Braille comes to Camarillo

The Los Angeles Braille Center has been known as one of the outstanding organizations servicing visually limited of all ages. It provides equipment tapes and records free of charge to all qualifying members. The Los Angeles Center circulates over 15,000 units each month. The library covers every publication available in book stores, libraries, and newstands.

"The I's Have It" was organized at Leisure Village two years ago under

the leadership of Florence and Leon Block, Harry and Vida Castaline, and Anne Gaynes. With active membership of 23, they have been largely responsible in bringing three Braille Centers to Ventura County. Miss Jane O'Conner, Director of Community Services, after visiting Leisure Village on two occasions, followed up after negotiation with approval of Centers for Camarillo, Oxnard, and Simi Valley. The Centers will open in the latter

AN OLYMPIAN EFFORT

Last month we published a letter from Mollie Silversher (V.23), announcing the circulation of a petition for bus transportation between Leisure Village and the Thousand Oaks Mall.

Currently the Thousand Oaks-Camarillo-Ventura Interconnecting Bus Service provided under contract by Westways Bus Company is financed by the three cities by general fund or sales tax revenues and fares collected from passengers. Seniors pay 15 cents a ride, and those over 75 ride free.

Leisure Villagers living here prior to the sharp rise in the cost of gasoline remember when the free bus service furnished by Leisure Technology, subsequently taken over by LVA, not only offered transportation into the business section of Camarillo, but—for a brief period—into Thousand Oaks, Oxnard, and Ventura.

Later an arrangement was made with the City of Camarillo to provide service into the city at a cost to the Association of \$16,000 a year. For those residents who don't drive, this is a welcome amenity, and the current effort to extend bus service is not intended to limit it.

There is a need, however, to offer transportation over the Conejo Grade to the department stores and other attractive establishments assembled at the Thousand Oaks Mall. A significant number of Villagers do not drive, and many who do would feel more secure riding in a bus than driving in the fast track on Highway 101—especially coming down the steep hill with a heavy tractor-trailer unit following close behind.

At present it takes about eight hours to make the roundtrip to T.O. via four connecting buses. With the proposed bus service, which would be made available once a day, a resident could board the bus at the Village gates approximately at 10:30 a.m. and return by 2:30 p.m.

The petition has already been signed by over 1,000 Villagers, and the LVA Board of Directors have been made aware of their desires. We are informed that the matter is now under study by the Community Services Director of the City of Camarillo.

If you have not signed the petition, but want to endorse the effort to bring this new bus service to L.V., write your name and Village No. on the dotted line, clip this editorial, and place it in the ILV box in the hallway near the parking lot.

APPLAUSE IS DUE

We have complained at times in the past that our Board of Directors does not listen to homeowners; Directors have complained that homeowners do not take enough interest in their goings-on in running the village. It is encouraging then when residents speak, the Board listens and acts.

At the July Association meeting, Dick Van Horn, in his "Board Comments" touched briefly on the defects of our voting procedures, and the unrealistic expectation of getting 50.1% of the voters required for a quorum to occupy the Center. In the future, therefore, the Board will rely much more than heretofore on the use of proxies, getting them out earlier, following up if they are not turned in, etc. Furthermore, the Board has already taken the first step toward improvement - at the next annual meeting all recreation facilities will remain open.

Both of these changes make sense. Many of our well-intentioned homeowners often have last-minute emergencies preventing them from exercising their voting rights.

As far as keeping the facilities open, only one member of a household can vote; why prevent others from their usual pursuits? Besides, if some of our negligent homeowners are in the center, they just might remember their responsibility and take the trouble to vote.

We commend our new Board for these actions.

Those responsible for expediting the work on the dressing rooms should also be commended for arranging for pool-goers to use the beautiful new showers much earlier than anticipated.

Don't forget the Bazaar in the Hawaiian Market Place, Sept. 29. Aloha!

