Media Information

PRESS ROOM: Room 162 in the eastern wing of the gymnasium serves as the press room for Titan basketball. Five telephone lines are available -- two at all times and three after the conclusion of radio post-game shows.

PRESS TABLES: Primary beat reporters, scouts and broadcasters will be located on the north side of the playing floor opposite the scorer's table.

GAME SUMMARY PACKETS: Booklets consisting of computer generated halftime and final boxes and manually-typed play-by-play summaries will be collated and distributed in Room 162.

PRESS/PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only. Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. "Visiting" media may make their requests through their respective "home" SIDs. Photo credentials must be worn in plain sight at all times. Photographers may shoot only from the designated areas behind both baselines.

PARKING: Parking is available by:

- a) Using Lot A at State College and Yorba Linda Blvd. or Lot B off State College Blvd. and paying \$1.50 (Monday thru Thursday only; free on Friday nights and weekends) upon entry for a daily permit, or:
- b) Obtaining a complimentary pass upon presentation of news credential to the Visitors Information Booth located on the south side of campus, northwest of the corner of Commonwealth and Nutwood Avenues.

BROADCAST SPACE: One" table" is allocated to each team's designated commercial radio station. Each position handles three persons comfortably. Two complimentary lines are available in most cases.

TELEPHONES: There is one telephone at the press table -- (714) 278-3970 -- which must be kept free for messages, out-of-town scores, etc. Additional telephones CANNOT be installed at the press table due to the physical limitations of the building. Please call if you have special telephone needs.

LOCKER ROOMS: Are located off the hallway on the north side of the playing floor. Bob Hawking will conduct his post-game interviews in the equipment manager's office just outside the Fullerton players' locker room, which is CLOSED to the media. Players will be brought to the office area upon request after a reasonable cooling-off period.

FAX on DEMAND: Fullerton's releases, statistics and most recent box scores are available by calling (800) 300-2050. The Big West Conference is 292#. Fullerton's codes are 1220 for the release, 1222 for cumulative statistics and 1223 for the most recent box score.





Cal State Fullerton --Where Learning Is Preeminent

California State University, Fullerton plays a major role in the intellectual, cultural and economic lives of Orange County.

Given the charge of teaching as a member of the state's three-tiered system of higher education, Cal State Fullerton does an exceptional job of educating the residents — and future — of Orange County. It prepares highly skilled and well-prepared university graduates.

Now in its 40th year, the university points proudly to its product, approximately 128,000 graduates. With 85 per cent of them remaining within a 50-mile radius of campus, they occupy key spots in business, industry, government, the political arena and education.

The university — with its main campus in Fullerton and a branch in Mission Viejo — is one of the county's largest employers and purchasers. Its presence is a key factor in the prosperity and progress of this area. With more than 24,000 students currently enrolled and more than 2,200 faculty and staff employees, Cal State Fullerton impacts the community by approximately \$600 million annually.

With a mission of making learning preeminent, the university's 700 faculty members combine the best qualities of teaching and research universities to work in close collaboration with students and staff to expand knowledge. The instructional program is offered by seven schools: The Arts; Business Administration and Economics; Communications; Engineering and Computer Science; Human Development and Community Service; Humanities and Social Sciences; and Natural Science and Mathematics

With full accreditation for its overall program, Cal State Fullerton has gained national recognition for its programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, computer science, dance, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing, teacher education and theater. In all there are 91 degree programs — with 44 of them at the graduate level — plus a wide variety of credential and certificate programs.

Students are provided the best of current practice, theory and research and integrate professional studies with preparation in the arts and sciences. Through experiences in and out of the classroom, students develop the habit of intellectual inquiry, prepare for challenging professions, strengthen relationships to their communities and contribute productively to society.

Cal State Fullerton is the most affordable and ethnically diverse university in the area. It ranks 14th nationally in the total overall number of

minorities who graduate, with a ranking of 12th for both Asians and Hispanics (No. 3 for both in Communications and No. 4 for Asians in both Education and Business). In California, the university is No. 1 for awarding undergraduate degrees in business and management to Hispanics and Native Americans and communications degrees to Hispanics, Asians and Native Americans. A No. 2 ranking is held in California for undergraduate education degrees to Hispanic Americans.

An extended education program, with open enrollment, offers individual courses, seminars and workshops, as well as more than 50 certificate programs ranging from entrepreneurship and sales management to creative writing. Classes are held evenings and weekends both on-and off-campus.

Community members also may visit campus for theater, music and dance performances and art exhibits of off-campus artists, plus those of university students and faculty members. Both the Fullerton Arboretum and Heritage House are worth touring. And, an extensive

recreation program is aimed chiefly at students, but is open to the public.

Volunteer opportunities are open through Cal State Fullerton's many support groups, such as the Art Alliance, Music Associates, Patrons of the Library and President's Associates. One such group, Continuing Learning Experience, holds many of its programs in the Ruby Gerontology Center, for which it spearheaded the fund-raising campaign. The center serves as an educational and research facility for the study of successful aging.

In less than four decades, Cal State Fullerton has taken its place as a primary force in the growth and prosperity of Southern California.

Dr. Milton A. Gordon was selected the fourth president of Cal State Fullerton by The California State University Board of Trustees and assumed his duties on Aug. 6, 1990.

His university leadership includes serving as vice president for academic affairs at Sonoma State University for

four years, as dean of the College of the Arts and Sciences for Chicago State University for more than eight years and as director of the Afro-American Studies Program at Loyola University of Chicago for six years.

President Gordon also taught at the Illinois Institute of Technology and in the Chicago public schools and served as mathematician at the University of Chicago's Laboratories of Applied Sciences.

He is the vice chairman of the NCAA Presidents Commission and the California state representative to the American Association of State Colleges and Universities. He also serves on the governing boards of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, California Coalition for Mathematics, Orange County Chamber of Commerce, Orange County Community Foundation, United Way of Orange County, YMCA of Orange County and Fullerton Chamber of Commerce. In addition, he is on the advisory boards of St. Jude Medical Center and The California State University's Institute for Teaching and Learning.

The President has a Ph.D. in mathematics from the Illinois Institute of Technology, an M.A. in mathematics from the University of Detroit and a B.A. in mathematics and secondary education from Xavier University of Louisiana.

John Easterbrook, Athletics Director

John Easterbrook is beginning his fifth year in charge of the Cal State Fullerton athletic department, riding the momentum of a most noteworthy inaugural four years. Under his leadership, the Titans have annually come out in the black budgetarily and on-campus facilities have been dra-

matically improved while three teams have advanced to the NCAA quarterfinals led by the championship 1995 baseball squad.

Easterbrook was appointed on Sept. 1, 1994, by President Milton Gordon. He was chosen from a field of 41 candidates on the strength of his experience at a successful Division I program and his familiarity with the California State University system as an associate athletic director for nine years at Fresno State. Easterbrook, 59, was involved primarily in compliance, facilities and event management at Fresno

State, which annually draws more than 500,000 fans to athletic events.

Easterbrook was hired at Fresno State by Dr. Gary Cunningham. The pair had crossed paths at the University of Wyoming in Laramie where Easterbrook was the president and chief executive officer of American National Bank and Cunningham was the UW athletic director.

Easterbrook previously coached college football for 13 seasons at Idaho, Oregon State, Illinois and Wyoming. He was a three-year starter at quarterback and also played two seasons of basketball at Illinois. He was the Most Valuable Player of the Copper Bowl. He earned a bachelor's degree (1961) in commerce and law and attended law school for two years before entering coaching.

The Champaign, Illinois, native and his wife, Cynthia, have three adult children, three granddaughters and a new grandson. John and his two sons are avid golfers.

