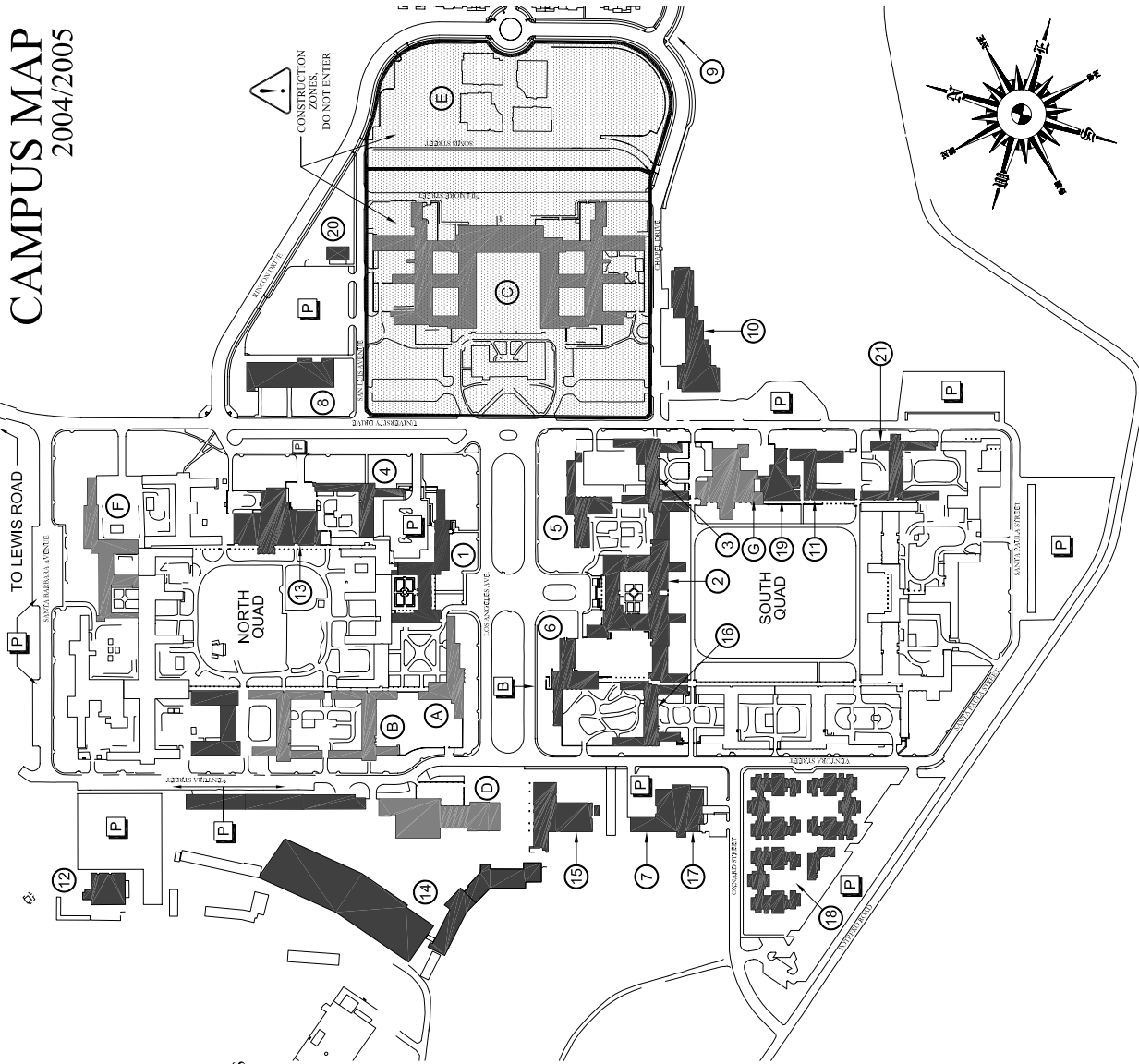

Criteria for Late Add/Drop or Changes in the Basis of Grading

Students should note that a deficient academic performance is not a sufficient reason for dropping a class or changing the basis of grading after the third week. Students must present proof of a serious and compelling reason for withdrawal.

Medical Withdrawal

A medical withdrawal usually constitutes complete withdrawal from the University for the academic period in question. Beginning with the fourth week of the semester, students who find it necessary to withdraw from the University for medical reasons may be required to present documentation. Financial aid recipients should consult a financial aid representative regarding the implications of a complete withdrawal.
