## CAL STATE FULLERTON

California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing.

Classes were offered for the first time in 1959 and the first commencement — for five students — took place in 1960.

The University's 24,000 students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and other nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes; many come to classes only in the evening.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 775-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The University enjoys full accreditation for its overall program. In addition, national recognition has been accorded to programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, dance, education, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing, and theatre. All told there are 85 degree programs — 41 of them at the graduate level plus several credential programs and six certificate programs.


Reinforcing classroom instruction is an internship and cooperative education program that allows students to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their regular studies.

Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours without the formalities of regular admission to the University.

Still another strong point is the University's cultural events program. It includes a series that brings nationally known professional artists to the campus for residencies as well as public performances.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members is another highlight, as is the network of community support groups. Another is Continuing Learning Experience, which spearheaded the fund-raising campaign to build a gerontology center on campus.

Further examples of community outreach are joint ventures with the City of Fullerton. One resulted in the Fullerton Arboretum, which opened on campus in 1979. Another produced lighting for the baseball field and adjoining soccer fields, while a third yielded two lighted softball fields. The long-awaited reality of an on-campus football/soccer complex and baseball stadium in conjunction with an on-campus Marriott Hotel recently was approved with a fall, 1989 completion date targeted for the athletic facilities. To reinforce the University's commitment to high academic standards and community services. Cal State has embarked on a comprehensive fund-raising campaign. Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to make a very good university a great university.





## **ED CARROLL, ATHLETIC DIRECTOR**

The rapid climb of Ed Carroll through the ranks of the Cal State Fullerton athletic department culminated in his appointment as Director of Athletics on July 1, 1985.

University President Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb made the announcement on May 28, 1985, after a nationwide search and Carroll, now 36, immediately ushered in an era of "positive thinking" for Titan athletics.

"One of my promises is to enhance the image of our athletic program by stressing positives," says Carroll. "We must use the power of positive thinking to overcome our limitations and build our program to greater heights."

In his first year as athletic director, Carroll immediately upgraded the football schedule. LSU, Florida, West Virginia and Tulsa have signed on to host the Titans over the next few years with several other major universities currently in negotiations to play Fullerton.

Carroll began his Fullerton athletic career as a wrestler. In 1972, he served as team captain and was selected the "Most Outstanding Wrestler" in the California Collegiate Athletic Association championship meet. He later served as an assistant to former head coach Don Matson.

Carroll earned bachelor's degrees in history and physical education from Fullerton as well as a secondary teaching credential. He taught physical education classes at Fullerton and earned a master's degree in recreation administration from CSU Long Beach.

After serving in various capacities in the Fullerton recreation department, Carroll left briefly in mid-1980 to serve as a recreational sports programmer and doctoral intern at Indiana University. He returned to Fullerton in November, 1980 as an assistant athletic director. From October, 1981, to April, 1982, he was acting athletic director and also acting director of the Titan Athletic Foundation. He then served under athletic director Lynn Eilefson, who left in January, 1985 for a similar post at San Jose State.

## **HEAD COACH JUDI GARMAN**

Beginning her ninth season at Cal State Fullerton, Judi Garman has led the Titans to no less than a ninth place national finish, an NCAA National Championship and 416 career victories in her seven-year tenure. A co-remarkable accomplishment for the only coach in the program's history.

Garman established the program in 1980 and finished third in the conference, second in the region and ninth place nationally. Since then, Garman's teams have won every conference title, including the 1987 PCAA Co-Championship, and six out of seven regional championships while finishing second in the College World Series in 1981, 1983 and 1985 and third in 1982 and 1987.

Garman's tremendous success at Fullerton is only the latest in a remarkable string of accomplishments which stretch across the continent from Canada to Santa Barbara to Golden West College in Huntington Beach to Cal State Fullerton.

Garman earned her bachelor's degree from the University of Saskatchewan in 1966 and then moved to California where she began working on her master's degree at UCSB. While at Santa Barbara, she started club softball. Upon completion of her studies, she took the women's athletic director position at Westmont College in Santa Barbara and coached the volleyball, basketball and tennis programs in addition to softball.

