I have planned for a school here which will teach the hand as well as the head so that no young man or young woman will be sent off into the world to earn a living as poorly equipped for the task as I when I landed in San Francisco in 1849.

Myron Angel, Writer-Editor, SAN LUIS OBISPO TRIBUNE, Testimony before visiting State Legislative Committee, February 20, 1897

The purpose of the school is to furnish to young people of both sexes mental and manual training in the arts and sciences, including agriculture, mechanics, engineering, business methods, domestic economy, and such other branches as will fit the students for non-professional walks of life. This act shall be liberally construed, to the end that the school established hereby may at all times contribute to the industrial welfare of the State of California.

Founding Act, signed by Governor Henry T. Gage. Legislation authored by Assemblyman Warren M. John and Senator Sylvester C. Smith, March 8, 1901

Sixteen sites for the new school were offered for sale to the trustees. On March 25, 1902, after three ballots a sightly tract within a mile of the court house offered by Dawson Lowe was selected. On May 26, 1902, the special committee appointed for final purchase reported a deed executed by Dawson Lowe and his wife and Edward Lowe for 231.04 acres, for which they were paid \$7,709.30.

Report of the Trustees, 1902

This school stands out unique in the State and not only here, but elsewhere in the United States there is not one like it in all particulars. The school is affiliated with nothing; it depends on no institution to prepare its students; it prepares its students for no other institution; it simply tries to prepare them for an active and industrial life. As such it is treading on virgin soil and everything that is done is eminently building for the future.

Dr. Leroy Anderson, First Director, California Polytechnic School, Message to the Board of Trustees, May 17, 1902

California Polytechnic School is out of joint with the state educational system and should be turned over to some other agency or used in some other capacity.

Governor Friend Richardson, Budget Message, February, 1923

It is the recommendation of the Special Commission, in the interests of economy and to avoid wasteful duplication, that the California Polytechnic School be abolished as an educational institution.

Dr. Henry Suzzallo, Chairman, Carnegie Foundation Commission of Seven, State Survey of California Col-

leges and Universities, 1932

The California Polytechnic School is an orphan among the state educational institutions. It is not a part of the university system. It is not a part of the state college system. It is classified as a special school (which it is not) and its sponsors have ambitions that it be made a four-year college (which it will undoubtedly become if continued). In view of the high cost it is recommended that the present building program be stopped, the school closed, and its functions transferred to other institutions.

Griffenhagen & Associates, Report of the Committee

on State Reorganization, August 19, 1937

California Polytechnic's degree plans will keep educational standards at as high a level, if not higher, than those maintained by present degree-granting institutions; but they will fix these standards in terms of actual life needs, of employment requirements, of social independence, rather than upon a classical foundation rapidly becoming outworn.

President Julian A. McPhee, letter to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Walter F. Dexter, pro-

posing degree status, January 22, 1938

Although its wanderings have been many, the California Polytechnic has never abandoned the ideals of its founders, and now, perhaps more than at any previous time in its history--although on a higher educational level than was originally intended--it is devoted whole-heartedly to their achievement.

Miss Margaret H. Chase, Notes on the History of the California Polytechnic School, April 18, 1943

I look forward to a Cal Poly which will match its technological strength with educational breadth; its fundamental practicality with creative vision; its traditional stability with dynamic innovativeness. I look forward to a Cal Poly which will command respect because its educational processes are excellent and its democratic processes are effective.

As the educational world knows, this institution is famous for its upside-down methods of education--initially emphasizing the practical, then developing and discussing the theory. To a considerable extent you have solved the question of relevance. You have a good thing going on this campus; see that you preserve it.
