Karabian's papers will be part of the library's Central Valley Political Archive, joining those donated earlier by the late state Sen. Kenneth L. Maddy, former state Sen. Jim Costa, former Rep. Charles "Chip" Pashayan and the late Rep. Bernie Sisk.

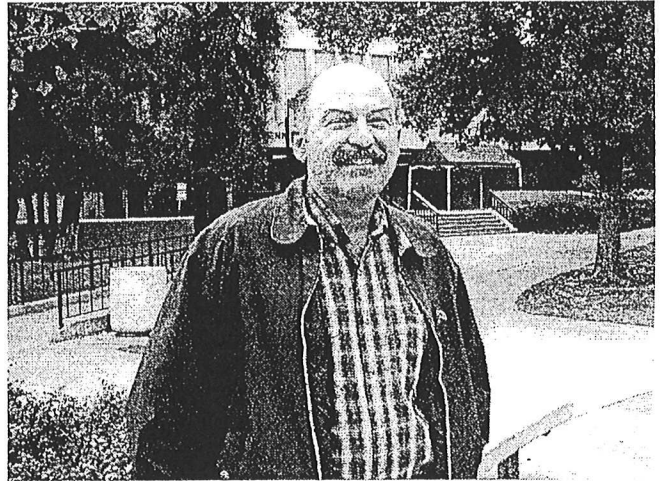

## All Things Armenian begins second season on KFSR

*All Things Armenian*, a joint production of KFSR and the Armenian Studies program at Fresno State celebrated its first anniversary last month. Since its launch in Fall 2003, the program, which is hosted by Armenian studies professor Barlow Der Muqrdechian, has featured renowned guests from the Armenian diaspora from across the world. Those guests have included everyone from Peter Balakian, author of the New York Times best seller *The Burning Tigris: The Armenian Genocide and America's Response*, to the Prime Minister of Karabagh Anoushavan Tanielian. All Things Armenian is more than interviews however. The hour long program also features classical, tradition and contemporary Armenian music, as well as updates on news from the Armenian diaspora, local Armenian and campus events. "I think *All Things Armenian* is a perfect example of the new things that we're trying to do with KFSR," says station manager Joe Moore. "We're working with the Armenian Studies Department, and producing a radio program that's really unique, that provides content that you can't get anywhere else. And it also reflects the diversity of our community and our campus."

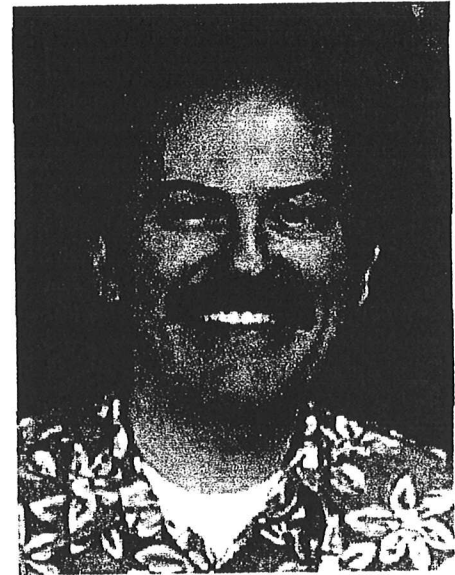

## Karabian donates papers

The Henry Madden Library has announced the donation of the legislative papers from former state Assemblyman and Fresno native Walter Karabian. The papers will be housed in the library's Central Valley Political Archive.

The Central Valley Political Archive is sponsoring a public event with Karabian in conjunction with the Armenian Studies program at California State University, Fresno, on Saturday, Sept. 18, at 10 a.m. Panel discussions with Karabian and his associates

will be held focusing on Karabian's legislative career, including his role in mentoring Latino politicians, his involvement in Armenian issues, and his legislative legacy. This event will be open to the public and press and will be held on the Fresno State campus in the Music Building East Wing, Concert Hall Room M126. Additionally, an exhibit featuring items from the Karabian Collection will be on display on the first floor of the Madden Library.

