AN OLYMPIAN EFFORT

Last month we published a letter from Mollie Silversher (V.23), announcing the circulation of a petition for bus transportation between Leisure Village and the Thousand Oaks Mall.

Currently the Thousand Oaks-Camarillo-Ventura Interconnecting Bus Service provided under contract by Westways Bus Company is financed by the three cities by general fund or sales tax revenues and fares collected from passengers. Seniors pay 15 cents a ride, and those over 75 ride free.

Leisure Villagers living here prior to the sharp rise in the cost of gasoline remember when the free bus service furnished by Leisure Technology, subsequently taken over by LVA, not only offered transportation into the business section of Camarillo, but—for a brief period—into Thousand Oaks, Oxnard, and Ventura.

Later an arrangement was made with the City of Camarillo to provide service into the city at a cost to the Association of \$16,000 a year. For those residents who don't drive, this is a welcome amenity, and the current effort to extend bus service is not intended to limit it.

There is a need, however, to offer transportation over the Conejo Grade to the department stores and other attractive establishments assembled at the Thousand Oaks Mall. A significant number of Villagers do not drive, and many who do would feel more secure riding in a bus than driving in the fast track on Highway 101—especially coming down the steep hill with a heavy tractor-trailer unit following close behind.

At present it takes about eight hours to make the roundtrip to T.O. via four connecting buses. With the proposed bus service, which would be made available once a day, a resident could board the bus at the Village gates approximately at 10:30 a.m. and return by 2:30 p.m.

The petition has already been signed by over 1,000 Villagers, and the LVA Board of Directors have been made aware of their desires. We are informed that the matter is now under study by the Community Services Director of the City of Camarillo

APPLAUSE IS DUE

We have complained at times in the past that our Board of Directors does not listen to homeowners; Directors have complained that homeowners do not take enough interest in their goings-on in running the village. It is encouraging then when residents speak, the Board listens and acts.

At the July Association meeting, Dick Van Horn, in his "Board Comments" touched briefly on the defects of our voting procedures, and the unrealistic expectation of getting 50.1% of the voters required for a quorum to occupy the Center. In the future, therefore, the Board will rely much more than heretofor on the use of proxies, getting them out earlier, following up if they are not turned in, etc. Futhermore, the Board has already taken the first step toward improvement - at the next annual meeting all recreation facilities will remain open.

Both of these changes make sense. Many of our well-intentioned homeowners often have lastminute emergencies preventing them from exercising their voting rights.

As far as keeping the facilities open, only one member of a household can vote; why prevent others from their usual pursuits? Besides, if some of our negligent homeowners are in the center, they just might remember their responsibility and take the trouble to vote

We commend our new Board for these actions.

Those responsible for expediting the work on the dressing rooms should also be commended for arranging for poolgoers to use the beautiful new showers much earlier than anticipated.

OPEN LETTER TO THE LEISURE VILLAGE BOARD OF DIRECTORS
