

■ Goodwin Field

All Cal State Fullerton home baseball games are played at Goodwin Field on campus. The field is located at the north end of campus, just east of Titan Stadium. Parking is available by:

- A) Using Lot G at Yorba Linda Blvd. and Associated Road and paying \$1.50 upon entry for a daily permit (Monday-Thursday only). Parking is free on Friday nights and all day on Saturdays and Sundays.
- B) Obtaining a complimentary pass upon presentation of a news credential to the Visitors Information Booth located on the south side of campus, northwest of the corner of Commonwealth and Nutwood Avenues.

■ Media Credentials

Requests should be made by phone (714-278-3081), fax (714-278-3141) or e-mail (rermeling@fullerton.edu) as far in advance as possible and no later than 48 hours before game time. When time permits, credentials will be mailed. Otherwise, credentials can be picked up at the press will call.

■ Photo Credentials

Credentials will be issued on a per-game basis and must be worn in plain sight at all times. All photographers must remain in the camera wells located to the outfield side of each dugout. NCAA regulations regarding photography will be adhered to at all times.

■ Press Box

The press box is located on the walkway behind the home plate seating area. Limited seating is available with beat writers receiving priority. Radio positions and additional media seating will be allocated in the press box or in the rows immediately in front of the press box, if necessary.

■ Telephones

The press box phone number (for media scoring updates only) is (714) 278-5327. Additional phone lines are available on a shared basis in the press box or softball press box (located adjacent to the baseball facility).

■ Radio Lines

Up to three telephone lines can be made available to the designated radio station of the visiting team. The charge is \$35 per game or \$100 for a three-game series. Please make arrangements through the athletic media relations office well in advance. The fee is waived for commercial-free webcasts.

■ Interviews

Coaches and players will be available for postgame interviews on the field after a brief cooling down session and team meeting. Midweek interviews can be conducted before practices, which generally start at 1:45 p.m., or by special arrangement. Coach Horton can also be reached in his office at (714) 278-3780 before noon. Special requests should be made through the athletic media relations office. Interviews with visiting coaches or players should be arranged through the visiting team's SID, when available.



▼ Heading to Omaha

The Big West has enjoyed a tradition of representation at college baseball's premier event, the NCAA College World Series, a showcase of the nation's best teams battling for the national championship in Omaha, Neb. The Big West has featured a contender for the coveted crown on an almost annual basis. In fact, a Big West school has reached Omaha in 11 of the last 14 seasons. Cal State Fullerton brought home the Big West's first national title in 1995. Here is a breakdown of Big West participants in the College World Series over the years (baseball was not sponsored in the Big West from 1977-84).

1975 - Cal State Fullerton 1988 - Cal State Fullerton, Fresno State 1989 - Long Beach State 1990 - Cal State Fullerton

1991 - Long Beach State, Fresno State 1992 - Cal State Fullerton

▼ Big League Talent

The Big West boasts a sizable number of alumni who have moved on to baseball's highest level and are contributing to the successes of their respective major league clubs.

Some of the Big West's more prominent alumni wearing major league uniforms include Jason Giambi, the 2000 American League Most Valuable Player and 2001 National League All-Star Phil Nevin. Other notable major leaguers who honed their skills in the Big West are Chris Singleton, Mark Kotsay, Steve Trachsel and Brady Anderson.

The list goes on and on. And the supply does not appear to be in danger of shortage. The Big West produces an annual bumper crop of players in the major league baseball amateur draft that ranks the conference among the highest represented in the nation. In the 2001 MLB amateur draft alone, an incredible 38 Big West players were selected, including first-rounder Bobby Crosby of Long Beach State. Cal State Fullerton's Adam Johnson, the second overall pick of the 2000 MLB draft by the Minnesota Twins, made a quick ascent to the parent club with his appearance in the starting pitching rotation in 2001.

▼ Key Dates in Big West Conference History

July 1. 1969 - The desire to form a Division I football conference sparks the formation of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association (PCAA) with seven charter members: Fresno State, Long Beach State, San Jose State, UC Santa Barbara, Pacific, Cal State Los Angeles and San Diego State. The conference sponsors 11 men's sports: baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, gymnastics, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field, water polo and wrestling. J. Kenneth Fagans is named commissioner on a part-time basis.

June 3, 1976 - The conference approves the split of the PCAA baseball league into two leagues separate from the PCAA. The Southern California Baseball Association (SCBA) and the Northern California Baseball Association (NCBA) consist mostly of members of the PCAA and the West Coast Athletic Conference. PCAA Commissioner Jesse Hill agrees to govern the SCBA.

June 8, 1979 - SCBA member Cal State Fullerton wins the NCAA Baseball Championship with a 2-1 victory over Arkansas.

May 17, 1984 - The conference council approves the reformation of PCAA baseball for the 1985 season, thus eliminating the SCBA and the NCBA.

June 10, 1984 - SCBA champion Cal State Fullerton wins its second NCAA Baseball Championship. The Titans prevail over the University of Texas, 3-1.

July 1, 1988 - The conference changes its name from "PCAA" to "Big West Conference."

May 14, 1995 - Cal State Fullerton defeats Long Beach State, 8-4, to claim the title in the inaugural Big West Baseball Tournament in Long Beach, Calif.

Big West Conference teams are scheduled to play 56 games against the Pac-10 this season. Fullerton and Long Beach State will each play 11 contests against the conference.



Goodwin Field, formerly known as Titan Field, became the home of Cal State Fullerton baseball on April 18, 1992, when the Titans swept a doubleheader from Loyola Marymount, 8-2 and 11-3. It is the third oncampus diamond to serve Cal State Fullerton, which has also played "home" games at city parks such as Amerige in Fullerton and Boysen in Anaheim as well as borrowing junior college fields at Fullerton, Santa Ana, and Orange coast Colleges during the installation of lights in 1983.

The first Titan diamond was laid out to the west of Titan House, located to the southeast of the current stadium. Home plate was in the southeast corner of the field plowed out of the citrus groves. A new field

was built around 1970 on today's site, but with home plate located where the current left field foul pole rises. The largest crowd to see a game at that field, with small portable bleachers and plenty of standing room, was estimated at 5,000 in 1979, when Fullerton hosted the University of Hawai'i and heralded pitcher Derek Tatsuno.

The most recent facelift to the facility came in the way of a \$3

million project completed just prior to the 2001 season. The stadium's seating capacity has been expanded from 1,750 to nearly 3,500 and for the first time, the stadium boasts an on-site clubhouse-style building, which connects to the adjoining softball stadium. The clubhouse includes locker rooms, coaches offices, umpire quarters and a VIP viewing and entertainment area. The stadium's name was officially changed from Titan Field to Goodwin Field in a ceremony prior to the Titans' game against Long Beach State on April 14, 2000.

Thanks in part to the extensive renovations and a commitment by the

university to transform the field into a state-of-the-art facility, the NCAA has named Goodwin Field as a regional site each of the last two seasons and also as a super regional site last year. The Titans had been on the road for the first 21 Regional appearances in their history and had qualified for more College World Series appearances (10) by winning on the road than any other school. When Fullerton hosted Mississippi State in its first home super regional last June, consecutive sellout crowds of 3,412 cheered the Titans on as they swept the Bulldogs to clinch a CWS berth in front of a home crowd for the first time.

Goodwin Field is also home to the prestigious Kia Baseball Bash (see following page), which will mark its third annual tournament in 2002. The three-day round robin event is considered one of the bestournaments in the country and this year's field of Fullerton, USC, Houston and defending CWS champion Miami will only bolster that reputation.

Goodwin Field has had several othe renovations over the years. Its playing surface sported a brand new look for the 1996 season, thanks in part to the efforts of the Sports Turf Managers Association led by Steve Guise. The organization donated materials and labor in rebuilding the pitcher's mound and batters' box, along with planting new grass in the outfield. Turface was added to the warning track. Additional landscaping has been placed on the outside of Goodwir Field, including palm trees along the batting cages in left field.




THIS IS TITAN BASEBALL

Eleven College World Series appearances. Three national titles. Ten consecutive trips to the NCAA playoffs. Not one losing season in 27 Division I seasons. Cal State Fullerton's baseball program and excellence seem to go hand in hand.

The excellence starts with a coaching staff comprised entirely of former Titans, coaches who understand what it takes to be successful. None of the Cal State Fullerton coaches have ever experienced a losing season. At any school. At any level.

It's passed on to a highly talented and dedicated group of players who are equally successful... Successful on the field – the Titans made their 11th trip to Omaha in 2001. Successful in the classroom – witness Jon Smith's selection as a first-team Academic All-American last year. Successful in the community – the Titans continue to sponsor Baseball Buddies, a program that links Titan players with elementary school students in the classroom and on the playground.







KEEPING IT IN THE FAMILY: Every member of the Fullerton staff - from head coach to adminstrative assistant - played baseball for the Titans. Head Coach George Horton was an all-conference first baseman on the Titans' first Division I team in 1975. Assistant coach Dave Serrano made 15 appearances for the Titans in 1986 and Rick Vanderhook was a member of the 1984 national championship team, though he never appeared in a game. Volunteer assistant coach Chad Baum was a captain on the 1998-99 teams and first-year administrative assistant Sergio Brown was a reserve on the 1995 national champions.

AND SO WE MEET AGAIN: Six pairs of Titans claim the same high school as an alma mater. Kyle Boyer and Darric Merrell teamed up at Temecula Valley H.S., Trevor Mortensen and Chad Cordero were teammates at Don Lugo H.S. and P.J. Pilittere and Richie Burgos played on the same team at Bishop Amat. Three other pairs attended the same high school, but just attended the same high school, but just missed playing together: Jordan DeJong and Joe Turgeon (El Dorado); Blake Garrett and Chris Klosterman (St. John Bosco); Travis Esquibel and Chris Stringfellow (Rancho Buena Vista).

KIA BASH: The Titans will host the third annual Kia Baseball Bash from March 1-3 and, as with the previous two tournaments, the field is top-notch. Defending national champion Miami will make its second trip to Fullerton (and first since 1983). Local rival USC, which captured the rain-shortened 2000 Kia Bash, will make its second appearance at the tournament and Houston, which stands to be much improved this season, will visit Goodwin Field for the second time in four seasons. Of the eight teams that have played in the Kia Baseball Bash over its first two years, four went on to make super regional appearances and three reached the College World Series.

TALKING TITLES: The Titans have celebrated a Big West Conference championship (by way of conference tournament win or regular season title) every season under Coach Horton. They have also won a Kia Bash title (2001), two regional titles (1999, 2001) and two super regional titles (1999, 2001). Horton has also extended the Titans' run of consecutive NCAA appearances to 10, the fifth-longest active streak in the nation.

CALIFORNIA DREAMIN': As usual, nearly every member of the Titans' squad claims the Golden State as home. The only exceptions are Sean Martin (Arizona), John Estes and Sean Alley (Washington) and Kurt Suzuki (Hawaii).