Garman then moved to Golden West College where, along with softball, she coached basketball (1973-76) and cross-country (1977-79). Twenty-one of her softball players received scholarships to four-year institutions, against whom she manufactured a 34-11-2 record over the years.

Fishing and snow skiing occupy Garman's time away from the softball field. She has also been published in many physical education journals and was a pioneer in the equality of sports movement when she played Little League baseball.

## ASSOCIATE COACH MARTY RUBINOFF

First-year Associate Coach Marty Rubinoff brings a world of experience and knowledge to his new job at Cal State Fullerton. Formerly the coach of the six-time national champion California Raiders of the ASA, Rubinoff has all the necessities

to become a very positive addition to the Titan program.

Rubinoff grew up with a baseball/softball background. He started playing fastpitch softball as a child in Toronto, Ontario until he moved to southern California when he was 13, playing in men's fastpitch leagues until he was 18. He signed a professional contract with the San Francisco Giants, playing for their Class A Decatur affiliate for three seasons (1972-74). In 1974, he left baseball and picked softball back up as a player in the Western Softball Congress (ISC) men's open division and played for 10 years while participating in five national championships and winning two ISC World Titles. In 1985, he captained the USA National team at the Maccabiah Games in Israel and was named MVP of the fastpitch competition.

While coaching the Raiders, Rubinoff was involved in the development of Titan outfielder Tiny Glomboske and a number of present collegiate stars. He

has also been involved in hitting clinics throughout the United Stats and New Zealand.



## ASSISTANT COACH LINDA SHAFOR

An integral part of the Titan coaching staff, Linda Shafor returns to the Titans for her fourth season as a part-time assistant coach with a direct responsibility in overseeing Fullerton's young outfield. Prior to the 1986 season, Shafor had worked with Garman in the latter's rookie season and returned in time to help the Titans win the 1986 NCAA Championship.

Coach Shafor possesses a wide and varied softball background from her playing days with the Sun City Saints (1966-67) to serving as the player-coach with the Huntington Park Blues in 1970. Shafor took over as head coach at LA Harbor College in 1971 and ran the program until 1979 when the program was suspended for two years. From there, she went to the University of Arizona as an assistant for one season followed by her one year stint with the Titans in 1980.

Shafor returned to Harbor College in 1981 as the head coach when the program was reinstated. The sport was dropped last year but Shafor remains as a physical education and math professor.

Shafor is a 1966 graduate of The Ohio State University with a degree in physical education. She went on to receive her master's degree in PE at California State University, Long Beach.

## **TITANS LOOK TO RELOAD IN 1988**

Okay, here's the scenario.

You've lost your entire outfield, among them is a two-time All-America leftfielder who hit .400 with a single season record 23 stolen bases, a veteran All-PCAA centerfielder who finished second on the team in RBI's and a two-time All-PCAA power hitting rightfielder.

In addition, you're first-team All-PCAA catcher has graduated along with an All-PCAA third baseman that was a member of the

1987 US Pan American squad.

And if that's not enough the nation's dominant pitcher, a first-team All-America and the 1987 Broderick Award winner, has also had her eligibility expired.

Desperation time? Bring in those walk-ons? Forget it!

Despite losing a lineup that finished 59-10 (third place at the College World Series), the Cal State Fullerton softball team looks like a strong bet to return to the CWS with a group of talented and experienced young players.

"All of our non-pitchers, despite many a junior and sophomore, have solid collegiate experience," commented eighth-year Head Coach Judi Garman. "Our pitching staff is very young, but very

talented, and can be a very positive force for us this season."

The outfield looks set with three returning sophomores expected to step right in. Left hander Missy Coombes, a second-team All-PCAA selection last season at first base, enjoyed a phenomenal rookie season after hitting .336 with a team high 38 RBI's. Coombes will return to her natural position of left field. Centerfield should be filled by switch hitter Tiny Glomboske, another player who earned All-PCAA honors (second-team designated hitter) as a freshman last season. Glomboske is a prototype centerfielder with an aggressive attitude in the field and at the plate. The former El Dorado HS star hit .289 for the Titans along with 28 RBI's. Another left hander, sophomore Carey Hess, appears set in right field. Blessed with a strong arm and good speed, Hess hit .344 in limited action last year. Pushing these three for playing time is versatile redshirt freshman Mich DeBree.