Titans' Elephant Mascot Evolved from Campus Stunt

"What exactly is a Titan?"

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that pop into the minds of media and fans when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit to a campus or city. While the relatively young institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, here are the recognized legends:

"It was the student's decision in a vote," explained the late Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname 'Titans.' "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body at the outset, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College. They voted to organize as a student body and to assess themselves a fee of \$10 per semester.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories where named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done about a mascot because no one knew quite what to do. Until the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke turned into probably the biggest "happening" on the campus to this day. The "gag" attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became known that spring afternoon in 1962.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions in the caricature have been made in recent years to

create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek. The costume that brings the elephant mascot to life also has changed. Tuffy even attracted a female Tiffy in 1992.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white when they

chose Titans, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was an appropriate color on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987. A change to a navy blue in uniforms and printing instead of the "reflex" blue of recent years was initiated in 1992 with a de-emphasis of the orange, furthered by former athletic director Lynn Eilefson in the mid 1980s.

Finally, there is the matter of the school's name. The name originally for CSUF was Orange County State College. It's also been Orange State College and later California State College at Fullerton or California State College, Fullerton. The change to university status necessitated a further change to California State University, Fullerton, but the school's address could not be changed from 800 N. State *College* Boulevard.

To out-of-staters, the school's name causes confusion because most don't realize there are two distinct systems of higher education in the state - the University of California and the State University system. So, the school has been called everything from Cal-Fullerton to UC Fullerton to California State Fullerton State to simply Fullerton State. The preferred moniker is Cal State Fullerton, with no hyphens or commas, which is what most of the more than 100,000 graduates recognize.

Senior Associate Dir. of Athletics/ Senior Woman Administrator -

Dr. Maryalyce Jeremiah (Cedarville College, '65)

Was appointed on July 1, 1992, after serving as interim senior woman administrator for one year, the last concurrent with the final season of a seven-year (112-93) tenure as Titans' women's basketball coach. She previously coached for 16 seasons at Cedarville College, Dayton and Indiana University.

Assoc. Dir. of Athletics/Sports Complex -Ron Bond (Temple University, '62)

Was appointed on Jan. 10, 1994, as director of the sports complex. He previously was a manager of Veteran Stadium in Philadelphia and JFK Stadium in Washington, DC. He also was Deputy Commissioner of Recreation for Philadelphia for eight years and director of recreation for the University of Pennsylvania for 14 years.

Assoc. Dir. of Athletics/Media Relations -Mel Franks (Arizona State, '70)

Was appointed Aug. 14, 1980, after six years as public relations assistant for the California Angels of the American League. He also was a sportswriter for the Fullerton Daily News Tribune for three years.

Assistant Director of Athletics/Finance -John Jentz (Brigham Young, '92)

Was appointed July 22, 1996, after three years as assistant athletics financial officer at UC Riverside.

Asst. Director of Athletics/Compliance -Dr. June Kearney (Taylor University, '62)

Was appointed June 14, 1994, after eight years as an assistant coach for Titan women's basketball. She previously was an assistant at Indiana University and at Cedarville College, where she coached four sports.

Asst. Director of Athletics/Academics -

Christine McCarthy (Cal State Fullerton, '83)

Was appointed to current post in July, 1992, but has been on campus since Aug. 31, 1984. She served most recently as director of the learning assistance resource center at CSF. See Academic Assistance feature on page 8.

Assistant Director/Sports Complex -Ron Andris (Univ. of Illinois, '66)

Was appointed by the University on July 1, 1974, as director of university recreation and assumed his current position in 1996. He also has served as interim director of athletics. He has served as stage manager for pre and postgame productions at 13 of the last 14 Super Bowls.

Assistant Equipment Manager -Joe Camacho (Fullerton College)

Was appointed to a permanent position on Aug. 1, 1990, after 10 years as equipment manager and trainer at Troy High School in Fuller-

Director of University Marketing & Sales -Jeff Cova (Fresno State, '91)

Was appointed to a permanent position on Jan. 13, 1997, after three years as assistant director of sports marketing at Fresno State, where he also portrayed the Bulldog mascot.

Athletics Secretary -

Cheryl Driver (Cal State Fullerton, '88)

Was appointed on Dec. 1, 1996, after 18 months in the financial aid office on campus. She is an accomplished pianist and has performed at numerous venues.

Equipment Manager -Cliff Hatter (Univ. of Alabama, '63)

Was appointed Jan. 9, 1974, after 10 years in the retail and wholesale shoe business in the South.

Assistant Business Manager -

Barbara Horngren (Wisconsin-Milwaukee)

Was appointed on Oct. 2, 1995. She is an accomplished free-lance travel writer and edi-

Coordinator of Academic Services -Barbara Kempton (Fullerton College, '63)

Was appointed to the university on Feb. 25, 1964, which makes her one of the senior employees on campus. She served as athletics department secretary for nearly 20 years.

Head Athletic Trainer -

Julie Max (Cal State Fullerton, '78)

Was appointed head athletic trainer in May, 1992, after serving since 1980 as assistant athletic trainer. She is one of only a handful of female head athletic trainers in NCAA Div. I and she is vice president of the National Athletic Trainers Association. She coordinated coverage of volleyball and fencing for the 1984 Olympics in Los Angeles.

Exec. Director of Development/Athletics -Bob May (Whittier College, '87)

Was appointed on Oct. 1, 1992 after a fiveyear career in marketing and sales.

Academics Counselor -

Mike Miller (University of LaVerne, '95)

Was appointed on March, 1, 1998, after serving as an occupational counselor at Mt. San Antonio College and as an academic advisor at Cal Poly Pomona and Cerritos College.

Assistant Athletic Trainer -

Chris Mumaw (Cal State Fullerton, '76)

Was appointed to his second term at CSF on Aug. 1, 1989, after four years in a sports medicine office in Riverside. He also worked at Cal Poly Pomona (1976-80) and with the Los Angeles Express of the USFL. He has served abroad as athletic trainer for several U.S. national teams as well as the syndicated TV series, American Gladiators.

Admissions & Eligibility Coordinator -Bill Reeves (Goddard College, '64)

Was appointed to a permanent position in athletics in February, 1991. He has served the campus in a variety of roles including coordinator of judicial affairs, assistant vice-president of student affairs, interim director of housing and the health center and assistant dean of students.

Assistant Sports Information Director -Jody Roginson (Cal State Fullerton, '82)

Was appointed permanently in Nov., 1995, after working in several offices in the athletic department. She previously was a facility manager at Anaheim Stadium for 12 years. She was a member of the Titan softball team in 1980.

Director of Athletic Personnel Services -Patty Sexton

Was appointed to her current position on Apr. 1, 1997, after 15 years as Titans' ticket manager. She previously worked for the Titan Athletic Foundation.

Event & Facility Coordinator/Sports Complex -Scott Stow (Cal State Fullerton, '95)

Was appointed in the summer of 1994 after serving in an operations position with the Los Angeles Salsa of the American Professional Soccer League.

Assistant Director/Sports Complex -

Mike Uraine (Cal State Fullerton, '75)

Was appointed to the university's recreation department on July 31, 1980, and has been in his current position since 1996. From 1977 to 1980 he was assistant director of intramural sports at Long Beach State.

CITY OF FULLERTON

The City of Fullerton was born of the railroads, grew because of oil and citrus, reached adulthood after World War II and is now maturing as an educational center of urbanized Orange County. It is located about 30 miles southeast of downtown Los Angeles and about 20 miles inland from the beaches of the Pacific Ocean.

The first settlers were an Indian tribe known as the Gabrielenos, who were on hand when the first Spanish explorers arrived in 1769.



The former Union Pacific train depot, built in 1923, has been converted into a restaurant. It is listed on the National Registry of Historical Places.

