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

...to meet Dickran Kouymjian, editor of **An Armenian Trilogy**, three plays by Fresno's own William Saroyan. The reception for Prof. Kouymjian, who is director of the Armenian Studies Program at California State University, Fresno, will be from 3 to 5 p.m. on Saturday, Dec. 13. Refreshments will be served.

An Armenian Trilogy is the first of the Saroyan manuscripts to be published since his death in 1981. Besides his novels and memoirs, Saroyan's best-known plays include "My Heart's in the Highlands" and "The Time of Your Life," for which he received the Pulitzer Prize in 1940.

Written in the 1970's, the plays in **An Armenian Trilogy** are: "Armenians," which takes place in Fresno in 1921 and explores the victims' memories of the genocide; "Bitlis," which picks up the story four decades later and is named for the Armenian town where the Saroyan family originated, and "Haratch," set in Paris, 1979, which in a larger sense reflects the problems of all dispossessed and persecuted people.

Prof. Kouymjian was a close friend of Saroyan. **An Armenian Trilogy** is being published by the Fresno State Press. It has 195 pages with 57 illustrations and includes an introductory essay by Prof. Kouymjian. The hardback version is \$21.95; paperback, \$12.95.

THEATRE**N.Y. première of Bartèvè Play**

The latest play of Reine Bartèvè, the Armenian playwright and actress from Paris, was given its international première in a showcase production by the UBU Repertory Theater at the Guggenheim Museum in New York City on Sunday, October 19, 1986.

The play, *A Man With Women*, focuses on the attraction and misunderstandings between a man and a woman in the dream-like atmosphere of carnival time. It was translated from French by Richard Miller and directed by Françoise Kourilsky, founder and Artistic Director of the UBU Repertory Theater. The two-person cast featured Dan Duckworth as Bernard Crao and Yolande Bavan as Maya Lance. The music for the play was written by Genji Ito and performed by him and Yuko Tsuji. Both Mrs. Bavan and Mr. Ito collaborated with Françoise Kourilsky in the 1985 UBU production of Madame Bartèvè's *Nowhere* (the French was entitled *L'Arménoche*) at the La MAMA E.T.C. Theater in New York City.

The performance of Bartèvè's *A Man With Women* was part of the Contemporary French Theater Festival stage by UBU in conjunction with the exhibition at the Guggenheim «Angeles of Vision: French Art Today.» during which three contemporary French one-act plays were featured.

Reine Bartèvè (Takouhi Bartèvian) was born of Armenian parents in Paris. At an early age she turned to acting. She has been distinguished by her very sensitive interpretations of roles from

classical Greek and French theater. She has also made a number of films and toured with French companies and as a solo artist in the United States, Africa, Europe, and most recently the Soviet Union. She has appeared in a number of modern plays by Ionesco, Camus, Anouilh, and Tennessee Williams. After a production of Williams' *I Can't Imagine Tomorrow* in Paris in 1976 in which Reine Bartèvè played the lead, the American writer said he thought the play was unproduceable until he saw her performance.

In that same year Bartèvè's first play, *L'Arménoche*, roughly meaning *The Little Armenian Girl*, was produced in Paris and met with instant success. It is a powerful drama of exile and loss and the plight of the immigrant in a racist world. The play was translated into English by Bruno Kernz and first published in *Ararat* (winter 1981), the Armenian literary quarterly of New York. It was accompanied by an

essay on Ms. Bartèvè and her work by Angèle Kapoian. It was in the pages of *Ararat* that Bartèvè's countryman, Françoise Kourilsky, discovered the play and decided to present it to American audiences. Kourilsky's company is devoted to presenting contemporary French theater to American audiences: she received a Mayor's 1986 Liberty Award from Mayor Koch of New York this summer in recognition of her contribution to American theater.

Since her first success Reine Bartèvè has written half a dozen more plays including *Le Pavillon Balthasar* (1978), *Ouverture sur mer* (1980), *L'Orphelinat* (1984), *Le Dompteur ou la Forêt des Traverses* (1985). She has also written a screenplay based on *L'Arménoche* entitled *Fuite (Flight)*.

CSUF Publishes Saroyan Work

A trilogy of plays reflecting author William Saroyan's Armenian heritage published last month by the CSUF Press is the first book of previously unpublished material released since the writer's death.

Saroyan was born and died in Fresno and often wrote about this city in his more than 50 published works. Since his death in 1981, he has been the subject of over one-half dozen biographies.

"My purpose was to show the world that Saroyan is not just a subject for dark biographies," said CSUF Professor Dickran Kouymjian, Saroyan's long-time friend and confidant, who edited the book. "He was not an angry, frustrated person who'd dried up as a writer, a bitter old man. That's what the biographies suggest."

"I decided it was about time we heard some of his own voice. Since he's not here, we had to let his work speak for him."

The book should cause a stir in the literary world because of the fame and skill of Saroyan, Kouymjian said.

The New York Times may publish an article on the book in its review section, he said.

Twenty-six paperback copies have already sold in the Kennel Bookstore, according to Helen Mueller, general book buyer. Released Oct. 15, the Saroyan book has sold as many copies as the average book sells in a semester, she said.

