

# Turney standout in 'J.B.' production

In a superbly enacted performance of Archibald MacLeish's "J.B." SF State's drama department displayed a seldom seen ability for intense dramatic acting. Freshman Walter Turney as Nickles, in his first attempt at college dramatics, stood out among his experienced fellow cast members. It took a few beginning lines to suppress a normal attack of stage fright, but from then on the stage was his. Experience supposedly strengthens and sensitizes the actor. It can also toughen him

and make him forget that edge of excitement necessary in conveying character. In the intimate atmosphere of the Little Theater much of the action takes place upstage and in the aisles. Turney's every facial expression and movement, heightened by the proximity of actor and viewer, showed deep understanding of the role and an unabashed love for his art. Due to a successful and rapid recovery from appendicitis, George Spack, cast in the role of Mr. Zuss, was able to appear opening night.

It would be interesting to see this young man act when physically healthy. His powerful voice resounded most effectively and heightened the dramatic impact of the play. Martin Hansen and Marlene Silvers both adroitly enacted the contemporary man and wife, prosperous, devout, powerful and happy. Suddenly having become God's targets, inflicted with punishment and catastrophe, they are called upon to carry the weight of the tragic drama. This they accomplished with dynamic energy and great finesse.

Screaming in agony, a face wrinkled in unbelievable pain with blood pouring from his wounds, Hansen personified MacLeish's mortal creature prone and helpless on a destroyed earth, frequently referred to by Nichols as a "dry dung heap," still crying out faith in God. The costume designer, Aileen Kahre and talented make-up artist Stan Dufford must be highly commended. A vividly colored 'mask,' tightly fitted on the back of the suffering J.B. was frighteningly realistic. Long purple and red capes and masks, found in a battered wardrobe, worn by Zuzz and Nickles in their 'play' acting of God and the Devil were most effective. Kathy Brown, Dan Mason, Art Konstik and Brad Hollinger in several of the secondary roles were excellent in characterization. The successful execution of a play of such power and depth logically shows excellent direction. Dale Mackley obviously has a feel for sensitive interpretation and working with a group of college students.

## Contest offers tour of Poland as first prize

An all expense six weeks tour of Poland is the top prize in an essay contest commemorating the Polish Millennium in 1966 open to undergraduate students throughout the country. Sponsored by the Kosciuszko Foundation of New York, the contest is designed to stimulate the study of Poland's achievements in her ten centuries of participation in western Christian civilization.

Manuscripts, on the topic "The Meaning of Poland's Millennium," should run from two to three thousand words. They should be submitted no later than May 15, 1964 to the Foundation, 15 E. 65 Street, New York 21.

A second prize of \$500 cash, five third prizes of \$100 and ten honorable mentions at \$25 each, will also be awarded. In addition to the essay, written on standard eight and one half by eleven inch bond paper, a letter from the registrar is required to confirm enrollment.

# Prof heads summer festival

Lecturers, teachers and actors are needed for next summer's 29th annual Shakespeare Festival at Ashland, Oregon, according to Mrs. Dolora Cunningham, assistant professor of English at SF State.

Mrs. Cunningham has been named acting executive director for 1964 of the festival's Institute of Renaissance Studies.

As director, Mrs. Cunningham will schedule courses and lectures "conveying the 'living Shakespeare' in a very lively way."

The Renaissance Institute reinforces each summer's courses with short-term courses for credit, visiting lecturers, concerts, and readings of Renaissance poetry by festival actors.

Mrs. Cunningham has already booked for lectures Shakespearean scholar G. B. Harrison, Virgil Whitaker, dean of the humanities department at Stanford Univer-

sity, H. D. F. Kitto from the University of Bristol and Daniel Gerould, head of SF State's World literature department. Richard Dyer-Bennet is scheduled for a concert of Elizabethan ballads. Famous counter-tenor Alfred Deller and the Budapest String Quartet may appear. "I feel like a theatrical agent," Mrs. Cunningham declared. Mrs. Cunningham stated she would like to hear from or about anyone interested in lec-

turing or teaching this summer at Ashland. Mrs. Cunningham may be reached in care of the English department at SF State. SF State students often act in festival productions. This year "Twelfth Night," "Merchant of Venice," "King Lear" and "Henry VI, part one" will be produced. Interested students should write to Angus L. ## Rafferty happy over student test grades

SACRAMENTO (AP) — Dr. Max Rafferty said Tuesday results of the first statewide testing program show California students top the national average in achievement in some basic subjects, but lag in others.

The superintendent of public instruction said the good results should be expected, because California pupils also rank above average in these areas in intelligence tests.

Rafferty refused to be more specific, saying he would wait until today when the results are given to the State Board of Education in San Fran-

cisco. They have not been made public. The tests in reading, arithmetic, intelligence and language usage were given to 750,000 fifth, eighth and eleventh graders just over a year ago.

## JV gridgers end season with loss to Cal frosh

John Bradley scored touchdowns the first three times he carried the ball in leading the University of California freshmen to a 45-6 victory over the SF State junior varsity Saturday at Memorial Stadium in Berkeley.

Bradley's touchdowns came in the first 10 minutes of the game and SF State never recovered.

The Gators didn't score until the fourth quarter when a

25 yard pass from quarterback Tom Martinez to wingback Nick Minschokovich moved the Gators to the Cal 10. Halfback Chuck Garric carried it in for the touchdown.

It was the final game of the season for the Gators and evened the team's record at 3 and 3.

"We lost to real fine teams in the University of California, San Jose State and Marin J.C.," said Coach Allan Abraham. "Actually we're proud of our record." The Gators beat Santa Clara Frosh, Moffett Field and San Quentin.

"We're sending about 12 players, predominantly freshmen, to the varsity next year who can really help the team. It's the finest group of freshmen we've had," said Abraham.

The team's biggest standout, however, was a sophomore quarterback, Tom Martinez. "Martinez is the outstanding passer we've got for next year. Each team we played commented on his fine throwing," said Abraham.

## Gator champion water polo team hosts tourney

SF State's water polo team, recently crowned Far Western Conference champions, will participate in the Northern California Closed Tournament this Friday and Saturday.

It will be a seven team meet with Saturday's competition taking place at the San Francisco Olympic Club pool. Friday's action will be at the SF State pool.

Other participants will be the San Jose State Frosh team, pre-tournament favorites, the Olympic Club, the Cal Aggies, Modesto Junior College, the Modesto Racquet Club and a Westlane team.

Friday's competition will begin at 5 p.m. with three consecutive games.

Saturday morning's competition will start at 9 a.m. and continue until eliminations decide upon a winner.