▼ Titans Hope New Mix Shakes Its Way to Omaha

It's the question that gives coaches the biggest headache, but is fundamental to any eason preview.

What can we expect from your team this season?

Cal State Fullerton Baseball Coach George Horton isn't sure how to answer, and for good reason.

On one hand, the Titans return a pair of freshman All-American pitchers and their incoming class of a year ago – judged the best recruiting class in the nation – has had a year to develop. But on the other hand, the Titans are without the nucleus of a 2001 team that reached the College World Series and finished third in the nation.


"For that reason, it's hard to answer that question," said Horton, who has a 222-94-1 record in five seasons with the Titans. "We've got a new look to this team and while there's a lot of excitement and anticipation of working with a new group, there's also a measure of uncertainty."

Don't misconstrue Horton's comments as an admission that the Titans will struggle; he knows this group has the potential to succeed at a national level (the Titans are ranked as high as 10th in the preseason polls) and certainly, in the Big West Conference.

But the 2002 Titans, who open at No. 1 Stanford on Feb. 1, will have to rely on a lot of new faces to get the job done. Gone are All-American pitchers Kirk Saarloos and Jon Smith, who combined for more than half of the Titans' victories last year. And gone is the entire starting infield.

If that's the bad news, then the good news is this: sophomores **Darric Merrell** (*Temecula*, *Calif.*), and **Chad Cordero** (*Chino*, *Calif.*), who posted sensational freshman campaigns, return to anchor a pitching staff that again should be among the nation's best.

And, though most of the Titans position starters from last year were drafted and signed, senior centerfielder **Chris Stringfellow** (*Vista, Calif.*) went untouched. He is one of just two Titans left from the 1999 College World Series team (the other, Jordan DeJong, transferred to Tennessee for the 2000 season) and inherits the veteran role along with key returners **Jason Corapci** (*Orange, Calif.*), **Mike Martinez** (*Anaheim, Calif.*) and **Shane Costa** (*Visalia, Calif.*).

Infield

The infield quartet that combined for a .326 average and 40 home runs last season can now be seen on the professional circuit. But the Titans don't feel they're without options for 2002.

Corapci, a .332 hitter in his two-year career, is one of the few players already penciled in as a starter. After roving the outfield with some spot starts at middle infield positions over his first two years, Corapci is set to inherit David Bacani's spot at second base.

"We'll be completely satisfied with Jason if he can have another year like his first two," said Horton. "He's not the strongest or the biggest player out there, but neither was David Bacani and look what he did in his career. That's not to put pressure on Jason, because we think he'll step in and play a solid second base."

Corapci will likely be flanked by newcomer David Munoz (Yorba Linda, Calif.) at shortstop. The Titan staff initially recruited Munoz out of Esperanza H.S., but he landed at nearby NAIA-powerhouse Biola University when Fullerton pursued other options. However, Munoz, who starred for an Eagle team that nearly upset the Titans a year ago, has finally found his way to Fullerton, with the blessing of the Biola coaches.

"He's got great baseball instincts," said Horton. "After seeing him play last year, we were reminded why we had recruited him in the first place and we developed another level of respect for his play."

Munoz - whom Horton compares to former Titans' standout Jerome Alviso - will key much of the Titans' success: not only does he play a critical defensive position, but he will be expected to provide leadership as a senior and he is a top candidate to replace Bacani in the leadoff spot.

"There's no doubt David Munoz needs to have a big year for us to have a big year," said Horton. "We're asking a lot of him, especially as a newcomer to this program, but our whole staff believes he is up to the task.'

Martinez, a junior, had a rough 2001 season by all accounts. Just a week into the season, he lost his starting shortstop job to Mike Rouse, and later battled injuries that hampered his return to the active roster.

But Martinez will be given a fresh start this season. He will likely win the starting spot at third base and bat near the middle of the order. In fact, of the infielders, Martinez might post the best power numbers this season.

Of the four infield spots, first base might pose the biggest question mark, though that's no knock to Nick Fitzgerald (Los Alamitos, Calif.), who was the likely candidate after the fall practice session. But with Santa Ana College transfer David Fischer (Anaheim, Calif.) - who didn't join the Titans until the start of January practice - and Houston transfer Chris Klosterman (Long Beach, Calif.) entering the fray, the opening day lineup card remains in question.

"Nick has certainly stepped it up, even beyond my expectations," said Horton. "But I think the fact that he's right-handed and is more of a line-drive hitter than a power hitter will force us to look at some other options."

Klosterman, who earned all-tournament honors at the Enron Classic while playing for the University of Houston last year, might be the most versatile of the Titan infielders. He has also worked out at third base and might even see time at designated hitter.

Richie Burgos (Glendora, Calif.) and Jacob Mendrin (La Habra Heights, Calif.) are also in the mix and might have an edge for playing time because they bat from the left side. Joe Turgeon (Placentia, Calif.), who was the CIF Division III Player of the Year at El Dorado H.S. last season, and junior college transfer Justin Smyres (Paso Robles, Calif.), who is recovering from neck injuries associated with a summer car accident, will also make a push for time. Also on the Titans' bench is Sean Alley (Issaguah, Wash.), who did not see ex-

tended playing time last year, but was voted

"Best Teammate" by his peers.

Outfield

The outfield should retain a bit more familiarity, especially with the return of Stringfellow.

Long recognized as one of the finest defensive outfielders in the conference – and perhaps even the country – Stringfellow has been the most consistent offensive player at Fullerton over the last three years. Entering his junior year, Stringfellow had a .345 career average and as a junior, he batted....345.

Stringfellow has typically batted near the bottom of the order, but that might change with the new personnel, especially if Stringfellow can improve his base-stealing – he has just 22 swipes in his career.

A pair of sophomores – **Kyle Boyer** (*Temecula, Calif.*) and Costa – will likely play on either side of Stringfellow.

The coaches believe Costa is a bona fide All-American candidate after leading the team with a .380 batting average as a freshman. Though he did not hit a home run in 129 at-bats, Costa has bulked up during the offseason and will shoulder some new expectations.

Boyer had an up-and-down freshman campaign, though the coaches maintain that he has the potential to break out monstrous power numbers.

"I think Kyle's key is finding the consistency he needs to perform at a high collegiate level," said Horton. "If he can begin doing that, there's really no limit. This is one of the most physically talented players we've seen here."

Senior **Geoff Comfort** (*Burlingame*, *Calif*.) will try to play his way into the line-up, though it might be at designated hitter and **John Hanley** (*Riverside*, *Calif*.), who can also catch, should see some time. **Trevor Mortensen** (*Chino Hills*, *Calif*.) and **Adam Cooper** (*North Hollywood*, *Calif*.) provide another pair of options for Coach Horton and his staff.

Pitching

Pitching Coach Dave Serrano finds himself in a position not unlike last year, when he entered the season with two proven arms in Saarloos and Smith and a bunch of promising, yet untested arms.

This season, he will ride the arms of Merrell and Cordero, and will look for others to emerge from what looks to be a quality group.

Fullerton's pitching staff has been its strength, really since the Horton era began in 1997. The Titans have paced the conference in ERA all but one of those seasons, they've been in the national top 20 the last two seasons and they've produced nine All-Americans on the mound in that short time.

Merrell and Cordero were two of those All-American selections as freshmen. Cordero was rock-solid all year long, but started to receive national recognition as his saves mounted over the second half of the season. He finished with 14, tied for third in the country and a record for Big West Conference freshmen.

Cordero, known as "Chief," might be soft-spoken off the field, but comes with the all the intensity of a raging bull on the hill. He knows no intimidation, which was evidenced in a sparkling outing in the College World Series opener. Facing Nebraska in a one-run game with nearly 23,000 Husker fans on hand, the freshman stymied the Huskers, closing the game with 2.1 perfect innings and four strikeouts.

Cordero, who was the major reason the Titans were 42-0 when they had a lead after seven innings, will again be Fullerton's closer.

Merrell, meanwhile, didn't quite match Cordero's numbers, but proved to be one of the most reliable freshman starters in the nation and came up big in the Titans' postseason run.

He was the winning pitcher in the Titans' 9-3 super regional victory over Mississippi State on June 2, and then nearly shut out a Tulane team that won more games in 2001 than any team in the country.

A Collegiate Baseball third-team preseason All-American, Merrell will be the Titans' Friday night starter this season.

"The maturity those two freshmen showed last season, especially in the playoffs, was unbelievable," said Serrano. "You could tell that they were battle-tested."

Aside from Cordero and Merrell, Serrano said the path to the mound is wide open.

"There's a group of six or seven guys that are really going to put up a battle," he said. "It might be a situation where our starting rotation isn't completely solidified until we're a few weeks into the season."

Among the candidates for starting roles are seniors Jordan

DeJong (*Yorba Linda, Calif.*) – in his second stint with the Titans – and **Charlie Zahari** (*Hemet, Calif.*) along with sophomores **Wes Littleton** (*Oceanside, Calif.*) and **Travis Ingle** (*Cypress, Calif.*). Redshirt freshman **Travis Esquibel** (*Vista, Calif.*), junior transfer **Jeff Housman** (*Visalia, Calif.*) and freshman **Dustin Miller** (*Diamond Bar, Calif.*), who might be comparable to Merrell, round out the group competing for starting jobs.

Junior **Sean Martin** (*Tucson, Ariz.*) will retain his long-relief role out of the bullpen and a small contingent that includes right-handers **Jared Eichelberger** (*Poway, Calif.*), **Chad Robbins** (*Murrieta, Calif.*) and **Randy Tymchak** (*Long Beach, Calif.*) and lefties **Tim Jimenez** (*Whittier, Calif.*) and **John Estes** (*Sammamish, Wash.*) will work into the Titans' plans one way or another.

"I think the biggest concern will just be getting some of our new guys to feel comfortable pitching at this level," said Serrano. "But if we can get them to that point, we should have some real quality depth on our staff."

■ Catching

A thumb injury that kept Brett Kay out of the lineup for more than a month last season may have been the best thing to happen for this year's team.

P.J. Pilittere (*Walnut, Calif.*), who just weeks before the start of the 2001 season was told by the coaches to not expect significant playing time, suddenly found himself the starting catcher in late February.

Pilittere batted just .154, but played solid defense behind the plate and is the favorite to start this season.

"I don't think it was any coincidence that our team went 14-3 with P.J. as the starting catcher last season," said Horton. "He stepped right in for Brett and provided some real leadership."

Pilittere, however, will be pushed this season by Hawaiian transplant **Kurt Suzuki** (*Maui, Hawaii*), who was the top catcher in the 50th state as a senior. Suzuki's defensive and throwing abilities are well beyond his years and if Pilittere does indeed win the starting spot, Suzuki might be utilized as a defensive replacement.

Blake Garrett (*Lakewood*, *Calif*.) has been slowed by an arm injury, but hopes to rehabilitate by the spring, while Hanley and **Eric Echevarria** (*Alta Loma, Calif*.) can also catch.

