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#### **Exhibit Curators Statement**

"Black Spartans (1907-1948)" represents ongoing research in SJSU Special Collections & Archives identifying documentation of Black experiences throughout SJSU history. This exhibit is the first of several installments.

Much of the information we have comes from the Spartan Daily student newspaper and the La Torre yearbooks. With too few exceptions, Black Spartans' stories are not told in their own words but from the perspectives of their majority white classmates. This is reflected in the language and focus of the articles. We invite you to read critically.

The Black Spartans featured in this exhibit pursued their educational goals while contending with institutionalized racism and other major crises of the 20th century: two World Wars, the influenza pandemic of 1918, and polio. Locally, "the deed to virtually every home in San Jose" included restrictions against Black and Asian residents known as "restrictive covenants" (Spartan Daily, February 16, 1948, page 2). On campus, blackface and minstrel shows were a regular part of student events.

"Black Spartans (1907-1948)" is an invitation to the community to join us in surfacing these stories, ensuring these histories are preserved and presented in a way that honors these students' lives. Contact us at special.collections@sjsu.edu to participate.


#### **Artist Statement**

The "Black Spartans (1907-1948)" exhibition is a homage to Black culture and history at San José State University and the Bay Area at large. Until recently, the significance of Black bodies in Bay Area history (as well as U.S. history) was overlooked. Unless it was associated with the struggles of civil rights leaders, athletes, or celebrity-personas, the story of a graduate from a state school wasn't valued because we weren't part of the mainstream culture. As a Black Spartan myself, I was deeply connected to these individuals that started out just like me. I saw a reflection of myself and my community throughout the process of making these mixed media portraits and came to realize how important it is to know your history because it becomes a catalyst for knowing who you are.

My work explores the intricacy of identity and the role culture, tradition, and history play. These portraits are embodiments of our Black Spartans, they are visual representations of the colorful and captivating lives they led. Through this work, I hope to influence other artists and individuals to take part in researching and finding out the infinite layers of what it means to be Black. Our history is beyond our struggle. We are the blueprint.

Aubrey Minter attended San Jose State College from 1940-1944. He was a football halfback, baseball player, and novice boxer. Minter was a member of the football team when they traveled to Hawaii in November 1941 to play against both University of Hawaii and Willamette University. The trip was violently interrupted by the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, and Minter and his teammates spent the weeks after the attack assisting the local police and engaging in the work of digging trenches, installing barbed wire, and patrolling to ensure the safety of the island's inhabitants. Minter and his teammates' experience is detailed in the book "Scrimmage for War: A Story of Pearl Harbor, Football, and WWII."




A couple of the Spartan gridders looked bewildered, scratched their heads, and said, "Titchenal? Who's he?"

# San Jose Crushes Nevada 28-0 For 5th Straight Win

San Jose State Spartan football warriors victimized their fifth straight opponent here last Saturday night, trapping the University of Nevada Wolves, 28-0.

The DeGroot-Warner machine manufactured its own breaks and then made the most of them to turn back the

Wolfpack. It was San Jose's "Maginot Line" that leaked through the Nevada forward wall to block two punts and pave the way for two of the locals' four touchdowns.

#### MINTER RAMBLES

Aubrey Minter, zig-zagging little sophomore halfback, provided the only real thrill of the ball game on an 80-yard run to a touchdown on Nevada's kickoff at the start of the second half. The diminutive colored boy took Mitch Cobeaga's boot on the 20, swung to the right sideline where he picked up an escort of Spartan interferers whose scythe-like blocking sprung him into the open. Once in the clear, Minter's tantalizing hipaction carried him by the Nevada safety man for the score. Manoogian kicked the extra point.

San Jose's first scoring opportunity occured late in the first quarter, with Captain Bob Titchenal breaking through to block Cobeaga's punt that a swarm of Spartans recovered on the Nevada 20.

# 14,000 Witness State Finish Perfect Year

San Jose State's Spartans put a fitting finishing touch to its 1939 football season by polishing off the Drake University Bulldogs, 12-0 here last night as a crowd of 14,000 fans looked on. It was the co-coached Warner-DeGroot machine's thirteenth straight victory and the locals ended

> their schedule untied and undefeated to insure their chances of a "bowl" bid.

> San Jose ran up against a tough ball club in the person of the Drake team which gave the Spartans a bruising 60-minute gridiron battle. Except for a single penetration by the DeGrootmen deep into Drake territory in the second quarter, the first half was a battle that took place between the two 30-yard lines.