By the 1830s, the expanses of mustard fields and cactus became part of a vast 35,000-acre grant of Juan Pacific Ontiveras, who sold off land to newcomers from the eastern United States.

The Amerige brothers, George and Edward, entered the picure in 1887 amid rumors of the coming of the California Central Railroad. They bought up land and offered a free right of way to George H. Fullerton, president of the Pacific Land and Improvement Co., a Santa Fe Railway subsidiary. They laid out the town from a stake at what is now downtown, Commonwealth and Harbor Blvd., and named it in honor of its benefactor.

Charles Chapman, a descendant of legendary "Johnny

Appleseed," revolutionized the exploding citrus industry by introducing the Valencia orange. Under the same rich agriculture ground, oil was discovered and by 1912, wells extended for 12 miles along the hills into what is now Brea.


The city was incorporated in 1904 and Chapman elected mayor.

An airfield was established in 1927 and the Fullerton Municipal Airport remains a busy general aviation facility.

Another boom began as veterans returned from World War II and demanded homes for their young families. As that growth cycle slowed, the city was able to concentrate on providing the necessary amenities and educational opportunities blossomed. Cal State Fullerton joined Fullerton College, which was established in 1913, and it was followed by Western States College of Law, Southern California College of Optometry and Pacific Christian College, now part of Hope International University. All are within a 2-mile radius in the east part of town.

ACADEMIC ASSISTANCE

The Athletic Academic Services department was established at Cal State Fullerton to help ensure the academic success of intercollegiate athletes.

The mission of Athletic Academic Services, according to Director Christine McCarthy, is to provide academic and effective support services to help each student reach his or her academic goals.

"We want all of our student-athletes to benefit fully from his or her educational experience at Cal State Fullerton," said McCarthy.

The department's many programs and services are directly aimed at this goal. The office is responsible for academic advisement, coordinating study plans, class schedules, study skills workshops, tutoring, study hall, faculty and peer mentoring and referrals to the many campus services available.

The office is staffed by three full-time personnel in McCarthy, Academic Coun-

selor Mike Miller and Administrative Assistant Barbara Kempton and two half-time graduate assistants in Rocky Medina and Tammi Bories, who serve as academic counselors and peer mentors. Kempton has been at CSUF for 30 years, and her knowledge of the campus and the athletics department is immensely valuable to student-athletes who may need help with administrative paperwork and problems.

Coaches rely on Athletic Academic Services to track studentathletes' progress in classes and to alert them and the students to any potential problems. The department has an "Early Warning" system -- periodic grade checks -- in place which encourages faculty members to notify the office if a student is having problems with coursework and may require academic support.

Student-athletes at CSUF take an average of 4 1/2 to 5 years to graduate, and some of that success can be credited to Athletic Academic Services. The staff members assist with selecting and registering for classes, referring students to faculty advisors and tracking and evaluating their progress toward graduation. The office's services are available to all past and current student-athletes.

"Not all student-athletes are able to graduate in four years, because of professional opportunities or personal commitments," says McCarthy. "We developed a re-entry program for former student-athletes who wish to complete their studies, offering them the same services which were available to them when they competed for us."

The office of Athletic Academic Services helps studentathletes feel comfortable in the CSUF environment and McCarthy's experience before coming to the department in July, 1992, helps the orientation process.

McCarthy received her masters degree in social science from Cal State Fullerton in 1987 and has been working in education since 1984. Previous to her appointment in athletics, McCarthy worked for three years as the Assistant Director of the Learning Assistance Resource Center at CSUF before budget cuts eliminated the department.

Before coming to Cal State, McCarthy was the director of student services at Western State University, College of Law, and before that was the director of student services at the University of Phoenix.

UPGRADED FACILITIES



Dramatic improvements have been made over the past few years to many of the Cal State Fullerton facilities utilized by the men's basketball program and fans will share in the benefits in the 1998-99 season. Titan Gymnasium has undergone its first major renovation since it opened in 1964 and the results will be obvious to repeat visitors.

A new paint job from floor to ceiling has been augmented by a giant reproduction on the south wall of the university's recently adopted logo. Complementary touches have been made with the addition of pennants for the 12 members of the Big West Conference on the west wall and fresh, new banners commemorating the Titans' 11 national championship teams scattered among the four corners of the

facility, which now seats about 3,500.

Chairback seats, which were installed on the south side of the playing floor for the 1997-98 season, can now be found as well on the north sideline. Bleachers remain only in the "end zones" behind the baskets and in the upper deck on the north side.

Even the baskets are new. The basket supports are mounted on the floor, giving the gym more of an arena look and improving site lines from the seats behind the baskets.

The playing surface was redone two years ago and now features the script "Titans" logo with "Cal State" and "Fullerton" emblazoned along the opposite baselines.

Equally important to the players but out of sight to the fans is the vastly

improved weight training facility located on the second floor of Titan Gym. About \$100,000 was appropriated by the Kinesiology and Health Promotion department over the summer to bring the facility up to today's high standards. It services majors, community recreation members and athletics with the latter gaining exclusive sessions each day. This facility augments the athletics-only outdoor facility which dates to the days of Titan football prior to 1992. It has been remodeled and recently gained \$40,000 of new equipment and now won't be overused.

The health and welfare of studentathletes is in improved hands, from the enlarged student union dining accommodations to the athletic training room and the on-campus health center, located adjacent to Titan Gym.

Commercial outlets such as Marie Callender's, Carl's Jr., Round Table Pizza, ToGos Sandwiches and Starbuck's provide popular food to the entire campus community. The health center serves as a primary source of treatment with nearby St. Jude Hospital in Fullerton handy for more serious problems.

The Titans' athletic training program is one of the finest in the nation. A nationally attractive curriculum has produced scores of certified athletic trainers over the years and most of Orange County's high school athletes are being cared for by Cal State Fullerton graduates.

Head Coach Bob Hawking

Exciting new ideas, players and coaches for the 1998-99 season accent this chapter of the Bob Hawking Era at Cal State Fullerton, where the foundation for future successes has been established and dividends should be forthcoming.

The evidence of all the hard work over the past four years is starting to show. Back-to-back years of double-digit victory totals have provided great momentum to build on. The focus is now firmly on the program's goals -- "A Big West Conference championship, a trip to the Big Dance and a chance at an NCAA championship," said Hawking, 49, who is in his seventh year at Fullerton including two as the top assistant coach.

Veteran players Ike Harmon, Kenroy Jarrett and Mark Richardson will carry the leadership role for the returning players and the eight newcomers in 1998-99.

"The process hasn't been as quick as we would all like. With continued hard work and relentless recruiting, we will put together the team that reaches these goals," he said.

The Titans were 12-16 last season after a 13-14 campaign in 1996-97 that certainly would have been a break-through season had leading scorer and rebounder John Williams not missed the final month of the schedule.

"We are looking for good people, good players and young men who want to earn a college degree. We will not recruit anyone who does not fit that mold." -- Bob Hawking

"With this year's large class of six recruits, the system is already in the works," said Hawking. "We are excited about these young and talented athletes. There is reason to think that a 20-win season isn't too far on the horizon.

"Our recruiting philosophy remains the same. We are looking for great players and young men who are good students and who will do what it takes to earn a degree.

We will only recruit people who fit this mold."

With young, fast and quick legs this season, the Titans will have an upbeat approach to the game.

"On the court we will utilize an exciting up-tempo style of play," said Hawking. "We put a priority on practicing and playing hard on a daily basis."

Rated an excellent teacher of the game, Hawking puts his master's degree in education to work and it pays dividends. The learning process is the cornerstone of all areas of the program.

"My staff and I want to teach and educate as quickly as we can. All these men are willing to learn, which is something that is essential to making the next step forward," said Hawking.

