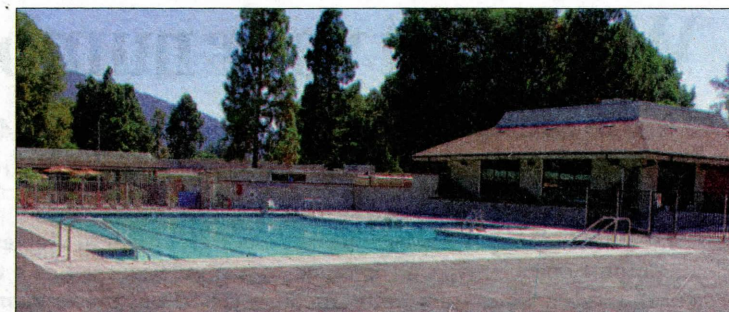

For more years than any of us can remember, the Star has been our publishing partner, but like many good things in life, that arrangement has come to an end. To be sure, it is

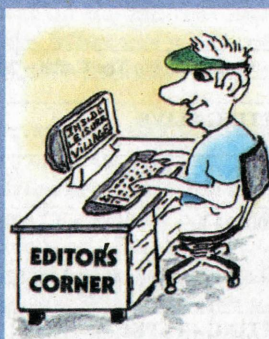

## Important dates for the 2016 Leisure Village Board election

Village homeowners will elect two members to the Board of Directors this year, and election season is nearly upon us. Traditional campaigning is not permitted - no signs, no rallies, no parades, etc. But voters will have the opportunity to get know the candidates at Candidates Night, the public question and answer event that allows residents to ask the candidates about their experience, their position on Village issues, and their goals if

elected. Candidates' biographies and personal statements will be posted in the Rec Center Atrium.

**Here are the important dates for Village voters:**

**Friday, April 22:** Deadline for candidates' nomination forms to the Nominating Committee and petitions to the Association Office.

**Monday, May 2:** Candidates will be formally introduced at LV's monthly Board meeting.

**Thursday, May 19:** Candidates Night.

**Friday, May 20:** Election Ballots mailed to homeowners.

**Wednesday, June 22, 5 p.m.:** Absentee ballots must be received in the Association Office.

**Thursday, June 23:** Election and Annual Meeting.

## Hometown hero recognized for bravery

LV Security Officer Matthew Harrison says he was just "helping out." Government agencies across the state - from Camarillo to Ventura County and up to the State Capital - call him "a lifesaver." Last fall as Matthew was driving home on Santa Rosa Road, he suddenly came upon an overturned SUV with flames licking around the vehicle; the driver was trapped inside. Matt singlehandedly pulled the man to safety.

Over the past months, recognition for his heroic action began to flow in, much to Matt's surprise. He has received a Ventura County Fire Department Lifesaving Medal, a Camarillo City honor, and proclamations for valor from the County Board of Supervisors, California State Senate and State Assembly. At first, he said the attention was embarrassing. Now he admits, "It's pretty cool."

Matt modestly credits timing for what he accomplished. "It happened seconds before I got there," he says. The car was

## Uncle Sam and the City of Camarillo want you!

A call to action has gone out to all local veterans of the Vietnam War. The City of Camarillo is planning a recognition ceremony for those men and women who served on active duty during that era - from Nov. 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975, regardless of location served - and asks veterans who live here now or lived locally during those years to register with the city for that event.

The ceremony will take place on Armed Forces Day, May 21, and will honor those veterans for their service with special certificates of recognition and a commemorative pin for each participant. The observance is part of a national program by the U.S. Department of Defense. Locally, it will be held in Constitution Park, complete with speakers, a Color Guard, and music.

Camarillo's event manager Kathy Talley reports that nearly 150 veterans have already registered for the event. "This is our opportunity to thank them now. And we will continue to honor this group at future events including Veterans Day in November," she says. To register, Vietnam veterans are asked to contact Kathy Talley by phone at 388-5312 or online at ktalley@cityofcamarillo.org. and provide name, branch of service, rank, dates of military service, mailing address, phone number, and email address.

Those eligible must be residents now (Kathy is eager for Leisure Village vets, she said) or have lived in Camarillo, Somis, the Heights, the Estates, or the Santa Rosa Valley at the time of their enlistment.

## REALTOR CORNER

Have you and/or your family been thinking about buying or selling real estate this spring? Interest rates today are 3.75%. Certainly an ideal time if a loan is going to be involved. All predictions are that rates will be higher later on this year which will significantly affect a monthly payment.

Here's an interesting example. Today's mortgage rate at 3.75% will cost approximately \$4.63 per \$1,000 of loan amount. If the interest rate increases to 4.25%, the cost will be approximately \$4.92 per \$1,000 of loan amount. The higher the interest rate, the more difficult for the buyer to qualify.

