## Search Narrows For Maintenance Supervisor

Almost 40 resumes were received by General Manager Bob Cullati in response to the maintenance supervisor "Help Wanted" ads that appeared in a number of local and nearby newspapers.

"Alas," says Bob, "almost all applicants had fine landscape experience but we need a man who also has experience in the maintenance of buildings."

Bob wants villagers to know that, despite the loss of Terry Craig, all phases of his operation are going ahead on schedule. He credits much of this success to grounds supervisor Ray Rios, who has 18 years' experience here.

"Matter of fact," says Cullati, "Ray was a great help to Terry when he (Terry) arrived 9 years ago. I'm very high on both Ray and the two foremen who report to him."

The normal procedure in the hiring of a supervisor is our general manager, Cullati, to select the final six candidates, then narrow the field to three and present those individuals to the Board for final nomination.

About 50% of the entire LVA budget is under the direct control of the Maintenance Supervisor, which emphasizes the importance of finding a competent person. Water and sewer costs are about \$750,000 per year, plus landscape, streets and building expenses which bring the total to about \$3

## Ballot Propositions

Two ballot propositions have been sent to homeowners by the Board of Directors, with the voting period scheduled to end on September 2, 1994.

Issue #1, a proposed amendment to the CC&R's, needs a 75% affirmative vote to pass.

This issue provides that if an owner who is renting his home does not pay the monthly assessments on time, the Board has authority to demand that the rent be paid by the tenant directly to the Association.

Homeowners who pay the assessment on time have no need for panic. This recourse will be taken only after a lien (a legal claim against the property) has been filed, as stated in Article 5.2(b) of the CC&R's.

As our Association bud-

get is entirely dependent upon the collection of monthly fees, it is in the best interest of all homeowners that this authority be granted to the Association to protect our financial basis.

A "yes" vote will make this possible.

Issue #2, proposed deletion to Article VI, Section 2 of the By-Laws, would stop the practice of cumulative voting (stacking votes) for the Board of Directors. A simple majority of "Yes" will pass this change.

America's democracy is based upon the guarantee of one citizen - one vote, with the majority winning the decision. The business of our Association, however, is the management, protection, and maintenance of all L.V. property.

Therefore, the number of votes to which one is entitled is based upon the *units of property* one owns, and not the number of residents in a home.

In voting for our Board of Directors, stacking of votes makes it possible for a small group of people (a minority) to defeat the preference of the majority.

A "Yes" vote for Issue #2 will stop this undemocratic election practice.

Mail or put your ballot into a ballot box today—if you have not already done so.

### INTRODUCTION TO GUEST EDITORIAL

*The differences between THE VILLAGE VOICE and INSIDE LEISURE VILLAGE have been explained many, many times, but obviously, the message has not been entirely understood*

*The Staff of ILV thanks Robbie Karlin, dedicated resident and former board member, for a particularly succinct description of the purposes of the two publications, and are placing his letter in the Guest Editorial spot. Ed*

## Guest Editorial

At the board meeting of July 5th there was discussion on the roles played by "Inside Leisure Village" as opposed to the "Village Voice". One resident spoke in praise of the "ILV" editorial in the July 5th issue, and expressed strong displeasure concerning recent past policies of the "Village Voice". Another resident took him to task, saying that "Inside Leisure Village" does not speak for Leisure Village. The "Village Voice", he declared, is the official instrument for 'in-house' concerns. It appears that there is a need for clarification on the position of these two publications and where they differ in their scope and targets.

"Inside Leisure Village" is a publication sponsored and paid for by the Star Free Press, and is distributed free to the residents. *(There are, however, no constraints by the Press on the contents; all material is written and controlled by L.V. residents. Ed.)* The editorial staff is composed of residents of Leisure Village. Its contents are targeted toward the ideas, thoughts, and activities of our residents. There are editorial comments, commendations, and criticisms that center around the actions and activities of L.V. Included in "Inside Leisure Village" are unsolicited letters to the editor, notes on club activities, cartoons, advertising, etc. It is a newspaper of wide latitude targeted toward our residents.

The "Village Voice", on the other hand, is mailed to the residents monthly by the L.V. Association, and is the 'houseorgan' of the Association. In keeping with its original purpose it carried information on committee meeting dates, activities and happenings in the village, without personal opinions interspersed between the next garbage collection or street sweeping schedules. Suddenly personal-opinion editorials began to appear. Under the president's by-line appeared the likes and dislikes, and the philosophical opinions of the writer. Additionally the 'Village Voice' devoted a number of pages to "Letters to the Editor". How these letters came to be has never been explained by the Board.