Sparta's lone touchdown in the first half came in the closing minutes of the second quarter after Guard Ken Cook crashed through and smeared Ned Swan's punt on the four-yard line where End Chuck Johnson recovered for the locals.

#### PEREGOY SCORES

One thrust at right guard by Carlton Peregoy at this point was all the Spartans needed to break the scoring ice. Ken Cook's attempted conversion was blocked.

San Jose's only real scoring march that matured came early in the fourth quarter and was sparked by Halback Aubrey Minter who ran the Bulldog defense ragged on reverse plays. The drive was good for 55 yards, starting on the State 45.

Zetterquist that penetrated Bulldog territory to the 41-yard line was followed by a 21-yard jaunt off right tackle by Aubrey Minter to the 20. An off-side penalty moved the Spartans back five yards, but a double reverse with Minter winding up with the pigskin placed San Jose down to the 10.


Minter and Manoogian wormed the ball down to the one-yard line, and a crashing drive at right guard by Fullback Dick Hubbell was good for the touchdown. Ken Cook's kick went wide.

Shortly afterwards the Spartans failed by inches of capitalizing on a 47-yard drive that found Minter and Manoogian teaming up to do most of the damage in advancing to the Bulldogs' two-yard line. Zimmerman then hit center but fumbled over the goal line where Drake recovered for a touchback.

#### SCORING THREAT

It was Carlton Peregoy who led a second quarter scoring threat that started on Sparta's 43 and ended on the Drake 13, where an attempted field goal by Ken Cook failed.


Statistically, the only decisive edge shown by the Spartans was in their passing attack by which they gained 50 yards to none for the 'Dogs. From scrimmage the locals rolled up a net yardage of 99 to the visitors' 82. First downs were 11 to 6 in favor of San Jose.

# NOVICE CHAMPS CROWNED

Boxing Tourney Ends The sixth annual Novice Boxing tournament ended in a deadlock Friday night, as the Spartan Knights and the Tau Delta Phi In Deadlock; Spartan Knights, Tau Delts Tie

Knights and the Tau Delta Phi honor fraternity tied for the team championship with 26 points apiece. Each organization will be awarded the trophy for a six-month period.

The Hawaiian club was third with 20 points, and the P.E. majors fourth with 16. Eckert Hall finished with four points, while the 330 club was first with one point.

A capacity crowd of over 2000 witnessed the fights, virtually all of which were slugfests. Eckert Hall with a siren and a yell leader, lead the organizations for the

120-Pound class produced one of the best boxing bouts of the evening with Bob Webber of the Tau Delts winning the championship over Eldon Becker, Spartan Knight southpaw. Both boys boxed cleverly with Webber having a slight edge in a very close and hard-fought

The heavyweight class was the thriller of the evening with Dave Osmond, slugging wrestler of the Hawaiian club, winning the title over Bob Ashcraft. Ashcraft was the better boxer, but Osmond's unorthodox slugging tactics, and aggressiveness was enough to win the title.

Another thriller in the 118pound class pitted Jim Fahn of the P.E. majors against Bud Rideout of the Spartan Knights. Fahn and his wild swings was too strong for Rideout and floored him in the second, but in the third, Rideout again began to get the range with a long left jab, and a hooking right that brought the crowd to its feet as the boys stood toe to toe. 



The 1939 season marked San Jose's debut into "big time" football . . . . . As a team the Spartans gained widespread recognition by defeating U.S.F. and a strong intersectional opponent, Drake University . . . . An official intercollegiate football statistical summary released by the American Football Statistical Bureau ranked the Spartans as the leading defensive team and the third highest in the nation on the basis of total team performances. Another national gridiron publication called San Jose the "team of the year." . . . . Individual stars on the Spartan eleven also came in for their share of the glory. Fullback Leroy Zimmerman was accorded all-coast and "Little All-American" honors and was selected to play in the East-West Shrine game. His showing in this contest was heralded as the outstanding performance of the day . . . . . Tackles Bob Bronzan and Duke Tornell, Halfbacks Morris Manoogian and Aubrey Minter, Center Bob Titchenal, Ends Chuck Johnson and Johnny Allen, and Guard Ken Cook were other Spartans honored on mythical elevens . . . . . For the first time in San Jose football history San Jose was given serious consideration to play in one of the nation's post-season "bowl" games.



# **SAN JOSE RECORDS 24** FIRST DOWNS TO ONE FOR BEATEN MONTANA

Scooting Halfbacks Run Enemy Ends Ragged In Piling Up Big Yardage

Butte, Montana, Sept. 23-San Jose State college's Spartans went back to their high-scoring ways tonight as they buried Montana State's Bobcats under a 34 to 0 score before 5,000 fans.