The Titans began Hawking's first season (1994-95) well, splitting their first six games and jumping off to a 2-0 start in the Big West Conference with wins at UNLV and UC Irvine. But several injuries down the stretch drained the limited depth and the Titans settled for a 7-20 overall mark and a 5-13 Big West log. His second year was almost a carbon copy. Included in marks of 6-20 and 5-13 were a buzzerbeating win at San Diego State, another win over UC Irvine and the first sweep of New Mexico State since 1986-87 despite short seasons from injured guards Chris St. Clair and Brian Thomas and a total of 41 missed games by players.



The 1996-97 team had a 7-3 non-conference record including rare victories at BYU and Montana and a close home loss to Utah. The overall mark was 10-6 before Williams missed 11 games.

Last year, the Titans went 5-5 in non-conference play before opening Big West competition with four games decided by one basket — winning only once. They swept rivals UC Irvine and Long Beach State, the latter for the first time since 1986-87, and beat Boise State in the Big West Tourney before taking eventual champion Utah State down to the final minute. The strong finish built momentum that carried through the summer.

Hawking was the top assistant under Brad Holland for two years (1992-93 and 1993-94) at Fullerton after two-year stints under Bob Williams at UC Davis and Tom Asbury at Pepperdine.

Hawking's high school coaching career began at Pater Noster High in Los Angeles and he later served as head coach at Simi Valley High School for 14 years and developed a championship program. His teams went to the CIF playoffs nine times and won five Marmonte League championships. His 1987 team was ranked No. 4 in the state and his 1988 team won the CIF title behind the play of Don MacLean, who went on to become the alltime leading scorer in the Pac-10 for UCLA. Hawking was selected the CIF Southern Section 4A Coach of the Year.

The Dean of Metropolitan L.A. Coaches

Although beginning only his fifth season as the head coach at Cal State Fullerton, Bob Hawking can be called the "dean" of the eight Div. I men's basketball coaches in the metropolitan Los Angeles area based on either continuous service to his campus or Div. I head coaching experience.

Second-year coaches are on the job at UC Irvine (Pat Douglass) and Loyola Marymount (Charles Bradley). Third-year men have the title at UCLA (Steve Lavin), Long Beach State (Wayne Morgan), Cal State Northridge (Bobby Braswell), USC (Henry Bibby) and Pepperdine (Lorenzo Romar). None of the above, including Hawking, were previously head coaches at the Div. I level.



Assistant Coach Todd Johnson (Oklahoma '91)

Todd Johnson returns for his second season as a Titan assistant coach, but in a much higher profile role in a full-time recruiting position. Among his assignments are handling all player personnel issues and supervising the recruiting process.



"Todd is one of the bright young coaches on the West coast," said Head Coach Bob Hawking. "He has been a tremendous asset to our university."

Johnson, 30, played for Hawking at Simi Valley High School and was the point guard on Simi Valley's CIF runnerup team in 1986.

He began his college career at Moorpark Junior College and was a two-year starter at guard. He transferred to the University of Oklahoma, where he got his bachelor's degree in 1991 in physical education.

His coaching career began back at Simi Valley as an assistant varsity coach in 1991-92. He returned to the southwest and began a teaching and coaching career in the state of Texas but often returned to southern California to work summer camps in the Simi Valley and Thousand Oaks areas.

Johnson eventually became the head basketball coach at St. Mark's School of Texas in Dallas. His 1994-95 team won a Div. I title and his next two teams won Div. II championships in the 1995-96 and 1996-97 seasons, compiling a 55-34 record.

Johnson's wife, Jan, is a resident physician at Children's Hospital in Dallas on her way to a career as a pediatrician.

Assistant Coach Bob Thornton (UC Irvine '98)

Bob Thornton, who battled Cal State Fullerton as a player for Orange County rival UC Irvine seven times in the early 1980s before launching an 8year National Basketball Association career, became a Titan on July 29 when he was ap-



pointed an assistant to Head Coach Bob Hawking.

Thornton, 36, most recently was an assistant coach at Chapman University in Orange in 1997-98 after spending the previous season as an assistant coach at Orange Coast College (JC) in Costa Mesa. He last played in the NBA in 1995-96 with the Washington Bullets after three years in the Italian Basketball League.

"Bob is a great addition to our staff," said Hawking. "Our inside players are really going to benefit. His expertise is post play."

Thornton began his NBA career in 1985 as a fourth-round draft pick of the New York Knicks and later played for the Philadelphia 76ers, Minnesota Timberwolves and Utah Jazz.

He played at UC Irvine from the 1981-82 through the 1983-84 seasons after one year at Saddleback JC. The Anteaters compiled a 57-29 record during his tenure including 3-4 vs. Fullerton. He had 16 points and 9 rebounds on Jan. 26, 1984, as UCI snapped Fullerton's 26-game home-court winning streak, 81-80. He averaged 12. 7 points and 8.1 boards as a senior.

Thornton completed work on his bachelor's degree in social science at UCI in 1998.

Assistant Coach Rich Bossenmeyer (Cal State Fullerton '89)

Rich Bossenmeyer joined the Titan coaching staff just in time for the beginning of practice drills in mid October. The 33-yearold Cal State Fullerton graduate was an assistant last year at Chapman University with Bob Thornton under Mike Bokosky.

Bossenmeyer previously served two stints (1990-91 thru 1993-94 and 1995-96 thru 1996-97) for a total of six seasons as head coach at Orange High School, where he earned Century League and Orange County Coach of the Year honors in 1994. In 1993-94 the Panthers won their most games since 1965 at 23-4. They were 20-7 in 1996-97.

"Rich is recognized as a tremendous defensive coach throughout Southern California," said Hawking. "Our players and staff

are very excited about his addition to our program."

While taking a year's leave of absence from Orange High, Bossenmeyer served one season as an assistant coach for the Rapid City Thrillers of the Continental Basketball Association.



A political science major who did not play intercollegiately at Fullerton, Bossenmeyer earned his master's degree from Azusa Pacific University in 1998. He and his wife, Pilar, live in Orange.

1998-99 SEASON PREVIEW

Balance. That's the operative word describing the Cal State Fullerton Titans as they approach the 1998-99 men's basketball season.

The 13-man roster features equal blends of youth and experience, inside and outside scoring potential, full-court explosiveness and half-court patience. Most of the players can play more than one position. Senior Mark Richardson is the steadying influence and junior Ike Harmon the crowd-pleaser, but there likely will be major contributions from deep into the roster.

Excitement. That's the best word to describe the air around this team as it attempts to challenge for surpremacy in what appears to be a wide-open Western Division of the Big West Conference.

"That word 'excited' gets thrown around more than any other in basketball this time of year, but it really is the best way to describe the feeling around Titan Gym," said Coach Bob Hawking on the eve of his fifth season directing the Titans.

"We have some depth with eight new players who are going to battle the veterans for quality playing time. The only thing for sure is that there is going to be a whole lot of flexibility in making the determinations as to who will play."

The Titans return five lettermen, all of whom have been starters to some extent, in forwards Richardson and Harmon, center Matt Caldwell, wing player Jason Cunningham and point guard Kenroy Jarrett. Two junior college transfers and six true freshmen including one from the Israeli army complete the mix.

"My philosophy is, if they are good enough to recruit, they are good enough to play," said Hawking. "I'm not afraid to play freshmen because that's the only way to get experienced sophomores. The competition for playing time will be good for everyone."

Harmon (6-foot-7, Jr., Santa Ana) has the flashiest resume of the lettermen. He was an honorable mention All-Big West Conference selection last year as he led the Titans in rebounding at 6.4 per game and was the No. 2 scorer at 15.3 points per game in his first season as a Titan after an idle year out of Santa Ana Valley High School.

