Annual Vehicle Decaling

This is a special reminder for all new move-ins. The Security Dept. is responsible for removing old windshield decals and with the help of about 60 volunteers, replacing them with a 1999 decal of a different color. This decal was designed by Chief Moses. Decaling will be done at the Recreation Center on the following days:

Tues. May 12 - 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 2 to 5 p.m. Wed. May 13 - 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 2 to 5 p.m. Thurs. May 14 - 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. and 4 to 7 p.m. Fri. May 15 – 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. in RV lot (Cars o.k.)

1. REMINDER: To help speed up decaling, have valid driver's license and registration in hand. (Over 3500 vehicles are decaled in 25 hours.)

2. It is the vehicle owner's responsibility to notify Patrolman if your car has a plastic coated windshield.

3. ATTENTION RENTERS: Please make sure your lease is current and is on file in the Association office.

4. Non-resident homeowners do not receive decals.

5. Adult children and grandchildren living with residents do not receive decals.

6. For those out of town during decaling, please call Assoc. office for appointment, 484-2861.

7. All RVs and vehicles parked in RV lot must be decaled in RV lot because RV decal numbers start at

GTE Media Ventures Television Contract Approved

After nearly three years of study, the TADS Committee and the Board of Directors chose GTE Media Ventures to improve and supply television service to L.V. A contract was signed with them in February.

Nevertheless, a group of villagers, including one member of the Board of Directors, sincerely felt that contract, received over the contract had deficiencies which were not in the best interest of L.V. More an 5% of the residents signed a petition asking for

a general meeting to discuss and vote upon the contract.

That meeting was held on April 2. Speakers For and Against the GTE contract presented their views to a very full house, plus the Channel 12 audience. And residents voted.

A "No" vote, which favored keeping the GTE 1000 votes, a strong majority, and the "Yes" proponents who favored private LV ownership of television

Correction About DNR Form

In the March 27, 1998 issue of ILV there was an article on the proposed 'Automated External Program Defibrillator (AED)" for Leisure Village. As the Board of Directors' appointed Village Coordinator for this program, please let me make a correction and clarify information in the article about "Do Not Resuscitate (DNR) orders

If an individual does not wish to have extraordinary measures made to save or prolong their life they have the option to decline this help. The procedure for obtaining a "DNR" form is to request it from the Ventura County Medical Society at 641-1650 (not the American Heart Association as stated in the article).

A "DNR" form must be signed and immediately available to any emergency responder who might be providing Basic or Advanced Life Support. Bracelets with "DNR" on them are available through the "Medic Alert" Program, but the signed "DNR" form

to be provided to the emergency responder is still required.

I am writing to express my profound disappointment in the performance of the Leisure Village Board of Directors at the recent Open Board meeting 4/6/ 98; specifically, their absence of statesmanship. sensitivity and foresight. This meeting was the first public opportunity for the Board to address the residents of our community after the vote on the GTE contract which had been so divisive in Leisure Village.

Therefore, this was an important opportunity for words of outreach, conciliation and cooperation to try to begin a healing process. Indeed, as the leaders of our community, and as the "victors" in the conflict, I believe it was their obligation to do so. 

California Senior Legislature Election

During the election on May 5, eligible senior voters will choose one Senior Senator and two Senior Assembly members to serve in the California Senior Legislature (CSL) for the 1998-2000 term for Ventura County. Three candidates have qualified for the Senate position and seven for the Assembly posts.

Patterned after the State Legislature, the CSL consists of 40 senators and 80 assembly members. It holds an annual four-day legislative session during October at the State Capitol in Sacramento. Prior to Were made to the Federal the Sacramento session, legislators prepare drafts of their proposals. Following selection of their top ten (10) priority proposals, the CSL members advocate with the State Legislature for the carriage and passage of the CSL priorities.

Many of the CSL- sponsored bills have been signed into law since its inception in 1980.

During 1997, the CSL's top ten state proposals included actions related to the Bureau of Unclaimed Funds, prohibition of payment for petition signatures, senior tax credit, home community-based care, and public transportation. Also in the top ten proposals were items dealing with utility regulation, elder abuse, in-home support, and the Long-Term Ombudsman program.

Steiger has been active in The Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program and the Senior Home Share Program. Warnagieris is the incumbent and running executive from the naval teacher for films and TV. test facility at Point Mugu, he holds a doctorate degree and has taught at two local universities.