It's important to note that "Inside Leisure Village" is paid for by the Star Free Press, and distributed without charge to the residents of Leisure Village. The printing and mailing costs of the "Village Voice" are borne by the residents of LV through monthly assessments.

I am not alone in my resentment for having no choice in the payment for materials that express personal opinions when none are required or called for. And done in a manner contrary to the good and welfare of Leisure Village and its residents.

With the advent of the new Board make-up I look forward to the "Village Voice" reverting to its original and

proper intent. And I give my heartfelt thanks to those on the staff of "Inside Leisure Village" for doing a superb job in giving us a periodical that is a high standard, unbiased informational reflection of Leisure Village life.

I trust I have succeeded in separating the inherent needs and targets of two distinctly different communication patterns. Each serves a particular purpose for our Village and its residents. Let's get back to 'square one' and keep it that way.

### Past Board Member Encourages Trust

Congratulations on your editorial of June 24, 1994; it was both timely and appropriate. Prior Boards of Directors successfully governed Leisure Village Association in accordance with your recommendation, and in accordance with accepted standards for volunteer associations. That is, they established policy, worked closely with the standing committees, gave direction to the staff, and assured themselves that the Village was being managed in accordance with their wishes. Committee meetings were well attended by residents, who were invited to present their opinions. Committee recommendations were made to and carefully considered by the Board.

Board members met once a week on Monday mornings, and once a month in the Assembly Room. Major decisions were made during the public meetings, and discussion was invited and welcome.

The General Manager was expected to do the job he is paid to do; that is, make decisions in accordance with known policy and manage the staff. Our financial records and check register were reviewed twice a month by a sub-committee of the Finance Committee. The Board of Directors "directed," and the staff com-

piled.

This may be an appropriate time to terminate the antagonism toward our committees, management and staff that appears to have existed for the past year. The "antagonists" have had their day, and they have failed. Trust and confidence in our employees, and in our membership and their committees would be welcome.

### Appeal From New Director

I have just been elected to your Board of Directors, effective next month, and I thank fellow villagers for this privilege and challenge. However, I am writing this letter as a resident and not as a Board Member. In fact, I hasten to do this before I become involved in Board's activities and responsibilities.

I am deeply concerned about the degree of dis-

sension that seems to exist in the Village. We have been drifting into confrontational modes of operations and conduct which are certainly counterproductive, and potentially disastrous. I appeal to all of us to take it as a personal challenge to join in the effort to reverse this trend.

Our Board and Committee members are all hard working volunteers, doing the best job they can. The Board members are elected by the majority, and must be presumed to reflect majority views in most of their actions. At the very least, they deserve our courtesy and our respect.

This should be especially true at our Monthly Open Meetings. At these meetings, it is both appropriate and advisable for villagers to express their opinions and to voice their concerns about matters of general interest, as well as to make constructive suggestions.

I would suggest, however, that matters of interest to the requester only, such as something unique to his or her house, be taken up first with the appropriate Committee. Only if no satisfactory result has been achieved by that process, and only in extreme cases, should such matters come before the entire assembly.

I would also like to stress the obvious: personal attacks on Board

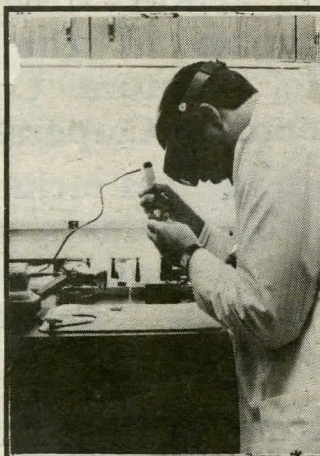

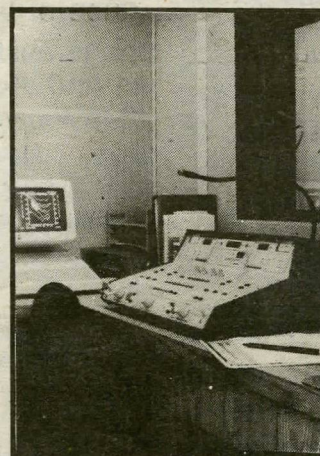

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## Emergency Services Committee

Hopefully, by the time this paper is delivered, Emergency Services Communication Center will be entirely completed.

