

**121. Advanced Public Speaking for Foreign Students (3)**

Prerequisite: permission of instructor. Advanced practice in expository and persuasive speaking. Analysis of propaganda. Study of techniques of persuasion; group discussion.

**193. Introduction to American Culture (3)**

Prerequisite: permission of instructor. Analysis and discussion of major figures and movements which represent the American tradition in social-intellectual history, literature, and the arts (painting, architecture, jazz, folk, and concert music).

**195. Interpretation and Analysis (3)**

Open only to undergraduate students from abroad. Prerequisite: permission of instructor. Individual analysis of the knowledge and skills of the student's field of study; application to problems in the country in which the knowledge and skills are to be applied. Scholarly paper.

**GRADUATE COURSES****293. Contemporary America (3)**

Open only to students from abroad. Prerequisite: graduate standing and permission of instructor. Seminar including studies from areas of anthropology, economics, history, literature, political science, psychology, sociology, and related fields. (See *School of Graduate Studies*.)

**295. Interpretation and Analysis (3)**

Open only to graduate students from abroad. Prerequisite: permission of instructor. Individual analysis of the knowledge and skills of the student's field of study; application to problems in the country in which the knowledge and skills are to be applied. Scholarly paper. (See *School of Graduate Studies*.)

**INTERNATIONAL PROGRAM (OVERSEAS)**

A study abroad program of global scope is offered by the California State Colleges through the California State Colleges International Programs. Study opportunities for students from all nineteen campuses include full-year curricula at distinguished institutions of higher learning throughout the world.

Cooperating universities abroad include the University of Aix-Marseille, France; the Free University of Berlin and the University of Heidelberg, Germany; University of Athens, Greece; the University of Florence, Italy; the University of Coimbra and the University of Lisbon, Portugal; the University of Stockholm and the University of Uppsala, Sweden; the University of Copenhagen, Denmark; the University of Madrid and the University of Granada, Spain; the State University of Leningrad, USSR; Tel Aviv University and the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, Israel; the American University of Beirut, Lebanon; Waseda University, Japan; National Chengchi University, Taiwan; Andhra University and the Universities of Benares and Delhi, India; the Catholic University, Peru. In the United Kingdom, cooperating universities, which may vary from year to year, have included Birmingham, Bristol, Dundee, Exeter, Leicester, Liverpool, London, Nottingham, Oxford, Sheffield, Southampton, and Wales. Cooperative arrangements exist with the Netherlands School of Business, Netherlands, and the Centro de Estudios Universitarios Colombo-Americano (CEUCA), Colombia; study opportunities are offered in Ghana, Africa.

Selected students remain enrolled and continue to earn residence credit at the home campus. Academic work successfully completed at the cooperating institutions abroad is applied toward the degree requirements of the college in accordance with college regulations. Students are selected from each college on the basis of academic, linguistic, and personal qualifications, as well as career objectives. Requirements include:

- (a) Upper division or graduate standing by the beginning of the academic year abroad;