Publication of the book was delayed as Saroyan's will went through probate. Then the William Saroyan Foundation, the appointed legal owner of the author's works, gave approval for the book.

According to CSUF President Harold Haak, who also serves as a member of the Saroyan Foundation Board, approval was granted "because the effort was going on. Professor Kouymjian was already working on the book."

Haak added he felt it was "appropriate that it came from this university," as Saroyan had strong ties with the campus. In his will Saroyan designated CSUF as one of the repositories for his literary estate.

Robert Ware, the executive editor of The Press, said the book was "a community effort of this office," and much of the work was done on volunteer time. "We're not salaried" at The Press, he said. "We're doing this out of our enthusiasm for the venture."

New Plays are About His Heritage;

Ware spent much of his first summer as editor retyping from the original manuscripts, and he found the plays to be different from Saroyan's earlier work. "The warmth, love, respect and honor for the human spirit is as evident as ever, but the projection is a bit different."

"We never knew what concerned this man when he stepped out of public involvement," Ware said. "This is the first glimpse of what Saroyan as a playwright had been about since then."

"The plays brought together here are concerned with Saroyan's Armenian Heritage," Kouymjian wrote in his introduction to the book. "William Saroyan's public voice has been known and loved for fifty years . . . yet like everyone, Saroyan, too, had an inner, non-public world, and in this book he speaks in one of his private voices."

Kouymjian had many plays that Saroyan had given him for use in classes at CSUF. "Three of the numerous plays I had worked together in a strong way," he said. "I'm the one who put these plays together" to highlight the theme running through them, he said.

"These are three plays in which Mr. Saroyan is presenting a strong philosophical message to his people dealing with the question of exile."

Kouymjian, who received the CSUF Professor of the Year award last month, said the most difficult task was deciding how to edit the material. All the work was in its original form and were rough drafts from Saroyan's typewriter. "I am a scholar who is reverent of unpublished material," Kouymjian said. "My first reaction was not to change anything."

Kouymjian spent hundreds of hours editing the plays. He tried to be as faithful to Saroyan as he could, he said. He based his judgments on "a life of knowing Saroyan and teaching his work."

"I spent more time on the plays than Saroyan," says Dr. Kouymjian, the editor

"I spent more time on the plays than Saroyan," Kouymjian said, explaining the speed at which the writer produced.

Saroyan left many unpublished works. "The amount of this material is staggering," Kouymjian said. "During his lifetime he often referred to the large number of plays he wrote and put aside. He refused to send them to Broadway because he was disillusioned with contemporary American theatre."

"The works show us that Saroyan had all of his wits together and was writing about serious issues. He had not lost his grip on writing. He was very productive in the last years."

While Kouymjian thinks the plays will probably never be seen on Broadway, he said, "I think these plays are going to be performed." Whether they will be performed at CSUF is something he wonders about.

A production of the plays by CSUF's Theatre Department would be quite a coup, Kouymjian said. It could be the first production of them anywhere except for the second play in the book which was performed off-Broadway in the '70s, according to Ware.

CSUF Production of these plays will "be a very appropriate and very decent thing."

"Saroyan is the greatest writer we (Fresnans) have ever produced."

President Haak said a CSUF production would "be a very appropriate and very decent thing."

Theatre Department Professor Phillip Walker said. "It's very strange to me that the works of the poet laureate of Fresno, the greatest writer we've ever produced, are never done. I wish we could do more," he said.

The choice of plays for production at CSUF is made by people in the Theatre Department, according to Professor Brad Myers.

Both Walker and Myers agreed that Saroyan's play, "The Time of Your Life," is an excellent play. Walker calls it "one of the greatest one-act plays in our literature."

However, both also said many factors go into the decision to include a play in the department's season.

The plays "should indeed be considered," said Myers, who has seen "The Time of Your Life" in seven productions. While the new plays should not be accepted on the strengths of Saroyan's earlier work, "they should be investigated and if they are of comparable merit, yes, they definitely should be done," Myers said.

Walker said the most likely reason there has been so few productions of Saroyan plays is the "subconscious feelings" that good work could not come out of Fresno. Saroyan's plays are produced and respected in other cities, he said, but "a prophet isn't listened to in his own home."

Personally, I think we should do Saroyan play," Walker concluded. "It would certainly be worth the effort."

Professors awarded Fulbright grants

Three California State University, Fresno professors have recently joined the competitive ranks of Fulbright scholars participating in the educational exchange between American and foreign universities.

- **Dr. Dickran Kouymjian**, coordinator of CSUF's Armenian Studies Program and the university's Outstanding Professor for 1986, was awarded a Fulbright lectureship for the upcoming semester at Erevan State University in Soviet Armenia.

Kouymjian, editor of the new Saroyan book *An Armenian Trilogy*, which contains three previously unpublished plays by the Pulitzer Prize-winning author, will teach two courses. One will focus on the life of his friend Saroyan, who he says is probably the most published American writer in the Soviet Union. Other Armenian-American writers will be the topic of the other course.