The middle infield will be the most experienced in the lineup as well as being among the best in the country. Second baseman Valerie Van Kirk has been a three-year starter and one of only four seniors on the roster. One of the nation's premier defensive second baseman, Van Kirk also enjoyed an excellent year with the bat hitting .240. Veteran shortstop Charis Monroe (.295) has been a

starter since early in her freshman season and missed 26 games last season due to injuries, but appears in great shape for 1988. Freshman **Yvette Hernandez** (All-CIF Cerritos HS) is an able replacement for Van Kirk or any of the infield positions as is redshirt freshman **Jill Matyuch**.

First base should be occupied by two-sport athlete **Cathi Hall.** The 6-1 left hander has been a center for the women's basketball team for two years but enjoyed an even greater claim when she knocked Fresno State out of the College World Series with a run scoring double off the fence. Hall hit .295 for the Titans with 16 runs batted in in only 47 games. Freshman pitcher **Anjie Bryant** will also see some action at first base as can Coombes.

Third base appears settled with returning senior Valerie Douglas (.301). The Pasadena JC transfer possesses exceptional speed and

proved to be a very valuable reserve last season.

Catching duties appear set for returning senior **Debbie Schneider**. Schneider served as an understudy to Michelle Gromacki last season while hitting .247 in 89 at bats. Backing up Schneider is redshirt sophomore **Kristin Goodall**. Goodall hit .203 for the Titans in limited action in 1986.

But the dominant position in softball is still pitching. And despite losing the nation's best in Connie Clark, Fullerton will try to replace

her with a committee of strong arms.

Leading the way appears to be the left-handed freshman Bryant. the team's hardest thrower, Bryant is also an excellent hitter who can see time as the designated player or at first base. Returning to softball after a year's absence is freshman right-hander **Jackie** (formerly Oakley) **Pittman** who was the 1985 USA TODAY Female Prep Athlete of the Year after leading Ocean View High School to the CIF Championship.

Returning sophomores **Janis Okerlund** and **Chris Gage** have shown great improvement over the summer and should also be a factor. Okerlund posted a 15-3 record last year with an earned run

average at 0.66 while Gage was 10-2 and an ERA at 0.66.

For the Titans to continue to enjoy the same success that has made them one of the nation's elite programs, they must see positive results from an inexperienced set of pitchers. The rest of the lineup appears set with a solid set of bats and the ever popular enthusiasm of youth.

As is the case every season, the Titans' goal is a trip to the College World Series. With a strong and talented nucleus, the likelihood of a post season trip to San Jose appears very promising.








Paula DeBree Utility 5-4 Freshman La Habra, CA


Third Base 5-2 Senior Altadena, CA

## Connie Clark 1987 Broderick Award Winner

Softball pitcher Connie Clark, a 1987 first-team All-America, became the third Titan to win the prestigious Broderick Award given to the top collegiate athlete in each of the ten women's sports.


Clark posted a 33-5 overall record in leading the Titans to a thirdplace finish at last May's College World Series. In addition, she led Fullerton and the Pacific Coast Athletic Association with a 0.47 earned run average and 261 strikeouts in 283 innings pitched.

The Phoenix, Arizona native was 53-7 with 458 strikeouts and an earned run average of 0.36 in two years. In addition to earning 1987 All-America honors, Clark was the 1987 Co-Player of the Year in the PCAA (along with Rhonda Wheatley of Cal Poly Pomona), 1987 All-West Region and a member of the 1986 All-College World Series team. Clark transferred to Fullerton after earning JC All-America honors at Central Arizona Community College and All-State honors at Greenway High School in Phoenix.

Clark joins Susan LeFebvre (1986) and Kathy Van Wyk (1982) as Titans who have won the award.

