### Be Sure To Vote

"The purpose of **INSIDE LEISURE VILLAGE** is to enhance and brighten our quality of life by broadening the news of LV residents, activities, special events and the actions of committees and the LVA board." This excerpt is from the first ILV issue, dated March 29, 1979.

After 14 plus years, the aim of Inside Leisure Village remains the same . . . **TO INFORM**. As a totally independent, non-partisan newspaper, ILV is neither controlled by nor beholden to the LVA board or any committee. In 1993 as in 1979, ILV is the resident's newspaper.

No responsibility of ILV is greater than (impartially) informing villagers of the annual election of new Board members. The Nominating Committee has selected four qualified candidates -- Robert Atz, Frank Craven, Donna Duke and Dick Griswold -- to run for three positions on the Board. ILV editorial policy does not permit endorsement of any board candidate. All board candidates speak for themselves. On pages 10-11 you will find profiles of the candidates and their priorities in managing and improving Leisure Village.

Candidates Night will be held on Thursday, June 3 at 7:30 p.m. in the AR. This is a great opportunity to get acquainted with the candidates and learn what their goals are for the Village. Each candidate will answer questions from the audience. Attend in person if you possibly can; if not, be sure to tune in Channel 12 for the live telecast.

Proxies will be mailed on or about May 28 to all homeowners. You may cast your vote in this manner; seal the proxy in the envelope provided and deposit it in the Proxy Boxes located in the Recreation Center and the Association office. Or, if you prefer, mail the ballot to office, 200 Leisure Village Drive, 93012.

If you do not use the proxy, sign in for the Annual Meeting on June 24 between 8:30 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. in the MPR. You will receive a ballot at that time. Cast your vote on the ballot and place it in the ballot box.

You have now been informed on how to be an informed voter for the Board of Directors election on June 24, 1993. Vote either by proxy or by ballot prior to the Annual Meeting on June 24. But be sure to vote for the candidates of *your choice*.

This federally enacted law provides comprehensive civil rights entitlement for individuals with disabilities. The ADA prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability in public services, transportation, public accommodations and telecommunications. Curb to

curb transportation for qualified disabled can be arranged.

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
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## EXERCISE GROUP

And of course, we are all anxiously awaiting our gala annual picnic, June 25, with prizes galore, games, and the best food. See you there.



## Village Wins Award





The highlight of the L.V. Amateur Radio Club meeting on May 4 was the fascinating talk by Herb Arnold (W6NEZ).

His earnest and amusing tale of his work on the Nike missile program after WW2 with the German scientists at the Huntsville, Alabama rocket facility kept everyone's strict attention. The story led up to the creation of NASA and the moon voyage.

Larry Sawyer began the reading segment with his story of the woman's choice between identical twins. His surprise ending led to a discussion about obscurity and/or subtle-


ty, various forms of realism, and over-explaining. John Callas read a first section of his novel.

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
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