■ Schedule

The Titans earned the national No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament last year and the chairman of the NCAA Division I Baseball Committee went on record to say that the Titans' winning percentage against one of the toughest nonconference schedules in the nation was the major factor.

If that's the case, Fullerton will again have a chance to play its way into high RPI consideration.

Fullerton's season-opening series at Stanford, already ranked first in a pair of preseason polls, will prove an immediate test for a young Titan team. Other nonconference road trips include stops at nationally prominent programs in Arizona State, Wichita State and Nevada

The Titans will welcome nationally-ranked Fresno State and UNLV to Goodwin Field before once again hosting the Kia Baseball Bash, perhaps the top tournament in the country in terms of talent.


The third annual tournament will feature the host Titans along with defending College World Series champion Miami, local rival USC and Houston, which figures to be one of the most improved clubs in the country.

The Big West Conference has again played "musical chairs" with two teams joining the mix for the 2002 campaign. The additions of UC Irvine, which has revived its program after a nine-year hiatus, and Big West newcomer UC Riverside bring the conference up to nine teams.

Last year, the conference had the third-best RPI in the country and sent three teams to the NCAA tournament. Horton believes that is a sign of things to come.


"I think a lot of the teams, especially Cal Poly and Northridge, are going to be a lot better this year and Coach (John) Savage and company will have UCI playing at a high caliber in a short time. Our conference should only get stronger."

The Titans have celebrated a conference championship (by way of tournament or regular season crown) every year under Horton and he hopes to keep that streak alive.

Coaching Staff



The Titan baseball tradition is alive and thriving, thanks to sixthyear Head Coach George Horton.

Since Horton, 48, took over for Augie Garrido on Sept. 4, 1996, after six years as Garrido's associate head coach, the Titans have posted a 222-94-1 record, celebrated a Big West Conference title every year (by way of tournament or regular season crown) and made a pair of trips to Omaha. They have almost always been ranked in the national Top 25 polls and briefly ascended to the top spot in the Collegiate Baseball poll in both 1999 and 2001.

Horton's .702 winning percentage is the sixth-highest among active Division I coaches (minimum five years). Of the 21 teams many of which are nationally prominent - that Horton has faced five or more times, only three (USC, Stanford and Pepperdine) have managed winning records against Fullerton. The two-time conference Coach of the Year has been at his best in series play. Heading into 2002, Fullerton owns a 56-15 overall record in three-game regular season series and the Titans have won 38 of 46 (83 percent) Big West Conference series. Fullerton has been swept just once (at No. 1 Stanford to open the 2000 season) while the Titans have recorded 32 series sweeps. Perhaps an even bigger credit to Coach Horton has been his success on the road: the Titans have won 21 of Horton's 23 conference series away from Goodwin Field.


Horton, who is one of nine men to have appeared in Omaha as a player and a head coach, has seen 32 Titans selected in the

> Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft during his tenure, including nine last June. Aaron Rowand was a "sandwich" pick in 1998 and Adam Johnson was the second overall selection in 2000 (both made their Major League debuts last year).

> Horton's Titans have been to the College World Series twice in the last three seasons, including last year, when they secured a berth at home for the first time and carried the national No. 1 seed to Rosenblatt Stadium. After holding off local favorite Nebraska in the opener, the Titans lost a pair to Stanford with a win over Tulane sandwiched in between. The Titans finished No. 3 in all three national polls. Under Horton's eve. the 2001 squad posted several memorable moments during the regular season as well. They won 24 of 25 over one stretch and be-

came the first team ever to sweep a three-game series against eventual national champion Miami at Mark Light Stadium.

The 2000 Titans, the unanimous preseason pick to win the conference and the consensus No. 2 team in the country, had a two-game lead on Nevada with three games to go in the Big West race. But the Wolf Pack swept Pacific in the final series and Fullerton lost two of three to Long Beach State, so the Titans had to settle for a co-championship. However, the Titans did host a regional for the first time, which was won by USC.



In 1998, the Titans used a remarkably balanced squad to start strong and then dominate the Big West Conference regular season with a 25-5 record. But they stumbled at home in the Big West Tournament and then ran into a powerful buzz saw in Baton Rouge in the NCAA regionals, placing second at 3-2 with a pair of losses to the host LSU Tigers.

In Horton's debut season in 1997, the Titans struggled to a 23-19-1 start, but then rattled off 15 victories in their final 18 regular season games. They lost the opener of the Big West Conference post-season tournament at home to Pacific ace Dan Reichert, but then came back to win four games in a row at Blair Field. They swept a doubleheader on the final day against host Long Beach State to capture the league championship and the automatic NCAA tournament bid. At Stanford, the Titans went 1-2 to place third, losing to Santa Clara and Fresno State.

Horton fulfilled a lifelong dream of being a Division I head coach when he was promoted to replace Garrido, who left to take over the program at the University of Texas. A 1978 CSF graduate, Horton had returned to the campus in 1991 when Garrido came back after a three-year stint at Illinois. In the next six years the Titans posted a 264-99 record and made three trips to the CWS, winning the 1995 crown with a phenomenal 57-9 season. Horton had input on virtually every aspect of the Fullerton program with his primary concern being the development of the pitching staff. His organizational skills, patience as a teacher and his attention to detail provided the backbone of the Titan coaching staff.

During the years Horton was responsible for the pitching staff, nine pitchers received All-America honors and James Popoff (1992), Matt Wagner (1994) and Ted Silva (1995) won Big West Conference Pitcher of the Year honors. Dan Naulty became the first Titan pitcher under Horton's guidance to reach the major leagues when he made the 1996 opening-day roster for the Minnesota Twins. He later earned a World Series ring in 1999 with the Yankees. Another Horton product, Brent Billingsley, made two appearances for the Florida Marlins early in the 1999 season. Seven more of Horton's former pupils both pitchers and position players - have ascended to the Major

League ranks over the last couple years.

Horton also worked with Phil Nevin (San Diego Padres), who in 1992 was the Golden Spikes Award winner, Baseball America player of the year, baseball's No. 1 draft pick (by Houston) and the College World Series MVP. Nevin has gone on to a successful pro career as have former Horton pupils Mark Kotsay (San Diego Padres) and Jeremy Giambi (Oakland A's).

Kotsay and Nevin along with Brian Loyd and Jason Moler – all tutored in part by Horton – were Olympians and Kotsay was chosen the college player of the decade by Baseball America.

Horton began his head coaching career at Cerritos College in Norwalk, where he guided the Falcons to three junior college state championships in six years. He compiled a 226-53 record and won the California titles in 1985, 1987 and 1989. Each of those years he was selected National Junior College Coach of the Year. His best season was 1987 when the Falcons went 46-5. He had a South Coast Conference record of 102-28 (.785) and was a four-time South Coast Conference Coach of the Year (1985, 1987, 1989 and 1990).


He had many players graduate to the major leagues including Brian Hunter, who played for the Atlanta Braves in the 1991 World Series. Other names include Mike Benjamin, Craig Worthington, Ever Magallanes, Al Osuna, Joel Adamson, Dan Patterson, Luis Medina, Jeff Hearron, Naulty and Olympian and major leaguer Bret Barberie

Horton was a player on the Cerritos College teams in 1972 and 1973. As the Falcons' team captain in 1973, he won the Dallas Moon Award and was a member of the state championship team. Horton played two seasons for Garrido at Cal State Fullerton in 1975 and 1976 and won All-PCAA honors as both a junior and a senior. He was on the first Fullerton team to go to the College World Series in 1975. He batted .308 as a junior and .290 as a senior while playing first base. He graduated in 1978 and went on to earn a master's degree in 1980 at Cal Lutheran.

Horton's coaching career began as an assistant at Cerritos in 1976-77 and he went to Los Angeles Valley College the following three seasons where he coached with former Long Beach State Coach Dave Snow. In 1980, he moved back to Cerritos as an assistant to Gordie Douglas before taking the head job in 1985. In addition, he coached during the summer for the Fairbanks Goldpanners (1981 and 1983) in Alaska and the Hutchinson Broncs (1982) in Kansas. A few famous names played for him on those summer teams such as Shane Mack, Oddibe McDowell, Joe Magrane, Dan Plesac, Phil Stevenson and Roger Clemens.

In 1994, Horton was inducted into the California Community College Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

Horton was born on Oct. 5, 1953. The Yorba Linda resident and his wife, Francie, have four daughters: Michele (22), Heather (18), Loyal (13) and Rebecca (11), and two granddaughters: Angelica (2) and Alyssa (born in May, 2001).



Coach Horton is one of just nine men to have appeared at the College World Series as a player and a head coach.





Dave Serrano, in his sixth season as Cal State Fullerton's pitching coach and recruiting coordinator, has quickly established himself as one of the top assistant coaches in the country. *Baseball America* has called Serrano the top assistant coach on the West Coast and has repeatedly noted his strength as a pitching coach.

His recruiting efforts have played a large part in Fullerton's ongoing success. *Collegiate Baseball* named the Titans' incoming 2001 class as the top recruiting class in the country and *Baseball America* tabbed the class as the second best in the nation. Since Serrano's arrival, each of the Titans' recruiting classes has ranked among the top 15 nationally.

During his watch at Fullerton, 13 pitchers have been drafted, and already, three of his Fullerton products (Matt Wise, Adam Johnson and Brandon Duckworth) have reached the Majors. Serrano also coached a pair of future Major Leaguers on the 1996 Tennessee team in Mike Lincoln and R.A. Dickey.

Of the 13 Titans to earn All-American honors at Fullerton since Serrano's arrival in 1997, nine have been pitchers. In 2001 alone, four Titan pitchers earned a total of 14 All-American citations, includ-

ing Kirk Saarloos, who was a finalist for virtually every National Pitcher of the Year award. Serrano has also coached 14 all-conference hurlers, including three of the last four conference Pitchers of the Year (Benito Flores in 1998, Johnson in 2000 and Saarloos in 2001).

Serrano's staffs have led the conference in ERA in every season except 1999, when Pacific's 4.29 ERA barely clipped Fullerton's 4.44 mark. In 2000, Serrano's pitchers posted a 3.95 ERA, the 17th best mark in the nation and the first sub-4.00 ERA by a Titan team since the 1995 College World Series championship season. The staff bettered that performance in 2001, ranking 14th nationally with a 3.60 ERA.

Serrano, 36, in seven years of coaching at the Division I level, has been to Omaha three times with two different programs. He was the pitching coach and recruiting coordinator in 1995 and 1996 at the University of Tennessee for Head Coach Rod Delmonico. He helped the Volunteers reach the College World Series in 1995, the first time they had visited Omaha in 44 years. At Fullerton in 1999, Serrano molded an assortment of question mark arms into an exclamation point staff that propelled Fullerton to its 10th Omaha bid.

Serrano has coached more than two dozen pitchers who are currently playing professional baseball. At Tennessee, he coached a pair of first-round draft picks in Dickey and Todd Helton, the latter of whom has blossomed into one of the best hitters in baseball after also having pitched at Tennessee.