## TITANS FINISH THIRD AT 1987 COLLEGE WORLD SERIES

GAME I - Fullerton opened up CWS play with their first game ever against Southern Regional Champion Florida State. The Seminoles sent former Orange County star Julie Larsen to the mound to face Titan All-America Connie Clark. The game remained scoreless until the top of the fourth when the Titans rallied with two down. After Chenita Rogers and Rina Foster tallied outs, Tiny Glomboske gave the Titans their first hit of the game. Lisa Baker dropped a line drive into short center giving Fullerton runners at second and third. Missy Coombes then lined a single into center scoring Glomboske and sending Baker to third. Florida State's Carolyn Fiero was then credited with a passed ball to score Baker and the Titans were up 2-0. In the fifth, Rogers singled home Alani Silva to close out the scoring for both sides. Clark allowed just three hits and struck out six in winning her 32nd game of the season. FINAL SCORE: CS Fullerton 3. Florida State 0

GAME II - Many people consider this the real national championship game and widely thought of as one of the greatest softball games in College World Series history. The defending NCAA Champs were facing the 1986 runner-up Texas A & M Aggies. The country's two best pitchers, Clark and Texas A & M's Shawn Andaya would be the stars of this contest that carried through 13 innings. The game stood at a 0-0 deadlock through the first ten innings, including two innings of tie-breaker. In the top of the eleventh, the Aggies got on the board. Zina Ochoa began the inning on second base and then was sacrificed to third. An infield grounder by Carrie Heightley eludes everybody and scores the go ahead run. In Fullerton's half of the eleventh, Foster opened at second and was sacrificed to third. After Baker hits back to Andaya. Coombes ties the game on an infield single that ties up the Aggies' Julie Smith.

Neither team scored in the twelfth despite Fullerton posting runners at the corners with nobody out. In the top of the thirteenth, Judy Trussell opens at second for the Aggies followed by an Andaya walk. Liz Mizera strikes out looking for one out. Ochoa grounds to Monroe at short who gets Trussell going to third for the second out. Newkirk steps up and singles to center to score Andaya with the winning run. The Titans fail in their half of the 13th and the 3 hour and 25 minute game is over. For Andaya, she allows seven hits, one unearned run and 13 strikeouts. Connie Clark allows two runs (one earned), four hits and 11 strikeouts.

FINAL SCORE: Texas A & M 2, CS Fullerton 1 (13 innings)

GAME III - A tired Titan team takes the field on Saturday afternoon to face PCAA rival Fresno State in an elimination game. After playing until midnight the night before, Titan ace Clark takes the circle again against Fresno State's Melanie Parrent. The Bulldogs got on the board in the top of the fifth when Shelly Stokes singled home Kim Mecum. It appeared as if the Titans should begin packing for home in the bottom of the seventh as they were down by a run. Then came THE RALLY. Silva opened up the inning with a single followed by a Gena Strang error putting Michelle Gromacki at first and Silva at second. Monroe's sacrifice attempt forces Silva at third but Monroe is safe at first and Gromacki is standing at second. Cathi Hall, in the biggest hit of her collegiate career, doubled off the top of the right field fence to score Gromacki with the tying run and sent Monroe to third. Rogers then sends a sacrifice fly to deep right and the Titans have come back to win the game. FINAL SCORE: CS Fullerton 2, Fresno State 1

GAME IV - Like so many times in years' past, the Titans were facing UCLA in the College World Series. No surprise as Clark goes to the circle to face UCLA's Samantha Ford. The only run of the game came in the bottom of the fourth when UCLA's Karen Walker singled home Janice Parks. Fullerton could place only one runner on third (Rogers in the first) all night and never really threatened offensively. Just when it appeared that Ford may be tiring, the Bruins sent in freshman fireballer Lisa Longaker to shut them down. UCLA went into Sunday's competition needing to win only one of two games. They fell in both to Texas A & M as the Aggies earned their second NCAA Championship. 32 FINAL SCORE: UCLA 1, CS Fullerton 0