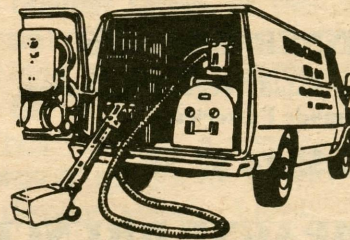
ILV LIKES THE NEW VOICE

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PROFILE: George and Edna McCormick

Fifty one years ago this month, on her nineteenth birthday, Edna married George McCormick, a happenstance brought about by George's sister meeting and then marrying Edna's uncle. Thus, when George and Edna married, George's sister also became his aunt.

Let's meet the McCormick's, LV residents for the past seven and one half years; she, current president of the LV Women's Club, and he, despite serious medical problems, an avid golfer.

Both were born and educated in the Bronx section of New York City and continued to live in the "Big City" following their marriage. George had a lengthy career with managerial skills in the refrigeration and air conditioning fields.

Weekends found them

fleeing the city for the beach, parks or the woods. In 1946 they purchased an undeveloped, heavily wooded lot at Mastic Beach, far out on Long Island. Working weekends, both summer and winter, they cleared the land and built, completely by themselves, a 10' x 12' one room vacation home.

"We really felt like pio-

neers," says George, "electric power was not yet available in this remote area."

"That's not half the story," adds Edna, "during construction we lived in a tent on weekends, with children ages 12, 10 and 3."

When the small unit was completed, neighbors

urged them to expand their unit. Over the next several years they did exactly that. Without any outside help they sank their own wells for water, did all electrical and plumbing work and were the proud owners of an attractive 3-bedroom home. Edna tried her skills at making furniture and still recalls a well made chest of drawers.

Always ready to travel and with a great love for the outdoors, they made an almost spur-of-the-moment decision in 1955. George decided to take early retirement from A&P and they came to California, arriving on Thanksgiving Day 1955.

Canoga Park in the west end of the San Fernando Valley became their home

During these twenty California years they became serious "rock

hounds" and spent many weekends either alone or with groups, exploring rugged areas of the desert. They also explored the coast line here and down into Mexico

When George retired for good in 1976 they took a three month camper trip of the United States, visiting friends and relatives in Florida, New York and Canada. The following year, visiting Leisure Village, they looked at the two new homes, all that remained available in Village 1.

"We quickly decided that the Monterey was to be the retirement home of our dreams," says George, "it was as simple as that."

Edna pursued some college classes, utilized the sewing facilities and in 1981 became first vice president of the Women's Club. Both started golf about three years ago and each is active in club

events. Some two years ago George underwent open heart surgery and this was followed by congestive heart failure. But he bounced back quickly and today enjoys a healthy, active life.

In January of this year Edna accepted the presidency of the Women's Club.

"I'm, not certain most LV residents know the tremendous assistance, mainly in cash donations, the Women's Club gives, both within the Village and outside," says Edna. "Recent examples are \$5,032 to the Board for a new mimeograph machine and \$1,200 to repaint all benches plus the installation of back rests."

"Outside our Village," she continued, "we donated \$1,318 to the Camarillo Arts Council for a new amplifier and have given donations to such diverse groups as Camarillo Hospice, Interface, the Boy's & Girl's Club,

Camarillo State Hospital and the Sr. Citizen's Survival Fund."

Easily the most important Women's Club activity is the annual bazaar.

"Hawaiian Market Place" is the theme and members have been working over nine months to insure its being a financial success.

George, as in previous years, will be deeply involved in setting up the booths. He hopes for lots of donations for the Trading Post, usually one of the busiest tables at the bazaar. Entertainment and the traditional raffle will be at 4 p.m.

Their home is a scenic source of delight for flower display lovers. Large rose bushes are clearly visible and giant planter boxes feature a dazzling assortment of flowering blooms. Their huge lemon tree yields hundreds of pieces of fruit and the McCormick's put them in

boxes, for all to see, with a sign saying "Help Yourself."

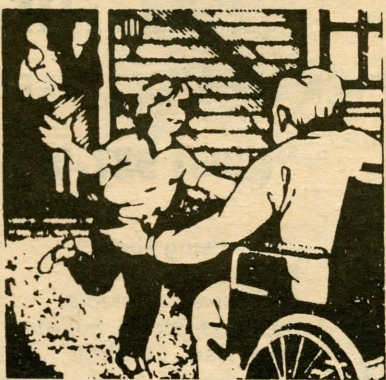
The McCormicks have three children, with each of them having three children. One daughter lives in Canoga Park and works for a division of Litton Industries; the other lives in Carnation, Washington, a suburb of Seattle. Their son, also a Canoga Park resident, is a sergeant with the LAPD and was assigned special duty in Olympic Village during the recent games.