In addition to the monthly payment, the rate in California for property tax is approximately 1.25% of the assessed value, which is typically the selling price. If there

is a homeowner association, that amount will be added to the buyer's monthly payment, in addition to any insurance (homeowners, flood, earthquake).

are expected to begin lining up at the Fairgrounds before dawn on Saturday, April 16.

Community volunteers don't need any professional dental experience. Hundreds are needed to register patients, enter data, escort them to the professionals, and many other tasks. Volunteer dental professionals are also needed to meet the expected need. Since 2012, this annual

event provided care to over 16,000 county residents. County Supervisor Kathy Long calls the opportunity to donate time and talent to less fortunate people "community support that will restore dignity by creating more smiles." ## De Godmuthah Part 2

*Probably one of the most private things in the world is an egg before it is broken."*

—M.F.K. Fisher

Getting from Brazil to Italy is a geographical challenge, but at Leisure Village it is a simple stroll from Village 35 to Village 26 (just a few minutes and with no Zika virus to worry about) and that's about how long it will take you to prepare the featured dish for April, but first...

My friend Rudy was born in Rochester N.Y. born Rudolpho Nino Magnolia – although the way Rudy says it, it doesn't sound like the fragrant tree. Using his right hand to help, he tells me to pronounce it "man – yola." Both his parents came to the U.S. from Pignataro Maggiore, Italy, a small town west of Naples, in 1925. They settled in Fall River, Mass. before moving to Rochester which at that time was the center of the men's clothing industry. Manufacturers would put up bonds to get the best Italian tailors ...and Rudy's mother was one of the best. His

dad was a cabinet maker and classical musician.

"Mom wanted the boys in the kitchen, not my sister" Rudy said, "so I started cooking when I was a teenager. I wouldn't say she was tough but she would tell us to be home by noon for Sunday lunch or don't bother coming home at all." I said jokingly, "sounds like she was a tough mother." I don't know if I insulted him or what, but the next thing I know he produces a very sharp knife ... and a bowl containing 5 hardboiled eggs. "I'm gonna show you how to make Mama's egg and olive salad", he says, "My mom showed me how to make this dish when I was only 13" She called it

### **Bettina's Ouva ande Oliva Insalata**

The classic way to make this, is to peel 6 large hardboiled eggs that have cooled properly, rinse off the little bits of shell, pat dry and put in a glass bowl.

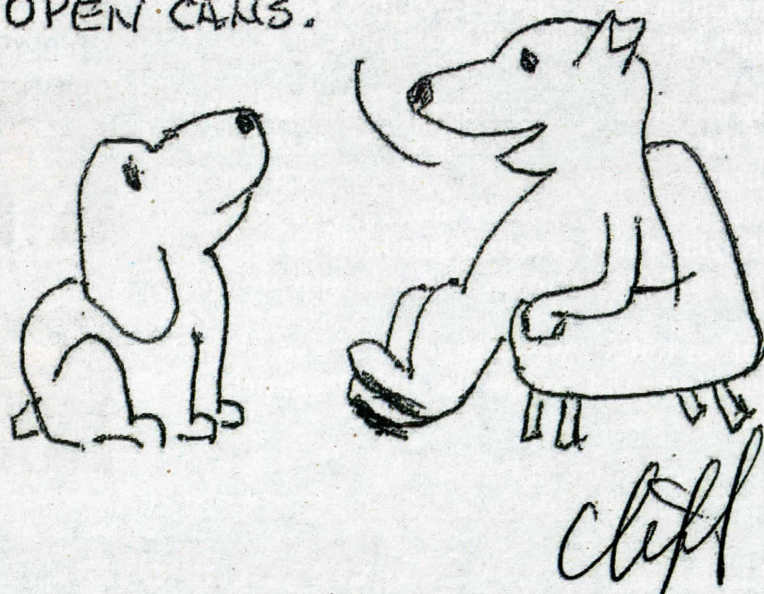
Refrigerate for at least 4 hours. (Why? I was afraid to ask...just do it) With a sharp knife, slice and chop the eggs into a small dice while in the glass bowl. Finely chop 4 oz. of Manzanilla olives with pimentos into the same size chop as the eggs. Mix

# Loneliness and isolation can affect senior health

(Part 2 of 2)

**Loneliness Can Mean a Shorter Lifespan:** When researchers at the University of California, San Francisco, followed a group of seniors for six years, they found that by the end of the study, almost a quarter (22.8 percent) of all the older adults who had reported feeling isolated or lonely had died. Another 25 percent had suffered significant health declines. In contrast, among seniors who said they were happy or satisfied with their social lives, only 12.5 percent had declining health, and only 14.2 percent had died.

**Ways You Can Help Protect Seniors from Loneliness:**

- Help seniors become more social-media savvy through their use of mail, news sites and sites of interest (music,

hobbies, shopping, etc.) and connections through Facebook.

