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ADD/DROP EXTENDED TO JUNE 1st

President Ellis McGune sent a letter to Dr. James L. Comer, Chairman of the Academic Senate in regards to action taken by the Academic Senate on May 12, 1970. It said in part:

"The Faculty and Administration of California State College, Hayward, recognize that present conditions require that the College remain open, but in an expanded capacity.

1. In courses where appropriate, students may, with the consent and approval of the instructor, substitute relevant outside activities for other prescribed course work.
2. The add-drop period will be extended to June 1, 1970 to permit a student, under currently established procedures,
 - (1) to drop a course without penalty, or
 - (2) to change, within the limits of existing regulations, from a letter-grade basis of enrollment to a pass-no pass basis.
3. Normal course work will be continued as scheduled to allow those students not wishing to avail themselves of these options to complete the work for which they are enrolled."

COMMUNITY ACTION TRUCKS ON

Community Action, located in trailer F-13, is a moderate liason between the Cal-State movement and the Hayward community. To this end, the committee has set-up tables in three shopping centers, Southland, Bayfair, and Garvells, which are open 9am-9pm 7 days a week. These tables are manned by students (and community people) to bring petitions, cards, and leaflets to the community.

The three sub-committees need help. One gathers speakers for local groups (PTA, etc.) and is headed by Steve Mason in the English Dept., ex.659. Another seeks to support Mayor Howell (who has come under powerful attack by the forces of reaction in Hayward) while the third supports AB 1674 (the Vasconcellos Bill) by writing Carlos Bee, who is "on the fence" about the bill.

New committees are in the making and Community Action is open for advice and suggestions.

CHICANO RALLY

"Twice as much for ten times less." For every 100 persons in the country, 10 are Chicano. Yet in the war in South-East Asia, for every 100 who die 20 are Chicano. And in the colleges, for every 100 students, only 2 are Chicano. Twice as much for ten times less.

Several Chicanos and Filipinos spoke at the rally held yesterday at the Agora. "We are still here--we have not been wiped out," said one Chicano speaker. He also said that the troops that are on the campuses today are the same ones who tried to force the Chicanos out of their own territory.

The director of the Centro de la Raza, Antonio Mondragon, welcomed the white revolutionaries to the struggle he said the Chicanos had been fighting for decades.

Prof. Elsa Garcia of the Foreign Language Department said that the Chicanos had been trying to make the universities more relevant and democratic since 1918. She also said that she wished the universities would never return to "Business as Usual."

One Chicano student said that "Our war is here! This is occupied Mexico!"

Frank Arias, speaking for the Filipinos on campus said that the Filipino cultural day scheduled for yesterday had been cancelled in support of the strike. He asked where all the whites were who asked for third-world participation earlier in the week.

This seemed to be the general tone of the rally. The third-world students were welcoming the whites to the struggle, but were wondering where they had been all along.

WILFIRE PROFILE GRABBLE FINCH BY THE BALLS

On Wednesday seventeen demonstrators vamped on the office of Robert Finch, Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare. Having liberated the office they proceeded to verbally attack Finch and the establishment.

George Wiley, executive director of the National Welfare Rights Organization, directed the attack while sitting in Finch's very own big-time, U.S. of A., official cabinet chair. Mr. Finch had to make other accommodations.

Finch appeared calm as he listened to attacks on the war, demands for domestic help and chances of being a "flunky for President Nixon." His most responsive reaction was gripping the arm of the chair he sat in.

After an hour of torment Finch left. His office had been liberated and he had been reduced to a political dart board as the demonstrators hurled bullseye after bullseye.

The Seventeen stayed in the office and were later arrested by the local forces of reaction.

MEDITATE FOR PEACE
(At home and abroad)
(Silence is golden)

Much has been said in behalf of the anti-war movement. Everything said and done is designed to bring peace at home and abroad. Many have spoken on campus and across the nation and surely we are progressing towards peace. Somehow, however, complexity and sometimes confusion arises as to how to best to solve the problem. A couple of simple questions come to mind in quest for the best solution:

1. How does one stop water from running from a faucet?
2. What is the most common way to put out a fire?

To a complicated mind or nation answers to these questions will undoubtedly be considered an over simplification. However, common sense readily lead you to the appropriate noncomplicated solution. A third and relevant question then is, "How do we put an end to an unjust war? Declare peace," your logical sensible mind tells you. Since our national elected leaders seem to intelligent to draw these same reasonable conclusion, we must show them how it's done. Meditate on:

1. Peace-demonstrate in your daily life peace with all of your brothers and sisters.
2. Love-that love that overcomes all obstacles. The Sharing giving kind. Show love to at least one person you thought impossible to love.
3. Joy-receive the joy that's yours from the exalted and elated feeling of well being that comes from loving.
4. Happiness-look, feel, Be Happy!
5. Harmony-the rhythm and lucidity which is indicative of a harmonious life.

Since we realize we receive only what we give, there is nothing or no one to fear because we care to give only those things we want to receive. When you smile at your lover, for example, it is only natural that you receive a smile in return. So it is with all things.

A speaker expounded a very pertinent point at the recent convocation on campus when he explained how we must attack the causes of our problems rather than the symptoms. The obvious causes of war is a lack of Peace. Thus, our reason for meditation for peace.

The Blacks expounded on unrest at Cal-State and in America as well as our involvement in Southeast Asia. Now we have the opportunity to focus on unrest within each of our personal lives. Where is peace within ourselves? Until this personal question is sufficiently answered, there is no need for us to try to answer critical problems affecting other lives.

The following questions is a test to determine whether you are ready to solve problems existing in Southeast Asia or America. Even if you answer all, you will gain by meditating with us at least one hour per day until this unjust war ends. They are:

1. Is there peace in your home?
2. -with your lover, wife, or husband?
3. -with your blood sister or brother?
4. Finally, are you at peace with yourself?