"Ike has a chance to continue playing this game and make some money at it," said Hawking. "He's a spirited player who can play the '3' or '4' position equally well. He will do a lot of damage in the paint."

Richardson (6-foot-7, Sr., Fort Wayne, IN) has started 55 times in his 3-year, 74-game Titan career and has been a consistent performer, averaging about 5 points and 4 rebounds per game in each of his three seasons.

"Mark is a rock of Gibraltar," said Hawking. "He's been solid, if unspectacular, throughout his career. He's strong and has been a solid fixture. And we think he will produce more offense this season. He has advanced his game."

Jarrett (5-foot-11, Jr., Twentynine Palms) is the only point guard on the roster with Div. I experience, so his contribution will likely be critical to the team's success.

"The final eight games of last season, Kenroy was an impact player both offensively and defensively," said Hawking. "I think it was just a matter of him grasping what it takes to play the point at this level. It was his third year in the program after playing at Twentynine Palms High School, where his physical ability alone was enough to dominate."

Jarrett averaged 4.8 points and 1.6 assists on the season, but in the last eight games averaged 7.8 points. He shot 58 per cent from 3-point range down the stretch and ended up with a higher 3-point field goal percentage at .421 than senior teammates Chris Dade and Chris St. Clair, the school's career record holder and runnerup for most 3-pointers made.

Jarrett started 13 times as a freshman in 1995-96 before sitting

out a year with a knee injury. Last season he started only five times but played in all 28 games.

Cunningham (6-foot-5, Sr., Los Alamitos) is something of a bonus for Hawking. He had to appeal to the NCAA for a final year of eligiblity as a sixth-year full-time student who has been out of high school for seven years. He started half the Titans' games last year after one season of junior college ball and averaged 5 points and 4 rebounds.

"We're very pleased he was able to win his appeal," said Hawking. "He's had a successful year of Div. I experience. He's a gym rat who loves to play."

Caldwell (6-foot-8, So., Peoria, AZ) appeared in all 28 games as a redshirt freshman in 1997-98 and started 6 times. He showed flashes of his potential with a 16-point effort in only 17 minutes against Portland and an outstanding 15-point, 9-rebound performance in an overtime defeat at New Mexico State. For the season he averaged 4.3 points and 3.6 rebounds.

"Matt has made a lot of progress in his two years in the program," said Hawking. "He's a very physical specimen with a year's experience under his belt. His skills are only going to grow."

Attention towards the newcomers has centered primarily on guard-forward Brandon Campbell (6-foot-4, Fr., St. Louis, MO) from Cardinal Ritter High School and guard Mark Murphy (6-foot, Jr., Phoenix, AZ) from Glendale Community College in Arizona. Campbell is an outstanding athlete who also will compete for the Titans' track and field squad while Murphy is a prolific perimeter shooter, hitting 51 per cent from 3-point range last year.

"Brandon can play the'2,' '3' or '4' positions," said Hawking. "He was among the top track athletes in the state of Missouri and at 205 pounds, will give us a more physical presence on the perimeter than we have had in the last few years.

"Murphy is an outstanding shooter. He doesn't miss. He can also play the point position."

Another possible point guard is Josh Helbig, who played the position as a 6-foot-5 senior at East Belleville High in Illinois last year. He also will see time at the '2' and '3' spots.

Another key new face is a local one in 6-foot-9 freshman forward Josh Fischer from La Habra High School. He has the size to play in the paint but also possesses a soft shooting touch from the perimeter.

Less certain are the roles of the remaining newcomers -- guards Matt Donahue (6-foot-1, Fr., Rancho Cucamonga) from Etiwanda HS and Danny Italiano (6-foot-5, Fr., Jerusalem) from Israel; walk-on guard Kito Patterson (6-foot-3, Jr., Bakersfield JC) and massive center Mitch Deve' (7-foot-2, Fr.) from La Cueva HS in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Donahue has been plagued by an ankle injury during Fall conditioning while Deve' has had a cast on his right foot due to a stress fracture. Italiano spent the last three years serving in the Israeli Army while playing in international leagues.


"Donahue got hurt in the summer and they have had trouble diagnosing the problem," said Hawking. "Mitch had the same problem with a stress fracture in high school. He has great potential and it's up to him. We have him on a year-round conditioning program.

"Italiano is a 22-year-old freshman who we don't really know that much about. He has good size and individual skills, but we haven't seen him in the team concept."

The Titans will continue to play up-tempo basketball.

"We will again play pressure defense to create tempo and get some scoring out of our defense," said Hawking. "Offensively, we want to run, but that always depends on your ability to defend and rebound. We have good speed and balance. We have the advantage of being able to fast break or run a half-court attack. I think we have four or five guys capable of scoring in double figures on a given night."

The Big West Conference continues to undergo change as it approaches its fourth decade of existence. Created in 1969 as the Pacific Coast Athletic Association with seven charter members, all in California, the Big West evolved into a 12-school organization for the 1996-97 academic year with half the member institutions being located outside of California.

A change in name to the Big West was made in 1988 and it has proven prophetic. The conference for the third year includes schools in Nevada (Nevada), Utah (Utah State), Idaho (Idaho and Boise State), New Mexico (New Mexico State) and Texas (North Texas) along with California (Cal State Fullerton, Long Beach State, Pacific, UC Irvine, UC Santa Barbara and Cal Poly San Luis Obispo). The latter comprise a western division and the non-California schools make up the eastern division.

Two divisions create an unbalanced scheduling format. Teams play home-and-home series against intra-divisional rivals for a total of 10 games. Each school plays inter-divisional foes only once, alternating sites annually, for six more games for a total of 16. Thus, each school now may play as many as 10 nonconference games.

The realignment culminated a very eventful four-year span. Dennis Farrell, who has worked in the conference office in a variety of roles since 1980, was named commissioner in August of 1992. Fresno State, a charter member in 1969, moved to the Western Athletic Conference and was replaced by the University of Nevada for the 1992-93 seasons. A football consortium was created for three seasons that brought Arkansas State, Louisiana Tech, Northern Illinois and Southwestern Louisiana into a sched-

uling combine to create a much broader Big West on the gridiron. UNLV and San Jose State have moved to the Western Athletic Conference along with Hawai'i's women's teams.

Big West Conference members are nationally competitive and have won 13 NCAA Division I men's championships and 11 NCAA Division I women's championships.

Basketball success among Big West institutions has grown over the years and reached its apex in 1989-90 when UNLV won the NCAA championship in convincing fashion over Duke yet couldn't even claim sole possession of the Big West championship. New Mexico State tied the Rebels for the regular season title and actually was the No. 1 seed in the post-season tournament in Long Beach. The league's third-place team, UC Santa Barbara, went on to beat Houston in the first round of the NCAA tourney and help the Big West top all other conferences in tournament play with a .778 winning percentage (7-2).

In 1990-91, UNLV was ranked No. 1 in the nation all season until losing to Duke in the semifinals of the Final Four. New Mexico State again was ranked nationally, but Cal State Fullerton was the only other team to avoid a losing overall season. In 1992, New Mexico State captured the nation's fancy by advancing to the Sweet 16.

The Big West post-season tournament returns for a fourth year to Reno and the Lawlor Center at the University of Nevada. The tournament previously has been held in Stockton, Anaheim, Los Angeles, Long Beach and Las Vegas. The format for the third year includes the top four finishers in each division competing for the automatic berth into the NCAA Tournament.

Mar. 4-6 host Big West Tournament

A review of Cal State Fullerton's 1997-98 men's basketball season reveals a classic "half-full, half-empty glass" scenario.