- Provide companionship with conversation and activities such as cooking and eating together, reading aloud to the senior, playing games, scrapbooking, listening to music, or taking a walk.

- Provide transportation to seniors so that they may visit family and friends, go shopping, attend events, and visit outdoor venues such as parks.

- Help a loved one find support and/or social groups at senior centers, YMCAs, places of worship-wherever seniors tend to gather.

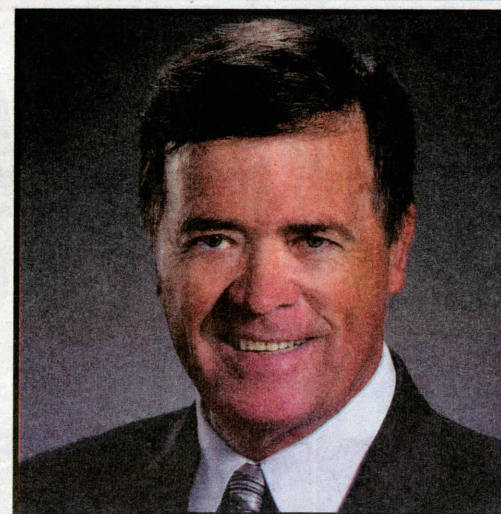

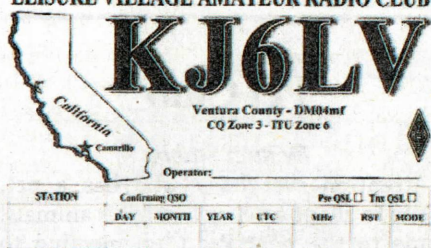

## The Amateur Radio Club

This past month, the QSL card we designed for the LV Amateur Radio Club was printed. These cards play a key role in documenting a contact that was made with another station. Their history dates back to the 1920s when collecting these cards became popular with the listeners of the early AM radio stations.

At our March meeting we had a guest speaker, Steve King, who spoke about the newest technology in ham radio. We now have the ability to set up and automatically connect to our own Intranet system of stations. This is like the Internet but is completely independent, totally wireless and allows communication when normal Internet systems go down. Steve explained how easily the normal Internet, phone systems and cell phones can be disabled when fiber optic lines are cut or cell tower systems fail. Sometimes that has happened due to hackers and earthquakes but other times it's an accident when just digging for a construction project. The new MESH network system wirelessly links together and is being used in disaster communications. We are planning to be a part of that system here at Leisure Village.

As we make more use of the Ham Shack here at Leisure Village, you can be one of those people that makes new contacts with another country or just locally within the county. The experience gained will help us all if ever needed in an emergency situation and in the meantime it's a fun hobby. So please join us. You do not have to be a licensed amateur radio operator to be a member. If you want, we will provide help in getting your license and it's now easier than ever since Morse code is no longer required. ## Bill Proposes to make HOA fees tax deductible

It is called Helping Our Middle-Income Earners Act or HOME Act and was introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives on March 3, 2016 by two California legislators. The proposal would allow

a federal tax deduction for community association assessments, up to \$5000 for homeowners who make up to \$115,000 in annual income.

The HOME Act is designed to provide

tax relief for people who live in condominium associations, housing cooperatives, and homeowner associations like Leisure Village. U.S. Representatives Anna Eshoo (CA-18), who represents a portion of the Silicon Valley, and Mike Thompson, who represents District CA-5 that includes the Napa Valley-Santa Rosa area, report that

these associations have grown in recent years because they offer more affordable housing. According to their statistics, 65 million Americans now live in 26 million units in some kind of community association. It's estimated that more than 1.5 million people over the age of 55 in California live in such associations.

going eastbound on Santa Rosa Road when the driver lost control, crossed all lanes (taking out a tree), and flipped on its top. The smoke from the fire was so thick that Matthew thought it was a broken sprinkler as he drove into it. Then he saw the flames and the trapped driver, and his training kicked in. He parked his truck across the road to protect oncoming traffic. He carries a rescue tool that can break glass and cut through seat belts, which he pulled out along with his duty flashlight as he ran to the SUV. In seconds, Matt broke the window. The driver was conscious. With Matt's help, he crawled out of the car safely.

Matt, who has had first responder training as do all Village officers, insisted that the driver lie down and helped him keep his neck stable until firefighters and paramedics arrived at the scene. "The driver was worked up; but he was not seriously injured," he recalls. Matt was handed a fire extinguisher and put out the fire. "And then I went home," he smiles and says quietly, "I was happy that he was ok."

Matthew Harrison has been a member of LV's Security Patrol Team for most of eight years. When he first signed on, he planned for it to be a stepping-stone to law enforcement. But he changed his mind about that. "I love my work here because I like helping people," he explains. His awards for heroism are on his wall at home. He says he gets a different kind of reward in the Village regularly.