This is Serrano's second go-around as an assistant to Horton. He worked with him at Cerritos College for three years (1988-90) before Horton moved to Fullerton in 1991 as an assistant to Augie Garrido.

Serrano remained at Cerritos through the 1994 season. In his seven-year tenure, Cerritos won a state championship (1989) and six


conference titles, including 1991, when Serrano was the Falcons' head coach and earned South Coast Conference Coach of the Year honors.

Serrano graduated from Cerritos High School in 1982 and played two seasons at Cerritos College. In 1985, he went 12-1 and earned junior college All-American honors while helping the Falcons go 39-5 and win the state championship. Serrano then pitched for Cal State Fullerton in 1986, posting a 3-4 record with one save in 15 appearances.

He and his six-year old son, Kyle, reside in Placentia.




SERRANO FAMILY: Dave and son, Kyle.



Rick Vanderhook is in his 16th season as an assistant coach for the Titans. He will again coach the outfielders and hitters, set the defense and handle third-base coaching duties. He is also a key evaluator of talent in the recruiting process and is the director of Titan Baseball Camps.

"Hook" has coached four first-round draft picks (Mike Harkey in 1987, Phil Nevin in 1992, Dante Powell in 1994 and Mark Kotsay in 1996) and a supplemental pick (Aaron Rowand in 1998) as well as 12 All-Americans since 1991.

As camp director, Vanderhook oversees all aspects of the Titan Baseball Academy, which help young players (7 to 17-years-old) reach

their top performance level. Among the graduates of Titan camps are former Titans Steve Chatham and Rowand and current Fullerton players Darric Merrell, Kyle Boyer, Jason Corapci, Nick Fitzgerald and Dustin Miller.

Vanderhook, 39, first coached at Cal State Fullerton from 1985 to 1988. After serving as a bullpen coach and working with the pitchers and catchers in 1985 and 1986, he stepped into the third-base coaching box in 1987 and began working with the hitters and defense a year later. In 15 seasons with the Titans as a player and a coach, Vanderhook has been to the College World Series seven times.

Vanderhook spent 1989 and 1990 with Coach Bill Kernen at Cal State Northridge. In 1990, the Matadors posted a 39-22 record and were the NCAA Division II runners-up. Vanderhook returned to Fullerton, along with Head Coach Augie Garrido, prior to the 1991 season.


Vanderhook has coached some of the most explosive Titan offenses in the program's history. The 1999 Titans, who made the school's 10th College World Series appearance, set school records for single-season batting average (.338) and runs per game (9.2).

Vanderhook has also coached for Fairbanks in Alaska and helped the Goldpanners finish third in the nation in 1986.

A product of the prominent Cerritos College program where he played for George Horton, Vanderhook originally came to Cal State Fullerton in 1983 and redshirted his first season with the Titans before becoming a member of the Titans' 1984 national championship team.

Vanderhook prepped at Lakewood High School under Coach John Herbold, now the head coach at Cal State Los Angeles.

He currently resides in Yorba Linda with his wife, April, daughters Noelle (6) and Autumn (4), and son R.J., who will turn 2 in April.


Chad Baum is in his second season as the Titans' volunteer assistant coach after serving in a student assistant capacity in 2000.

Baum, who graduated from Cal State Fullerton with a degree in kinesiology in 2000, was a Titan team captain in 1998 and again in 1999, when Fullerton reached the College World Series. Baum appeared in 38 games over the two-year stretch and hit three home runs in just 44 at-bats. He was also reliable behind the plate, turning in a perfect 1.000 career fielding percentage (70 chances).

Prior to his pair of seasons in a Titan uniform, Baum spent a season each at Santa Ana College and Golden West College. Baum batted .306 in 1997 for the Dons, who were ranked No.1 in the country during most of the season. He was selected in the 42nd round of the 1997 draft by the San Francisco Giants.

Baum prepped for Coach Mike Najera at Canyon H.S. in Anaheim Hills and earned honorable-mention All-Century League honors. While at Canyon, Baum hit one of nine home runs that set a one-game CIF record for the Comanches.

Baum, 24, lives in Anaheim Hills.

The former Titan spent the last six seasons as an assistant coach at JC powerhouse Cypress College, where he coached under Scott Pickler. Brown, 29, helped Cypress to a California Community College state championship in 1999, while the Chargers finished as runner-up in 1996 and 1997.

Among Brown's products were infielder Keith Ginter, who earned All-American honors at Texas Tech, and outfielder Cory Sullivan, an All-American at Wake Forest. Brown also worked with several future pros, including highly touted catcher Gerald Laird.

Brown played just one season at Cal State Fullerton, helping the Titans to their third national title in 1995. The Los Angeles native prepped at Mountain View H.S., where he earned All-CIF honors.

Brown, who holds a master's degree in English from Azusa Pacific, owns his own valet parking business. He and his wife, Olivia, reside in Whittier with their 1-year-old son, Vincent.

Two of the Titans' three no-hitters have come against Pacific - Ted Silva no-hit the Tigers in 1995 and Kirk Saarloos matched the feat in a 28-O victory last season.

2001 Im Review



▼ Super Saarloos

Kirk Saarloos compiled one of the most dominant – and memorable – seasons in Titan history. When all was said and done, Saarloos racked up a record six Big West Conference pitcher of the week awards, three national pitcher of the week honors, conference pitcher of the year and a school-record six All-American citations. Saarloos, who won his final 15 decisions after starting the season 0-2, threw the third no-hitter in school history against Pacific.

▼ Better Not Fall Behind

Fullerton was a perfect 42-0 when leading after seven innings, thanks primarily to the emergence of freshman All-American closer Chad Cordero. The "Chief" finished third in the nation with 14 saves, the most ever by a Big West Conference freshman. His 1.83 ERA would have paced the conference and been in the top 10 nationally, but he was two innings shy of qualifying.

▼ Road Warriors

Fullerton posted an impressive 21-8 record away from Goodwin Field, due largely to a pitching staff that had a 3.08 ERA away from home. The Titans also went 10-3 outside of California with a 2.19 ERA. Perhaps most impressive was the composure of freshmen Chad Cordero and Darric Merrell. Cordero was 1-1 with six saves and a 1.69 ERA away from Goodwin Field while Merrell was 5-0 with a 1.67 ERA.

▼ All in a Day's Work

Senior second baseman David Bacani became the first Big West Conference player ever to earn first-team all-conference honors four times. He ended his career on a high note, earning all-tournament honors at the College World Series, where he hit .400 with three homers and six RBI while handling 28 chances without an error.

▼ Flair for Drama

Five times – and three times against Pac-10 teams – the Titans scored the winning run in their final at bat. Fullerton posted walk-off wins against Stanford (Feb. 2), USC (March 27) and UCLA (April 18) and also scored the go-ahead run in the top of the ninth at Cal State Northridge on April 22. In their final regular season home game, the Titans posted a nine-run eighth inning to beat Long Beach State, 10-5.

▼ All-American Arms

Fullerton might have been the only school in the nation with four All-American pitchers. Kirk Saarloos earned six separate citations, Darric Merrell and Chad Cordero were both freshman All-American selections and Jon Smith was named an academic All-American.

▼ 2001 Titans Turn March Madness into Momentum

It may have coincided with the NCAA's basketball version of "March Madness," but the last week of March provided plenty of drama for the Cal State Fullerton baseball team. After starting the week with a four-run ninth-inning rally to upset 12th-ranked USC, the Titans traveled to Miami and became the first team ever to sweep eventual national champion Miami at Mark Light Stadium. With momentum on their side, the Titans won 14 consecutive games and 24 out of 25, clinched the national No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament and made their 11th trip to Omaha.

That week in March proved the turning point for a Titan team that had many scratching their heads over the first few weeks. Fullerton stumbled out to a 1-4 start and was still playing .500 ball through its first 16 games. But the Titans' pitching staff proved too good for the team to hover around .500 much longer. Led by **Kirk Saarloos**, a candidate for virtually every national player of the year award, the Fullerton hurlers took things into their own hands. In a stretch that coincided with the Titans' turnaround, Saarloos threw seven consecutive complete games, earning national Pitcher of the Week honors three times. Among Saarloos' early-season highlights was a near-perfect game vs. Brigham Young on Feb. 17 (he settled for a one-hitter after allowing a single with two outs in the eighth).

Senior lefty **Jon Smith** and freshman **Darric Merrell** filled out the starting trio that became one of the best and most reliable in the college ranks. Smith was 7-0 with a 1.67 ERA through the first 10 weeks and became the Friday night pitcher, allowing Saarloos to close if necessary. Merrell, meanwhile, became a permanent starter after some brief experimentation out of the pen. The three starters threw 25.1 of 27 innings in a three-game sweep at Houston March 9-11 and followed suit by throwing all but two innings in a series win over Cal Poly the following weekend.

In Fullerton's 5-3 nonconference win over Long Beach State on March 23, **Wes Littleton** became the first Titan other than Saarloos, Smith or Merrell to earn a win in more than five weeks. The following night, the Titans fell to the host 49ers, 3-2, in a five-hour, 16-inning affair. The Titans would not lose again for four weeks.

▼ A Week to Remember

After a win over Long Beach in the series finale, the Titans hosted USC for a midweek showdown. The 12th-ranked Trojans had an 11-8 lead heading into the bottom of the ninth but scored four runs, with **Aaron Rifkin** rapping a game-winning two-run single with two outs and two strikes.

On to Miami.

It was Spring Break week for the Titans, though Fullerton's focus was clearly not on South Beach.

Fullerton upset the No. 4 Hurricanes, 8-2, in the series opener, and clinched a series wir with an 8-5 win on Saturday. The Titans weren't in a joking mood on April 1, as they pounded Miami, 9-2, to earn the historic sweep at "The Light." Fullerton's offense, best described as inconsistent over the first two months of the season, roared to life in Coral Gables. The Hurricanes' trio of Brian Walker, Kiki Bengochea and Tom Farmer had been a combined 18-2 with a 2.55 ERA coming into the series, but they were 0-3 with a 12.91 ERA over the weekend. Fullerton flexed its muscles in the opener, blasting three home runs and collecting seven

extra-base hits, but relied on the typical Titan "line-drive" approach over the final two games. Without the benefit of the long ball, Fullerton banged out 31 hits in the pair of contests, including 15 off Miami starter Tom Farmer (the winning pitcher in the national championship game) on Sunday.

The now 18th-ranked Titans returned home to open the Big West Conference portion of their schedule against Pacific. After two closely contested Titan wins, Saarloos and the Titans made some more history in the Sunday finale. Fullerton exploded for a 28-0 win (the most runs in Goodwin Field history), but the offense was overshadowed by Saarloos, who threw the third no-hitter in Titan history. The outing earned Saarloos yet another national Pitcher of the Week bid and a record sixth

conference Pitcher of the Week award.