Half-full? The Titans posted victories in double digits (12-16), advanced to the semifinal round of the Big West Conference post-season tournament and swept both rivals Long Beach State and UC Irvine in the same season for the first time since 1986. There were five non-conference home victories in five tries and four road victories in Big West play.

Half-empty? The Titans failed to win several games decided at the buzzer and were saddled with their fifth losing season in a row. They went 0-for-5 on the road in nonconference play and only 2-6 at home in Big West contests.

The 1997-98 Titans avoided major injuries but weren't very lucky in the closing minutes of several games, particularly at the outset of the Big West schedule. What was seconds away from being a 4-0 start became 1-3 and the Titans' confidence ebbed.

The senior guard tandem of Chris Dade and Chris St. Clair concluded their five-year careers at Fullerton ranked as the most prolific 3-point field goal shooters in school history. St. Clair made 58 in 151 tries and Dade made 54 of 148 attempts last season, but Dade ended up on top of the career ladder with 191 made to St. Clair's

185. Dade received honorable menton All-Big West Conference honors along with new teammate Ike Harmon, who was the team's top rebounder and No. 2 scorer behind Dade.

"We had a lot of distractions during the year and I think those kind of things had an effect on our play," said Coach Bob Hawking, whose contract was extended through the 1999-2000 campaign at the conclusion of last season. "But we rallied in the final weeks and finished the season strong and played well in the tournament in Reno, which built some momentum for this season."

The Titans didn't duck the heavyweights. They opened the season at Utah, which would go on to be the national runnerup. And they took a 4-2 record into Pauley Pavilion and ran into a spirited bunch of UCLA Bruins, who were celebrating the return of forward Kris Johnson from a suspension.

The Titans went 3-1 against teams from the West Coast Conference, beating Loyola Marymount, San Diego and Portland at home while losing a close game at Pepperdine. St. Clair and Dade led the way against LMU, Harmon was the star vs. San Diego and freshman center Matt Caldwell had a phenomenal 17 minutes off the bench to pace the Portland victory, which preceded a Christmas Holiday break.

The next three weeks were not kind to Hawking and the Titans. Fullerton traveled to the chilly midwest the day after Christmas and had only one practice to prepare for games at Wisconsin-Green Bay and Loyola-Chicago. The Phoenix and the Ramblers handed Fullerton road defeats to leave the non-conference record at 5-5.

The Titans appeared to have a won a big road game to open Big West play at New Mexico State, holding a 3-point lead in the final seconds of overtime. But Donminic Ellison banked in a long desperation shot to tie and the Aggies got a 3-point play from Ellison and two free throws in the final 21 seconds of the second overtime period to rally for a victory. Fullerton salvaged the road trip in

Denton when the Titans beat North Texas on a tip-in by Harmon with two seconds remaining.

Fullerton's modest 8-game winning streak at home dating to the previous season came to a screeching end on Jan. 15. Idaho rallied from a 10-point deficit in the final nine minutes and won when Avery Curry hit a 3-pointer and two free throws in the final 2:17. Two nights later, Fullerton fell to 1-3 when Roberto Bergersen made

an 18-foot jumper over Dade at the buzzer for a 76-74 Boise State win.

Things appeared bleak when Fullerton went to Long Beach State on Jan. 22 minus the services of Dade, who had four wisdom teeth removed on Jan. 19. But 7-foot center Andrew Betts was a non-factor for the 49ers and the Titans won a defensive struggle, 61-52, for their inaugural win in The Pyramid.

Fullerton got its first look of the season at NBA No. 1-draft-to-be Michael Olowokandi two nights later at Pacific. The 7-footer had 21 points, 11 rebounds and 5 blocked shots to pace an 86-68 Tigers' win.

Two frustrating losses attributable directly to shooting woes at home followed. The Titans lost to UCSB when Raymond Tutt regained his conference-scoring-leader form of the previous year with 16 second-half points in an 87-81 Gaucho win. UCSB

went 22 of 24 from the foul line while the home team was only 16 of 31. The Titans lost to Cal Poly for the first time in Big West play, hitting just 4 of their first 27 3-point field goal tries while Cal Poly was shooting 50 per cent for the game from behind the arc.

The Titans' offensive woes continued at UC Irvine on Feb. 5, but the defense rose to the occasion. Holding UCI to 14 points in the first half, the Titans used a late 7-0 spurt for a 51-48 victory.

Fullerton managed only 15 points itself in a first half at chilly Logan and accepted a lopsided loss at Utah State. The Titans then came home to suffer a 15-point loss to Nevada despite a 15-point second half by Kenroy Jarrett.

The stretch run to qualify for the Big West post-season tournament went down to the wire. Fullerton routed UCI and Long Beach State at home around another impressive performance (career-high 32 points and 12 rebounds) by Olowokandi in a Pacific victory. Seniors Dade, St. Clair, Craig Whitehead, Wyki Tyson and DeVaughn Wright bowed out along with reseve Jerome Archie in the lopsided win over the 49ers.

The final week was typical of the season. Chris Dade hit a 3-pointer for a tie with 4.5 second to play but Mike Wozniak beat the buzzer with a follow shot for a 96-94 Cal Poly SLO win. Two nights later, with four minutes to play, the Titans still weren't assured of a tourney berth. But Long Beach State lost at Pacific and the Titans, who had led for all but 20 seconds of the game, held on behind two St. Clair buckets in the final 1:04 to beat UCSB, 76-70, and gain the western division's No. 2 seed.

In Reno, the Titans played probably their best game of the season. They hit 7-of-9 3-point field goal tries and beat Boise State, 89-82. In the semifinals, they were tied at 50 with 6:57 to play against heavily favored Utah State. But Marcus Saxon took over on his way to tourney MVP honors and the Aggies won, 65-56.

A quick examination of the box score leaves some doubt that the Titans beat Portland. Fullerton hit only half of its free throws, got combined 5-for-21 shooting from senior guards Chris Dade and Chris St. Clair, got only 3 minutes from injured Mark Richardson and only two points from Craig Whitehead and Dane Plock.

But Matt Caldwell had a career game and Ike Harmon dominated down the stretch and the Titans ran their home record to 5-0 with a win over the Pilots, who had some of their own problems such as missing 17 of 30 free throws and shooting only 38 per cent from the floor.

Typical for final exams week, the Titans started slowly. They fell behind early — 10-3 — and by as many as 10 points at 31-21 late in the first half.

A 10-3 run to open the second half left Fullerton within a point at 38-37 but the Pilots scored the next 8 points to build a 9-point lead at 46-37 with 14:53 to play. The Titans' first trip to the Midwest in five years began at one of the most difficult places in the nation to play — Green Bay, Wisconsin. The host Phoenix had the ninth best winning percentage in Div. I basketball in the 1990s at .751. And at home they have been virtually unbeatable, taking a 51-8 record in their last 59 games into the contest against a Titan team that had held only one practice since their win over Portland to allow players to go home for Christmas.

The result was predictable. The Phoenix were fired up after seeing a 12-game home winning streak snapped the week before and the Titans showed signs of inactivity and the all-day trip east. After building a 19-15 lead 8 minutes into the game behind the scoring of Craig Whitehead and solid board work by Mark Richardson, the Titans hit a wall. UWGB went on a 12-0 run for a 27-19 lead as the Titans went more than 7 minutes without scoring.

The Titans' chances of earning a road trip split seemed encouraging. They had an extra day of rest in Green Bay, they were facing a team they had beaten by 21 points last season in Titan Gym and they had a vocal fan following compliments of their midwestern-connected players.

But Loyola had better hole cards. The Ramblers rode the momentum of a 3-game winning streak, an unbeaten home record (4-0) and hot shooting by guards Earl Brown and Damien McSwine to drop Fullerton to 5-5 overall, 0-5 on the road. They also got a poor shooting night by Chris Dade.