Karabian was born in 1938 in Fresno and attended the University of Southern California where he served as student body president. He also earned a Law degree and a Master's degree from USC. He was Deputy District Attorney for Los Angeles County before winning a seat in the California State Assembly in 1966.

By the time he left the Assembly in 1974, he had served as the youngest majority leader in the history of that body. His legislative contributions included the Species Preservation Act, the ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment, and the California Invasion of Privacy Act. Karabian continues to reside in Los Angeles, where he is a partner in the law firm Kams & Karabian.

While in the Assembly and in the years since, Karabian has been active in opening the doors of politics to Latinos. Former State Senator and current California Democratic Party Chairman Art Torres, who was a member of Karabian's staff before being elected to the legislature, called Karabian a "visionary and architect of the Latino community's political empowerment in California."

The Karabian family arrived in Fresno in 1896 led by Walter Karabian's great-great-uncle, Krikor Karabian. Krikor was accompanied by his nephew, Hovsep Karabian, who was Walter Karabian's grandfather. His grandmother was Haiganoush Simonian.

The Karabian papers received at the CVPA measure approximately 30 linear feet and include correspondence, press files, photographs, campaign material, articles, speeches, memorabilia and other records documenting Karabian's legislative activities and his commitment to his Armenian heritage.

The core of the Karabian Collection consists of legislative bill files from Karabian's years in the state legislature. A generous financial contribution made by Karabian has enabled the timely processing of his papers. A guide to the collection is being prepared and will eventually be made available on the CVPA's Web site at [www.cvparchive.org](http://www.cvparchive.org).

The Karabian papers join those previously donated to the CVPA by state legislators Kenneth L. Maddy and Jim Costa, in addition to former U.S. congressmen Chip Pashayan and Bernie Sisk. Other notable legislators from the Central Valley have also pledged their papers to this burgeoning archive.

The CVPA was formally established in 2000 as a resource for researchers and is committed to preserving the legacy of legislators from the Central Valley and documenting all aspects of political life in the area, in particular the contributions of Latinos, Armenian-Americans, and other minority groups. Researchers wishing to consult the Karabian papers or any of the above collections are welcome to visit the CVPA, which is located on the second floor of the Henry Madden Library.

## Yerevan State honors Fresno State

### More photos of Welty trip

President John D. Welty and Fresno State were commended for the university's academic

relationship with Yerevan State University during Welty's trip to the Armenian capital of Yerevan in June.

The rector, or president, of Yerevan State, Dr. Radik Martirosyan, presented Welty with the university's gold medal, the institution's highest award.

While there, Welty signed a five-year extension of the agreement that pledges the two universities to work together in areas of mutual interest, including business and Armenian history and language. The YSU faculties of Economics and the Craig School of Business at Fresno State have been conducting a faculty development program in business and economics for the past five years under a grant from the Newly Independent States College and University Partnership Program.

It was Welty's first trip to Armenia but the two universities have had ties since the late 1980s and formal working agreements since 1992.

Welty also visited the Armenian Agricultural Academy, where he was received by Rector Arshaluys Tarverdian and signed an agreement of cooperation.

While in Armenia, Welty also placed a wreath at Tsitsernakaberd, the Armenian Genocide Monument; had an audience with His Holiness Karekin II, Supreme Patriarch and Catholicos of All Armenians; and was honored at a reception by U.S. Ambassador to Armenia John Ordway at the U.S. Embassy.

Fresno State Armenian Studies professors Dickran Kouymjian and Barlow Der Mugrdechian joined Welty for the visit at Yerevan State, the largest university in Armenia. The University was founded in 1919 and has about 10,000 students.

The goal of the NIS College/University Partnership Program between Fresno State and YSU is to contribute to economic and political stability in Armenia by fostering educational reform. Der Mugrdechian is the project director.

The project was assisted financially by the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs of the United States Information Agency under the authority of the Fulbright-Hays Act of 1961, as amended.