The Titans still had plenty of hits left in their bats 24 hours later, when they beat ASU, 13-6, in a make-up of a February rain-out. Shortstop **Mike Rouse**, voted the team's MVP on the year, was 4-for-5 on the heels of

his five-hit effort against Pacific and **Brett Kay**, recently returned from a broken thumb, had a career-best four hits.

Fullerton collected three easy wins at Sacramento State, including a 20-2 win in the opener, and added a midweek win over Loyola Marymount to stretch its winning streak to 13 games.

The Titans staged their greatest comeback of the season against UCLA on April 18. Trailing, 9-1, after five innings, Fullerton

Kirk Saarloos won his final 15 decisions, threw the third no-hitter in school history and picked up six All-American citations. ripped three homers in a six-run sixth, tacked on a run in the seventh and forced extra innings when Rouse drilled a one-out solo homer in the ninth. After four tense innings, including a 12th inning that saw both teams score, **Shane Costa** ended the drama with a two-out single in the 14th that scored **Chris Stringfellow** with the winning run. It took nearly six hours, but the Titans had extended their now national-best winning streak to 14 games.

Time for a wake-up call?

Cal State Northridge thought so, as the Matadors handed the Titans a 15-1 loss on April 20, just the second time in 27 Division I seasons that Fullerton had lost by 14 runs. And the Matadors did it with style. They hammered four consecutive home runs off Smith to open a 10-run second inning and finished with a school-record seven on the day.

But credit the Titans for clawing out a 4-3 win on Saturday, thanks to Rifkin's go-ahead home run in the top of the ninth. Saarloos picked up his 10th consecutive win on Sunday and the Titans appeared to be rolling again. A nonconference sweep of UC Riverside, midweek wins over Pepperdine and Biola and a sweep of Cal Poly helped the Titans ascend to the No. 1 spot in the *Collegiate Baseball* poll on May 7.

But UCLA, which nearly played spoiler three weeks earlier, scored a convincing 9-3 win to snap the Titans' 10-game winning streak. More importantly, the Titans lost the next two games to conference rival UC Santa Barbara and suddenly found themselves tied for first with the Gauchos with just four Big West games remaining. In the series finale against UCSB, Saarloos took a shutout into the ninth, but was tagged for four runs in the final frame and needed an assist from freshman All-American **Chad Cordero** to seal the deal. Cordero induced a game-ending line drive to center field with the bases loaded to pick up his 12th save and give the Titans the narrowest of cushions.

The Titan-49er rivalry had been marked by close, down-to-the-last-at-bat games during the last decade or so. But the first two games of the last conference series of the year were anything but. The Titans blew out Long Beach, 16-6, in the opener to clinch a share of the Big West title, but the 49ers returned the favor with a 17-6 win on Saturday. Needing a win or a UCSB loss to Cal Poly to clinch the title outright, the Titans got both on Sunday. Fullerton scored nine runs in the bottom of the eighth to beat the 49ers, 10-5.

▼ The postseason

Fullerton already knew it would play host to an NCAA Regional for a second straight year when the NCAA Baseball Committee rewarded the Titans with the National No. 1 seed, based largely on its winning percentage against perhaps the toughest nonconference schedule in the country. Remarkably, though, the Titans drew two top-25 teams in Texas Tech and Arizona State along with Temple to round out the regional field.

Fullerton coasted to a 17-3 win over Temple in the regional opener and surprised Arizona State with a 13-3 win on Saturday. Regional MVP **Shawn Norris** hit three-run homers in each of the first two games and thanks to a brilliant pitching gameplan devised by the Titan coaches, the Titans had both Merrell and Smith available for Sunday's championship showdown with Texas Tech.

Fullerton would need them both.

Merrell was touched up by the Red Raiders in an 11-5 loss and it was the senior, Smith, who delivered in the clutch, allowing just two runs in 7.2 innings in the winner-take-all game to lead Fullerton to a 9-2 win.

Thanks to its national seeding, Fullerton got to stay at home for a super regional matchup with SEC power Mississippi State, which had won its regional at Ohio State.

Fullerton used the same script in two lopsided victories over the Bulldogs, though different men played the leading roles. It was Rouse – who hit home runs in his first three at bats – and Saarloos – who allowed just four hits in seven innings – who led Fullerton to a 13-2 win in the opener. Rifkin matched Rouse with three bombs on Saturday and Merrell got past a shaky first inning to lead Fullerton to a 9-3 win and the super regional title. The Titans had clinched their 11th College World Series appearance, but got to celebrate in front of a home crowd for the first time.

The Titans were in the thick of a CWS opening day that had more fanfare than any in history. President George W. Bush became the first sitting president to attend a College World Series when he threw out the opening pitch before the Stanford-Tulane opener. The nightcap featured the Titans vs. the state of Nebraska. Nearly 23,000 red-clad fans showed up to watch the Huskers open their first CWS. It was the minority who went home happy, though, as the Titans held on for a gutsy 5-4 win. **David Bacani** hit the go-ahead home run in the bottom of the fifth inning and the Titan relief corps of **Mike Nunez** and Cordero shut down Nebraska the rest of the way while the Titans dealt Nebraska All-American Shane Komine his first loss in 15 decisions.

The Titans called on Saarloos in a second-round matchup against perennial foe Stanford. He and Stanford hurler Mike Gosling dueled late into the game, but the Titan bullpen, which had been untouchable against Nebraska, faltered in the 10th inning as the Cardinal won, 5-2.

Working out of the losers' bracket, the Titans posted a commanding 11-2 win over Tulane to knock the Green Wave out of its first College World Series. The game could have been subtitled "The David Bacani Show" as the senior second baseman hit two homers for the first time in his career while turning in several dazzling defensive plays.

The Titans got their wish – a second shot at Stanford – but Cardinal starter Jeremy Guthrie pitched as well as Gosling had three nights earlier and Stanford ended the Titans' season with a 4-1 win.

▼ Top 10 2001 Memories

As selected by the coaches

After a relatively slow start, the Titans go 24-1 over a six-week stretch from March 25 through May 6, reaching No. 1 in the Collegiate Baseball poll.

The Titans, not exactly known for their power in 2001, get three home runs from a single player in both super regional games. **Mike Rouse** hits home runs in three consecutive at-bats (including two in one inning) as the Titans rout Mississippi State, 13-2, in the opener. The next night, **Aaron Rifkin** follows suit with three round-trippers in Fullerton's 9-2 win.

Aaron Rifkin's two-out, two-strike single in the ninth scores a pair of runs to cap a four-run comeback as Fullerton beats USC, 12-11, on March 27

The Titans ride the momentum of the USC comeback to South Florida, where they become the first team ever to sweep a three-game series from eventual national champion Miami at Mark Light Stadium.

Needing a win to clinch the Big West Conference title outright, Fullerton erupts for nine runs in the eighth inning against nemesis Long Beach State en route to a 10-5 win.

After flirting with a perfect game against BYU earlier in the season, **Kirk Saarloos** throws the third nohitter in Fullerton history against Pacific on April 8. But that was only half the story...the Titans' offense rapped out 30 hits and scored a Goodwin Field-record 28 runs.

For the first time in the program's illustrious history, Fullerton captured regional and super regional titles at home. The Titans beat Texas Tech in a winner-take-all game to clinch the regional, then swept Mississippi State in front of back-to-back record crowds of 3,412.

The Titans beat Nebraska, 5-4, in perhaps the most hyped College World Series opener ever. Nearly 23,000 fans – almost all clad in red and cheering for the home state Huskers – filled Roseblatt Stadium, but the Titans showed their cool in the one-run victory.







▼ In the Beginning

1964 thru 1974

Titan baseball began in the most modest of fashions as a club team in **1964**. The founding father was University physical plant employee Beryl Kempton, who carved a diamond out of an orange grove, literally establishing the foundation for what has become arguably the most successful facet of a University now in its fifth decade and educating more than 30,000 students each semester.

Home plate of the first diamond was located near an old orchard residence, the John Hetebrink House built in 1886, which has served a variety of functions for the campus and now houses athletic department offices. The first-base line ran north and the third-base line went to the west paralleling what is now called Gymnasium Drive.

The first coach was Warren Beck, a physical education faculty member who gave way to Bill Fulton when the team assumed intercollegiate status in **1965**. The Titans played at the College Division as members of the California Collegiate Athletic Association along with Cal Poly SLO, UC Riverside, Cal State Northridge and Cal Poly Pomona. The Titans had limited resources and were competitive at best until the arrival for the 1973 season of Coach Augie Garrido from Cal Poly SLO.

A new backstop and batter's eye and such "luxuries" as electricity for the pitching machines provided Garrido the most basic of tools. His first season's record was 19-33-1 and it would be the Titans' last losing season. The Titans won the CCAA championship with a 39-11-1 season in 1974 and the stage was set for Division I play.

▼ New Bully in the Neighborhood 1975 thru 1984

Garrido's Titans made an instant splash in **1975** as a little fish in the biggest pond. They captured the Pacific Coast Athletic Association championship and then served notice by snapping USC's string of five consecutive national titles by winning their first NCAA regional tournament at Dedeaux Field. They earned their first trip to the College World Series where they were quickly eliminated by losses to Arizona State and Oklahoma. Pitcher Dan Boone, catcher Andy Pasillas and first baseman George Horton were key players that year and initiated a pipeline into the fertile California junior college ranks.

The Titans were dominant in the regular season for nine more years, running their string of conference championships to 11 in a row. They won the PCAA in 1976 and won every Southern California Baseball Association pennant through its 1977 to 1984 run. And in the post-season they proved their mettle against regional and national competition despite always playing on the road.

In 1976 they took Washington State to a final game in Pullman and in 1977 they lost to the Cougars again in Tempe. USC and Arizona were their nemesis in 1978 in Los Angeles but the Titans struck paydirt in 1979 in Fresno. After an opening loss to UCLA, they came back to beat Portland and Fresno State before sweeping a Sunday doubleheader with the Bruins to earn a return trip to Omaha. There they repeated the championship formula, falling immediately into the losers' bracket with a loss to Mississippi State before rolling through Connecticut, Ari-

zona, Arkansas, Pepperdine and Arkansas again to win the first NCAA Div. I men's championship in school history. First baseman Tim Wallach was the College Player of the Year, pitcher Tony Hudson was the MVP of the CWS and Dave Weatherman hurled a complete-game 2-1 victory in the championship game on no day's rest.

The Titans would return to Omaha twice more in the next five years and it would have been more but for the strength of the western region in that era. In 1980 they went to the Tucson regional and Arizona went on to win the national title. In 1981 they went to Tempe and were ousted by the Sun Devils, the eventual national champs. Behind the play of Mike Rubel, Mark Pirruccello and freshman John Fishel, the Titans went through powerful Arizona State in Packard Stadium in 1982 to get back to the World Series, which was now being televised nationwide on the new ESPN network. Unfortunately, the Titans left their game in Tempe and became the first CWS team to go scoreless in losses to Wichita State and Maine.