Their future? "Well, says Edna, 'with fifty-one years behind us and nine grandchildren ahead of us, we will always be young in spirit'."

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LEISURE VILLAGER WINS WESTERN TRACK CHAMPIONSHIP

Though Hank Dorff started to run competitively as pretty much of a light-hearted gag, and to get some pleasant exercise from his leisure afternoons, his success has led to serious areas.

On Saturday, July 14, running at the beautiful new Occidental College track near Glendale, Hank took the first place gold medal in the 400 meter (quarter-mile) race of the T.A.C. Western Regional Masters Track Championships. Next day, Sunday, in over 100 degree heat, he took the 2nd place Silver medal for the 200 meter dash.

The Athletics Congress (T.A.C.) official western region includes 7 states — Hawaii, Alaska, Cal., Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado and Nevada. Over 220 athletes from

the age of 30 up, entered the championship track and field meet. The newly built Occidental track is one of the official warm-up and training tracks for Olympic athletes, as it is exactly like the Coliseum track.

Three weeks ago, Hank tore a thigh muscle while winning a 100 meter feature dash at the Southern Cal. Striders annual relay games. So he actually had not done any real training during that time, until his first race Saturday. But even though his time was slower than usual he didn't want to have to miss the Western Regionals.

Fred King, a leading Ventura County athletic trainer and head of physical therapy at Pleasant Valley Hospital was very helpful in enabling Hank to run. A careful program of

swimming and jacuzzi massage; stretching exercises; and running in the weightless atmosphere of chest-deep water in our swimming pool, worked well in enabling Hank to run with his thigh heavily taped, and win.

So while his running all started lightly, Hank is now eligible for the National Masters Championships to be held at the Univ. of Oregon's Hayward Field in August.

With 4 weeks in which to train and get his leg back to his top speed before he hurt it, Hank confidently entered and will run in Eugene, Oregon during the August National Championships.

Right now, his unbroken string is 13 medals won in the 13 races he has run so far during his first year.

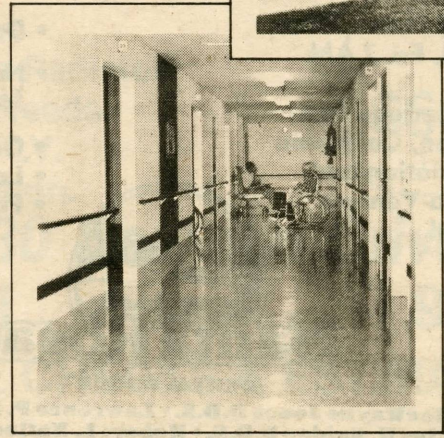
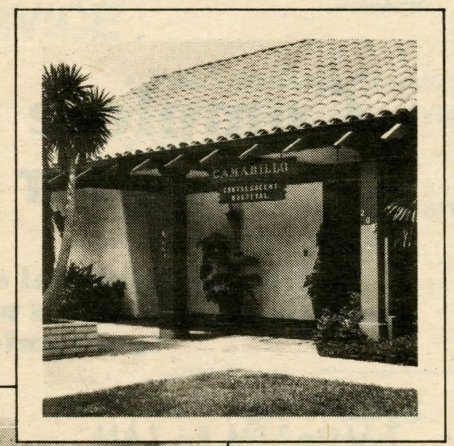
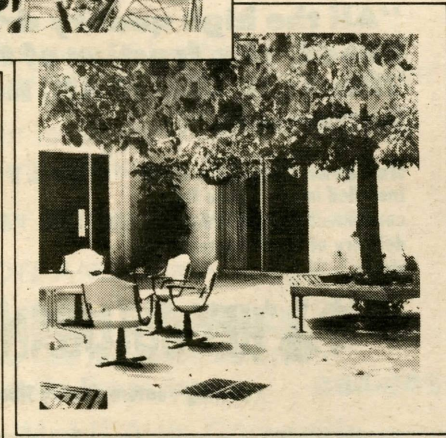
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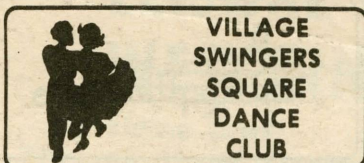
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VILLAGE SWINGERS SQUARE DANCE CLUB