## Pianist Sergei Babayan in Concert at Fresno State

FRESNO, CA - Award-winning pianist Sergei Babayan will perform in the opening recital of the Philip Lorenz Memorial Keyboard Concert Series at Fresno State. The concert will be held at 8:00 p.m. on Friday, September 24, 2004 in the Concert Hall on the Fresno State campus.

The concert is co-sponsored by the Armenian Studies Program of Fresno State. Babayan will be performing works by Leighton, J.S. Bach, and Liszt.

One of the most charismatic personalities on today's concert stage, Babayan's vibrantly expressive performances have elicited audience acclaim worldwide. Ever since his arrival in the United States, on his first trip outside of the Soviet Union in 1989, his breathtaking virtuosity and a wide-ranging tonal palette have brought him critical praise and

accolades. He is the winner of four first prizes in international piano competitions, including the 1989 Robert Casadesus Competition in Cleveland (marking the first time a Soviet artist had competed without government sponsorship), the Palm Beach Competition (1990), the Hamamatsu Competition in Japan (1991), and the Scottish Competition (1992).

Babayan, who was born in Armenia to a musical family, started to play the piano at the age of three. He began his musical studies at the age of six under Luisa Markaryan and later with George Saradjev. He continued his studies at nineteen with Mikhail Pletnev at the Moscow Conservatory and completed post-graduate work there in 1989 as a student of Professor Vera Gornostaeva. He also studied privately with Lev Naumov in Moscow.

After making his New York recital debut in 1990 at Alice Tully Hall to great critical acclaim, Mr. Babayan embarked on a busy schedule that has included solo appearances with the Cleveland Orchestra, the Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra, the Osaka Symphony, the National Orchestra of Belgium, the BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra, the Warsaw Philharmonic, the Slovenska Filharmonia of Bratislava, the Brno Philharmonic, the Bergamo Symphony of Italy, the Florida Orchestra, West Virginia Symphony, New World Symphony, and Orchestre National de Lille.

General tickets for the concert are available for \$12.50 per person; for seniors, tickets are \$7.50; and tickets for students are \$5.00 per person. Ticket reservations for the concert may be made by calling (559) 278-2337. Relaxed parking will be available in Lots C and V after 7:00 PM the night of the lecture. ## Ceremony for Donation of Karabian Papers Held Sept. 18 at CSUF's Madden Library

FRESNO - A ceremony for the donation of former California Assemblyman Walter Karabian's papers to the Central Valley Political Archive of the Henry Madden Library at California State University, Fresno was held Sept. 18, at Fresno State.

Karabian, who was born and raised in Fresno, donated papers from his 1966-74 state Legislative service.

In addition, panel discussions were held focusing on Karabian's career with an emphasis on his opening the doors of politics to young Latinos, his commitment to his Armenian heritage and his various legislative contributions such as the Species Preservation Act, the ratifi-

cation of the Equal Rights Amendment and the California Invasion of Privacy Act.

Art Torres, Democratic Party chairman, as well as other former staff members to Karabian participated in the panel discussions.

The Karabian papers received at the CVPA measure approximately 30 linear feet and include correspondence, press files, photographs, campaign material, articles, speeches, memorabilia and other records documenting Karabian's legislative and civic activities.

After leaving the Legislature, Karabian has practiced law and is a partner in the Los Angeles law firm Karns & Karabian.





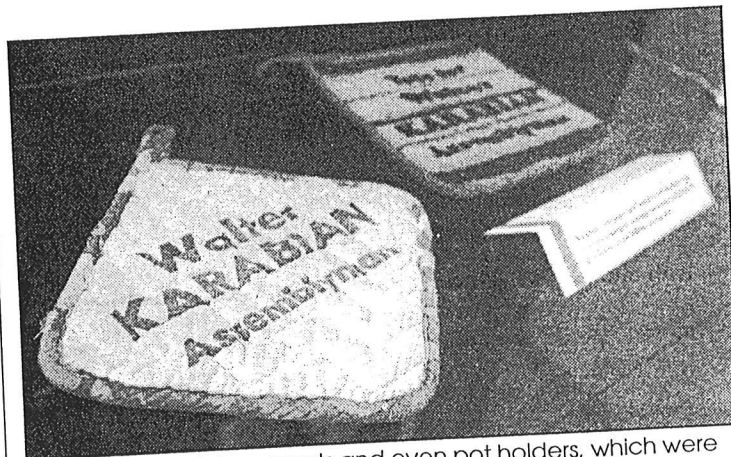

## Former assemblyman donates papers

In 1974, there were only four Hispanic assemblymen and two California state senators—now there are 23 Latinos in the legislature.