There are two separate facilities. One is called the Emergency Communication Center, or the E.C.C. Room, which houses the two transceivers. One is a 2 meter FM, for communication with each of the eleven Area Posts in Leisure Village. If necessary, signals can go outside to Camarillo City Hall. The other piece of equipment is an all band transceiver. We have tested both of these instruments, and they have met E.S.C. standards.

On the other end of the building is the Citizen Band Base or the C.B.B. Room. At this time it is not quite ready for testing, but in a few days it should be complete.

On the outside of the building, halfway between the two communication rooms, stands a gas powered generator which can produce electricity, if there is a black out.

Camarillo City Hall granted permits for the renovation of both of these rooms, to bring them up to legal code standards, which has been done.

Installation of new shelves in both rooms will accommodate storage of

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## New VISTA Bus Service Started

A new countywide bus system was started in Ventura County during July. It is called the Ventura Intercity Transit Authority, or VISTA.

Camarillo is served by two routes: VISTA Highway 101 connects with Vista Highway 126 and runs through Ventura, Oxnard and Camarillo to Thousand Oaks. Stops include Ventura College and the County Government Center in Ventura, the Camarillo Metrolink Station and The Oaks Mall in Thousand Oaks. VISTA Central runs between Oxnard and Camarillo, including stops at the Oxnard Transportation Mugu Naval Air Center and Camarillo State Hospital.

VISTA buses run Mondays through Fridays from about 6:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., usually hourly service. There is no weekend service. Fares are 50 cents for senior citizens. Drivers do not make change. Monthly passes are \$15 for seniors.

The VISTA stop is right outside the Village West Gate on Los Pueblos, north one block, where residents formerly caught the bus to Thousand Oaks.