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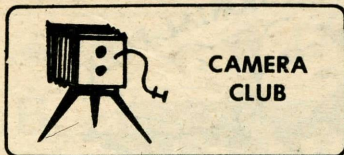
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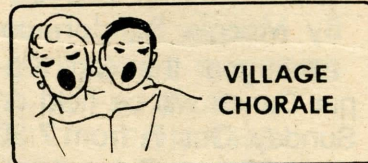

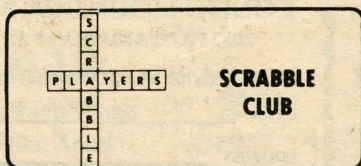

The Hoofers are to be commended for bringing their joyous entertainment to Convalescent Hospitals, Homes for the Aged and groups such as the Handicapped.

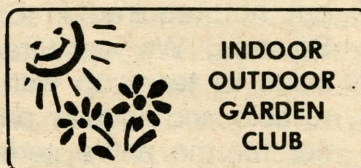

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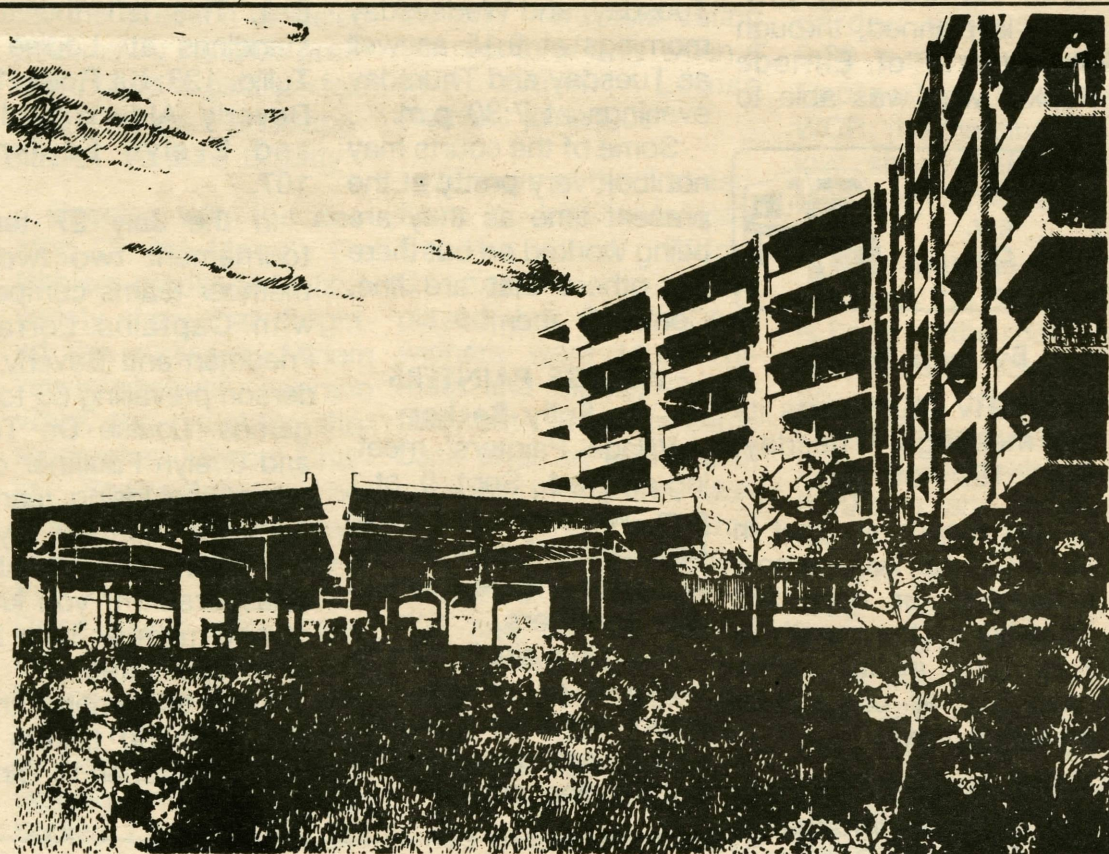
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SENIOR LEGISLATION

