Check Hazards Before Rainy Season Starts

All Village residents are urged to look for measures they can take NOW to prepare for a possible heavy rainy season expected from El Nino conditions.

Is there a tree which might topple and cause damage to your house after a heavy storm? About four years ago the Village had a drenching rain followed by strong winds. Hundreds of trees, under this combination of circumstances, were damaged. Residents were awakened at 2 a.m. by the sound of chain saws clearing out fallen trees which had blocked Village streets, or hit houses.

Look around now, before the rainy season starts in November, and report to the Association Office any hazards which you can spot. Phone 484-2861 to ask for Landscaping Service, or submit a green work sheet (no charge) telling the exact location of the hazard. Do this check-up

Another hazard residents should be aware of is rain gutters which are filled with leaves, pine needles and dirt. Check the condition of your gutters. After the fall leaves are all down, have the gutters cleaned. Do it yourself, if you can, or call Resident Services at 484-2861 for help. Homeowners must pay for this service.

If your rain gutters are clogged with debris, damage to your roof can occur in a storm, or the weight of the debris may pull the gutters loose from the house.

Memory Testing Underway

As of September 3, over 750 LV residents have volunteered to take the test; however, we would like to reach 1000. If interested, please call Sonia Brink at 484-2387 or Sandy Okum. 482-8125. The test is designed to assess memory, concentration, thinking, feelings and depression in persons aged 55 or older.

Benefits of the test? It could show a precursor of Alzheimers disease, memory loss, oncoming of depression and other mental conditions that can, in the early stages be treated by your M.D.

I took the test and found it to be easy and interesting. All you have to do is follow instructions given by voice, and touch the computer screen.

Each participant can direct that a \$2.00 donation be given to any LV organization he chooses. Our Board is charging Dr. McGuire \$1,100 per month to use the rooms opposite the Bocce courts. You will be tested by appointment only and will be called within the next three months for the test.

Applause

At the September Open Board meeting Rule 2.07 was passed and is already in effect. This rule states that "To ensure accurate reporting of incidents, Leisure Village Patrol Officers will carry voice recording devices. Residents and guests may be vocally recorded while in the direct presence of any Leisure Village Patrol Officer "

Some residents question the right of Security officers to record conversations with residents or guests. Legal council assures the Board that there are no laws to prohibit the use of recording devices, except over telephone lines. These LVA recordings are used in person and in sight of both parties. Some law enforcement agencies use video cameras for much the same purpose.

There already was a Rule (19.23) concerning residents' verbal abuse of employees. It was necessary to draft that Rule because many residents "lose their cool" when stopped for a traffic offense within the Village, or want to issue their own orders to LV Staff. "Who are you to tell me what to do?" (I'm older and wiser.) "I pay your salary" (Therefore I should be free to make up my own rules).

Traffic offenders are specially volatile. There have been threats made by residents to run down the officers with a car! The Security Dept. can report several such incidents.

Inside Leisure Village applauds this new Rule on recording. The tape can show what was said, by whom, and also captures the tone of voice. In the interest of Village safety, these recording devices are warranted and long overdue.

Perhaps the clerks in the Association office need recorders too.

A Question Of Semantics

When a Village resident calls and says "Have I got a great editorial topic for you!", the yellow flag of caution goes up for ILV editors. We try to be watchdogs on Village events and policies, and as such we should be well aware of what matters are bidding for Village attention.

So we put on our reporter hats and start asking questions. Usually the "great topic" proves to be a matter of interest to all the Village, true, but as a general news story, not in the actual editorial column. People often fail to distinguish the difference between those terms. "Editorial" in the dictionary is an "opinion" or "commentary." General news articles and features should not contain opinions.

This bears repeating. General news articles and features should not contain opinions. We have trouble teaching (and enforcing) that rule with our own staff, so we try to be patient with non-reporters too.

Editorial writers are made, not born. As with other larger publications, ILV expects its reporters to come up through the ranks and be experienced writers and watchdogs by the time they are tapped to be editors and editorial writers. They must put in many hours and months to earn that privilege.

All articles, news stories and features from villagers are welcome but the editors of ILV reserve the right to choose their own editorial topics.

Communication Problem

At the September 2 Open Board Meeting, there was the second reading of two new Rules. At least seven residents approached the microphone to pose questions or offer comments. This much response should have indicated to the Board that residents were uneasy with the new rules. However, the Board proceeded to vote and approve the measures as printed in the agenda.

Rule 18.09; The residences shall not be rented by the owners, or their representatives, for an initial period of less than one year. The maximum lease term shall be limited to (2) years. There shall be no exceptions to any provisions of this article. The Board of Directors may permit a minimum rental of a lesser duration. A lease can be renewed at the expiration of a two year lease.

This rule is poorly written and the sentence order is terrible. The real reason behind the change is that the LVA Security Department finds very short term leases awkward to handle and enforce, so the Board acted to prevent 3 and 6 month leases. Does the new rule say that? No. Why doesn't it? Instead, many renters (and their neighbors) are inquiring about why they must move every two years. Talk about being misunderstood!

Many of the LVA Rules and Regulations are vague, inconsistent, poorly worded and awkward. The Board should appoint an ad-hoc committee to revise/rewrite the Rules and Regulations for clarity, completeness intent and directness. The revision should be delegated to this committee, not be done by the Board itself, which already has enough work.

There are over 3500 residents here and they represent a wealth of talent. A blue-ribbon ad hoc committee can be formed to do this important rewrite job, while the Board continues with its current policy making for the Village. The key word is delegation.

Delegate: "One authorized to act as a representative or agent for another; deputy."







Proposed Use Of Reclaimed Water For L.V. Landscaping

By Herman Waltzer

A meeting was held here at Leisure Village on September 9 regarding use of reclaimed water for landscaping purposes. Richard Hajas, manager of the local Camrosa Water District, discussed the cost and environmental benefits of using reclaimed water in place of potable (drinking) water, which is the current practice here and elsewhere.

The main points of this presentation and ensuing discussion were:

(1) Use of properly treated reclaimed water should present no health hazards nor cause any odors.

(2) Camrosa Water District would maintain a strict daily quality control to ensure that all state and federal regulatory agency standards are maintained.

(3) Examples: Re-used irrigation water has been used for many years at the Buenaventura and Camarillo Springs Golf Courses.

(4) There would be an initial cost increase due to modifications (which should be minimal here in L.V.) and the cost of increasing the capacity of the existing treatment facility. However, this cost should be easily amortized by savings of \$100,000 250,000 annually.

(5) It was suggested that, on a pilot basis, the program could start with the LV golf course. If successfully demonstrated, the program could