Fullerton opened Big West Conference play on the road against the team with the best non-conference record — 10-4 New Mexico State — and the Titans nearly pulled off a major upset. It took an off-balance, desperation, banked 3-point field goal by Donminic Ellison to deny CSF a win in overtime and Ellison made the plays that won the game for the Aggies in the second overtime.

Fullerton was ahead with less than 75 seconds to play on three occasions. In regulation, Matt Caldwell picked up a loose ball and scored for a 65-63 lead with 2:38 to go. New Mexico State tied it with 1:14 to play on a Louis Richardson putback and neither team scored on its final possesion.

The second conference game of the year also went down to the final shot and this time events went in the Titans' favor. Ike Harmon tipped in a missed shot by Mark Richardson with two seconds to play and he then intercepted the Eagles' full-court pass to ensure the win, Fullerton's first over an Eastern Division foe.

The Titans appeared to be headed for an easier victory. On their first trip ever to Denton, Texas, they squandered a small first-half lead only to regain a 37-34 halftime edge. They stretched it out to 10 points, the first time with a 9-0 run that produced a 57-47 advantage with 9:53 to play.

The lead was 5 points at 69-64 in the final two minutes and the Titans had the ball. But Harmon was called for an over-the-back foul on a missed Titan shot and Gabe Moeller, on his way to a career-high 15-point game, made two free throws to make it 69-66 with 1:09 to go.

Harmon missed a free throw with 41 seconds to go and Moeller hit one of two to make it 69-67 with 23 seconds left. Richardson hit one of two charities to make it 70-67 at 0:19 only for Moeller to tie it at the 12-second mark with his second 3-pointer of the night — but only his third of the year!

In one of the tightest, best played and most exciting games of the year, the Titans got beat at the buzzer. Roberto Bergersen made an 18-foot jump shot with Chris Dade all over him to drop Fullerton to 1-3 in the Big West and 0-2 at home.

Craig Whitehead, who was denied the hero's role in overtime at New Mexico State, again lost a spot in the headlines. His 3-point field goal tied the game at 74-74 with 32 seconds remaining. Just when things appeared to be falling into a tailspin for the Titans, they came up with a surprise victory at Long Beach State, winning for the first time ever in the four-year old Pyramid and the first time in the city since 1990.

Chris Dade missed the only game of his five-year Titan career as a result of the extraction of four wisdom teeth on Monday and Ike Harmon did not practice all week due to a sprained toe. And Long Beach was on a roll behind the play of Big West Conference Player of the Week Andrew Betts.

Long Beach couldn't buy a basket in the early going and couldn't get the ball to Betts, its 7-foot center. Fullerton methodically pulled away to a 15-3 lead over seven and a half minutes but then hit a cold spelll of its own. Pacific showed Fullerton why it was the dominant team in the Western Division of the Big West Conference. The Tigers gradually pulled away and led by as many as 24 points at 68-44 with 8:13 remaining. Surprisingly, the Titans outrebounded the Tigers, 35-28. Part of the reason was that Pacific shot 59 per cent from the floor and had only 20 possible offensive rebounds, grabbing just 8.

A trip away from Titan Gym to the recently friendlier confines of the Bren Center at UC Irvine helped to put Fullerton back in the victory column. In a defensive struggle, the Titans exploded for a 7-0 run in a late 2-minute span to capture their sixth win at UCI in the last seven years.

The Titans came up with another low-scoring first half but this time their defense couldn't match the effort at UC Irvine and Fullerton's inability to win in Logan continued. The Titans got a career-high 30 points from Chris Dade, a career-high 14 rebounds from Mark Richardson, 21 second-half points from Ike Harmon and outrebounded the host Cal Poly Mustangs by a 53-30 margin but it wasn't enough to get a victory.

For the second time this season, the Titans got beat at the buzzer. Mike Wozniak's 10-foot follow shot of a missed 3-pointer by Jabbar Washington beat the clock after Dade had made an unbelievable 3-pointer with 4.5 seconds remaining to tie the game.

The difference in the game was at the foul line. The Mustangs' success there also set up their full-court press and the tactic helped contribute to Fullerton's 20 turnovers, seven of which came in the first five minutes of the second half when Cal Poly opend up a 56-47 lead.

But Harmon rallied the Titans and they caught up at 74 with 7:04 to go. Fullerton took the lead and stretched it to 86-80 at the 3:40 mark. But Wozniak hit a pair of crucial 3-pointers, the second for a 92-91 lead at the one-minute mark. Ben Larson threw in a baseline jumper and give Cal Poly a 94-91 lead with 11 seconds left.

Not until four minutes remained in the regular season -- when the Pacific-Long Beach State final was posted -- did the Titans know they would be playing in the post-season tournament and not until the final 10 seconds did they know they would be advancing as the No. 2 seed in the Western Division. It took another road victory over a team that was sending off six seniors and a 15-year head coach in Jerry Pimm, who had announced his resignation the day before.

Fullerton got off to a good start and trailed for only 20 seconds of the game. Ike Harmon (15) and Chris Dade(14) had 29 of the team's points as the Titans built a 41-37 first-half lead after being up by as many as 9 points at 39-30.

For the first time since 1990, the Titans advanced beyond their first game with an impressive 89-82 win over Boise State, the No. 3 seed from the Eastern Division with a 17-12 record coming in.

Fullerton had its best field goal percentage of the season, a school record percentage from 3-point range, solid defense, above average accuracy from the foul line and a season-low 8 assists and still it took until the final seconds before the outcome was final.

Chris Dade scored the first five points of the game and the Titans never trailed. The defense held Boise State to 29 per cent shooting from the floor in the first half and Fullerton built a 40-26 lead as BSU hit only 4 of 12 3-point tries

The Broncos made a run after intermission, getting as close as 5 points at 58-53 with 10 minutes to play. But Ike Harmon made a 3-point play and then Craig Whitehead scored 7 points in a minute and a half and suddenly the lead was 71-55 with 4:33 to go.

A late barrage of 3-pointers by Boise State forced the Titans to hit a decent percentage of their 49 free throw attempts, only one shy of the school record. The win avenged a Jan. 17 loss in Titan Gym at the buzzer.

With 6:57 to play, Ike Harmon hit two free throws to tie the game at 50 and keep Fullerton's season and hopes of an NCAA Tournament berth alive.


But Marcus Saxon, who almost single-handedly built an early 14-point Utah State lead in the first half, took over the game down the stretch as well. He made a free throw to put the Aggies ahead for good and, when Harmon hit a jumper to counter two Kevin Rice free throws to make it 53-52, Saxon hit back-to-back 3-pointers for a 59-52 Utah State lead with 3:44 to play.

Chris Dade answered with a layup but Saxon hit another jumper to make it 61-54 and the Titans didn't make another field goal as their season concluded at 12-16.

Saxon, who hit only 3 of 10 shots against the Titans in a blowout in Logan in February, was equally dominant in the other two games of the Big West Tournament and easily won MVP honors. He scored 12 points in a row for the Aggies as they increased a 14-7 lead to 26-15 at the mid-point of the first half. Only a second personal foul late in the half and a third with 16:35 to play slowed him down.

The win was Utah State's 24th of the year, to tie a school record, and its tenth in a row -- nine in the Larry Eustachy Era -- over Fullerton.

Cal State Fullerton has been well represented at the professional level despite the relative youth of the intercollegiate basketball program. Seven Titans have been drafted in the past 16 years and several more players have signed as free agents with the National Basketball Association.

The most prominent Titan of late has been forward Cedric Ceballos. He became one of the league's top scorers for the Los Angeles Lakers and made the NBA All-Star team for 1994-95 but was unable to play due to an injury. He has since played for both Phoenix and Dallas.