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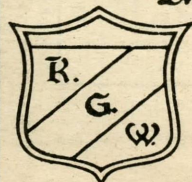
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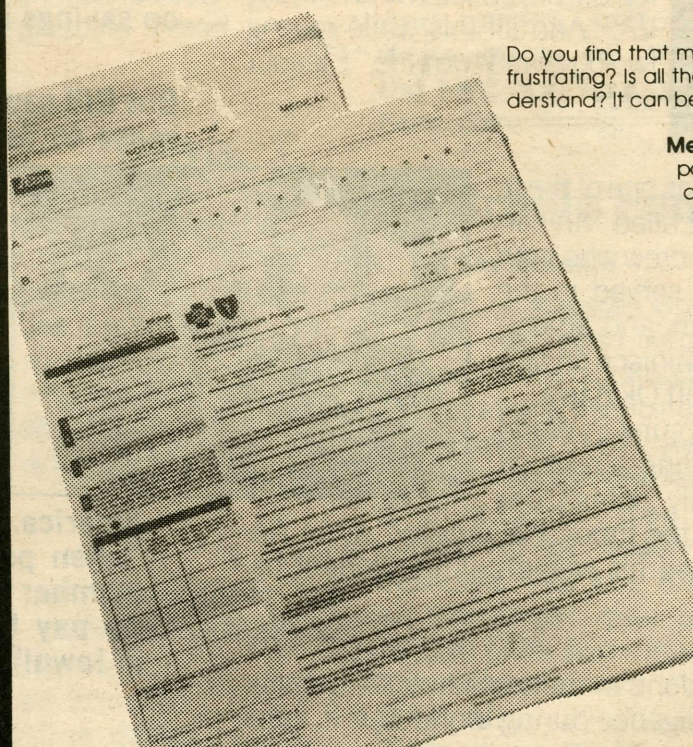
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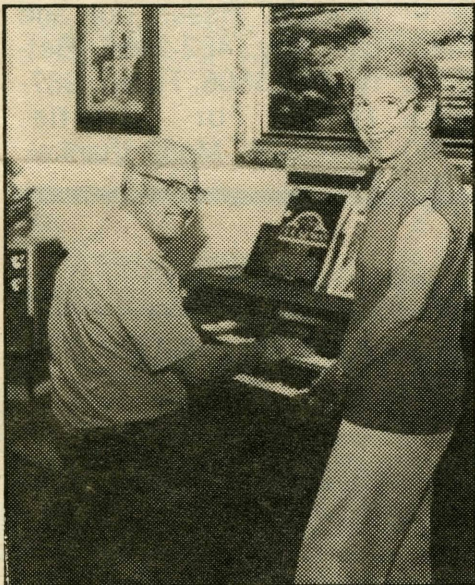
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Meet "NewAmericans" Eleanor and Bill Berger!

It was a long haul, with plenty of stops along the way, but Eleanor and Bill Berger are finally "at home for good" with their friends and neighbors in Leisure Village.

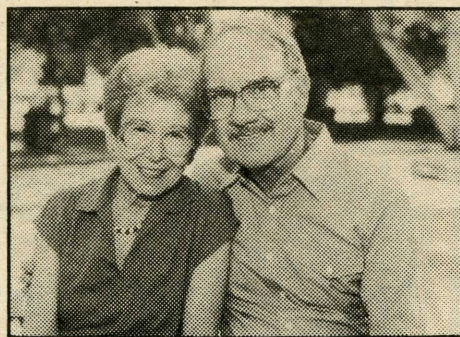
