Winds wreak havoc across Village

The record rainfall and high winds that pounded Southern California on Sunday, March 20, not only interrupted the serenity of our generally quiet community, but also caused considerable damage to some parts of the Village.

According to General Manager Bob Scheaffer, a total of 25 mature trees were either completely leveled during the storm or suffered enough damage they will need to be removed. Several of the trees toppled onto five individual patio enclosures, causing an estimated \$50,000 in damage;

shingles were blown off of 50-plus homes, causing a few minor leaks; and skylights on two different homes were completely removed from the rooftops by the wind, leaving gaping holes in the ceilings and heavy internal showers until temporary repairs could be made.

Disruption also occurred at the main gate when a large tree completely blocked the entrance roadway and traffic was subsequently diverted to the side gates for about six hours. Both sides of the thoroughfare were closed for safety reasons, not only



Camarillo mayor updates Village

Camarillo's mayor, Mike Morgan, and the city's top administrators appeared at the Village's Current Issues Forum on March 18 in the AR before approximately 100 Villagers.

Explaining where the tax revenues go, it was noted that the city has a healthy balance now but it is narrowing, and reductions in expenditures are under way.

In a lengthy PowerPoint presentation, Morgan and the staff outlined extensive future development of city parcels and consideration of a development called Village At The Lakes, which will transform a large agricultural section of land directly across Highway 101, from just below the Camarillo Springs Golf Course to nearly as far as the recently completed Village In The Park development. It was agreed that major environmental issues will have to be resolved before final approval can be considered.





Many of the residents within Leisure Village and all of the tap dancers belonging to the recently disbanded club known as the Happy Hoofers represent the best of the Greatest Generation, those citizens who endured the Great Depression, survived the Second World War, witnessed the advance of the space age, television, computers and other technological marvels.

Those changes in technology have also paralleled a similar pattern of evolution in how people use their leisure time, and tap dancing, like duplicate bridge and canasta, no longer appear to be in vogue. Gone are the days of Fred Astaire, Donald O'Connor, Gene Kelly, Sammy Davis Jr. and many others who rose through the

ranks of vaudeville, variety television shows and other similar entertainment venues of days gone by.





And, as always, good snacks will be provided.




We welcomed Greg Cooper, professional photographer and instructor at the Brooks Institute, as our judge for the evening's March competition meeting.



because of the potential danger from other falling trees, but also because some disgruntled homeowner ignored the gatekeeper's order to make a u-turn and use one of the side gates, instead driving into the Village down the exit lane, thus creating an additional potential problem.

True to form in response to the emergency, Scheaffer, Jerry Salas and 10 other employees responded to the immediate needs of the community by showing up to work on their scheduled day off to address community needs by removing trees and other debris from roadways, sidewalks, damaged homes and attending to other important matters, and our thanks are extended to these valued employees. The fire department also assisted at various times throughout the day, as did Southern California Edison and Time-Warner Cable.

Although Conejo Creek ran unusually high from the runoff, no immediate concern was expressed by government authorities relative to the levee being breached, nor did any water flow over the banks. The only flooding reported was in Villages 26 and 28 when storm drains clogged and water backed up into the streets, but due to the original design and engineering of the community, no homes were flooded.

Events of the day were further complicated when, according to

Edison, power was lost to 250 homes due to a transformer being short circuited, in addition to the loss of cable television. Most of the power and cable television was restored by Sunday evening, and all services were functioning by 10 a.m. Monday.

Finally, Scheaffer wanted to express his sincere thanks to all residents in maintaining calm during this unusual event and providing assistance when needed.

Thus marks another "happening" in our community that will likely be embellished over time by some, and talked about for many years into the future by most.

Pet Corner: Now's the time to fight the fleas

Flea control is another part of keeping your pet healthy. Monthly topical flea medication, or the newer oral medication, is effective for use in dogs.

In cats the topical applications are used most commonly.

For many pets flea bites create itching and irritation. This can become severe when the animal is allergic to the bites. Also, fleas can carry worms that

parasitize the bowels of your pet. Many infectious diseases can be prevented by routine vaccination. Talk with your veterinarian to determine which vaccinations your pet needs.

Being proactive will help you keep your pet healthy on any budget.

The best time to start is right

Common asked question: Is it OK to feed our dog table scraps with her meal?

Answer: Most name brand pet foods are complete and balanced for the life stage on the label. When you add people food to your pet's balanced diet you are shifting the balance, thereby creating an inbalance. It is better not to supplement with people food.