During four years with the Suns, he was known primarily for two things: winning the NBA slam-dunk


contest in 1992 with his blind-folded "hocus pocus" act and scoring a phenomenal number of points when Charles Barkley was injured. Ceballos' absence due to another injury may have swung the tide toward the Chicago Bulls in the 1994 playoffs.

A Fullerton teammate of Ceballos' -- forward Bruce Bowen -- was a pleasant surprise during the 1997-98 season for Coach Rick Pitino and the Boston Celtics, starting nine times in 61 appearances and averaging 5.6 points and 2.9 rebounds while playing several positions. He had played briefly in 1996-97 with the Miami Heat for Coach Pat Riley after two productive and profitable seasons in France. In Evreux, France, he averaged more than 29 points per game.

The Titans hit it big in 1984 when two players made NBA rosters -- guard Leon Wood with Philadelphia and center Ozell Jones with San Antonio. Each was subsequently traded more than once. Wood completed a 6-year NBA career with Sacramento on Christmas Eve, 1990. He played last in the CBA and in France and toured with Magic Johnson's All-Stars. He has spent the last two seasons as an NBA referee, only the second former NBA player to make that transition. Wood began his post-Titan career as the point guard on the United States' goldmedal 1984 Olympic team under Coach Bob Knight.

Other former Titans in and out of the NBA and CBA during the past few years were 1988 graduates Richard Morton and Henry Turner. Morton started the 1988-89 season with Indiana and later played with Golden State. Turner, who was a teammate of Morton's in the CBA, spent much of the 1989-90 season with Sacramento. Morton was one of the top scorers in the CBA the past few seasons and has made the loop's all-star team.

Guard Aaron Sunderland, a 1993 product, has done well in




Bruce Bowen of the '97-98 Boston Celtics

the CBA and 1994-95 products Winston Peterson and David Frigout are playing in Europe. J. D. Green (1990-92) has become a star in Australia.

Other Titans to play in the NBA include guard Kevin Henderson, who played with Golden State and Cleveland; forward Mike Niles with Phoenix; and forward Greg Bunch with the New York Knicks. Foreign leagues have featured center Herman (Demone) Webster, forward Kerry Boagni and sharpshooter Kevin Heenan

to name a few. Other players drafted in the 1980s were Ricky Mixon (Lakers), Tony Neal (Lakers) and Boagni (Utah Jazz).

Sean Williams has gained fame first as an actor ("Blue Chips") and recently as a member of the Harlem Globetrotters, for whom he gained Guinness the Book of World Records by dunking on a basket 11 feet, 8 inches off the floor.





Obstacles and adversity. Grass-roots support and coaches with "sandwich board" signs. Stunning upsets and courageous performances. All have been a part of Cal State Fullerton athletics as "Titan Pride" has taken limited resources to athletic successes disproportionate to such a young institution.

How many universities can claim 11 national championships in seven different sports, a perennial All-Star third baseman, baseball players and men and women basketball players in the Olympics, two rookies in the Super Bowl, a Miss America candidate, the subject matter of a Walt Disney feature film and the first player selected in the major league draft?

The tenor was set by the first intercollegiate team - men's

basketball. In only their second season, the Titans of Coach Alex Omalev advanced five rounds into the NAIA national playoffs in 1961-62. Sixteen seasons later, the entire nation watched another "cinderella" Titan Five advance within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association postseason tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the NCAA Western Regional.

The basketball tradition, which included a women's national title in 1970 and Coach Billie Moore and star Nancy Dunkle on the women's 1976 Olympic team, was continued in 1984 as Leon Wood helped the men to a gold medal before he became a first-round NBA draft choice. Coach George McQuarn's teams were usually factors in the PCAA race and had

national Top 20 rankings and a victory over the nation's No. 1-ranked and undefeated team to their credit.

Fullerton, which seemingly specialized in last-second wins in 1988-89 behind 1995 NBA All-Star forward Cedric Ceballos, currently of the Dallas Mavericks, also has competed twice in the post-season NIT Tournament while the women have recently been in both the WNIT and NCAA fields. In 1991, Genia Miller was selected a Kodak All-America after ranking No. 2 in the nation in scoring and blocked shots and No. 7 in rebounding. She played for the L.A. Sparks (as Eugenia Ryclaw) in the WNBA in 1998. In 1993-94, Autumn Hollyfield was the nation's top 3-point field goal shooter and in 1994-95, Koko Lahanas led the nation in

scoring. The women's program is now run by Denise Curry, a 1997 inductee into the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton more fame. Former men's Coach Dick Wolfe won three NCAA college division titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and had later teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation led by former Chinese Olympian Li Xiao Ping. Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished sixth or better in the nation 12 times and won the national title in 1979. Onearmed Carol Johnston was the Disney film, "Lefty," while Tami Elliott (1984-86) won 10 All-American

awards before becoming Miss Virginia and competing in the Miss America pageant.

With the arrival of Coach Augie Garrido, baseball exploded on the national scene. He broke the USC monopoly in the western regionals in 1975 and won the national title in 1979 behind the play of Tim Wallach, a five-time All-Star with Montreal. CSF won the College World Series again in 1984 behind CWS Most Valuable Player John Fishel. Garrido directed a national second-place finish in the 1992 and a key member of that team, third baseman Phil Nevin, was selected as the No. 1 pick in the amateur draft by the Houston Astros. (He's now catching for the Anaheim Angels). The Titans placed third in the CWS in 1994 and came back with their best season ever in 1995, posting a 57-9 mark en route to their third national championship, led by Player of the Year Mark Kotsay, who joined the Florida Marlins during the 1997 season.

Five baseball players have become Olympians with Kotsay and Brian Loyd joining the elite group by playing in 1996 for Team USA in Atlanta. Nevin, Jason Moler and Bob Caffrey are the other Olympians who have gone through the Fullerton baseball program.

Women have sparkled on the Fullerton diamonds, too. Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and the Titans have been a powerhouse, making eight trips to the College World Series and 17 consecutive regional appearances. The Titans brought home their first NCAA Championship in 1986 and often have been ranked No. 1 in the country. The Titans last appeared at the Women's College World Series in 1995 and placed fifth.

There have been national titles in men's cross country (1971) and

women's fencing (1974) and individual standouts like golfer Martha Wilkerson, runner Mark Covert and wrestler Laszlo Molnar, who finished second in the nation at 167 pounds in 1994. Heather Killeen became the Titans' first Div. I cross country All-American in 1994 and then won three events at the 1995 Big West Conference track championships. She was one of 10 finalists for 1995 NCAA Woman of the Year.

The now-defunct football program made great strides in Division I-A after its humble Division II beginnings. Coach Gene Murphy guided the Titans to two conference championships and four runnersup finishes between 1983 and 1989. Titan products included Super Bowl rookies Bobby Kemp (Cincinnati in 1982) and Mark Collins (New York Giants in 1987). Titans have starred in the Canadian Football League led by single-season receiving record holder Allen Pitts of Calgary, 1995 MVP Mike Pringle of Baltimore and perennial quarterback star Damon Allen, the younger brother of Heisman Trophy winner Marcus Allen.

With the loss of the football program, Head Coach Al Mistri's soccer program has tried to fill the void in Titan Stadium. A new women's program was launched in 1993 and it coincided with a memorable men's season that saw the Titans move as high as No. 3 in the national rankings behind All-American forward Eddie Soto and compete at the NCAA Final Four in Davidson, North Carolina. The 1994 team advanced to the NCAA quarterfinals after hosting and winning in the first two rounds and the 1996 team upset No.1-ranked UCLA in the first round.