In 1983 the Titans were sent to Tempe for the third consecutive year and they were eliminated by Fresno State. But the Bulldogs

had to sit and watch the next year as Fullerton won the **1984** regional over Mark McGwire's USC team and Chris Gwynn's San Diego State squad in well over 100-degree weather in Fresno. John Bryant's single in the 11th inning of the finale scored Bob Caffrey and the 8-7 win over the Aztecs sent Fullerton to Omaha for the fourth time in its 10 years of Div. I competition.

Bryant was a hero again in Omaha. After beating Michigan, Miami, Arizona State and Oklahoma State, the Titans used Bryant's triple for a 2-run rally that was the difference in a memorable 3-1 victory over Texas and gave the Titans their second NCAA championship. The Titans won 37 of their last 42 games. Fishel was the series MVP but 5-foot-7, 133-pound lefthander Eddie Delzer captured the headlines in *Sports Illustrated* with his courageous 7-inning mound effort to get the win that was preserved by Scott Wright with his NCAA record 22nd save. Caffrey would go on to become the first Titan Olympian and join Wallach as a first-round draft choice, also by Montreal.

▼ A Couple of Blips on the Radar

1985 thru 1987

The Titans returned a solid nucleus for **1985** and ended up with a roster that featured seven players who would eventually play in the major leagues. But they failed to win the conference championship and the string of consecutive NCAA playoff appearances was snapped at 10 when they lost a PCAA playoff series at Fresno State and did not get an at-large berth with a 36-32-1 record.

The **1986** team wasn't much better, posting a 36-21 record that again left Fullerton out of the top spot in the standings and out of the NCAA Tourney. The **1987** team restored order with a 42-15 regular season record and an 18-3 PCAA championship mark. But the Titans stumbled in the post-season when sent out of the West for the first time. In New Orleans, they lost an improbable opening game to Southern and converted reliever Allan Ratliff in a 1-0 game in which the defensively-suspect Southern infielders had no chances. Mike Harkey and Larry Casian tossed shutouts to give Longo Garcia another start, vs. LSU. But the unlucky Garcia lost again, this time victimized by his fielder's mitt coming apart on what should have been a routine come-backer.

When Garrido left to accept a lucrative offer from University of Illinois Athletic Director Neale Stoner, who had hired him at Fullerton 15 years earlier, it appeared the Titans' national prominence was waning.

▼ Cochell Does Even Better

1988 thru 1990

Well-traveled Larry Cochell replaced Garrido and a different style and approach still produced success similar to what Garrido had manufactured. The Titans won a pair of regional tournaments in unlikely spots - Mississippi State and Texas - to earn Fullerton its fifth and sixth trips to Omaha in Cochell's 3-year term.

The 1988 team looked like it might be a team of destiny. After a 5-

6 start, Garrido's players adapted to the Cochell style. Despite a late-season slump after a 30-5 run, they ventured to Starkville for the NCAA playoffs. With reliever Paul Johnson turning in a clutch performance, the Titans twice beat the host Bulldogs and then posted a 5-run ninth inning capped by a two-out, three-run home run by Mike Ross to beat top-seeded Texas A&M. In Omaha, they took control of the revamped format with wins over Miami and Stanford behind Garcia and Mark Beck. But the Car-

dinal came back to beat both Titan aces on their way to the NCAA title

Despite the presence of a pair of All-Americans in Brent Mayne and David Staton, the **1989** Titans struggled all year and finished at 30-27 for their worst Div. I record ever. They finished in the second division of the standings at 10-11.

The **1990** team was picked to finish fifth in the renamed Big West Conference. When they began the year 9-9 there were stories printed that the Titan dynasty was over. It was still only a 18-16 team until back-to-back sweeps of Fresno State and UNLV sparked a 14-5 finish and a 13-5 record good enough to win the Big West and an NCAA berth. Behind two solid starts by righthander James Popoff, the Titans went 4-0 at the Austin regional, beating Texas twice. In Omaha, the Titans were stunned twice. They lost to Oklahoma State in a game that saw outfielder Rich Gonzales carried off the field after crashing into the steel wall in left field. And they lost in extra innings to The Citadel when a catcher took the mound and shut down a Titan rally.

▼ If You Build It, He Will Come...Back

1991 thru 1996

Cochell accepted a lucrative financial offer to go to Oklahoma and, with constuction of a new field underway, Garrido returned from Illinois to launch the Titans' most successful decade yet. *Baseball America* would rank the program No. 3 for the decade behind only LSU and Miami.

It started in bitter disappointment. The **1991** team won 10 of its last 12 games to post a 34-22 record that the Titans thought was sufficient to earn an at-large NCAA berth considering the circumstances of Garrido's late return, the strength of schedule, playing at Amerige Park downtown and the strong finish. The team would have gotten the Big West's automatic bid as a Big West tri-champion, but Long Beach State lost its season finale to Pacific, leaving a 2-way tie with Fresno State that worked to the Bulldogs' advantage. An at-large berth was not forthcoming (the third-place 49ers got one) and Fullerton was left to focus its frustration on the **1992** oppositon.

Led by juniors Phil Nevin and Jason Moler, the Titans christened

their long-awaited new stadium with a return to the national championship game. An overpowering performance at Baton Rouge – they outscored the opposition 35-3 – earned the Titans their seventh trip to Omaha. They beat Florida State twice and Miami two out of three times, the last time in a heavy rain shower, to get a shot at unbeaten and well-rested Pepperdine. Two schools located about 50 miles apart put on a classic show almost 2,000 miles away for a national CBS televison audience with the Waves winning, 3-2, thanks to the pitching of Patrick Ahearne, a home run by light-hitting shortstop Eric Ekdahl and a brilliant eighth-inning play by second baseman Steve Rodriguez. Nevin nevertheless earned MVP honors after being selected college Player of the Year. His also was the first name selected in the pro draft a week earlier. Both he and Moler were selected to the U.S. Olympic team and Nevin joined Wallach as a Golden Spikes Award winner.

The **1993** team couldn't overcome the losses to graduation and the pro draft. The Titans placed second in the Big West and twice lost to USC, whom they had beaten twice in the regular season, to be eliminated from the NCAA Regional in Austin and finish 35-19.

World Series. The Titans beat San Diego, Oklahoma and Georgia Tech in February and all but USD would be reunited in Omaha. Fullerton earned its eighth trip with a dramatic regional victory at Oklahoma State. The Titans had to beat Memphis in oppressive afternoon heat and humidity and then come back at night and beat a rested Cowboy team on its home field. A ninth-inning, 2-out pinch-hit single by Brian King tied the game and Robert Matos was hit by a pitch with the bases loaded to win it in the tenth.

Georgia Tech, with a quartet of future major leaguers – Brad Rigby, Nomar Garciaparra, Jason Varitek and Jay Payton – beat the weary Titans and Mike Parisi in the CWS opener, 2-0. Fullerton then pounded LSU for 11 runs in the first inning of a 20-6 victory and freshman Mark Kotsay drove in seven runs in a 10-3 win that eliminated Florida State and set up a rematch with the Yellowjackets. This one went extra innings with Garciaparra's home run the difference when the Titans couldn't score Dante Powell from third base with no outs in the bottom of the 12th and had to settle for third place.

A year later, the Titans were not denied as they compiled perhaps the best college season of all time. With Olympians Kotsay and Brian Loyd and future major leaguer Jeremy Giambi pacing the offense and Ted Silva and Kotsay anchoring the pitching staff, Fullerton went virtually wire to wire as the No. 1 team in the nation. They won everything in their reach - the Hilton Classic with Olsen the MVP; the Big West regular season; the Big West Tournament with Loyd the MVP; the regional at LSU with Jack Jones the MVP and the CWS behind MVP Kotsay. They won their final 18 games to finish 57-9 and become the first No. 1 seed at Omaha to win the title. Kotsay won Fullerton's third Golden Spikes Award after batting a then schoolrecord .422 with 21 homers and 90 RBI. To this day, Kotsay holds College World Series career records for batting average and slugging percentage.

The momentum continued into **1996**. The Titans opened the year with a 38-4 record before hitting an inexplicable slump where they lost 12 of their final 19 games. Fullerton tumbled to fourth place in the Big West and was eliminated from the BWC tourney at home by UNLV, but still got an NCAA berth at Wichita State. Kotsay tied an NCAA record with nine RBI in a rout of Delaware and a

victory over Rice set up a showdown with the host Shockers. Wichita State got a great pitching performance from tourney MVP Brandon Baird and Rice ended the Titans' season and Kotsay and Loyd's collegiate careers with a come-from-behind 13-10 decision. As part of its millenium edition, *Baseball America* selected Kotsay the college player of the decade.

Garrido left again for greener pastures, this time the historical program at Texas. His former first baseman and associate head coach for six years, George Horton, took over. Again, the program marched forward.

The **1997** team won 11 of its last 13 regular season games and then bounced back from an opening game loss to win the Big West Tournament, sweeping Long Beach State at Blair Field for an automatic NCAA bid. Good pitching and an aborted ninth-

inning rally knocked the Titans out of the regional at Stanford. The **1998** squad reversed the pattern, winning the Big West regular season title but losing the tournament at home to Long Beach. They got sent to Baton Rouge for the third time in the decade and won two games before taking a big lead over the host Tigers behind pitching ace Benito Flores. But LSU flexed its muscles and came back to beat Fullerton twice.

The most productive Titan offense ever - .338 batting average and 9.2 runs per game - carried Cal State Fullerton back to Omaha in **1999.** Again, the Titans advanced via the road, winning the regional at Notre Dame and capturing the super regional at Ohio State. But the bats went quiet in Fullerton's 10th trip to Omaha, where they shared in the 50th Anniversary celebration. The Titans sandwiched a win over Texas A&M between losses to Stanford and Florida State en route to a fifth-place finish.

The Titans' 38 wins in **2000** marked their fewest since the 1993 campaign, but they still captured a share of the BWC championship. The season also marked the start of a \$3 million renovation to the Titans' facility, which saw its official name changed to Goodwin Field. With the complex's increased seating capacity, Fullerton finally was named to host an NCAA regional after 22 on the road, but the second-seeded Titans couldn't get by red-hot USC. Adam Johnson was named BWC Pitcher of the Year after leading the nation in strikeouts and he was selected second overall in the MLB Draft.

After a sluggish start, the **2001** Titans traveled to Miami and became the first team ever to sweep the eventual national champion Hurricanes on their home turf at Mark Light Stadium. The sweep was the highlight in a stretch that saw the Titans go 24-1 and claim the No. 1 spot in the nation in one poll. Fullerton, seeded first in the nation for postseason play, won a regional and super regional at Goodwin Field to clinch a CWS berth in front of a home crowd for the first time. After beating sentimental favorite Nebraska in the CWS opener, Fullerton ran into Stanford, which beat the Titans twice, though Fullerton was able to sandwich in a win over Tulane. Senior Kirk Saarloos, who pitched the third nohitter in Titan history, led a quartet of All-American pitchers.