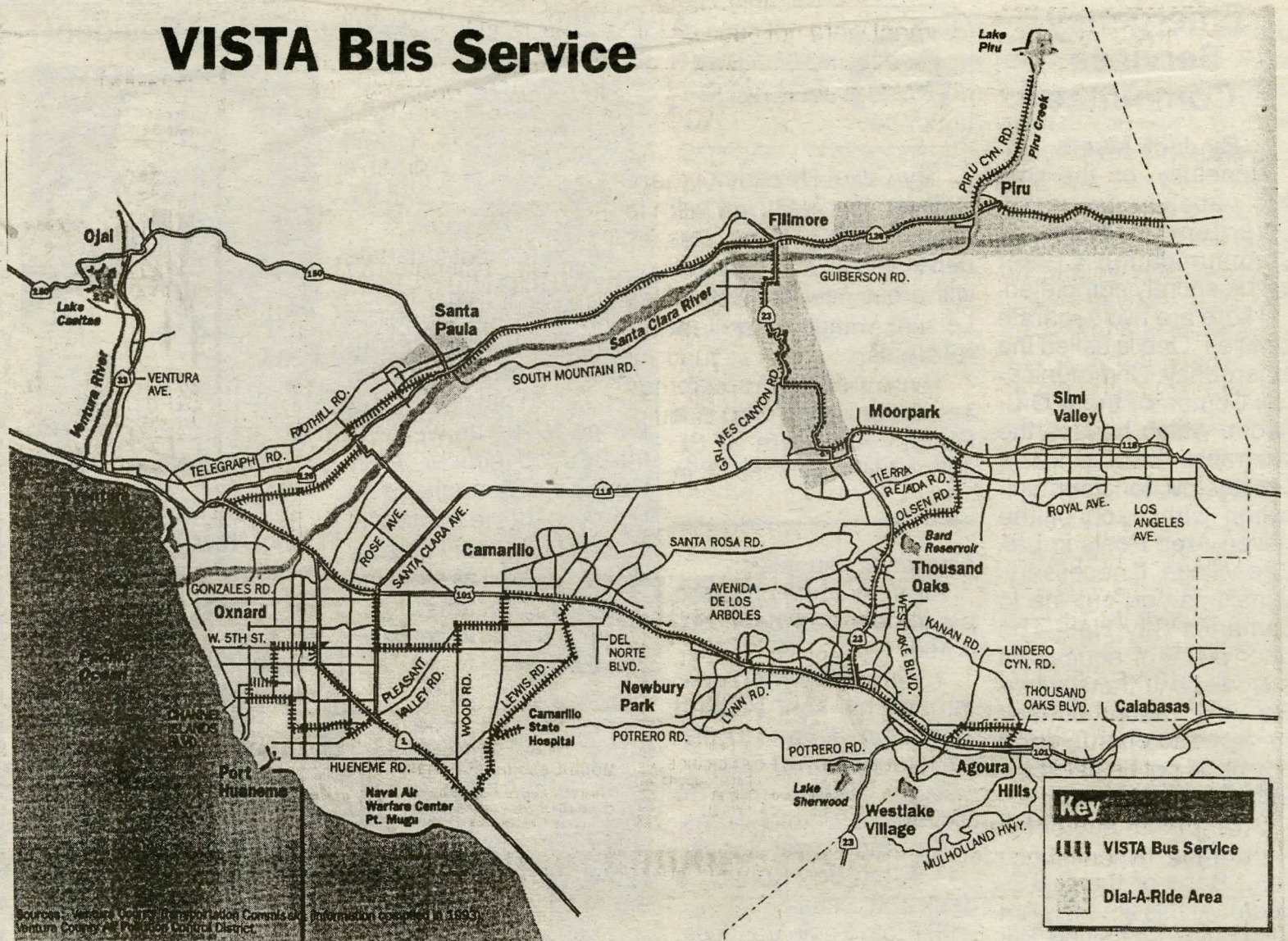

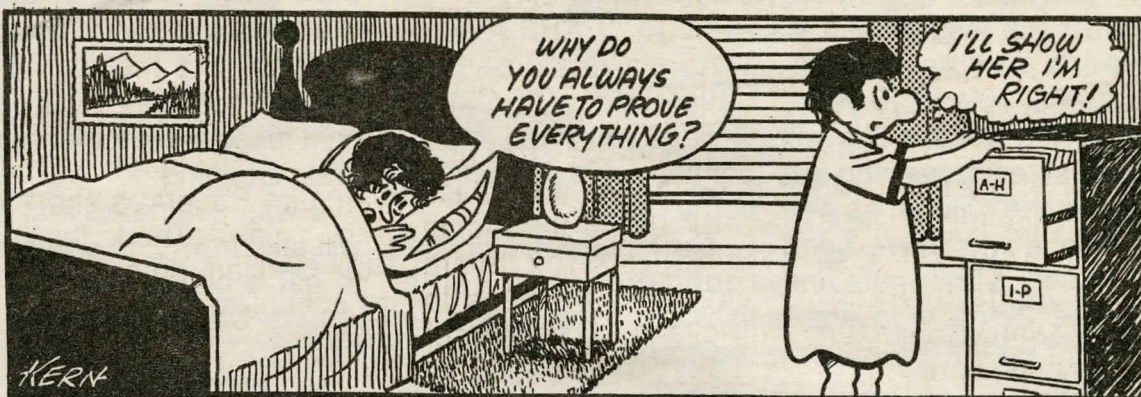
are lead-free, so this can be safely used for a working teapot.

Aileen Chuck, Program Chairperson, promises

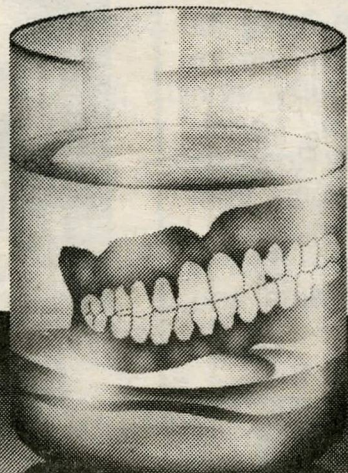

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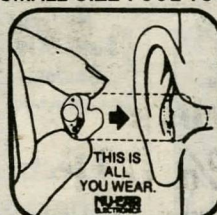
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## Porcelain Artist Betty Kumler

Talent is not uncommon here in Leisure Village. However, creative ability which has had a track record of recognized accomplishment is relatively rare.

Betty Kumler of Village 6 is an outstanding proponent of the art of porcelain painting, both as talented producing artist and as teacher. She and her husband Bob (also well known to paddle-tennis playing residents as a top player and teacher of the sport) have resided here for sixteen years.

