

James Patrick Moore has been chief of the Safety and Security Services for Leisure Village since December 2001.

He started service at Leisure Village as a patrol officer in April of 1988. His service to the Village has been continuous except for a period from October 1998 through December 2000 when he was employed by Sears doing industrial security work.

Leisure Village is privi-

leged to have this man of honor and caring as chief of our welfare within the scope of his title.

Although born in Santa Monica, Jim has lived in Camarillo most of his lifetime and received his schooling in Camarillo. He has spent two years at Ventura College, where he hopes to receive an associate of arts degree in business.

Jim's interests are varied, but his strong area of interest at Adolfo Camarillo High School was agriculture. He



was active during high school in the 4-H Club and Future Farmers of America. He raised pigs at the Camarillo Ranch and had a special interest in Duroc pigs, which have dark red skin. He received numerous awards from both of these organizations.

He was active during high school as an Explorer Scout, working with the local Sheriff's Department in assisting with the Rural Crime Program and he rode along, on the streets, with the active deputies.

Unfortunately, some criminals enjoyed a season of generosity that may be a yearlong venture. The gift that the Camarillo residents have given to a small group

of deviants is the gift of opportunity.

We regret to report that Camarillo residents had property stolen from their vehicles, while parked in front of their own homes. This occurred 169 times in Camarillo during 2005.

Criminals have stolen anything they can get their hands on, such as guns, laptop computers, portable DVD players, purses, wallets, cash, and, of course, personal identity information, which can lead to identity theft. For identity theft criminals, your personal information is the gift that keeps on giving!

Criminals must have felt like kids during the holiday season while they peered into vehicles and found a variety of "gifts" placed in plain view. Aside from leaving personal valuables in plain view, 64 percent of these victims left their vehicles unlocked!

Now don't get excited — we do have a fine police presence, provided by the Ventura County Sheriff's Department.

Come and find out all about this apparent anomaly and much, much more through the Camarillo Citizens Academy.

You will be introduced to the three branches of our judicial system: the judges, the district attorneys and the public defenders. You will meet representatives of all of the various law enforcement divisions in our city. These will include the Traffic Division, the Fraud Squad, the Youth Services Division, the Bomb Squad, the Canine Squad, the Narcotics Division and on and on.

If you care to, you can accompany a deputy as he patrols in his radio car. You will visit our county jail and the evidence room and the up-to-date laboratory facility.

You will complete the course with a new appreciation of how law enforcement works in our city, and it's free. All you have to do is sign up and show up.

Many of your neighbors have taken the course and all have been very enthusiastic about the experience.

The next course is scheduled to begin on Tuesday, Feb. 28, at 6 p.m., and it will run for 12 consecutive weeks. Classes are held at our Camarillo Police Station on Upland Road. Early enrollment is encouraged since the class tends to fill up rapidly.

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Next 55 Alive senior driving class is set for Feb. 16, 17



This message is to all those with and without



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'Katharina,' mid-'30s comedy, will screen Feb 12

"Unerwunschtes Kino." It showed the lives of some of the more famous cinema artists who escaped Nazi Germany and made films in Austria until that unfortunate country was also overrun by the Nazis.

In many ways, Vienna was the "Hollywood" of the German-speaking people. Rosenhügel Studios is a model for any studio anywhere, from the wellequipped sound stages to the warm and inviting commissary where hot Viennese sausages and strudels are served, along with real Vienna-roast coffee.

There were pictures of the studio in the documentary. It's now much like any studio in Hollywood, with a

combination of feature films, news broadcasts, kids' TV shows, and other works being filmed or taped there daily. I've been there several times, and it always seems like home. Just like in Hollywood, the commissary walls are covered with colorful posters of past and present productions.

It was especially nice for me to see a poster of one of my father's productions from 1934-1935 there, just like his posters grace the walls of the Fox and Universal commissaries here in Hollywood.

On February 12, at 7 p.m. in the A.R., we will see one of these movies. "Katharina Die Letzte" is a rousing comedy of manners. Franciska Gaal, Hans Holt and Otto Walburg star in it.

Franciska Gaal later came to the United States

and acted in "The Buccaneer" with Frederick March, directed by Cecil B. de Mille.

Otto Walburg did not leave Austria soon enough, was captured by the Nazis, and died, alas, in Auschwitz. He was a master actor, portraying with equal ease a multimillionaire industrialist, as in "Katharina," or an impoverished auto mechanic, as in "Peter," made the prior

Hans Holt remained in Austria through the war, acting occasionally, but he really came into his own on the stage right after the war. His imposing presence and good looks stood him well, and he flourished onstage and in film until the 1990s.

I was privileged to meet him in 2000 when I visited Vienna the first time. He

and his wife were living in Baden, a town about half an hour from Vienna, in the Viennese equivalent of the Motion Picture Home. It was called the "Kunsthaus." Retired artists from all disciplines lived there. It's a 100-year-old, wonderfully comfortable building in the fin-de-siècle style, with very high ceilings and wood-paneled walls.

Renate Holt, Hans' wife, had been the script supervisor on "Katharina." In fact, my father had introduced them. Their marriage lasted for 66 years until his death in 2001 at 92.