Former assemblyman Walter Karabian was the vision and motivation for the influx, said Art Torres, chairman of the California Democratic Party and a former assemblyman. A panel discussion held Saturday in honor of Karabian donating his papers, including original correspondence, bill files, photographs, campaign materials and speeches, to the Central Valley Political Archive of the Henry Madden Library.

Torres worked with Karabian when he was in office and during his political campaigns. Torres said Karabian had a big

influence—financially and intellectually—in getting him elected to the state assembly in 1974.

"Karabian gave me a framework to how to be successful in politics," Torres said.

Born and raised in Fresno, Karabian—one of the first Armenians to be in an American legislative position—served in the California State Assembly from 1966 to 1974. His political career flourished with success where he opened the doors of politics to young Latinos, committed to his Armenian heritage and contributed in the ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment and the California Invasion of Privacy Act.

During his years in the state assembly, Karabian became the youngest majority leader ever at 33.

"It was a great honor, lots of responsibility and so much fun, I can't even describe," Karabian said.

Paul Krekorian, vice president of the Burbank Board of Education, said the Armenian community was once oppressed and excluded, and Karabian fought hard to erase that discrimination.

"Karabian never forgot where he came from," Krekorian said. "He has opened doors for many, and ever since he got elected, he has been a teacher of politics to many people of the Armenian society."

Karabian's political career focused on helping under-represented people.

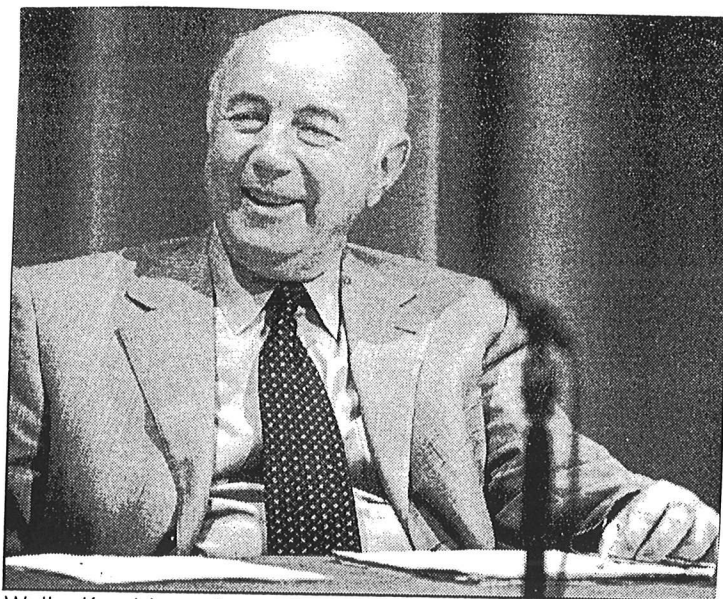
He remembered someone saying, "Good policy is good politics."

"My good policy was helping disenfranchised people like

Hispanics and Armenians, and good politics came into effect when both groups fully supported me," he said.

Glen Gray, archivist of the Central Valley Political Archive, said the Karabian papers measure about 30 linear feet.

"It is one-of-a-kind material you cannot buy in a bookstore,"

# Pianist is a longtime friend of Fresno

*Sergei Babayan's  
lifelong love of piano  
drives him to achieve.*

Pianist Sergei Babayan says he could have been many things in his life — a chess player, a doctor, perhaps a psychiatrist — but it was his destiny to play the piano.

"I could do this and that or that and that," he says, "but the question is, can you really live your life without the piano?"