Kouymjian has taught courses on William Saroyan at CSUF for many years. He said he feels the students at Erevan University should have the opportunity to study the life and works of Saroyan through such a course. Kouymjian will attempt to make known the author's later memoirs and unpublished works, many of which were given to him by the author himself, including those in the new trilogy, which will be used as a textbook for the course.



Kouymjian spent hundreds of hours editing the plays. He tried to be as faithful to Saroyan as he could, he said. He based his judgements on «a life of knowing Saroyan and teaching his work.»

«I spent more time on the plays than Saroyan,» Kouymjian said, explaining the speed at which the writer produced.

Saroyan left many unpublished works. «The amount of this material is staggering,» Kouymjian said. «During his lifetime he often referred to the large number of plays he wrote and put aside. He refused to send them to Broadway because he was disillusioned with contemporary American theatre.

«The work shows us that Saroyan had all of his wits together and was writing about serious issues. He had not lost his grip on writing. He was very productive in the last years.»

While Kouymjian thinks the plays will probably never be seen on Broadway, he said, «I think these plays are going to be performed.» Whether they will be performed at CSUF is something he wonders about.

A production of the plays by CSUF's Theatre Department would be quite a coup, Kouymjian said. It could be the first production of them anywhere except for the second play in the book which was performed off-Broadway in the '70s, according to Ware.

President Haak said a CSUF production would be a very appropriate and very decent thing.»

NorCal Conference Will Focus On Armenian-American Culture

SAN FRANCISCO — The Zoryan Institute and San Francisco State University will co-sponsor a conference on Armenian American culture Feb. 14. The conference is entitled, "Armenian American Culture: What It Is? Where Is It Going?"

AROUND FRESNO STATE

California State University, Fresno will continue to extend its campus to overseas points next summer with a variety of foreign study opportunities, including a five-week program in London May 30 through July 3.

Headquartered at Regent's College near the center of London's west end, the Extended Education Summer Session program will offer six three-unit courses. Students will be permitted to enroll in two of the classes which may be used to meet general education, elective or other requirements.


The class offerings will include Drama 62, "Theatre Today;" Management 104, "Administrative Principles of Management;" Marketing 100, "Principles of Marketing;" Speech 8, "Group Discussion," and "Communication and Learning," which can be taken for credit as Speech 114 or Teacher Education 158.

The program fee is \$1,987 including round-trip air fare between Los Angeles or San Francisco and London, six units of residence credit, a double-occupancy room for five weeks, 12 meals per week, and a college facilities fee for the use of the library, bank, bookstore, pub and lounge, and recreational facilities. A \$395 deposit is due no later than Feb. 2. Additional payments of \$796 each are due March 2 and Apr. 30.

Class meetings will be held from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Monday through Thursday to provide students with a three-day weekend for travel, leisure or other activities.

Other overseas study opportunities during the summer will include "The British Connection: London, England" June 22 through July 6, conducted by Dr. Lester Roth, professor of education. It will cover English cultural topics such as education, religion, ancient history and theatre. The fee is \$1,395.

"London Seminar in International Finance" will be conducted July 12 through Aug. 7 by Dr. Donald Stegall, professor of international finance. It will deal with current issues in international fi-



inance, banking and trade, and will be held at the City University Business School. The fee is \$2,350.

A tentative program is planned for Guanajuato, Mexico June 29 through Aug. 7 for classes in Spanish, Hispanic culture, Chicano culture and Chicano society. Dr. Cosme Zaragoza, an assistant professor of foreign languages, will direct the program. The fee is \$950.

"Field Geography: Peru" will include the archaeology as well as the geography of that South American country and will be offered July 5-19, taught by Dr. James Kus, CSUF professor of geography, and Claudia Mader of Kings River Community College. The fee is \$1,999.

Also in the planning stages for July and August is a study tour on "Armenians in

the Holy Land" covering Jerusalem and Israel and conducted by Barlow Der Mugrdechian, a lecturer in Armenian Studies. It will focus on the presence of Armenians in the Holy Land since the time of Christ. The tour cost is \$1,550.

Rounding out the 1987 summer programs is a "British Theatre" tour to be directed by Dr. Phillip Walker, professor of theatre arts, and covering shows, theatre tours, backstage visits, museum trips and meetings with London stage celebrities. The dates are to be announced.

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

Jerusalem-1987 Summer Program for Armenian Students

Plans have been finalized for *Jerusalem 1987*, a program of intensive study and travel in the Holy Land, co-sponsored by the California State University, Fresno Armenian Studies Program, the CSUF Armenian Students Organization, and the Armenian Patriarchate of Jerusalem.

The three-week program will be held during July 13-August 3. The group will be headquartered in the Armenian quarter of the Old City of Jerusalem. The course of studies will include a history of the Armenians in the Holy Land, classes on Armenian language, art,

history, architecture, and the Armenian Church. Participants will have the opportunity to acquaint themselves with an Armenian community whose presence dates from the first century. In addition, the cultural life of various groups will be examined. Field trips will be conducted to the holiest sites of Christianity, Judaism, and Islam.

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