When I met him, he was a tall, distinguished, handsome man with a ready smile and kindly eyes. Our meeting was emotional because of the history we shared. Renate, Hans and I spent an amazing nostalgic hour together. Furthermore, "Katharina" was his first film! My German is not very good, but he and Renate made me feel as if I spoke German better than Goethe!

"Katharina" was produced in 1935 in Vienna by Joe Pasternak and was written by Herman Kosterlitz (later Henry Koster) and Felix Joachimssohn, later Felix Jackson of Leisure Village. It is entirely in German, but is easily understandable because the acting in those days was still the broad style used in silent films. And the sight gags which run throughout the film are just as funny today as they were more than 70 years ago. So the lack of subtitles is no problem.

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



"Singin' in the Rain" stars Gene Kelly, Donald O'Connor, Debbie Reynolds, Jean Hagen, Millard Mitchell and Cyd Charisse. Gene Kelly and Stanley Donen directed it.

We also have discovered a series of historical musical scenes of the first times the musical numbers were filmed. "Broadway Melody of 1932" had some of the numbers that were repeated in the later film, and you can see "Ukelele Ike" suffering through "Singin' in the Rain" with a bunch of chubby, slightly awkward dancers behind him giving atmosphere to the piece. This will be another thoroughly enjoyable evening, especially for those interested in the birth of the American musical film.

Our April screening will be on April 23. The second Sunday, April 9, I am teaching at UCLA. Ditto April 16. So the first available day is April 23. We will screen a real treat for you. In 1929, just when sound first appeared on the scene, King Vidor directed the first all-Black feature film, "Hallelujah." More about this in future columns.

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Camarillo Grove Park a short drive away

One of the prettiest places in Camarillo is within only two or three miles of Leisure Village.

Camarillo Grove Park is a property of the city itself and reachable on paved roadways in only a few minutes. Just hop in your car, drive to Highway 101 and head south as though you

were going to Thousand Oaks. You'll take the Camarillo Springs turnoff from 101, and within a very short distance on the offramp will be a stop sign with a small sign indicating a right turn should be made to Camarillo Springs and a left turn to Camarillo Grove Park.

Take the left turn and go under the freeway to a

county road with another small sign pointing the way. For about a half mile, you'll motor along the edge of the prettiest farm in Ventura County and a view of Conejo Creek, Santa Rosa Valley and perhaps a bit of the Village

The park is gated with an entry office with an entry fee for weekend visitors and a dollar for weekday cars. A

maintenance person lives in a nearby house and is often available to assist visitors.

The park contains all the facilities needed for a picnic party for visitors and other groups with interests in enjoying natural surroundings in an easy-to-get-to facility.

I received such a wonderful response to my first column on memory lane in Los Angeles. I was reminded of so many places by callers who wanted to help places like Lick Pier, Hugo's Hot Dogs and Walt's Malt Shop in southwest Los Angeles.

Other places brought to mind were Angeles Temple, Carthay Circle, Angels Flight and events like sunrise services at the Hollywood Bowl at Easter. More on some of these in another column.

I thought I would devote most of this column to famous buildings and their history.

One of the most historic buildings was the Ambassador Hotel and its beautiful Coconut Grove. Built in 1921 and closed in 1990, it unfortunately was recently demolished. Robert Kennedy was shot there after giving a speech, Richard Nixon is said to have written his famous Checkers speech there, and the jury at the Charles Manson trial was sequestered at the Ambasssador. One of my fondest memories was seeing Ella Fitzgerald there in person.

The Bradbury Building was built in 1893 in downtown Los Angeles. The lower floor is still open to the public and houses great books on early Los Angeles.

Hollyhock House on

Hollyhock House on Hollywood **Boulevard** was the forerunner of the Art Deco style of many future buildings.

Hollywood Boulevard in Barnsdale Park was one of several homes built by

Frank Lloyd Wright. Built in 1917, it was the forerunner of the Art Deco style of many future buildings. These include the Max Factor Building on Highland, now the Hollywood History Museum, Union Station, Title Guarantee & Trust and the Beverly Wilshire department store on Wilshire Boulevard.

Next time, read about more eateries and the history of the Farmers Market, Red Cars, more movie houses, hotels and buildings and, for you ladies, shopping in the early days.





Jim is a family man whose wife, Cheryl, works in the Ventura County Superintendent of Schools office. They have two sons, Courtney and Geoff.



Lessons we can learn from the Seven Wonders

- 6. To laugh. 7. To love.




While serving at Camp Victory, she has been doing the word of Chabad, Chabad-style, in addition to her duties in the service.

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

1 cup ricotta cheese

1 cup cream cheese (softened)

10oz grated mozzarella

1-1/4 cups fresh grated parmesan

3 cups tomato sauce

1 cup fresh basil leaves (packed)

12 sheets dry "no-boil" lasagna pasta



A wide variety of vegetable seeds that can be planted now include carrots, beets, radishes, peas, and sugar snaps. Seed pota-

toes and onion sets are usually available in February.

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

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

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
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Dear Villagers,