She retired from a teaching career in English and History in Ventura County. Betty's interest in porcelain painting was first stimulated in a class she attended about twenty years ago in Oxnard. She has been captivated by it ever since.

Betty's creation, "Spider Woman", recently was awarded first prize at the International Porcelain Art Show in Florence Italy. Artists from all regions of Europe had entered this show. The competition judges are considered among the foremost authorities in their field. She has also exhibited some of her work in Colorado and California during her twenty year involvement with this art.

Porcelain painting is an ancient art, originating with the Tang Dynasty of China, circa 600 A.D. Al-

though, throughout Europe and Asia, China painting is regarded as a true art form, it is still regarded as a craft in the United States, not on the same level as other art forms such as canvas

paintings.

Although there are no painted china pieces by American artists in the Smithsonian, there is an abundance of works by Chinese, Japanese, German, French, and Italian

artists, according to Betty. Partly, to fill this void, with help from husband Bob, who became self-taught expert in videotaping, she produced video tapes of seventeen major porcelain American artists during a period of one year. These tapes and one huge private collection may now be viewed in the Smithsonian Archives Center.

Presently, Betty does her painting in one room at home dedicated to this purpose. There is a magnificent collection of painted porcelain art works in the Kumler living room (see photo), many of which are her creations.

Porcelain painting can be completely engrossing and self-satisfying, according to Betty. Anything in porcelain including plates, tiles, boxes both large and miniature can be the artist's canvas. Cost of materials is nominal, ranging from \$22.50 for starter

material, which include brushes and paints. Paints are all imported mineral gold or iron base. Brushes range from large sizes to quills.

A China Painting club was first formed here in the Village approximately sixteen years ago. After some time of active participation, the club became defunct due to losses in membership. Although talented qualified teachers, including Betty herself, are available here in the Village, re-establishing a class for interested persons requires considerable effort, including initial formation of a club dedicated to porcelain painting. She would be most willing to counsel others who would attempt to form a porcelain painting club in conformity with official LVA regulations.

Now is the time for all good volunteers to come to the aid of the Village.

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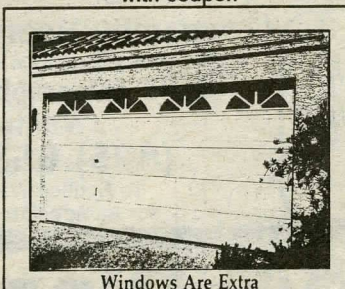

## Birds Of Leisure Village

Since the advent of the crows in Leisure Village, bird populations have changed dramatically.

Actually, such changes have been apparent since I came here nineteen years ago when only four or five villages were occupied. Trees were much smaller then and in the undeveloped areas towards both the east and west gates there were country type birds--even roadrunners and occasionally a hawk or an owl could be spotted. Beyond Mountain View Drive across Conejo Creek from what is now Village 20, etc., there were ducks and killdeer. In Village 11 where I live, there were many hummingbirds because most early move-ins had put out feeders for them.

Blackbirds, even some red wings, from Woodcreek Canyon came here in flocks and marched up the greensward and back again looking for insects several times a day. (Woodcreek Canyon was just that then; there was no road and no houses were on the hill above.)

As homeowners built patio "egg crates" and roofs, birds who like people moved in. That's when some sparrows but even more linnets came. As trees and shrubbery grew taller there came robins, mocking birds and warblers. Building both in the

Village itself and especially above Woodcreek reduced the blackbird population drastically although it did not eliminate it.

Natural forces were certainly at work.

Then came the mini-mall outside the Main Gate, and with it good sources for scavenging birds. It took some time for enough of them to find the garbage bins to make much difference, but by

1990 the invasion began. Crows like tall perches and our pines are ideal for the nests. Villagers leave half-finished dog food containers out. Big uncovered trash bins are just over the wall. Crow heaven!

Crows eat anything they can get but special delicacies to them are birds' eggs and baby birds. For two years, no one in Village 11 saw a baby robin. See Birds.....pg1

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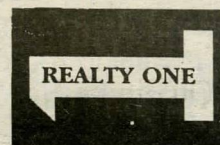
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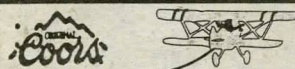
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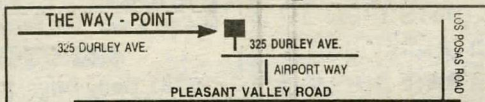