▼ History at a Glance

- Cal State Fullerton won national championships in 1979, 1984 and 1995. Its most recent championship capped off a 57-9 season where the Titans finished the 1995 campaign with an 18-game winning streak. They became the first No, 1 seed to win the national title since seeding began in 1988 and the 14th team to advance through the NCAA Regionals and College World Series without a loss.
- Cal State Fullerton is one of only three schools (Arizona State and Florida State are the others) to have three Golden Spikes Award winners. The award is given annually by USA Baseball to the top amateur player in the nation. The Titans who won the award were Tim Wallach (1979), Phil Nevin (1992) and Mark Kotsay (1995).
- Mark Kotsay and Brian Loyd represented Cal State Fullerton and the United States at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, Georgia. In winning the bronze medal as part of Team USA, Kotsay and Loyd joined three other Titans who have been members of Team USA (Bob Caffrey in 1984 and Phil Nevin and Jason Moler in 1992).
- Thirty-five Titans have gone on to play Major League Baseball. A trio of former Titans made their debuts in 2001: Adam Johnson (Minnesota), Aaron Rowand (White Sox) and Brandon Duckworth (Philadelphia).
- Cal State Fullerton is 89-48 (.650) in NCAA postseason play and is ranked in the top five all-time in winning percentage for teams that have played more than 100 postseason games.
- No school has made more trips to Omaha, Nebraska and the College World Series by winning on the road. Cal State Fullerton has won 10 Regional titles and one Super Regional title, all on the road. In 2001, the Titans clinched a CWS berth in front of a home crowd for the first time.
- In 27 years at the Division I level, the Titans have made it to the NCAA Tournament 23 times. Their current streak of 10 consecutive NCAA appearances is the fifth longest active streak in the nation.
- Adam Johnson became the eighth Titan to be selected in the first round of the Major League Baseball draft when Minnesota selected him second overall in June, 2000. Other Titans selected in the first round: Mark Kotsay (Florida, 1996), Tim Wallach (Montreal, 1979), Bob Caffrey (Montreal, 1984), Mike Harkey (Chicago Cubs, 1987), Brent Mayne (Kansas City, 1988), Phil Nevin (Houston, 1992) and Dante Powell (San Francisco, 1994).
- Cal State Fullerton has had 49 All-Americans and 126 first-team all-conference selections in its 27-year Division I history. CSF first joined the Pacific Coast Athletic Association in 1975 when it made the jump to Division I. The baseball conference was not in existence from 1977 to 1984 (CSF played in the SCBA), but returned in 1985. On July 1, 1988, the PCAA officially changed its name to the current Big West Conference.
- The Titans have never had a losing season in the 27-year history of the program at the Division I level and have never gone winless in 23 years of NCAA postseason competition.






- Dan Boone...No. 12...LHP...1975-76...A member of Fullerton's first Division I team, Boone became the first Titan to pitch in the majors when he debuted for San Diego on April 11, 1981...Earned a pair of first-team all-conference bids while going a combined 22-6 with a 2.29 ERA over his two seasons...His career ERA is still the third lowest in Titan history and his single-season marks of 2.26 (1976) and 2.32 (1975) are among the nine best...Drafted by California in the second round of the secondary phase in 1976.
- Bob Caffrey...No. 14...C...1982-84...A pure physical talent behind the plate, Caffrey was a key cog on the Titans' 1984 College World Series championship team...Set the school single-season record for home runs (28) which he still holds and drove in 90 runs, but was overlooked on the All-American teams...Picked to the CWS All-Tournament team...Was the first Titan to play in the Olympics when he wore the Red, White and Blue in Los Angeles in 1984...Became the second Titan to be drafted in the first round when Montreal selected him in 1984.
- John Fishel...No. 12...OF...1982-85...Textbook definition for "every-day player"...Holds seemingly unbreakable NCAA records for career games (295) and at bats (1,114)...Is also first on the Titans' career list in hits, RBI, doubles and total bases...Second-team All-American pick by Baseball America in 1984, when he batted .378 with 16 homers and 88 RBI...Capped the season by earning MVP honors at the College World Series, where he banged out 13 hits in six games to help the Titans to their second title...Drafted in the ninth round by Houston in 1985.
- Augie Garrido...No. 16...Head Coach...1973-87; 1991-96...Took the Titans from the most limited of resources to seven College World Series appearances, one runner-up finish (1992) and three titles (1979, 1984, 1995)...One of just two coaches to have won national titles in three different decades...Named National Coach of the Year in 1975, 1979, 1984 and 1995...Posted an 875-341-5 record (.719 winning percentage) in his 19 seasons with Fullerton at the Division I level...Won conference championships his first 11 seasons and 16 of 19 overall...Was the driving force behind the construction of Titan Stadium (now Goodwin Field)...Now the head coach at Texas.
- Mark Kotsay...No. 7...OF/P...1994-96...Arguably, the best and most decorated player to ever wear a Titan uniform...Three time All-American and only Titan ever to earn consensus first-team All-American honors twice...Among the top five career leaders in virtually every Titan offensive category, including first in batting average (.404), second in home runs (45) and second in RBI (216)...Named collegiate player of the decade (1990s) by Baseball America...Earned Golden Spikes Award and Smith Award in 1995 as college baseball's top player...Also named Player of the Year by Collegiate Baseball...Named College World Series MVP in 1995 after batting .563 and slugging 1.250...Is still the career CWS leader in batting (.517) and slugging (1.103)...Member of the 1996 US Olympic team, which captured a bronze medal in Atlanta...Drafted in the first round by Florida in 1996.

- Tim Wallach...No. 29...1B...1978-79...The first national high-profile player at Fullerton, Wallach won the 1979 Golden Spikes Award, was named *The Sporting News* Player of the Year and was a consensus first-team All-American after leading the Titans to their first CWS title....Batted .391 with 23 home runs and a still-standing school-record 102 RBI...Earned CWS All-Tournament honors...Batted .394 with 16 home runs and 80 RBI in 1978...Selected in the first round of the 1979 draft by Montreal.

- Harkey, Schooler, Turner, Fishel, Reimer, Casian and J. Mota were all on the 1985 Titan team which failed to win the PCAA championship and snapped Fullerton's string of 10 consecutive trips to the NCAA playoffs.
- Catcher Brent Mayne became the first Major League position player in 32 years to post a pitching win when he worked a scoreless 12th inning in Colorado's 7-6 win over Atlanta on Aug. 22, 2000.
- Frank Charles played for nine years in the minor leagues before finally making his Major League debut for Houston on Sept. 5, 2000.
- Phil Nevin was one of just five players in the National League in 2001 to hit .300 or better with at least 40 homers and 100 RBI. The others were Barry Bonds, Sammy Sosa, Todd Helton and Luis Gonzalez.
- Adam Johnson, the second pick in the 2000 draft, was also the second player from that draft class to appear in the Majors. He struck out Mark McGwire in his debut against St. Louis on July 16, 2001.





▼ One for the ages...

Mike Rouse banged out five hits - including two homers - and scored five runs in a 28-0 win over Pacific on April 8, 2001, but his feats almost went unnoticed. Instead, the spotlight was on Kirk Saarloos, who threw the third no-hitter in Cal State Fullerton history. The Titans' 28 runs marked their third highest total ever and their most in the 10-year history of Goodwin Field. It also surpassed the Titans' 19-0 win over UNLV in 2000 as the most lopsided shutout in program history. In fact, the Titan coaching staff had thoughts about lifting Saarloos after the Titans grabbed a 24-0 lead in the fifth inning. But perhaps the staff saw destiny at work and Saarloos certainly took advantage of the opportunity. He allowed just two base runners, retired 22 batters over one stretch and wrapped things up in 2:41, despite the Titans' offensive onslaught.



The Titan Tradition...

From modest beginnings and never with abundant resources, the Cal State Fullerton Titans have achieved successes that are the envy of many older and larger institutions across the country.

"Titan Pride" has been the rallying cry for 11 national team championships in seven different sports, hundreds of individual All-Americans, dozens of eventual professional athletes, numerous national coach of the year award winners, Olympic basketball players, a Miss America candidate and the subject matter of a Walt Disney film.

The tenor was set by the first intercollegiate team - men's basketball. In only his second season, Coach Alex Omalev advanced the Titans five rounds into the NAIA playoffs in 1961-62. Sixteen seasons later, the nation watched another "Cinderella" Titan Five advance to within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association postseason tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the NCAA Western Regional.

The basketball tradition began even stronger on the women's side. Recent Naismith and Women's Basketball Hall of Fame inductee Billie Moore coached the Titans to the national championship in 1970 and star forward Nancy Dunkle was one of her players on the women's 1976 silver-medal winning Olympic team. The most recent Titan All-American was center Genia Miller in 1991.

The Titans earned gold in 1984 when point guard Leon Wood directed the men's Olympic team to victory in Los Angeles. The first-round draft pick of the Philadelphia 76ers went on to a 6-year National Basketball Association career and he currently is in his third season as a referee, only the second former NBA player to make that career switch.

Future NBA performers Richard Morton, Henry Turner, Cedric Ceballos and Bruce Bowen were some of the stars of the 1980s and 1990s, when the Titans made NIT appearances on both the men's and women's sides. Ceballos gained notoriety for winning the NBA Slam-Dunk contest one year while the women can point with pride to Autumn Hollyfield, the nation's top 3-point field goal shooter in 1993-94, and Koko Lahanas, the nation's scoring leader in 1994-95. Miller still holds NCAA records and came back from a career in Japan to earn a spot with the Los Angeles Sparks of the WNBA as Eugenia Rycraw.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton considerable fame. Former men's Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division NCAA titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and had subsequent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation. Coach Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished sixth or better in the nation 12 times and won the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while Tami Elliott (1984-86) won 10 All-American awards


before becoming Miss Virginia and competing in the Miss America pageant.

Baseball exploded onto the national scene behind former Coach Augie Garrido by breaking the USC monopoly in the NCAA western regionals in 1975. The Titans won the national title in 1979 behind Tim Wallach, who would play 17 major league seasons. They won the College World Series again in 1984 and John Fishel was the MVP of the CWS. They were national runners-up in 1992 with another MVP in third baseman Phil Nevin, who also was the first pick in the amateur draft by the Houston Astros.

The Titans placed third in the CWS in 1994 and came back with their best season ever in 1995, going 57-9 en route to their third national championship. Leading the way was Player of the Year Mark Kotsay, now with the San Diego Padres, and one of 35 former Titans to have played in the majors. Fullerton has made a pair of trips to Omaha under Coach George Horton, finishing as high as third in the nation in 2001.

Five players have become Olympians with Kotsay and Brian Loyd helping the U.S. win a bronze medal in 1996 in Atlanta. Nevin, Jason Moler and Bob Caffrey are the other Fullerton baseball Olympians.