That was a question Babayan, who will perform Friday in

Fresno, and many of his compatriots at the Moscow Conservatory asked themselves in the 1970s and 1980s, when the Soviet Union still existed and life as a musician there was much more controlled. Opportunities at home were limited to the chosen few of the government, and visas to perform outside the country were hard to come by.

"We did not know what was going to happen. We said, 'What are we going to do?' But none of us could stop. Well, some did. Some went into computers and became wealthy and successful — because they could. But for the rest of us, it was, 'Can you really live your life without it?'"

"It's like real love. It's possible to see yourself being with another woman, but there's always one whom you can't live without."

Fortunately for Babayan and his fellow students, the Soviet Union broke up in 1989, and leaving the country became much easier.

In 1989, Babayan came to the United States, to Cleveland, and he took first place in the prestigious Robert Casadesu Competition, which led to other competitions, which led to an international career.

"At first, I wanted to win the sixth prize, not the first," he says of that first competition. "I was dreaming of \$1,000 — I needed a ticket to go back home. Then I won first, and first again. Next I started dreaming of first place, not sixth. I got spoiled."

He said if he had it to do over again, he wouldn't do competitions, though.

"I could probably find other ways to survive," he says. "It's not a part of my young years that I miss. They're anti-musical, anti-creative. You're always worrying what the jury will do. It's horrendous."

"You play music because you love it, not because you want to be better than the others."

Babayan was born in a small town in Soviet Armenia, and he moved to Yerevan, the Armenian capital, when he was 3. By then he already was picking out melodies on the piano that he had heard his teenage sister play.

"My sister would be playing Beethoven, the 'Lost Penny Rondo,' and I would go over to the piano and play it. My parents realized I had a natural ear, and they supported me. There was no pressure. They

were very wise."

His father would take him to the symphony and would buy every classical recording that came out.

The young Babayan fell in love with music twice, he says. The first time, it was with the Tchaikovsky Piano Concerto No. 1, performed by a young Van Cliburn, who had stunned the world by winning the prestigious First Tchaikovsky International Piano Competition in Moscow in 1958.

Then came Chopin, he says, and Bach, Mozart and Beethoven. It wasn't until he was a teenager that he fell in love with Rachmaninoff.

"That is not a language for a child. But the second time I heard the Second Piano Concerto, I realized I cannot live without it."

"Studies and friends and football went away. I became like a monk dedicating his life to God."

His father took him to Moscow for lessons during Babayan's teen years, and he eventually entered the Moscow Conservatory.

"As much as I hated the Soviet system, it had one good side," he says. "They even paid for you. I got not just a good, but a great education. It wasn't like only the wealthy could afford good schools. And the teachers were absolutely fanatic and dedicated."

"Even the walls could teach you" at the Moscow Conservatory, he says. "They would hear such an incredible level of playing."

Babayan studied at the conservatory for 12 years, taking a break to serve in the army, then returning to do three years of post-graduate work. Then he came to America to perform in that first competition, and his career took off.

He now teaches at the Cleveland Institute of Music, where he runs a small piano academy, and he still is able to

keep up a full touring schedule.

His performance Friday in Fresno is part of the Philip Lorenz Memorial Keyboard Concerts series at California State University, Fresno, co-sponsored by the Armenian Studies Program at Fresno State.

"I'm on the mailing list for the Keyboard Concerts series, and I'm always really impressed with it," Babayan says. "Very often these series are run by someone with no ears for piano and they get someone mediocre, but not this one."

He will perform Kenneth Leighton's Study Variations, Liszt's Sonata in B Minor and Bach's Goldberg Variations.

He also will return in the spring to perform with the Fresno Philharmonic, which he has done several times before.

"It's a happy collaboration," he says of his relationship with the city.

