Supplemental Medicare Insurance Change

Everyone in LV who has YNCG and Hartford Group Insurance, and those interested in obtaining a better supplemental Medicare policy should attend our next YNCG meeting on Mon, Jan 4 at 7:30 p.m. in the AR.

Last February, Hartford increased our premium 13% and also decreased our benefits. This precipitated cancellation of our contract with the 40 doctors in the Anacapa group. Previous to Feb 1, they received 20% of their charges without waiting for Medicare to pay first. Now they must first get payment from Medicare to apply for the Hartford supplement and only receive 20% of what Medi-

care allows.

For a small increase in premium, we can reverse this problem, reduce paper work and pay nothing extra out of pocket. Several insurance companies will be present at this meeting — Aetna, etc.

We have been looking for a group policy since last Feb. No insurance company large or small will write group insurance for our population. We have exhausted all avenues.

Since Feb our group numbers have diminished greatly and we look for Hartford to cancel our group policy in the near future — even though what they give us now can be purchased for

Do you value the role Inside Leisure Village plays in Village communications? Do you want ILV to cease publication? Well, there is a campaign operating inside the Village which may cause this to hap-

The Camarillo Daily News has printed ILV for almost 10 years and delivered it to each unit FREE, depending on local ads to pay their production expenses. We owe the CDN a great vote of thanks for their largess over the years. But all that is endangered by certain Villagers.

The CDN previously delivered to each unit a copy of its regular paper on Thursdays, plus ILV once a month. Now because of expenses, the newspaper chain which owns the CDN has decided that each non-subscribing Village unit gets a copy of a regional shopper free. But distribution of this shopper is done separately, so there is no opportunity to insert ILV. CDN subscribers still get ILV home delivered, now on the fourth Friday. Non-subscribers may pick up a FREE copy at the Rec Center once a month.

However, the phone campaign from inside the Village is threatening these arrangements. Those people are calling ILV advertisers to complain they can't get a copy of the paper (untrue), claiming businesses are wasting their money on ads in ILV. When asked who is calling, they haven't the courage to give their names. Their goal may be to restore delivery to each home, which is no longer feasible; their campaign could have disastrous results for ILV. If these complainers are successful in their phone campaign, ad revenue of ILV will fall below production costs, forcing the discontinuation of ILV.

Do you value the role ILV plays in Village communication? Do you want ILV to shut down totally?

The editors of ILV do not know of any other senior community which has available to it free any comparable publication.

Please help us publicize the great harm these people are doing to ILV, before it is too late.

Recent earthquakes in the Imperial Valley and, closer to home, the power outage here in the Village Nov 29 are powerful reminders that events beyond our control can force us to take emergency measures. In recognition of these facts the Your Neighbors Care Group, in cooperation with the Emergency Services Organization, led a drive to collect funds to acquire medical supplies for use in case injuries are sustained as a result of an emergency here in the Village. The ESO is working with the LVA Board of Directors to prepare a facility for secure storage of

these supplies. Details will be announced when the plans are finalized.

A survey of villagers is being performed to identify those who may need extra help as the result of an emergency-producing event. A questionnaire is being distributed to all residents to develop this information.

Meanwhile, villagers are urged to review the LV Disaster Survival Guide and the Red Cross Check List for Earthquake and Disaster Survival. C-SPAN Campaign In High Gear

Last month we received word that C-SPAN was moving to a new satellite reach of our dish antenna. Later, the deadline was extended to Dec 15, after which C-SPAN would no longer be received in Leisure Village with the present equipment.

Since there is no room in the current budget for an expenditure to purchase a new dish antenna, I proposed that the Leisure Village Board authorize the collection of contributions to reimburse the Assn for the new C-SPAN connection.

The Board responded favorably, and I accepted the challenge, along with Ed Salzer and an informal committee of volunteer solicitors. At the end of the third week we had collected \$2005 toward our goal of \$2400, which will cover equipment to re-

ceive both C-SPAN and C-SPAN II.

Because this drive beon Dec 7, beyond the gan almost at the last minute, there was a possibility of a brief blackout period of C-SPAN on our TV screens. Not to worry.

> We shall redouble our efforts not only to achieve the primary goal of broadcasting C-SPAN programs beamed from the new satellite in space, but, in response to a number of requests to receive C-SPAN II (the U.S. Senate debates), we hope to raise sufficient money to secure this fringe benefit without burdening the Assn treasury.







Profile: A.D. and Vee Flowers

At age 9 he was selling popcorn in a theater in Oklahoma and perhaps it was a harbinger of things to come. This same man, decades later, before millions of televison viewers. stepped on to the stage of the Dorothy Chandler Theater to receive the coveted special-effects "Oscar" from the Academy of Arts & Sciences.

And she, a native Californian and an all-around athlete, achieved local fame as an outstanding semi-professional softball player both during high school days and in the years that followed.

Let's travel to V.32 and meet A.D. and Vee Flowers, residents for some 9 years, who are looking forward to their 50th Wedding Anniversary next October.

A.D., Texas born, spent his young life in Oklahoma and soon after high school took an assignment to drive a car to Los Angeles. "This part of the country sure looked great," he recalls, "and I never looked back."

His first employment was with a large bakery and that's when Vee entered his life. Vee participated in a wide variety of sports while at Hamilton H.S. She played tennis, volleyball, basketball, Ping-Pong, plus swimming and diving. But playing softball, both in high school and later with a semi-pro team, was her real love. The girls attracted large crowds in the late '30's and received good newspaper coverage throughout much of southern California.

A friend of A.D.'s, wanting to date that "popular ball player," but being a little timid, arranged for a foursome date, the friend taking a casual friend and matching A.D. and Vee together. "His friend's plan backfired," says a smiling See PROFILEPg 15

Vee. "A.D. and I were married three months later.'

Thanks to Vee's father and uncle having employment at MGM, both were able to find jobs there. A.D. started as a laborer, then helped on sets. moved to prop assembly and then on to special effects. World War II took him away for two years and he returned to his former employer. In the years that followed they raised two children, a boy and a girl.

As A.D.'s skills improved, he moved into the explosive division of special effects and "20,000 Leagues Under the Sea" and "Ben Hur" were two of the great films in which he played a minor role behind the scenes. The thriller "Dillinger" saw his name listed for special effects and this was followed by many segments of such popular TV series as "Gunsmoke," "I Love Lucy" and "The Untouchables."

In the late 1960's he rose to new heights during the filming of "Tora, Tora, Tora," All who viewed that film will long remember the "explosive" scenes planned and executed under A.D.'s supervision.

The Academy of Arts and Sciences, in their 1970 awards, presented A.D. with his first gold "Oscar." Two years later, on the same stage, A.D. again stepped forward to