Jesse Dunlap is the only incumbent candidate for the Assembly seat. He is a retired Air Force member who has been very active in the Area Agency on Aging including three years as Chairperson. He is an Ombudsman for Long Term Care services and a Camarillo resident. Another Camarillan is Percy Silver of Leisure Village. Active on the Ed and Rec Committee and Channel 12, Silver has been a business man, actor, writer, director and

Raymond Beck of Port Hueneme is an ordained minister with advanced degrees. He is also Dean of Curriculum at Golden Grain Bible College in Ventura. Barbara Ann De Noon of Ojai is a former Advisory Council chairperson who attended CSL meetings in Sacramento. 



Riders May Lose **Bus Funds**

At the Open Board of Directors meeting on April 6, both Mimi Chuntz V.25 and Margrate Gowder V.22 spoke about bus transportation available to local and intercity medical services.

Dial-A-Ride will continue to be available to reach medical services within Camarillo, as usual.

However, bus service for intercity medical services to Oxnard, Ventura, or Thousand Oaks, which has

been available for a one way fee of \$3.50, or to Woodland Hills (Kaiser) for \$4.50 each way, is threatened with withdrawal of the subsidy and thus may be discontinued by June 1.

Bus riders held a rally at Camarillo City Hall on April 20 in an attempt to salvage the intercity service.

Margrate Gowder said that bus ridership on Thursdays to the Braille class at the Senior Center in Camarillo is great, but warned that the number of bus riders on other days needs to be increased in order to protect the service.

Once Upon A Memory: **Touched By An Angel**

Not everybody can say they have been helped spontaneously in an extraordinary way by a stranger, or an "angel," on the spur of the moment, without prodding or bribing. My husband and I had an experience which, to our sensibilities, constituted meeting an angel.

Kay and I planned a trip to Europe by ourselves (Fall 1972). We picked up a previously ordered bright yellow, brand new Volkswagen hatchback at the factory in Wolfsburg, Germany, and drove in a northerly direction toward Denmark with the intention of taking a ferry to Norway to explore the fjord country. Kay could speak elementary German, having learned it as a child from his grandmother.

As we crossed the German border into Denmark at Flensburg, we purchased a ferry ticket from Hirtshals, Denmark, to Kristiansand, Norway, for that same night at 10:30. This meant that we had to negotiate the main peninsula of Denmark in one day. We hurried a bit, missing some of the charm of the countryside, but arrived at the ferry dock at 7 o'clock. We were told that we couldn't load until 9, so we parked and walked around town awhile. Clouds had been amassing all day, and about this time a cold, wet, blustery storm began pelting us. At nine, we were told to confirm our ticket at the office and get a boarding pass.

The ticket! I had had it in my hand, and it was now gone! After a frantic search of the car, we could find it nowhere. We sat in the car numbly wondering what to do. We watched a steady

stream of vehicles, large and small, drive onto the ferry. After what seemed an eternity, and only minutes before the ferry was to depart, came a knock on the window by the same man who had guided us before. He had found the ticket! It had blown clear to the boundary of the parking area, perhaps 100 yards away, and was caught in the fence. It was soaking wet, but still legible. Our angel!

This man, whose name we never did learn, had voluntarily made a search for the benefit of a couple of somewhat naive strangers, for the absolutely vital ticket on the ferry. He qualifies, in my mind, as an an-

Thanking him profusely in our basic German, we went quickly to obtain our loading pass only to be put on the waiting list. So we waited some more. We had been the first car in the parking lot, and we were the last to be loaded. There seemed to be no more

room.

We were signaled to drive forward, then a crew of sturdy men lifted the rear end of the car around to fit it crosswise into the ferry, and blocked it down.

Success! We were on our way. My seasoned "sailor" husband anticipated what the voyage across the Skaggerak would be like, and insisted that we engage a cabin for the overnight trip. We tucked ourselves into the feather beds on smallish bunks, and although we did not sleep much, we certainly had a smoother and more comfortable time than the poor folks who had to stay in the passenger lounge topside. From the deck just below us, we listened to a myriad of sounds during the night: clanking, banging and creaking of chains, metal against metal, felt the rolling of the vessel, and hoped our brand new car would not be all battered.

About 6 o'clock the next morning, all was suddenly quiet. We had entered the harbor area of Kristiansand. Quickly gathering our belongings, we were on hand to see our little yellow

wagon offloaded into sunshine -- in Norway. First in line.

The rest of the trip, 10 weeks altogether, was full of adventure and wonder. But the act of that Danish dispatcher colored all the rest of the journey. He must have been an angel, at least he was to us.





My heart sings ever in the wood Where moss-hung oaks and fragrant pine Sigh softly as their boughs entwine. My heart is singing - peace is mine.