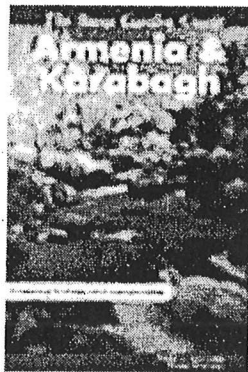

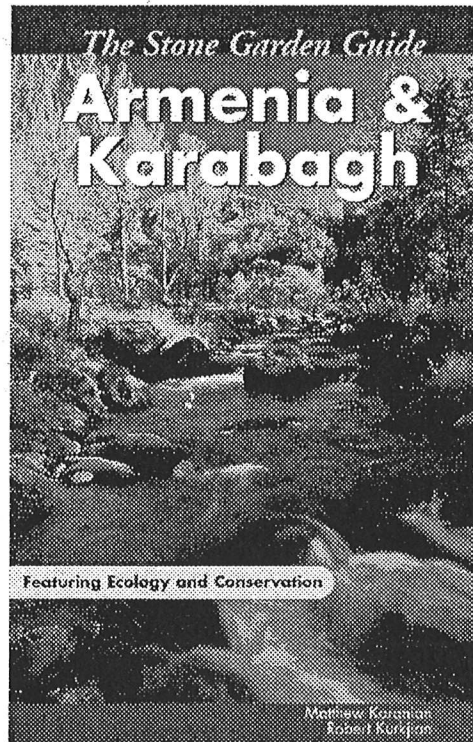

Event organizer Barlow Der Muqrdechian, the advisor to the Armenian Studies Program, praised the book, which he said had both a comprehensive text and a collection of beautiful photographs. The Stone Garden Guide is the first comprehensive guide book for both Armenia and Karabagh, and it is the only guide book

of its kind to feature so many color photographs.

Original prints of some of the color photographs from the travel guide were exhibited as part of the travelogue.

The "Stone Garden Guide to Armenia and Karabagh" was published in September and it immediately became the leading travel guide for Armenia. The 304-page handbook includes 25 color maps and 75 color photographs.

## CSUF Offers Honors Program in Armenian Studies

FRESNO - Ambitious Fresno State students who are taking Armenian Studies courses have something to look forward to in the Fall of 2005. An Honors Program has been approved for students taking upper division classes in the Armenian Studies Program. The Honors Program will also offer numerous benefits to its participants.

All students who apply to the Armenian Studies Honors Program, must have Junior standing (60 units) with at least a 3.5 GPA in Armenian Studies courses, a cumulative GPA of 3.4, and must have completed at least four Armenian Studies classes.

Along with the Armenian Studies classes, students must participate in the Smittcamp Family Honors Colloquium (a weekly two-hour meeting for all honors students) as long as they are in the Armenian Studies Honors Program. The colloquium will cover an array of topics regarded as higher learning - including: public policy, current affairs, and contemporary society.

To encourage community involvement and offer a greater experience, the Program requires its students to complete twenty hours of community service each semester. Opportunities are available for Armenian Studies-oriented service in the various programs available on campus: *Hye Sharzhoom*, "Hye Oozh Radio," and "All Things Armenian."

In the last semester of the program students in the Honors Program will be researching a topic of choice under the supervision of a faculty member. The topic can be in various areas of study such as language, history, architecture, or art. At the end of the semester, students would be ready to present their research findings and be prepared to submit their thesis to be published.

The rigor of the program is obvious, but the rewards are many. Those students brave enough, as well as competent enough, to be admitted to the Program will have full registration fees paid for up to two years. They will receive honors medallions upon graduation, and Honors recognition on their diploma. Perhaps the most important attribute of any Honors

Program is the preparation it provides for Masters and PhD programs. Inevitably, by completing the Program, students will have ascertained exceptional research, writing, and analytical skills, making them better candidates for postgraduate aspirations.

"With an Honors Program in Armenian Studies, Fresno State students who seek a minor in Armenian Studies and complete the honors program will be among a very small elite group at Fresno State who benefit from the highest academic standards the University is able to offer its undergraduates. The Armenian Studies Honors Program will pro-

vide students with a degree that will immediately reflect excellence in scholarship and learning, a valuable asset for any career," said Dr. Dickran Kouymjian, Director of the Armenian Studies Program at Fresno State.

This is such a great opportunity for students to develop new skills and get prepared for postgraduate studies.
