Proposition 1D passes bringing much needed funding to CSUCI

The passage of Proposition 1D on Tuesday's ballot will result in nearly 62 million dollars being allocated to California State University Channel Islands. Projects to be funded include renovation of campus facilities to accommodate the growing academic program, including special labs for the nursing program scheduled to launch fall of 2007. It will also fund improvements to the infrastructure, such as the distribution system for hot and chilled water, to provide building heating and cooling. The monies will also be used toward a new entrance road to accommodate the widening of Lewis Road.