The Spartans, rolling up their first win in two starts, were never threatened. They amassed nearly 400 yards from passes and scrimmage, chalking up 24 first downs as they shoved the Bobcats all over the Butte stadium sandlot.

Montana ended up with a net loss of 12 yards from scrimmage, and were able to make but one first down.

San Jose's first touchdown came with four minutes remaining in the first quarter, Tornell ramming over from the one yard line after a Spartan march of 85 yards. Little Aubrey Minter set up the score, going to the 3 yard line on a 10 yard double lateral from Tornell and Pursell. Captain Kenny Cook place-kicked the extra point.

#### NYGREN SCORES

A pass, Hubbell to Nygren, was good for 26 yards and the second San Jose score midway in the second period. Hubbell place-kicked the extra point to make it San Jose 14, Montana 0. Nygren featured this drive with a classy bit of running.

# SPARTANS HELD BY SOLDIERS

### SCORE LATE IN FOURTH QUARTER TO GAIN TIE WITH FORT ORD

The Golden Raiders of San Jose State college met their equal in Spartan stadium Friday night at the hands of a rugged Fort Ord eleven, managing to just hold their own and remain undefeated by "Mule" Minter on the 10-yard line coming from behind in the fourth quarter to knot the score at 6-6.

It was little but tough 170-pound Aubrey "Mule" Minter, left half 28-yard line. After two plays,

for the Spartans, who came through with a brilliant nine-yard run after taking a wide pass from Fullback Allen Hardisty, to pay dirt, despite the fact that three Fort Ord players were hanging on. Fred Lindsey, who was injured at the close of the half, was sent in to make the conversion but the big Soldier line crashed through to block the attempt.

Fort Ord won the toss and electand carried back 18 yards to the which gained nothing, Lindsay kicked into Soldier territory.

On the first play, Louis Davis passed to left end John Johnson for 20 yards with Minter stopping the play after it got by the other State secondaries. Pete Zagar, towering Fort Ord fullback, went for another first down on the next play, again being stopped by Minter in the secondary.

#### SPARTANS ROLL

San Jose then took over on downs and with an exchange on a fumble and a pass interception began to roll. Minter went for nine yards with Lindsay making it a first donw in a linge plunge. Hard hitting halfback Bert Robinson then galloped around left end for 24 yards for another first down and on the very next play picked up another seven yards. Lindsey again found a hole in the Fort Ord line and plowed to another first down, picking up 15 yards.

However, the Ord eleven took over at the end of the first quarter on a kick into the end zone after the Spartan drive had been

The Spartans came back fast, nowever, and took over on a punt. On the first play, Minter streaked around right end for 23 yards. Lindsey on three line-plunges made another first down. Minter picked up seven but the Ord eleven held and Lindsey kicked out of bounds on the five-yard line.

From then on it was a seesaw pattle with both teams punting out (Continued on Page 3)







Aubrey Minter registers amusement as a Hardin Simmons end goes into action. Fleet-footed Minter is running back a punt for a ten-yard gain



# Looking back at 'gold era' Alumni remember

Fans at Spartan Stadium Saturday celebrated the golden anniversary of an era in SJSU football that set the standards for all future Spartans to follow.

The years 1932-1939 were the years of the "perfect team", and more than 60 former players along with numerous other proud alumnic

with numerous other proud alumni came back to SJSU to reminisce about the most successful football team in Spartan history.

Special recognition was given in particular to the 1939 team that went undefeated and untied with a 13-0 record and scored a season total of

and scored a season total of 324 points while holding all 13 of its opponents to a paltry 38 points.

According to alumnus Jesse Murrey-Griffen, who traveled to SJSU from Citrus Heights, at least 100 alumni "survived" the 50 years and made it back for the reunion. and made it back for the reunion.
"The team of 1939 had the high-

est scoring team in the nation," said Griffen. "We actually went to 'a bowl game' that year."

That was the third consecutive year that the Spartan team had be ranked as the nation's high scorer.

The 1939 team's Glenn "Pop" Warner came out of retirement to devise an unstoppable offense for head coach Dudley DeGroot. The plan allowed SJSU to flat-

ten 13 opponents, according to San Jose State University Football Magazine.

This "wonder team" included fullback Leroy Zimmerman, halfback Herman Zetterquist, Morris Manoogian, Aubrey Minter, Howard Costello and Hugh Staley. All gaining yardage under the Warner strategy, the magazine reported.

In addition to participating in the Spartan's homecoming celebration, the golden alumni will also visit the campus and dine together after the game in the Faculty Cafeteria,