Women also have sparkled on Fullerton diamonds. Hall of Fame Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and won more games (913) than any previous Division I coach. The Titans have made eight trips to the College World Series and 20 regional appearances. They brought



home an NCAA Championship in 1986 and boast three national players of the year in pitchers Kathy Van Wyk, Susan LeFebvre and Connie Clark.

The now-defunct football program made great strides in Division I-A after its humble Div. II beginnings in 1970. Coach Gene Murphy guided the Titans to two conference championships and four runner-up finishes between 1983 and 1989. Titan products included Super Bowl rookies Bobby Kemp (Cincinnati in 1982) and Mark Collins (New York Giants in 1987). Titans have starred in the Canadian Football League led by receiver Allen Pitts of Calgary, 1995 MVP Mike Pringle of Baltimore and perennial quarterback star Damon Allen.

With the loss of football, Head Coach Al Mistri's soccer program filled the void in Titan Stadium. A women's squad was launched in 1993 and it coincided with a memorable men's season that saw the Titans climb as high as No. 3 in the national rankings. They were led by All-American forward (and current Titan assistant) Eddie Soto and competed at the NCAA Final Four, placing third. There have been four subsequent trips to the playoffs and a No. 2 national ranking in 1996. Four former Titans were on 2001 MLS rosters and on the international level, former Titan Brian Dunseth captained the U.S. Olympic team in the 2000 Sydney games.

There have been national titles in men's cross country (1971) and women's fencing (1974) and individual standouts such as golfer Martha Wilkerson, runner Mark Covert and wrestler Laszlo Molnar, who finished second in the nation in 1994 at 167 pounds.

Heather Killeen became the Titans' first Div. I cross country All-American in 1994, won three events at the 1995 Big West Conference track championships and was one of 10 finalists for 1995 NCAA Woman of the Year Award. The Titans have a rising star in junior Brandon Campbell. He became the first Titan to compete in the Pan-Am Junior Games and won a silver medal in 1999 in the high jump. He holds six school records, was the 2001 Big West Conference male track Athlete of the Year and also plays on the basketball team.

Why the nickname?

"It was the students' decision in a vote," explained Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname "Titans." "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College.


"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories were named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done but then along came the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became known that spring afternoon in 1962.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions of the caricature have been made to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek. The costume that brings the mascot to life also has changed. Tuffy even attracted a female Tiffy in 1992.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was appropriate on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987. A change to a navy blue was initiated in 1992 with a de-emphasis of the orange.



Titan Gymnasium

Titan Gymnasium undoubtedly has a place in Cal State Fullerton lore, having served as the backdrop for such memorable triumphs as the men's basketball team's 1983 upset of No. 1 UNLV. Titan Gym also has an impressive international history — it served as the venue for 1984 Olympic team handball — and political history — former President Ronald Reagan made his last Orange County appearance at Titan Gym while campaigning for his successor, George Bush. The facility also features practice and match rooms for the wrestling, gymnastics and fencing programs. Titan Gym is scheduled to undergo an expansion in the near future, which will add significant office space and a practice facility.

Goodwin Field

Goodwin Field was the host site for Cal State Fullerton's first NCAA Baseball Regional in the spring of 2000 and also played host to a Regional and Super Regional in 2001. A \$3 million expansion project, spearheaded by a \$1 million gift from Jerry and Merilyn Goodwin, has transformed the field into one of the premier collegiate facilities on the West Coast. The field now features the Wilson Clubhouse - which includes lockerrooms, a reception area and offices for the coaches - and the Doubek VIP Room.

Titan Stadium

Titan Stadium is considered among the finest soccer facilities in the nation and regularly hosts professional and international soccer matches in addition to the Titan men's and women's programs. The facility, completed in 1992, was home to the Titan football program for one year before the sport was dropped after the 1992 season. The stadium is also a hot-spot for the entertainment industry and is regularly featured in television commercials and programs.

Titan Softball Complex

Having received a complete makeover since the 2000 season, the Titan Softball Complex boasts one of the top facilities in the nation. Utilizing the adjacent Wilson Clubhouse and Doubek VIP Room, the two-diamond complex can now adequately serve as a host site for postseason competition in addition to the annual Kia Klassic, the top tournament in the nation.



Cal State Fullerton student-athletes have yearround access to the services offered by the Strength and Conditioning Program, under the direction of Mike Nagler. Aimed at developing speed, power, strength and endurance in Cal State Fullerton's student-athletes, the program plays a key role in the success of Titan teams.

Individual workouts are designed, implemented and regularly adjusted by Nagler to help each student-athlete develop the stamina needed to maintain the rigorous year-round workouts associated with Division I sports.



Now located inside Titan Stadium is a 6,000 squarefoot weight room facility featuring eight platforms, eight squat racks, plyometric devices and nearly 8,000 pounds in free weights. The facility will service more than 300 student-athletes over the course of the year.

Mike Nagler was named Cal State Fullerton's first full-time strength and conditioning coach on Jan. 4, 2000. Nagler had spent the previous 17 months as assistant strength coach at the University of Iowa. At Iowa, Nagler was in charge of developing and implementing weight lifting programs for women's basketball, volleyball, women's soccer, men's and women's track, gymnastics, softball and men's and women's golf. He also assisted with the men's basketball program.

He also previously worked as an assistant at Baylor University, the University of Washington, UNLV and Washington State and served as an intern with the NFL's Seattle Seahawks.

Nagler, 30, earned his bachelor's degree in exercise science from Washington State in 1993 and picked up a master's degree in kinesiology from UNLV in 1996.



Brian Quinn assumed the post of director of athletics at Cal State Fullerton on Jan. 14, 2002.

Quinn, 60, was assistant dean and AD at Loyola Marymount University from 1985 through 1998. During his tenure the Lions won nine West Coast Conference titles and advanced to the NCAA men's basketball tournament three times. Both the baseball team and the women's volleyball team made five trips to the NCAA Playoffs with the baseball team reaching the College World Series in 1986. Among his accomplishments away from competition were bringing the department into full Title IX compliance and earning a 10-year NCAA ac-

creditation without conditions in 1997.

In June of 1998, Quinn was appointed executive director of athletic development and promotion. He was responsible for major gift solicitation to build new recreation and health facilities, new athletic offices and auxiliary services as well as improved playing facilities.

Quinn graduated from Loyola in 1963 with a degree in business. He was a starter for the Lions in both baseball and basketball and was captain and most valuable player of the latter for the 1962-63 season. He was inducted into the LMU Athletics Hall of Fame as both a player and administrator.

Quinn began a teaching and coaching career at St. Anthony H.S. in Long Beach in 1968 and earned a master's degree at Long Beach State in 1973. He moved on to St. Bernard H.S. in Playa Del Rey, University H.S. in Irvine and Irvine H.S., where he was the head basketball coach. He was a part-time physical education instructor at Saddleback College (North campus) and assistant principal at Woodbridge H.S. in Irvine from 1980-85.

Quinn and his wife, Collette, live in Manhattan Beach. They have four adult children: Andrew, who lives in Atlanta; Janet, who lives in Rye, New York; and two recent LMU graduates in daughters Suzanne and Maureen. The Quinns have three grandchildren — Brendan, Ryan and Dylan.



Dr. Maryalyce Jeremiah is in her 10th year as Senior Associate Director of Athletics/Senior Woman Administrator for the Titans.

Dr. Jeremiah is primarily responsible for overseeing athletic department academics, assisting with departmental planning and financial forecasting and supervising volleyball, gymnastics, wrestling, women's basketball and softball.

She is chairperson of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee. Additionally, she is a member of the Big West Conference Athletics Council and serves on Cal State Fullerton's Academic Senate executive

committee and university planning committee .

In her seven years as the Titan's women's basketball coach, Jeremiah compiled a 112-93 record and in 1990-91, she guided the team to a 25-9 season (most wins in school history) and the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Following the season, Jeremiah was recognized with both District 8 and Big West coach-of-the-year honors.

She also was the recipient of the Carol Eckman Award, given by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association to the coach who best represents sportsmanship and ethics in the coaching profession. Jeremiah finished her 23-year coaching career with a 375-236 record.

She has a Ph.D. and a master's degree in physical education from The Ohio State University, as well as undergraduate degrees from Cedarville College and Central State University.

Dr. Milton A. Gordon was selected the fourth president of Cal State Fullerton by The California State University Board of Trustees and assumed his duties on Aug. 6, 1990.

His university leadership includes serving as vice president for academic affairs at Sonoma State University for four years, as dean of the College of the Arts and Sciences for Chicago State University for more than eight years and as director of the Afro-American Studies Program at Loyola University of Chicago for six years.

President Gordon also taught at the Illinois Institute of Technology and in the Chicago public schools and served as mathematician at the University of Chicago's Laboratories of Applied Sciences.

He is the vice chairman of the NCAA Presidents Commission and the California state representative to the American Association of State Colleges and Universities. 

Fullerton, a city of more than 123,000 inhabitants, is located in North Orange County, about 30 miles southeast of central Los Angeles. It is part of the Southern California population center and within easy freeway access of all the diverse natural and cultural attractions of this region.

Orange County, with an area of 782 square miles, is the 48th in size of California's 58 counties, but it is the third largest county in population (2.7 million). Orange County has experienced during the last four decades almost unprecedented growth as communities continue to occupy the diminishing expanses of open land.

Today, there co-exists an interesting mixture of the old and new economic and life styles in Orange County. Underneath the soil, archeologists and bulldozers uncover traces of the hunting and gathering Indian bands who flourished at least as early as 4,000 years ago in what was a benign and bountiful region.

More visible traces remain of the Spanish and Mexican periods and cultures: Mission San Juan Capistrano, which began the agricultural tradition in Orange County, and subsequent adobes from the great land grants and ranches that followed. Additionally, both customs and many names persist from this period, and so does some ranching. The architectural and other evidences of the subsequent pioneer period are still quite visible: farmsteads, old buildings from the new towns that were established in the late 1800s, mining operations, and traces of early resort and other types of promotional activities. For about 100 years, farming was the main economic activity with products such as grapes, walnuts, vegetables and oranges replacing the older wheat and cattle ranches. Today, agriculture still is very important. Orange County ranks high among California's counties in mineral production with its oil, natural gas, sand and gravel, and clay mining and processing activities.

The extensive development of the 42 miles of beaches in Orange County and the development of such attractions as Disneyland, Knott's Berry Farm, the Laguna Festival of Arts and Pageant of the Masters, the Arrowhead Pond of Anaheim, Edison International Field and Convention Center and the Orange County Performing Arts Center continue to make tourism an increasingly important activity. So does the Mediterranean-type climate, with rainfall averaging 14 inches per year, and generally mild days (either freezing or 100-degree temperatures uncommon) with frequent morning fog during the summer. Both downtown Los Angeles and the Pacific Ocean can be reached by car in half an hour, and mountain and desert recreation areas are as close as an hour's drive from the campus.
